# a M. White, 94, Dies After Long Illness

Mrs. Ida MacLennan White, 94, a resident of Pasadena for the past 30 years, died last night at her home at 815 North Hill Avenue, after an illness of several years.

Born in Salineville, Ohio, Feb. 14, 1857, she received her preliminary education in country schools near her home. Later, after graduating from Oberlin College, she taught in Michigan and New York prior to being commissioned by the American Board of Foreign Missions to service in Japan. She then was stationed in Okayama for eight years as head English instructor in a girls' school.

### Returned in 1920

In June, 1892, she married Rev. Schuyler S. White. They made their home for the rest of their stay in Japan at Tsuyama, except for three years in Tokyo.

She and her late husband resigned and returned to the United States in 1920, after Mrs. White was taken seriously ill with an oriental disease. They then located in Pasadena and became affiliated with the First Congregational Church. Her husband was connected with the Japanese Union Church here until his death Feb. 20, 1939.

She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Lee Bone, the former Margaret Lee; two grandchildren, Kenneth V. Bone of Pasadena, and Mrs. Thomas A. Lynch of San Gabriel; a half sister, Mrs. Florence MacLennan of Salem, Ohio, and many nieces and nephews.
