Scope Note

The papers of Illinois Congressman, William L. Dawson (1886-1970), span the period of 1942-1972 and measure approximately 5 linear feet. Correspondence and legislative material highlighting Dawson's political career form the bulk of the collection. The correspondence is arranged alphabetically and includes such notables as Chester Bowles, Ralph J. Bunche, William Henry Huff, Ira Latimer, F.D. Patterson, and Walter White.

The legislative material is arranged chronologically by session of Congress. This series includes civil rights bills, resolutions, motions, and reports supported by Congressman Dawson. Some of the folders include correspondence reflecting Dawson and his colleagues' opinions of the various bills. Dawson was particularly supportive of legislation concerning anti-lynching, anti-poll tax, and fair employment.

Personal papers include brief biographical sketches of Dawson, material from his retirement and funeral, and campaign flyers; both pro- and anti-Dawson. There is additional campaign material among the oversized items. The collection contains a few photographs, including Dawson with Presidents Truman, Kennedy, and Johnson.

There is a substantial amount of material documenting the role that Christine R. Davis, his congressional secretary and later chief of staff of the House Government Operations Committee, played in Washington and Chicago politics.

Scope Note continued

Correspondence, writings, and organizational material document her activities. Davis corresponded with such notables as Mary McLeod Bethune, Jacqueline and John F. Kennedy, Adam Clayton Powell, and Arthur Spingarn. Christine Davis donated the Dawson papers to the Moorland-Spingarn Research Center in 1980.

Biographical sketches, material from Dawson's retirement and funeral, and campaign material document Congressman Dawson's achievements in politics. Of note are the pro- and anti-Dawson campaign flyers and "Mississippians For Eisenhower," a paid political advertisement for the Eisenhower-Nixon ticket that includes excerpts from Truman's procivil rights Harlem speech.

Correspondence

Arranged alphabetically, this series includes correspondence from such notables as Chester Bowles, Ralph J. Bunche, William Henry Huff, Ira Latimer, F.D. Patterson, and Walter White. Included is a series of correspondence regarding the establishment of a George Washington Carver Stamp. Included are letters of support from Crystal Bird Fauset, Henry Ford, William Hastie, Watkins Hunt, Mordecai Johnson, Louis R. Mehlinger, F.D. Patterson, Frank Walker.

This series is comprised of four speeches. Two were published in the proceedings of the Democratic National Conventions of 1952 and 1960, one in the <u>Congressional Record</u>. All were delivered before <u>Congress</u>.

Personal papers, correspondence, speeches, organizational affiliations, events, and dailyreminders document Davis' role as Dawson's congressional secretary and later chief of staff of the House Government Operations Committee. Personal papers include biographical sketches, newspaper articles and a diary of Davis' 1952 trip with the Bonner Subcommittee. Correspondence includes such notables as Mary McLeod Bethune, Jacqueline and John F. Kennedy, Adam Clayton Powell, and Arthur Spingarn. The sub-series, Events, includes Davis' working papers and invitation lists to various political events.

Biographical Sketch

William L. Dawson

April 26, 1886	Born in Albany, Georgia to Rebecca Kendrick and Levi Dawson.
1909	Graduated from Fisk University.
1912	Moved to Chicago.
1917-1919	Commissioned a First Lieutenant in the 365th Regiment of the 92nd Infantry. He was injured in combat.
1920	Earned his law degree from Northwestern University and became a member of the Illinois bar.
1928	Entered politics and unsuccessfully challenged veteran Congressman Martin B. Madden.
1930-1932	Served as State Central Committeeman for the First Congressional District of Illinois.
1933-1939	Running as a Republican, he was elected as an alderman to the Chicago City Council from the 2nd Ward.
1939	Joined the Democratic party.
1942-1970	Served in the House of Representatives from the 78th to the 90th Congresses.
1945	Introduced legislation (H. Res 48) to establish a special committee to investigate race relations in the United States.
1949-1970	Assumed the chair of the House Committee on Governmental Operations. He was the first African-American chairman of a congressional committee. He served in this position until his death.
June 20, 1970	Retired from Congress.
November 9, 1970	Died in Chicago. His ashes are in a Columbarium in Griffin Funeral Home, Chicago, Ill.
