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Howard University mourns death of murdered engineering student

Trina Chanel Sansbury, a 22-yearold Howard University student, had high hopes of becoming an electrical engineer at Pepco Power Company next year. Sansbury was one semester shy of graduating when all her dreams came to a violent end this past Sunday.

Sansbury was murdered in the living room of her apartment by her boyfriend, Kelvin Dennis Brown. Brown, 31, shot his girlfriend 10 times in front of Sansbury's best friend, Andrea Hogan.

Hogan, who graduated last year in engineering, was held hostage by Brown during the standoff with the Prince Georges County police for some five hours before miraculously escaping from Brown.

However, before she could escape, Brown shot her four times in the neck, chin and shoulder area after she refused to kill him, according to Trina's aunt, Francina Sansbury.

The Prince Georges County police were called to the apartment around 11:45 p.m. on Sunday, when neighbors reported hearing gunshots and screams coming from the apartment. When Brown refused to let the police in, an emergency services unit was

After futile efforts of trying to communicate with Brown by phone, police fired tear gas into the apartment, foreing him and the hostage outside. According to police spokesman Captain James Terracciano, Brown refused to drop his .25 caliber pistol and was fatally shot by Cpl. Daniel Lippsey.

Hogan reportedly told Trina's aunt Francina that an argument had broken out between the couple and ended with Brown killing Sansbury.

Sansbury's aunt sadly recounted the

days before Sansbury's death.

"I begged her to leave him alone. He was withdrawn and never looked you in the face. He was a very jealous person, extremely jealous," she said.

Sansbury's aunt Francina described her niece as a "high-spirited person who never forgot birthdays or Christmas."

She is described as being an outgoing, friendly type of person who knew many people, according to her ex-boyfriend and University student, Ainsley Brooks.

"Trina was a real people person that knew what she wanted and how to get it," Brooks said.

Brooks also remembered his uneasiness with the relationship.

"I told Trina to get away and get some help, but when she finally did, he convinced her to come back. I told her that people can't just change like that. I could see it coming," Brooks

The last time Brooks spoke to Sansbury was the evening before her murder. He says he still cannot believe that it happened.

Sansbury's memorial service will be held today in the Rankin Memorial Chapel at 11 a.m. Bernard Richardson, dean of the chapel, will deliver the keynote address and encourages all to attend.

Although Trina Sansbury has suffered many losses in her lifetime, including the death of her own mother, she was a well-rounded and wellliked student. Trina's aunt Francina stated, "we never expect things like this to happen, but it does happen, and it can happen to anyone."

had the professional responsibility to attempt to get a broader and more representative sample of student opinion. I wish I could attribute the program's poor reporting to just an oversight on the producer's part [but] that was not the case."

Jenifer alluded to what he called "a set-up" by CBS of Howard University Student Association President Terri Wade and second year law student Malik Zulu Shabazz and their views on the relationship between African American and Jews. Statements like "If we (Blacks) were really violent, we would have killed their asses a long time ago" echoed from the television sets of many Americans of all colors and religions as they viewed the "Eye to Eye" report.

Though many of their statements were interpreted as controversial, antisemetic, and bigoted, according to the complaints Jenifer said he has received, Shabazz and Wade stand by their words and the report.

"I thought the report was positive even though it was biased," Shabazz said. "The bad part about the report is that it falsely characterized the truth and fact as hate. What I said and what I was trying to do was the truth ... just like Mal-

Jenifer's reponse: "Brother, you ain't no Malcolm X."

"I would just like to know what made anything I said antisemetic or bigoted. There has not been a case given that we are antisemites, hatemongers or demagogues," Wade said. "Nothing that was said was new or antisemetic. I don't believe Black people can be racist because we don't control anything ... we are all pawns in this game."

Joyce Ladner, Vice President for academic affairs disagrees with the notion that Blacks cannot be racist. She said she knows otherwise from

"I used to be one who didn't

believe Blacks could be racist also," Ladner said, "But I've seen it, been around it and know that Black racists do exist."

But for Ladner, the issue is greater than determining whether the televised statements of Wade colm X was telling the truth in the and Shabazz were racist, but rather what will be the cost to the Univer-

> "That show and your statements are going to cost us students, whose parents want them to go to a University where they don't feel pressured to be one way or another," Ladner said as she addressed the student leaders. "You are the lucky one's ... you are at Howard. What about all these children in the streets. Where are they?"

But despite Ladner and Jenifer's obvious disagreement with the statements and the way the students allowed themselves to be "set up," Jenifer supports the right to free

to apppear on the program and to speak their minds ... that is the cost of a free society and an open and academically free University," Jenifer said Tuesday in a public press conference. "However, that same freedom imposes a responsibility on those in leadership postions to deplore such comments when they are, as these were; hateful, hurtful and insensitive."

Melanie Alston, president-elect of the School of Business has gone on record in disagreement with Wade in the past. However, when asked to address solutions to the issue, Alston sees things different-

"To me, the journalist on "Eye to Eye" deserves more of the blame," Alston said. "By denouncing Terri and Malik, it will look like we (students and administrators) are divided. That's not the solution."

Though Jenifer did not specifi-"These students had every right cally denounce Wade or Shabazz at the press conference, he was very careful to distance himself and the University from their comments saving "the very mission of Howard University is totally inimical to big-

And amid threats from alumni to discontinue endowments and unconfirmed reports that Congress is considering eliminating the University's funding, Jenifer is calling for a public apology from CBS while kicking off an ambitions racial tolerance and understanding campaign with a series of lectures, seminars and a conference for the entire Howard University commu-

"If Howard were to loose its federal funding because of this, I'd have to raise every student's tuition to more than \$20,000 a year," Jenifer said. "I don't believe there is a student at Howard who could afford that."

es of our society. It gives students the chance to meet in an informal educational environment and ask any questions they may have and learn from these professionals," said Dean Henry Ramsey of Howard Law School.

Dean Ramsey has future aspirations in inviting a US Supreme Court Justice each spring . In the past, there has been a wide variety of speakers such as Congresswoman Maxine Waters, US Supreme Court Justice Anthony Kennedy, and Oliver Hill whose fame arose form the Brown VS Topeka Board of Education Case.

Clarence Thomas stressed to students during his lecture that something can be learned from any individual, despite their educational

background. Thomas noted that the educational processes of learning must be based on the ability to reason and become analytical in one's thinking. This can be done from a janitor, or a cab driver, not just professor's with Ph.D's.

