US Colored Troop Clothing Books

Contains correspondence, applications for appointment registers, rosters and other papers concerning colored recruitment, organization and service of colored units and their officers. Other records include a colored troop register showing whether an enlistee was slave or free on or before April 19, 1861, and record of regiments of U.S.C.T., 1863-65. Immediately after the issuance of the Emancipation Proclamation, efforts were begun by the Federal Government to raise colored troops. A bureau for colored troops was established in the Adjutant General's Office May of 1863. The draft was generally supervised by the Bureau for Colored Troops of the Adjutant- General's Office. After the war, the Bureau became known as the Colored Troops Division, and in 1879 it inherited the remaining function of the Freedmen's Branch, It was consolidated with the Volunteer Service Division, in 1888 and was transferred with that Division to the Records and Pension (R&P) Division of the War Department on July 16, 1889.
