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12th Annual James A. Porter Colloquium on African American Art Migrations and the Diaspora: Caribbean and African American Connections



April 6 and 7, 2001

he Department of Art at Howard University and the Smithsonian's Anacostia Museum and Center for African American History and Culture are co-sponsoring the 12th Annual James A. Porter Colloquium on African American Art, Migrations and the Diaspora: Caribbean and African American Connections. The Colloquium was initiated in the Spring of 1990. Since that time, it has been held each year on the Howard University campus. In 1998, the Anacostia Museum and Center for African American History and Culture joined the Howard University Art Department in sponsoring the 9th Annual James A. Porter Colloquium and has subsequently served as a co-sponsor.

The colloquium was named after noted art historian and artist James A. Porter (1905-1970), former professor and chair of the Howard University Art Department and director of the Gallery of Art. James A. Porter was one of the finest American art historians of this century, producing the first in-depth scholarship in African American art history. The colloquium brings together art historians, cultural critics, artists, and interdisciplinary scholars to focus on important issues pertaining to the visual arts and culture of African Americans and the Diaspora. Its principal aims are to provide a forum for scholars and advanced students to present their research findings and to discuss current issues, problems, and concepts in African American art and culture; introduce the visual arts community to current issues in African American art by bringing together art historians and scholars who are engaged in pioneering research in the field; and compile a series of papers for publication that would serve to expand, update, and encourage more in-depth research and scholarly writing on African American art and culture.