"The way to find out what's down the road is to ask those on their way back down the road," quoted Thomas from one of his words of inspiration. "If you think you know it all, then you will learn nothing. You must realize that you can learn something from somebody," said Clarence Thomas.

During the question and answer period of the lecture, many of the questions were not answered directly and completely from Thomas. Students questioned Thomas' feel-

ings on the recent resignation of Justice Harry Blackman, affirmative action, Roe vs. Wade, his response to criticism of being the second African American Supreme Court Judge, the future livelihood of Historically Black Colleges, and the decreasing amount qualified lawyers that are representing death row criminals.

Thomas' answers were not satisfying the majority of the students in the audience.

"I was disappointed to many of Thomas' reactions to the questions. He kept saying refer to his readings, but that's the reason why we asked those questions, was for him to elaborate, not beat around the bush," said Chantal Stevens a second year law school student.

"I think he is out of touch with dent, but he was anxious and perhis own race, and with race relations, politics, and economics," said Sam Roberts who was visiting Howard from the University of Vir-

Yewande Dada the student body president said that she was not surprised by Clarence Thomas's remarks but she felt that he got a little more respect and he held his ground in sticking to his own ideologies.

"He limited the playing field by restricting the questions to ones that did not deal with specific

cases," said Dada. Clarence Thomas is a native of the Pin Point community near Savannah, Georgia. Thomas said that he was never the brilliant stusistent to do well. He was the first in his family to finish high school.

Thomas earned his A.B. degree from Holy Cross College in 1971, and his J.D. degree from Yale Law School in 1974. He practiced law in Missouri and served as the assistant attorney general of Missouri from 1974 to 1977. For three years, Thomas worked as a staff attorney with Monsanto Corporation.

" Thad to overcome a lot of intimidation, every job you are faced with intimidation, but at Monsanto, I was faced with intimidation within the corporate environment," said Thomas.

A veil of secrecy continues to cloud the details about allegations that Howard University Athletic Director David Simmons' made derogatory comments against the cheerleading team.

Accussations that Simmons called the cheerleaders "bitches" during a logistics meeting with five other males staff members last month have been circulating for weeks.

Simmons admits to using the word "bitches" while venting his frustration about the cheerleaders' strike during a televised basketball game.

'It was supposed to be a big coup for the University. Then comes this strike that we had no warning of," Simmons said. He refuses to repeat his entire comment.

"It's not something I would say in a public

The cheerleaders strike that angered Simmons was during a basketball game aired on ESPN. The strike was in protest of the University's lack of financial support of the cheerleading program.

Cheerleading Coach John Morris said the cheerleaders chose that game because it was the first game after they made the decision

'Simmons believes it was directed towards him, but it was not. No one ever mentioned his name," he said.

Simmons does not control the cheerleading activities. The cheerleaders are an organization under the Office of Student Activities and are advised by Associate Director for Student Activities Daanen Strachan.

According to Cheerleading Coach Michelle Bowie, Simmons was livid when the cheerleaders sat in the stands instead of

taking their places on the court. "He came over screaming at John and me like a madman. He said 'Is this a joke. Do you know we are about to go on national TV?," Bowie said.

Simmons anger carried over into the logistics meeting held to plan a Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference tournament, where the offensive remark was made.

Simmons said he was under the impression the matters discussed in the

logistic meetings were confidential. Cramton Auditorium Manager Steve Johnson, who was at the meeting, took

offense to Simmons' remark. "Whether the meeting was confidential or not, I don't want people to think that is the type of language I support," said Johnson

who is also unwilling to repeat Simmons Although Strachan, who attended the meeting, found Simmons remark

unacceptable, he is also unwilling to disclose

the exact words. "I immediately took offense and told him said.

he should not have said it. In meetings people get upset and say things they don't mean," Strachan said.

Cheerleading coach Michelle Bowie, who was not at the meeting, contends Simmons said "those bitches aren't going anywhere." And she there is no plausible excuse for Simmons comment.

"I don't care how frustrated you become. As an adult, you don't come out of your mouth and call a student out of his name, cheerleading Coach Michelle Bowie said.

Bowie said Diane Oliver, mother of cheerleader Keisha Oliver, called Simmons to tell him she had spoken with an attorney about defamation of character.

Oliver also called Johnson to find out if Simmons had made the comment.

"When Mrs. Oliver called I verified for her what I heard and she expressed her outrage. If it had been a child of mine I would have been outraged too," Johnson

Simmons apologized to the cheerla but would not specify why he apologizing.

School of Business computer lab not meeting standard

The School of Business third floor computer lab at Howard University was a veritable disarray. Out of order signs posted everywhere, terminals and keyboards scattered about, work stations with no equipment and brand new printers already broken collectively made the lab look more like a big "Things to Do List" than a computing facility.

The lab had 40 work stations and not enough functioning computers to fill them. On Friday, March 25, only 19 work stations were fully operational, leaving 21 computers out of order or missing. One of three printers was forced to handle the demand from all of the computers.

"The School of Business computer lab does not serve the needs of Howard University students," said Shay Spencer, a senior international business major. "Most of the computers are out of order and the printers are of poor quality and break down often."

Students compete for a small number of functioning computers and then must patiently wait for the printer to become available. It is not unusual to wait over an hour for a print job to go through. Back-ups like this often cause havoc and confusion to erupt in the lab. Some students become so frustrated that they leave and try to print their documents elsewhere.

"There should be more facilities on hand so students won't find themselves waiting for a limited amount of computers," said Corey Wilson, a senior marketing major.

Many students believe that lab hours are also unsatisfactory. Currently, the lab is open from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m., Monday through Friday, with no weekend hours. Some students suggest that lab hours be comparable to library

"Students have to fight over computers because the access time is so limited," said senior management major Veronique Merritt. "We need longer hours, weekdays from 8 a.m. to midnight and weekends from I p.m. to 8 p.m. or 10 a.m. to 5 p.m."

"Hours of the lab should be extended on weekdays to accommodate working students," said MBA candidate Vanessa Baily.

Roy Beasley, manager of the computing facilities, did not respond favorably toward the idea of extending lab hours, he said.

Very few students have utilized extended hours in the past. Nevertheless, adjustments are usually made for finals.

"We tried to keep the lab opened until 10 p.m., but the student count was too low at 9 p.m.," Beasley said. "The students don't have a

Outdated hardware and software are considered problematic as well. The lab still contained IBM PCs. They ran the old WordPerfect 5.0 program. Additionally, basic selections of the program on the menu like class application were unreliable.

