CINCINNATI—HOST TO THE NATIONAL DENTAL ASSOCIATION

CINCINNATI, the Queen City of the West, and the Ohio Valley Dental Society, are extremely proud to act as hosts to the Convention of the National Dental Association, August 4, 5, 6, and 7th. The headquarters of the Convention will be located at the seat of the University of Cincinnati, College of Medicine Building, on Eden and Elland Avenues. This building is a beautiful, modern brick structure, which domiciles the College of Medicine of one of the great universities of the country. We have also been accorded the use of the dento-surgical facilities of the Cincinnati General Hospital, which is physically contiguous with and a part of the University of Cincinnati's medical program. This feature of the Convention is in itself a distinct privilege

to the National Dental Association when we think in terms of being associated with one of the outstanding hospitals of the world. The Dental Department of the Cincinnati General Hospital is one of the few complete, as well as highly developed, hospital dental departments in the United States.
