DURING the school year 1938-1939 there were two faculty socials. The first was in the form of a luncheon given in Sojourner Truth Hall. The second was given at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Walter B. Garvin.

Three scientific seminars were held during the school year. These seminars were attended by members of the faculties of the Dental and Medical Colleges and also by practitioners in the city.

The essayists were:

1. Dr. Robert Hendrick, a member of the dental faculty, whose subject was "A Comparative Study of the Merits of Box and Slice Type Cavity Preparation." The formal discussion was led by Dr. Jackson L. Davis.

2. Dr. Emmett J. Scott, of the Department of Orthodontics, whose subject was "Experimental Study in Growth of the Mandible." Dr. Robert Hendrick opened the discussion.

3. Dr. Hildrus Poindexter, a member of the faculty of the College of Medicine, who spoke on the subject of "Food Allergy." Dr. William Madison led the discussion.

Mr. Doxey Wilkerson and Mr. St. Clair Price, who are associated with the Department of Education in the College of Liberal Arts, were the speakers at the Educational Seminars for the Dental Faculty.

In the interest of Dental Education and Student enrollment extension, the Faculty Committee on Dental Education and Guidance with Dr. Emmett Scott as chairman, conducted a very effective campaign. Members of the Committee addressed student groups at the various colleges throughout the South in order to stimulate an interest in the professions of Dentistry and Dental Hygiene.

As part of the program for Public Dental Health Education, the Dental Hygiene Class of the College of Dentistry sponsored a health play and dental exhibit at Shaw Junior High School during the first week of May. This was attended by all students and teachers in the school as well as parents.

The following members of the faculty submitted articles which were published in the leading dental journals:

April 1939—Dr. William J. Madison, "Teaching of Periodontia as a Technique Course for Undergraduates"—Journal of Dental Education.

The two members of the faculty who were granted sabbatical leave for the year 1937-38 returned to the College of Dentistry in September. Dr. Emmett J. Scott completed a year of graduate study in the Department of Orthodontics at Harvard University. Dr. Robert M. Hendrick received the degree of Master of Science in Dentistry upon the completion of one year of graduate study at the University of Michigan. Dr. Hendrick is now also associated with the Department of Anatomy in the College of Medicine.

Dr. Eugene Marvitte has been on leave of absence for the year 1938-39.

The latest appointment to the faculty is Dr. Noah McNeil of Columbus, Ohio.

The dean and faculty members have made contributions to many programs of dental organizations. Dr. Turner was a clinician at the Florida A. and M. Society meeting in February. The following month, Dean Dixon, Drs. Fitzgerald and Garvin attended the meeting of the American Association of Dental Schools in Cleveland. In April Dean Dixon visited the meeting of the John Andrew Clinical Society which was held at Tuskegee. Drs. Scott, Hendrick and Mrs. Howard contributed to the annual program of the Old Dominion Dental Society at Roanoke. The latter part of the month Drs. Hendrick and Hayes served as clinicians for the Odonto-Chirurgical Society of Philadelphia which was also attended by Dean Dixon and Dr. Walton. On various occasions Dr. Fitzgerald and Madison met with the Baltimore Dental Society and Dean Dixon, Drs. Hayes, Walton, Hendrick, Davis, and Turner met with the Robert T. Freeman Dental Society. Drs. Davis, Madison, and Turner represented the College of Dentistry on the program of the Palmetto Medical, Dental, and Pharmaceutical Society which held its annual clinics late in April at Columbia, S. C. Drs. Hendrick and Madison participated in the program of the "Old North State," which was presented during June, at Charlotte, N. C.

Dean Dixon, Drs. Fitzgerald, Garvin, Hendrick, Madison, Nicolson, and Walton will represent the College on the N. D. A. program in New York.