"I tried to update the hardware to get it to run windows application over the Christmas Holiday," Beasley said, "I spent an average of 16 hours a day, with help from my colleagues, working in the lab on all the machines. They were too nonstandard to be updated.

The lab showed no significant signs of improvement during Spring Break. Beasley hoped, however, to have the lab in better shape by the following Tuesday or Wednesday. He planned to return eight computers taken off line, back to the lab, since they could not be updated. A couple of computers with minor repairs would be fixed. The printers would receive new ribbons and a rotating schedule to help relieve them. Lastly, a laser printer was introduced to the lab to pick up the slack.

"Ideally, I'd like 30 machines working by Tuesday, which is a lot better than 19," Beasley said. "This should alleviate student pressure."

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Not seeing "Eye to Eye"

Howard University was dealt an ugly and harmful hand last week when a network "news" magazine decided to air a segment about the school. On Thursday, March 31 CBS's "Eye to Eye With Connie Chung" took a hatchet to Howard, and in just about ten minutes may have inflicted more damage to our reputation than anything in recent memory.

The segment was titled "True Believers," and its focus was on the recent controversy surrounding Anti-Semitism on black college campuses—particularly Howard. Apparently the producers of "Eye to Eye" wanted to see what the fuss has been all about. Comments deemed anti-Semitic were made at Nation of Islam spokesperson Khallid Abdul Muhammed's speech/rally here in February. Two commentaries by Washington Post columnist Richard Cohen blasted Howard for allowing the Muhammed to speak and for the HILLTOP's response to the first commentary. Another rally led by Howard law student Malik Zulu Shabazz about Jewish and black relations added fuel to the already growing fire.

And "Eye to Eye" wanted the scoop.

The first error the news show committed was in its assignment of the reporter to cover to goings-on here. The reporter who did the segment is Jewish, and from his biased reporting of Howard, it is apparent that he is bitter towards Howard for allowing negative comments about Jews to be tolerated on campus. The language and inferences used by the reporter, such as comparing Howard to a "Ku Klux Klan" university, were entirely out of line and were meant, on the part of the producers to invoke unpleasant images about Howard.

However the most grievous error that "Eye to Eye" made was in its selection of students to interview. The only students shown in the broadcast were Shabazz and Howard University Student Association President Terri Wade, Shabazz's and Wade's comments, such as "...this damn (Jewish) holocaust" and "if we were violent, you would be dead a long time ago,", were their opinions and others who follow their beliefs; they were not the opinions of the entire student body, but one would not know that from the footage. According to "Eye to Eye," Howard is "breeding ground for anti-Semitism" and all the students agree with Shabazz and Wade.

This assumption is by no means true. How can a newsmagazine show talk to just two of the students (keeping in mind that one-Shabazz-is a law student, not an undergraduate) and claim that all the showed footage of the second rally, from one of the camera angles it was obvious that not a lot of students were in attendance. Yet, these "leaders of tomorrow" are all being led down the wrong path.

What makes the show even less credible is the fact that they interviewed other students for their opinions but choose not to air them on Thursday. For example, HILLTOP editor-in-chief Otesa Middleton, who told "Eye to Eye" that one or two people cannot possible represent the beliefs of the nearly 12,000 students who go here, was omitted from the broadcast. Middleton also explained that Howard is open to free speech, but her statements were ignored.

It was painfully suspicious that the only person who disagreed with Shanbazz's anti-Semitic remarks that was shown in the segment was a Harvard professor instead of someone from Howard. The producers of the show essentially took the easy, unethical way out; they set Howard up as an anti-Semitic school and refused to show anyone affilated with this school who disagrees.

Howard University was certainly harmed by the

mishadling of the segment, but the comments made by our student leader cannot be ignored. While Terri Wade is free to speak her mind, and has every right to voice her opinions, she must remember who she is. Wade is supposed to represent all of the students. After all we elected her into office. But when she begins to rope the entire university in lasso of hatred, she not only hurts those to whom she is speaking, but she also damages the school.

"Eye to Eye" could argue that they had the right to talk to Wade because she is the student body president, and they are right. But Wade's comments and actions-again, on national television-did more harm than good. If she is going to speak out against what she and some others believe that Jews are a major cause of the black race's problems then she should use the word "I" or "the members of this organization." When she uses "we" she makes everyone believe that she is talking about Howard students. That is wrong on her part and such careless actions have to be stopped before this school slips any further down the

Those words that were spoken by her and others could harm this school in a number of ways. It is already rumored that some companies have mentioned they do not want to hire any students from that "racist" university in D.C. Untold amounts of funding will be witheld if the powers that be deem this school as a racist university. That, in turn, will cause the tuition to go rise and the enrollment to go down. No doubt, some people have already decided not to come here.

Malik Zulu Shabazz is not an elected Howard leader, so the same restrictions do not have to apply to him as they do to Terri Wade. As it regards this man, it is up to the media to not assume he is someone the majority of Howard students support. The Washington Post on Wednesday, Apr. 6 featured a lengthy article on Shabazz and all of this controversy. The article was well done; it stated that not all of Howard is on the anti-Jew bandwagon, and hopefully, it helped to heal some of the wounds inflicted by "Eye to Eye."

Further, it is up to the Howard University students, faculty, staff and family to take action to repair the damage that has been done to this school in the past six weeks. Everyone can take it upon themselves to air their grievances, if they have any, to CBS, as well as other media outlets such as the Washington Post, to let them and others know how Howard students

The feedback they could receive will enlighten them to the diversity of thoughts and feelings that exist at this school-a diversity that Howard welcomes, students believe as they do? When "Eye to Eye" whether some people do not like it or not. Howard must let them know that speeches and rallies such as those held by Muhammed and Shabazz are not major events to most Howard students; most people did not even realize about either until the media decided to "hype up" the issue.

Finally, it is time to put this entire issue to rest. Starting with the media's pouncing on Muhammed's comments—the same comments that he has said in the past-and then Howard's "anti-Semetic volleyball game" with Richard Cohen, the black/Jewish controversy is out of control. Both groups are fighting over who has been oppressed more and who's holocaust was more damaging.

Everyone needs to realize that neither group can keep pointing fingers if any other advancements are going to be made. If anything, blacks and Jews have a lot in common. Those commanalities need to be expressed by members of both groups and everbody can begin to stop pointing the racist finger of blame.

