Scope Note

The James Reginald Logan collection consists of thirty-three scrapbooks of newspaper clippings. The thirty-three scrapbooks are a segment of a large group of scrapbooks collected by Logan. The other scrapbooks were donated to Tuskegee Institute and Fisk University.

The collection which spans six and one-half feet was donated by Logan's step-grand daughter Mrs. M.S. McCaskill in 1959. The scrapbooks cover the years 1948 to 1954 and contain items on social, political and economic events from major Black newspapers: The Pittsburgh Courier, Baltimore Afro-American, New York Age and Columbia S.C. Lighthouse and Informer.

The scrapbooks are very fragile. All thirty-three scrapbooks have been microfilmed as a preservation measure. The originals are not to be circulated.

James Reginald Logan was born in Charleston, South Carolina, son of and Catherine Logan. At the age of eleven he was a Tailor's Apprentice. He worked as a coat maker until he was 28 years old.
