





On the cover is the former campus of Dunbarton College, a women's liberal arts school, which Howard University purchased early this year from the Sisters of the Holy Cross. The University's School of Law has been relocated here as well as several graduate research institutes, the University Press, the University Legal Counsel, the Department of Alumni Affairs, and *New Directions* editor's office. The four buildings on the 19.4-acre property, at 2935 Upton Street, N.W., comprise about 220,000 gross square feet.