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Bigotry transcends race Letter to the Editor

When I read about Khalid Muhammad's speech at Kean College, my first thought was 'we have come a long way when an arrogant, egotistical fool can ascend a public soap box and be paid good money to deliver the kind of bitter bigotry that came out of the face of Khalid Muhammad that day, racism in America is

That was not the voice of the oppressed. How can one claim to be the victim of oppression when he is given a public forum, with pay, to say such hateful things about other groups of people? Freedom has rung. But alas, this initial white reaction gave way to the

truth. America is more racially divided today than ever before. And African Americans are suffering the consequences of American racism as badly as ever. But before continuing, let me define racism to show how

In the wake of the Kean College speech, I was amused to see so many editorials condemn Khalid Muhammad and the Nation of Islam for being "racists." That is not possible. No black can be racist in America. Because racism requires power. It is the group with the power that oppresses the group without power. Racism is about access. Racism is when the group with the pie

denies another group a piece of the pie.

No, Khalid Muhammad, Louie Farrakhan, and the Nation of Islam are not racist (though they may aspire to be). But for now they are certainly bigots. Bigotry is the nonsensical hatred of other peoples based on fear. It is usually espoused by very inbred folks with miniscule brains. It is based on ignorance. And it has often been used for political gain. Hitler is the classic historical example. But Nixon also used it to win the Catholic vote in the northeast in 1968 and 1972 by striking fear of busing into these voters. George Bush did it a la Willie Horton. And Pat Buchanan delivered it at the 1992 GOP Convention (protect our culture).

As I though about the Kean College speech and its reaction, I knew I had to look for motives. Why would Khalid Muhammad blame the plight of African Americans on Jews — a group of people that comprises only 4 percent of the U.S. population (with 3 million in New York and the rest scattered across the country)? Are these few folks really responsible for keeping nearly 30 million African Americans down and out?

The answer is that it is too easy to blame a smaller, relatively defenseless and hated minority. Anti-Semitism is part of the fabric of American bigotry. Nixon blamed the Jews for his problems. The Republicans often blame the "Jewish Press." Nasty Jewish jokes and stereotypes abound in our culture. In 1913, an upstanding Atlanta businessman with "fine" Confederate pedigree was lynched because he was a Jew. His name was Leo Frank.

Do Khalid Muhammad and Louie Farrakhan care to remember James E. Chaney, Andrew Goodman and Michael H. Schwerner? They were the young Freedom Riders murdered in Mississippi for fighting for black civil rights. Chaney was a young black man and Goodman and Schwerner were young Jewish men. On Nov. 17, 1965, Rabbi Arthur Herzberg of

Englewood, N.J., speaking at the Zionis Theodore Herzl Institute, castigated Jews who "go crawling on their bellies to Rome." The rabbi was saying that American Jews are a power and should act accordingly. The same goes for African Americans today. That means as a group with an economic, cultural, and (yes) nationalist identity. This is where we are at black American politics now.

So far, increased black representation at the American table has all too often appeared to have benefitted only those blacks at the table. Is Louis Farrakhan another Clarence Thomas in a bow tie? Perhaps something can be learned from American Jews. Malcolm X. said this. They know they are Jews. They never forget their history. It is that sense of identity and community that has allowed them to survive. And they did not survive so well by hating other peoples. Hate is the ticket to self-annihilation.

Martin Luther King preached this.

Any leader who calls on his people to hate is doing the oppressor's work. He is an Uncle Tom. Or, perhaps, an Uncle Louie.

The importance of names

A central question in the gal aspirations of oppressed de is the issue of identity we see ourselves sets the meters for what we can me. Identities can often heal empower us. In my own "names" have conveyed edible psychological and ed power. Our names make in statements about tradition beritage, our aesthetics and e of collectivity, our vision limate purpose in life.

If the age of nine, my great-Hather Morris Robinson was on an auction block in West . Ga., in 1854 — sold by his white, slavemaster father, white owner who purchased was Marable. So Morris son became, by accident of Morris Marable. At the end of the Civil War, when Morris fled the plantation, he took something else from the white Marable besides his name - two huge oxen and 40 dollars in gold. This was, for Morris, probably an early version of "affirmative action." But like chitterlings, the pig's intestines which white folks discarded and which sustained countless black households for generations, Morris took

Marable's name and turned it into

My youngest daughter was named for Sojourner Truth, the great abolitionist and freedom fighter for our people. The name itself has influenced "Soji" to become a poet, a young public speaker and to participate in public demonstrations - all before the age of 15. If our identity inspires and challenges us, we can remake ourselves and become a people of courage and Abdul Muhammad at Kean Duke vehemently attacked black

But identities may also severely hinder us. If we construct artificial barriers of language, sexuality or tradition between human beings, we can end up perpetuating stereotypes, instead of communicating with each other. Identity is a door through which we may encounter another dimension of the human experience. But that should only be the beginning, not the end, of our interaction and exploration of each other's values, traditions and cultures. No single group has a monopoly on "truth," "wisdom" or "beauty." No culture should ever be measured in hierarchical terms, as being 'high" or "low."

The politics of narrow identity, of "us" vs. "them," is always inherently reactionary. Consider the controversial speech of Khalid

College last year, which was people, winning a majority of nothing less than a vicious anti-Jewish diatribe. He referred to Jews as "bloodsuckers" who deserved the Holocaust. But he also described homosexuals as "faggots" and focused much of his attack against mainstream black leadership. Similarly, Farrakhan has attacked feminism as a "threat" to black manhood, and even justified boxer Mike Tyson's rape of a black woman. A central theme of such rhetoric - the sexism. anti-Semitism. homophobia and reactionary

nationalism - is hatred. But what bothers African Americans and other people of color is that the demands for us to condemn Farrakhan are rarely replicated among whites when they must confront their own hate-

whites' votes in Louisiana in his campaigns for governor and the Senate, the U.S. Senate did not statements condemnation. When Patrick

Buchanan indulges in frequent race-baiting, homophobic and sexist rhetoric, there is no call for white male leaders to denounce one of their own. When Senator Fritz Hollings of South Carolina described African diplomats as 'cannibals," the Senate said nothing. Why the double-standard on hatred?

Farrakhan's popularity is rooted in the dissatisfaction and alienation felt within the African-American community toward white power. Despite all of our efforts, we are losing ground in the struggle for equality. Our filled demagogues. When David "race" becomes the essential selfrespect. Yet if we define our politics simplistically, as a narrow definition of ourselves - whether as African-Americans or Latinos only, or working people or women only, or Christians or Jews only we surrender any hope for creating an agenda to liberate all people who are oppressed. Our struggle must be to destroy the oppressive institutions of racism and the very idea of race itself. while maintaining our cultural heritage and identity of struggle. We cannot accomplish this by denigrating others. The farthest boundaries of our identity should never stop until reaching the horizons of a common humanity.


