NOTE:

The characters depicting happiness and sadness and the Witch Doctor go through the pageant. The Witch Doctor becomes the Voodoo and in the last episode he becomes the Medical Doctor. The Minister is an offspring who on being acquainted to Miss Civilization, learns the difference between science and things spiritual. The two dancers become one Miss Jazz and the other Miss Blues. Here once more Miss Civilization keeps them balanced in the human

Moorland-Spine

The King of Krall calls his subjects and prepares for feast. He denounces the Witch Doctor for his manacling Miss Happiness, and orders Miss Sadness executed. He prepares with great gusto for the public demonstration. He calls for a feast. All the tribe assembles. The day is given over to revelry. There is an over indulgence in the spirit of happiness, riotous drinking and danc-ing. The Witch Doctor is furious. Ris wild protestation and demonstration of anger only brings laughs from the King and his drinking subjects. As the revelry reaches the climax, the outer guards of the village rush in and announce an attack of another tribe. The drums of war sound. The attack is on. In their drunken state the viled away to be sold to slave traders.

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Moorland-Spingarn Research Scene 1 (As the ship approaches the shores of America, the native African melody becomes flavored with the American Christian hymns.) Scene 2 The entire tribe captured in Africe is brought on. The former King becomes the head servant at the big house. The Witch Doctor becomes the Voodoo man, adopting Christian religious teachings in his ceremonies. Both Miss Bappinese and Miss Sadness are there, but Miss Happiness quite to the Voodoo Doctor's delight is subdued by the system of slavery.) The Eing who is at the big house learns by hearing the White Mistress of the house reading to her children about God and Christ and the salvation of a soul, and how those that believe in this God and Christ will be made free -- even as the children of Israel became free, some day a Moses would come and make them free. In the dark of the night he would take some of his trusted followers way down in the corner of the plantation and preach to them. He encouraged them to be patient be faithful - and work and pray and some day they would be free. He told them to trust in the God of Moses who delivered the children of Israel. He taught them to sing in symbols so that the overseers would not know what they were singing about. The lyrics were cleverly composed so they would carry a double meaning. Example (Steal Away To Jesus)

He encouraged the spirit of Happiness, but wished it only to be expressed in religious ceremony. Altho he winked at it in the form of folk dancing, he admonished his flock lest they should stray from his teaching of the scripture. The Voodoo man knowing his enemy the captured and enslaved former King, dare not let the Master or overseers know the subject of his preaching, was thus left free to practice his develtry. The preaching King how-ever got too strong for the Voodoo man and in a jealous rage, the Voodoo Doctor betrays the preacher to his Master. On the auction block they are sold down the river and the tribe is broken up. But the Gospel is spread. His deciples carry the news from one plantation to another. The feud between the Voodoo and preachers goes on (happiness the spirit of one and sadness the spirit of the other) to Smaneipation Day.
