AT THE meeting of the National Dental Association held in Louisville, Ky., last August, the College of Dentistry of Howard University was represented by Dean Russell A. Dixon and Drs. Adolphus Walton, John A. Turner, Percy A. Fitzgerald and Jackson L. Davis. Drs. Walton and Fitzgerald gave interesting clinics in their respective fields. Dr. Davis, of the Department of Operative Dentistry, was chosen President-elect of the Association, and Dr. Turner, of the Department of Oral Surgery, was elected Regional Vice-President. We feel sure that the duties of these offices will be discharged in a manner to reflect credit upon the incumbents, the school, and the association itself.

We miss the efficient services and the happy association of Dr. Percy A. Fitzgerald, of the Crown and Bridge Department, who is away on a year's leave of absence pursuing graduate study in Ceramics and Crown and Bridge Work at Northwestern University.

We are very pleased to announce formally the promotion of Dr. John A. Turner from Instructor in Dentistry to the rank of Assistant Professor of Oral Surgery, effective July 1, 1935.

Two newly appointed instructors have joined our faculty ranks. They are: Dr. Herman E. Gaskins, one of our own graduates of the Class of 1934, and Dr. Raymond L. Hayes, of the University of Indiana, of the Class of 1935.

The first faculty seminar for the school year 1935-36 was held on Monday, November 4, in the Dental Building. Dr. C. Thurston Ferebee addressed the meeting on the subject, "The Present Status of Periodontia and Its Importance in Oral Medicine." Hendrick and Turner were the hosts at this meeting, and served a very tasty buffet supper. All were present and accounted for, and the success of the party was unanimously voted.

The Dental Hygienists were hostesses to the Faculty on November 21st at a tea given in the auditorium of the College of Pharmacy. On this occasion Dean Dixon addressed the class on "The Early Beginnings and the Development of Dental Hygiene as a Profession." Miss Amanda Bowman gave a very splendid report of the class activities so far. It was announced that Miss Marie Abrams, Dental Hygienist, Howard, '35, is engaged in volunteer work at Provident Hospital, Chicago, Illinois.

Several contributions to the dental museum have been received this fall. We again express very deep appreciation for the aid we have received so far in building up this feature of the College. We hope the graduates and friends will continue to contribute such worth while specimens as may come to their attention.