Most people just look at the social aspect, but we are not getting what we are putting in. We

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
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


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
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Thomas visits Law Campus

Thomas served as assistant secretary for Civil Rights at the U.S Department of Education and as Chairman of the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. He served on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit.

Thomas shared with the students the activities of a

Supreme Court Justice.

The sir petition process is an independent process where the justices would read the petition to the court for cases to be heard. Thomas noted that he reads about six thousand sir petitions a year.

The next process is deadlisting, where any sir petition that does not make the conference list is placed.

The oral argument preparation period is an opportunity for advocates to speak and voice the facts surrounding their case. Thomas advised that the best advocates are those that know the facts of the cases as well as know the law. The best advocate is honest and is responsive in the court hearings, and emotions and anger only frustrate the justices.

"The best advocate is one that is honest, you can't the court because all of the justices have read the records and they know the law," said Thomas.

Thomas explained that the court is ordered by seniority. Where justices sit, and when they are called on to speak all descend with the amount of time one has spent as a justice on the Supreme Court. He also added that the Supreme Court is a very respectful, conducive, but cloistered environment. He said that many of the justices rarely see each other outside of work and they can't talk about the cases. Supreme Court Judges have to retain themselves emotionally, and imposing their personal views. They are also not politically accountable for the actions within Congress or the Executive Branch.

"It is important that a University encourages debate and diversity. We have had Khalid Muhammed and now Clarence Thomas to speak to us on an informal level. This is good because it encourages students to form their own opinions after listening to them," said Yewande Dada.

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
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Congress proposes criminal Pell grant bary

Some members of Congress feel that prisoner education is taking place at the expense of college bound students from lower and middle class families. In order to prevent this, the Senate has approved an amendment to the crime bill that bans inmates from receiving Pell Grants.

Pell Grants, named after Sen. Claiborne Pell of Rhode Island, were established to assist families and students with the increasingly high costs of college tuition. They provide approximately \$6 billion to at least 4 million students around the nation each school year. The lowest income students, including prison inmates, can get grants of up to \$2,300 a year. The average award is approximately \$1,500 per college student.

Presently, only prisoners on death row and those serving life without parole are restricted from receiving the

Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison (R-Tex), who proposed the amendment to the crime bill, said that since approximately \$100 million dollars in federal funds are already set aside for inmate education yearly, Pell Grants for prisoners are not fair.

The amount of Pell grant monies apportioned to those behind bars has risen," said Hutchison in an address to Congress. "At the current rate of increase we will have sacrificed the hopes and dreams of hundreds of thousands of our young men and women, who have always done what society has expected of them, and who have earned a chance to further their education and better their lives.

Hutchison says that climinating Pell grants for prisoners does not mean turning our backs on those who have committed crimes and are paying their

This is a question of presenting opportunities for those who are children of low income working people that have

not committed a crime," she said.

Although the Department of

Education does not keep track of the exact amount of Pell funds received by inmates each year, U.S. Rep. Bart Gordon (D-Tenn) says that convicted felons receive as much as \$200 million a year in Pell Grants for Post-Secondary Correctional Education programs, while students from working families are seeing their eligibility for the grants

"Giving Pell Grants to prisoners is a mistake and it should be stopped," Representative Gordon said. "Citizens who are struggling to meet their children's skyrocketing tuition costs have a right to be outraged when the child of a police officer in their community can't get a Pell Grant but a criminal the police officer sent to prison

Some students who find it hard to keep up with increasing tuition costs share the feeling that this practice is

"It is frustrating that my parents make too much for me to receive a Pell Grant, but not enough to pay tuition, while prisoners have no problem getting

money [to pay for tuition]," said Lakeisha Harris, a junior psychology

Amid growing criticism, prison advocacy groups and supporters, such as Sen. Pell himself, are lobbying to continue giving Pell Grants to

One such group, Citizens United for Rehabilitation Errants (CURE), says that the grants for post-secondary education are an integral part of the reform system and that prisons should have all the resources necessary for complete rehabilitation.

If prisoners lose Pell grants there will be a repercussion in the crime rate," said Charlie Sullivan, founder of the organization. "Prisoners who could turn their lives around, and stay out of a life of crime, would have even less opportunities than they do now.'

Sullivan said that less than 2 percent of all grants offered to students go to prisoners and many prison inmates would qualify for the grants if they were

not in jail.

Lyons health forum addresses health care in black community

Counselors, physicians, social workers and teachers gathered to discuss health care issues affecting African Americans at The Second Verne L. Lyons Health Forum held on March 31 at the Howard University School of Social Work.

The health forum is presented each year by the Metropolitan Washington Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers (NASW) to allow health care and social service professionals to share information about the special healthcare needs of African Americans.

Proceeds from the forum support the NASW Verne L. Lyons scholarship fund. Lyons, who died in 1989, was a Senior Staff Associate within the NASW national office. The forum and the scholarship in his name were established to continue his work by encouraging social workers to become more involved in health

"The main goal of the forum was to provide people in the health care profession knowledge and information they could use in their daily practice," said Eva M. Stewart, co-chair of the forum planning committee. "The conference provided information about diseases that are more common to the African-American population."

The forum began with a keynote address on "Social Work in Healthcare: The Promises and Pitfalls," by Kermit B. Nash, a professor at the University of North Carolina School of Social Work.

The main component of the forum were the 12 workshops given by various health care and social work professionals. Workshops addressed important health care issues for African Americans and outlined the roles of various caretakers in treatment.

Among the topics were Sarcoidosis and minority organ and tissue transplantation.

Gwendolyn Jackson-Harris, a supervisory social worker at D.C. General Hospital, was the main presenter for the workshop entitled, "Sarcoidosis: Life with a Neglected Puzzling Disease." Sarcoidosis, a disease which attacks the lungs, is found primarily in young women of African decent. Currently, the cause of the disease is unknown.

Along with Michael S. A. Richardson, head of the pulmonary division at D.C. General Hospital, Jackson-Harris focused on theories about the cause of Sarcoidosis and the important social aspects of the disease. A patient with the lung disease also took part in the presentation.

The workshop on minority organ and tissue transplants was conducted by MOTTEP, the Minority Organ and Tissue Transplant Education Program.

Members of the MOTTEP staff, as well as transplant recipients, and an organ donor spoke about the importance of organ and tissue

donation among minorities. While minorities represent 42 percent of the patients waiting for organ and tissue transplants, they represent only 22 percent of those willing to donate organs.

