Abolition of Slavery,

Will lie in the Vestry Room, at the Church, for Signatures, on Thursday next, and every succeeding day, (Sunday excepted,) until the 9th of March Instant, from 9 in the Morning until 4 o'Clock in the Afternoon of each day, and at the Houses of the following Inhabitants:

- Mr. PERRY, Baker, Curtain Road, Corner of Chapel Street,

- Mr. JACOB EASLEY, Linen-Draper, Crown Street, Finsbury,
- Mr. BENJAMIN LINDSEY, 48, Shoreditch,
- Mr. JOHN REECE, 248, Grocer, Ditto,
