#### **Scope and Contents**

The papers of journalist, educator, and politician, Alice A. Dunnigan (1906-1983), span the period of 1947-1977 and measure approximately 13 linear feet. Biographical data, correspondence, writings by and about Dunnigan, organizational affiliations, and scrapbooks document her activities as a pioneer in the fields of journalism and politics.

Alice Dunnigan accomplished numerous "firsts" in journalism. As Chief of the Washington Bureau for the Associated Negro Press (ANP), she was one of the first African American women accredited to the White House press corps and to the House and Senate press galleries. Within the collection, newspaper clippings and writings about Dunnigan reflect her experiences and her unique perspective on the activities of Washington. In 1948 she became one of the first African American journalists to travel with a U.S. president (Truman) on a cross-country political campaign. Scrapbooks, newspaper clippings, and correspondence document this trip.

During the Kennedy and Johnson administrations, Dunnigan applied the skills that she had acquired during her tenure in journalism to a career in politics. She accepted an appointment as education consultant to the President's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity (PCEEO) and travelled the country promoting the organization and its efforts to provide employment to all Americans. The bulk of the collection -- articles, addresses, reports, and organizational affiliations, reflect these efforts.

Alice Dunnigan donated her papers to the Moorland-Spingarn Research Center in 1974.

1931	Moved back to Russellville, Kentucky.
1932	Married Charles Dunnigan.
December, 1932	Gave birth to only son, Robert William Dunnigan.
1934	Began writing columns on "Achievements of the Kentucky Negro" for the Louisville <u>Defender</u> .
1935	Woman's editor for the Louisville <u>Defender</u> .
1926 - 1937	Enrolled in summer courses at Tennessee A & I State University to study journalism.
c.1938 - 1942	Contributed articles to <u>Kentucky Reporter</u> (Louisville, KY), <u>Rising Sun</u> (Hopkinsville, KY), and <u>Lighthouse</u> (Paducah, KY). Co-edited a triweekly publication, <u>The Informer.</u>

1942 - 1946	Moved to Washington, D.C. Worked as clerk- typist for the National War Labor Board and later as economist for the Office of Price Administration. Began contributing articles to the Associated Negro Press (ANP).
1947 - 1951	Appointed chief of the Washington Bureau of ANP.
1947 - 1948	Became the first African American woman accredited to the White House Press Corp, the Senate and House of Representatives Press Galleries, and the State Department Correspondents Association.
1948	Travelled with President Truman on cross- country political campaign; among the first African American reporters to do so.
1958	Served as vice chairman of the Courtesy Committee, Women's National Press Club.
1959	Served as a member of the Executive Committee, Capital Press Club.
1961 - 1965	Appointed education consultant to the President's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson. Acted as liaison between PCEEO and several government operations including the Commission on the Status of Women, President's Committee on the Physically Handicapped, and the President's Committee on Employment of Youth.
1967 - 1969	Appointed associate editor for the President's Commission on Youth Opportunity. She retired in 1969.

Spanning over twenty five years, the bulk of this series covers Dunnigan's professional activities. Dunnigan's career as a newspaper woman is documented through her correspondence with Claude Barnett and Enoc Waters, Jr. of the ANP, as well as with editors of such newspapers as the Pittsburgh Courier and the Louisville <u>Defender</u>. The bulk of this series relates to Dunnigan's accomplishments as education consultant for the President's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunities. Significant correspondents from the PCEEO include John Feild, William Kendrick, Hobart Taylor, and Albert Walls. Other important correspondents from this time period include Elizabeth Carpenter, Charles Diggs, Rosa Gragg, Dorothy Height, Lyndon B. Johnson, Melvin Maas, Vivian Mason, Henry Moon, and Dean Rusk. Also of note in this series are the many letters that Dunnigan drafted for Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey while working for the President's Council for Youth Opportunity. All the letters are arranged alphabetically by correspondent.

The addresses and reports are both arranged chronologically and document her many appearances across the country representing the PCEEO.