Since one of the major impediments to minority organ and tissue donations is a lack of awareness that a concern exists, according to the MOTTEP staff, the social worker can play a vital role by educating minorites and easing common fears.

With more than 300 people from a cross section of the health fields in attendance, Stewart says the forum was a success. She said that it provided practical information that professionals can put to use

"Many of the people who attended this conference were people working in the field of health care," said Stewart. The forum provided "information they need to hear on how to work with the consumer of health services."

Black Caucus criticizes U.S. Haitian policy

The Congressional Black Caucus is denouncing the Clinton Administration's current policy toward Haiti and pressing for former Haitian President Jean-Bertrand Aristide's immediate return to power.

In a letter to President Bill Clinton, signed by 40 CBC members, the Caucus outlined 11 steps to establish a fair policy toward Haiti. 'The United States' Haiti policy must be

scrapped," Caucus leaders stated in their letter. "It is ineffective, counterproductive, and encourages the continued torture and murder of Haitian civilians."

The 11 steps that the CBC urged the administration to move on without delay included: Imposing a complete trade and commercial embargo on Haiti, with food and medicine as the only exceptions; freezing all assets of all Haitian military

officers without exception; halting the repatriation of Haitian refugees and ending the use of U.S. Naval and Coast Guard vessels to keep Haitians from leaving Haiti.

The CBC is also calling for the resignation of the administration's special envoy to Haiti, Lawrence A. Pezullo, saying that he has been ineffective according to a Washington Post article.

According to the Post article, a State Department official said that Haitian refugees represent the smallest number of

those accepted into the United States. Of the 119,482 refugees accepted into the United States in 1993, only 1,307 were from Haiti.

The day after the CBC's announcement on March 24, Vice President Al Gore met with President Jean-Bertrand Aristide to discuss the Haitian situation.

Gore and Aristide reviewed the U.S. diplomatic approach, which includes sanctions and promotion of a political process that will include all legitimate Haitian political elements.

Also, Gore reaffirmed the U.S. commitment to the restoration of democracy in Haiti, as well as the international community's commitment to assisting President Aristide in rebuilding the island's economy.

"After the revolution, my father could provide food for our family of nine siblings. Obviously I came from a family that was very poor before 1959," he said. "My future without the revolution would have been very simple; I probably would be shining shoes somewhere, if I was lucky.

However, even with the benefits of the Cuban Revolution, the country today is suffering from an economic crisis. This, said Hernandez, is partly because of the blockade imposed by the United States and some of its allies and Cuba's own mistakes and inefficiencies. But, according to Hernandez, the Cuban people, particularly its youth, will not see its achievements lost.

He also believes that the Cuban youth should help solve Cuba's economic problems.

"Youth have been more critical of the revolution, but it has been constructive criticism," he said.

"Human beings talk, walk and criticize, but it is important [for them] to also help solve the problems."

While he stressed that it is the responsibility of the Cuban people to bring the country out of its severe economic mire, Hernandez assured the gathering that the will and the unity of the Cuban people will allow them to do so.

revolution are in so much danger. But we are not going to wait until the blockade is over to start building the country up," he said.

Mr. Marzel, 35, succeeded the late Rabbi Meir Kahanewho was the founder of Kach and was assassinated in New York in 1990. Mr. Marzel is being held without trial for three months under special military regulation. 
St. Vincent

Kingstown - The St. Vincent and the Grenadines Hotel Association says that a boycott campaign launched by the United States-based International

Wildlife Coalition (IWC) against the Windward Islands is likely to do more good than harm there. President of the Hotel Association, Mr. Tony Sardine, said that "Boycotts attract the curious. I have a feeling we will get a lot more [visitors] with this boycott." St. Vincent and the Grenadines has a centuries-old whaling tradition and is allowed to harvest two whales a year. However, the IWC is against harvesting whales altogether. Sardine also stated that larger islands such as St. Lucia and Grenada whose tourism industry is far more developed than that of St. Vincent may end up worse off. (The Sunday Gleaner).

United Nations

A 20-year plan prepared by the United Nation's Population Fund has proposed to stabilize the world's population at about 7.8 billion people by the year 2050, compared with some 5.7 billion today. The plan is being discussed by representatives from more than 170 countries at a two-week conference that began on Monday. The plan aims to quadruple funds given to poor countries for family planning and to expand their programs. The plan also aims to reduce infant mortality in third world countries and to improve women's rights and their treatment. If the needed steps are not taken, the world's population is predicted to increase to 12.5 billion by 2050, raising the possibility of mass starvation and poverty in developing countries and unsustainable taxing of the earth's resources. The amended plan will be presented for adoption at the World Conference on Population and Development in Cairo in September. (The New York Times).

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

Sad and Blue? The weather might be affecting you

For some Howard students, heavy, cumbersome coats and jackets are not the only things that weighed them down during the winter. Some students are welcoming the warm rays of sunlight and longer days after experiencing gloomy days of winter depression.

A number of Howard University students say the depression they met with last winter was not all in their

Studies have shown that the absence of light can affect a person's mood. The disorder, which commonly affects people during the late fall and throughout the winter, is called Seasonal Affective Disorder or S.A.D.

Sufferers of S.A.D. tend to experience the same social withdrawal, weakened sex drive and constant fatigue as non-seasonal victims of depression. They, like other types of depressants, tend to crave carbohydrates and overeat. However, S.A.D. differs from other types of depression in that its sufferers return to their normal moods in the spring.

"This type of depression is related to the existence of sunlight. And, of course, during the winter months there is less sunlight. Therefore, S.A.D. sufferers are affected mainly during these months," explained Dr. Thomas Wessel, assistant director of the University Counseling Service.

An article in the February 1990 issue of USA Today magazine reported that one out of every five Americans are affected by S.A.D.

Freshman Michelle Marion believes that she is probably not exempt from that statistic.

"In this kind of weather [dreary, winter weather], all I do is sleep and stay in," Marion said. Marion, who hails from New Orleans, found it dif-

ficult to adjust to the cold D.C. winter weather. "Some mornings I get up and I just want to cry because the weather is so bad. It's just so depressing. I'm thinking about transferring [to another University] and the weather has a lot to do with it." Marion said.

It seems that many Howard students who are from warmer states find it difficult to cope with the often cold and gloomy D.C. winter weather.

Sophomore Kimberly Bryant, of Carson, Calif., is happy that winter is finally over.

"My attitude has definitely changed for the better now that spring is here. My energy level has gone up now that the sun is out, and I'm more content with being at school," Bryant said.

Bryant added that this winter had really taken a toll

"All through winter, I was very depressed because it was cold. And the rain in combination with the snow made going outside less appealing," she said.

Wessel explained another reason some people tend to get depressed during the winter.

"The winter season can be a very depressing time of the year not only because of the weather, but also because of the holidays. Some people feel that they don't have reasons to be jolly during the holidays. It may be because of no money, family strife, or a number of other reasons. These problems compounded with the weather can cause an individual to become extremely depressed," he said.

There are treatments available for those affected by S.A.D. Researchers have found that exposing S.A.D sufferers to full-spectrum artificial light can help to regulate the patient's moods.

The discovery of light therapy as treatment for S.A.D. sufferers has sparked the invention of several types of therapeutic treatment apparatuses that can be used at home or at the office.

S.A.D. victims, as well as other victims of depres-

sion, are encouraged to seek help. "There are ways to treat depression. It may require talking to a professional counselor or taking medication. If you think that you are suffering from depression, it is important for you to seek professional help immediately. Don't think that you can just shake it off," Wessel said.

After some intense soul searching, I realized that things should not be like

this. When I see another brother, I should not view him as an enemy; love, not apprehension, should fill my heart. I should be able to embrace him and say, 'Glad to see you brother - I love you!

I have now begun to let some light into my heart. I am able to confide in brothers without thinking that they'll stab me in the back. I can now hug my friends and tell them how I feel about them without worrying that they will mistake my affection for weakness.

The answer is simple.

The reason why we are killing each other is because we never learned how to love each other. It took me two decades to finally come to this realization, but now it is crystal clear.

In retrospect, I can see that it was hard for me to love another black man. I grew up in a typical single-parent

household without a father. My mother did the best she could to put love into my heart, but without my father around, I was unable to develop a loving relationship with a male. And even if my father was there, I doubt that he would have outwardly given me any affection or allowed me to reciprocate it because this was and is not a manly thing to do. Hate and anger are the only emotions that real men are allowed to show. Love is for suckers. Men are supposed to be hard, and that is what I strove to be.

As I grew into adolescence, I started hanging with the boys, fighting, drinking, and getting into all sorts of mischief. I never really cared for the guys I hung out with, but they were 'hard" so I clung to them; in my eyes, they epitomized true manhood.

Whenever we walked through "the hood" I watched my back because I believed that other black men were a threat. If someone stared at me for too long or (God forbid) touched me in any

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

So far, Fluckes has been on tour with Ringling Bros. for three months. Although he says he loves being a part of the circus, he said he misses his family back home.

"Because I have four brothers and sisters at home, it's hard being away because I'm not always there when they need me," Fluckes said.

The Kidz are sure to grasp and sustain the audience's attention as they perform. Each routine is a combination of hip-hop, gymnastics, acrobatics and aerial leaps.

However, Fluckes used to have an "inner fear" that extra attention would be placed on The Chicago Kidz because it's an African-American troupe.

Christian rap artists use social issues, Jesus Christ to cross over

Christian rappers are some of the best rappers that you've never heard. With the Bible in one hand and a microphone in the other, gospel rappers are slowly gaining acceptance in the music industry.

Born on the same streets as mainstream rappers, Christian rappers use hip hop to spread the word of Jesus Christ. Gospel rap is gaining recognition in the Christian and secular rap industry.

Though the message of gospel rap emphasizes faith in Jesus Christ and turning to the Bible to deal with world problems and positive issues, record companies do not strongly promote it.

During 1994, gospel rappers will concentrate on getting their music and message to the converted and nonconverted Christians.

Gospel rap was started in the early 80s by such artists as Michael Peace, Rev. Rhyme and Hammer, previously known as the Holy Ghost Boy. Now the gospel rap scene has gotten bigger, with such artists as M.C. Dash, Faithful to the Cause, XL and DBD, the 12th Tribe, MC Thunder, Brainwash Projects, King Shon and Femala T.

The message of gospel rap is universal among the artists. They cover social issues as well as rap about getting saved and placing faith in Jesus Christ.

"No matter where you are from, no matter who you are, Jesus can change your life and make it complete," said Texas rapper D.J. Rub-A-Dub, owner of Grape Tree Records and publisher of Heaven's Hip Hop.

D.J. Rub-A-Dub also raps about gangs, violence, drugs

and other issues "tearing society apart."

Mike E, another Christian artist, emphasizes truth, wisdom and self-esteem. "My music is a total positive

message about Christ," he said.

Former Vanilla Ice dancer E-Rock turned to Christianity and uses his rap music to communicate with the youth. The youth have an anointing from God, and I'm here to tell them that," he said.

Other groups like Apocalypse, the Christian MC's and the Dynamic Twins are aiming for the streets and the hardcore listeners while staying true to their message in the

Apocalypse and Christian MC's are ministers who go to the worst inner-city areas to preach the gospel. They use their hard-core style as a tool to speak to those who would not listen otherwise.

'Set the captive free and shout to the secular people and Christians who aren't where they should be," said

Jamison Smith, Apocalypse member. "The message behind it all is a straight Biblical message, and there is no need for kids to be dying and suffering when somebody already died for them," said Gospel Gangstas

member D.J. Dove. "The Christian industry doesn't like Christian rap at all, so they don't promote it, and don't have the money to

gamble on it," said Noel of the Dynamic Twins. Gospel rappers hope the next year will bring prosperity. More and more artists like Brainwash Projects, Gospel Gangstas and T- Bone are expected to change the face of

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

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

An Open Letter to the Howard University Community

Many of you may have seen, and even more of you may have learned of the story on Eye to Eye with Connie Chung that aired on Thursday evening March 31, 1994. Titled "True Believers," the story prominently featured the views

the president of the Howard University Student Association and the head of the Unity Nation organization on the campus - hold about Jews. Their comments were diametrically opposed to everything that Howard University has stood for since its founding 127 years ago as a bastion against racism. In no way, shape, or form were - or are their views representative of the more than 11,000 young women and men who make up our student body.

Yet the "True Believers" segment, by

strong inference, painted the Howard of an ideology that vilified the Jewish University campus as just that: a hotbed of "true believers"; a training ground for bigots; an ideological center of black anti-Semitism.

So the Howard University community was damaged doubly, first by two of its own, and then by a prominent media

When I learned that CBS was planning such a program, a producer was contacted and the request made that Eye to Eye not proceed with the story because the views of the two students in question were so atypical of the student body as a whole. Then, when Eye to Eye went forth with the production of the program anyway, the producer was urged to interview me, other administrators, faculty, and students to ensure a balanced account. The editor of The Hilltop was, in fact interviewed, and she reiterated the view that the majority of Howard students were not supportive people.

But her interview was not included in the final story; nor were interviews with any of the many, many others on the campus who are critical of this ideology; nor was any mention made of Howard's great tradition of openness. From its very beginnings, the University has been one of the most diverse institutions in America, drawing its student body and faculty from throughout the nation and throughout the world. More specifically, Jewish faculty and students have been integral members of the Howard University family for years, including those dismal years in which Jewish faculty were effectively barred from many of the nation's prestigious predominantly white campuses because of rampant anti-Semitism.

No such perspective was offered by the Eye to Eye program. Instead viewers were treated to a mixture of distortions, half-truths, and sensationalism. The program caused great damage to our beloved University. Alumni, friends, and supporters have expressed alarm, outrage, and sorrow about this turn of events. The day after the program aired, we received numerous angry calls and letters to this effect.

I want to assure the Howard University community that we are doing everything we can to right the wrongs caused by the anti-Semitic views on the campus and the harm caused by the CBS program. For instance, we are planning a series of activities and events for the entire university community aimed at promoting tolerance and an appreciation of diversity. But we need your help.

First, I urge all those in the Howard University community to stand up strongly against all kinds of ethnic bias and intolerance, especially, given the times, anti-Semitism. Let us all say, as

the Executive Committee of our B of Trustees did so clearly and forcel that "anti-Semitism has no place on campus, in academia, or in the la society." If we do not take a stronge against those who would vilify and people, we, in effect, are acquiescing condoning that vilification. Oursile thus becomes a cloak for complicing

Second, I urge all those in the Ha University community to express outrage about the Eye to Eye sem that presented such a biased view of campus climate and, in its own represented a vilification, a vilificaof an entire university.

Finally, let us use this unforce episode to renew our commitment carry on Howard University's his role as a valiant foot soldier in the to combat racism, bigotry, oppression.

The challenge of the hour

University, I am deeply concerned about the expressions of intolerance and bigotry that have recently been expressed on our campus. I refer specifically to the March 31, 1994 CBS broadcast entitled "True Believers" on Eye to Eye with Connie Chung. It was inferred during this nationally televised broadcast that some 15 million viewers saw, that the views of a few students represented those of the entire Howard University student body. Further, it was also

implied that Howard has become a training ground for hate mongers.

The very essence of a university is that through an environment of tolerance, it encourages students and faculty to express and debate the broadest range of views. Howard should be no different. However, just as we uphold and protect first amendment rights of freedom of speech, we also have the right and responsibility to disagree with the content of the views some may express. As intellectuals, we cannot stand idly by and allow the university to be depicted by the media or others as a place where hate speech is the only speech that defines what the university

Howard has long been in the forefront of upholding and uplifting the rights of all minorities, no matter the race or ethnicity. It was at Howard that professors in the law school crafted the arguments and designed the strategy to successfully argue the Brown v. Topeka Board of Education school desegregation case in 1954. Ralph Bunche, the former United Nations Undersecretary, taught at Howard. Andrew Young, former Georgia Congressman, top lieutenant to Martin Luther King, Jr. and U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, is a Howard alum. We cannot abandon what these people stood for. The University cannot retreat into a sanctuary of isolation and xenophobia, no matter how tempting it may be. Our traditional mission as leaders in the struggle to protect the freedom of the least among us cannot change.

As faculty and administrators, we have the responsibility to foster a climate that encourages the most tolerant environment possible. As students, you have the responsibility to fight the apathy, the hopelessness and the despair that may allow the intolerance of any stripe to dominate the debate. Our failure to speak out is to encourage the destruction of a rich legacy and tradition that is the very essence of all the 65,000 Howardites, as well as the faculty.

As the Chief Academic Officer at Howard staff and friends who support this international institution.

> One of our greatest strengths is that we have historically been one of the most diverse institutions in the world in which people from around the globe peacefully co-existed. Today, our students come from all 50 states and more than 100 countries. Our faculty is one of the most racially and ethnically diverse in America. Few institutions have built the rich legacy of fostering internationalism long before it became popular to promote diversity and global communication. We must ensure that we continue to be a haven, a place where all are welcomed, regardless of race, gender, sexual preference, ethnic origin, political or religious beliefs. To do less is to abandon our mission and our legacy.

> I also believe that Howard has a responsibility to promote social change by using knowledge, where possible, to solve the social problems of the community. We need to be pro-active, and we need to be good neighbors, especially to those less fortunate. Administrators, faculty, students and staff need to re-commit ourselves to tutoring and mentoring poor children; teaching nutrition to single mothers; organizing block patrols to fight crime; and waging a clean-up campaign on our own campus.

> We must reclaim this great institution's tradition of caring and providing leadership during critical times. Now is the time to seek the high moral ground on an issue of principle-tolerance and diversity. In the sixties Howard students such as Stokeley Carmichael and Courtland Cox, Trinidadians from New York City, Ed and Rap Brown, African Americans from Louisiana, and Tom Kahn, a New York Jew, risked their lives to fight to end racial segregation on Maryland's Eastern Shore, in Alabama and Mississippi. They were students I met in the early sixties and worked alongside in the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee

> Today, our students can leave an enduring legacy by tackling the current civil rights issues of homelessness, illiteracy, poverty, poor health care, teen pregnancy, unemployment and the incarceration of young black males. Let us not lose sight of the real issue. The real issue is the structured inequality from which the poor suffer. To call the problem by any other name is a betrayal of all this great institution stands for. "We must all learn to live together as brothers (and sisters)," the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. said "or we will all perish together as fools. That is the challenge of the hour."

Note from the Editor:

On March 31, 1994 CBS's "Eye to Eye with Connie Chung" aired a report that featured interviews with students who said Jewish people are responsible for various injustices against African Americans. The HILLTOP subsequently received a number responses from students and administrators reacting to reporter Bernie Goldberg's story. Perspectives Extra was created this week in an effort to accommodate the numerous responses to this story and the image of the university that was broadcast.

Assessing the Damage

I sat watching t.v., enjoying my last night of Spring Break when my tranquil setting was disturbed by images of my Howard University Student Association President, Ms. Terri Wade and Unity Nation leader Mr. Malik Zulu Shabazz embarrassing this entire institution.

Yes I said it! I am sick and tired of Howard University students embarrassing our school. They are trying to earn names for themselves at our expense, and judging by the three-page spread in Wednesday's Washington Post, they have been successful. 

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
