

It will be long remembered how members of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers represented H.U. at the convention held at the Hotel Statler in New York in November, 1956. We were also the recipients of a plaque while attending a convention in Syracuse, New York, Remember when we won the trophy at the Homecoming Game upon our first attempt at entering a float?

A number of lucrative job offers have been received by our graduates from industry and the federal government.

Whenever the members of this class meet in reunion many years hence, they will still remember "Ship", "The EE Machine", "Jack the Dealer", "The Men of Tau Beta Pi", "The Prexies of Student Organization", and "The Team of Broome and Green."

Our history has just begun as we finish out stay at Howard. May we ever remain mindful of the high ideals and principles instilled in us here so that the class of '57—forty strong—will produce the men of tomorrow who will help direct the future of America.



ALPHA KAPPA ALPHA SORORITY

On January 16, 1908, a group of young women at Howard University caught the inspiration of a fellow student, Ethel Hedgeman (Lyle) and initiated the movement of Greek letter sororities among Negro women in America. Ethel Hedgeman, who introduced the original proposal and whose efforts were greatly assisted by Ethel Robinson, a teacher of English at Howard, was joined in this unique venture by Lillian Burke, Beulah Burke, Margaret Flagg (Holmes), Marie Woolfolk (Taylor), Lavinia Norman, Ann Brown, Lucy D. Slowe, and Majorie Hill.

The plan for a permanent organization as expressed in the constitution was presented to Dr. Thirkield, President of the University at the time, and to the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, with the result that permission was granted for the organization to function.

Alpha Kappa Alpha has instituted many projects. The Mississippi Health Project, which preceded our present National Health Project, was such a success that it received the financial assistance of the National Government. The ACHR, American Council on Human Rights, is the outgrowth of the Non-Partisan Lobby initiated by Alpha Kappa Alpha, Scholarships are given nationally and locally to deserving people. These and many other successfully completed plans brought recognition to Alpha Kappa Alpha not only in America, but in foreign countries. Alpha Kappa Alpha owns and operates a national house in Chicago, Illinois, and houses for undergraduates on the campuses of colleges and universities throughout the country.

Second semester brought us face to face with that eccentric but brilliant Renal Physiologist, Dr. Hawthorne, Not one of us will ever forget the significance of 1-2-3- as emphasized by one of our favorite but most feared instructors, Dr. Moses Wharton Young, Freshman Year terminated with four casualities and two transfers.

With battered egos, but daring will, we approached Part II of our dream the Sophomore Year. Though the morsels of summer vacation were juicy, our vacationing minds were soon plodded down in academic studies. That proper little Jamaican girl, Pauline Levy, was married during the summer to a "casual acquaintance." At last we were privileged to carry that significant little black bag. We looked like doctors but the Sophomore year had convinced us that everything one sees, hears and reads can be remembered. The suave lectures of Dr. J. B. Johnson as well as those of his associate professors gave us an insight into a vast collection of Medical topics. Though the girls feared meeting Dr. Frank Jones, he proved harmless and exposed them to an excellent Urology Clerkship, Drs. Greene, Syphax and White proved informative and enjoyed decreasing our ignorance. We shall ne'er forget the beneficial impact left by our ideal Dr. W. Lester Henry. The girls collected his pictures and envied his wife, while the boys quoted his teachings at every possible opportunity. Drs. Davis and Drew made shadows speak of normality and disease. Dr. Lawah sprayed us lethally with x-irradiation. Though busy getting adjusted to clinical life we sponsored a magnificent Med-Dent formal at the Presidential Arms, Eddie Saunders was chairman of that energetic committee. He and his group planned a feast which was most successful financially and entertainment wise. Skit Night proved successful also, Andre Galiber and that Portorrican charmer Sylvia Fuertes stole the show with an exotic Latin American Dance. We regretted the prolonged and serious illnesses of Bob Wilkins and lovingly teased "Spastic Bob" Chenault.

Though we've had good moments and bad, we count each as a precious memory. And though we've jokingly characterized some of our instructors, we gratefully acknowledge the beneficial immensity that each contributed to our education.

In Nineteen-hundred and fifty-three, We promoted a dream to reality. Now that the dream's completely true We sadly bid our friends adieu.

Class History

We are the last class to begin our dental training in the old dental building. We are the last to recall the "Glory Hole" and the joys associated with it, such as the floods and one casting oven. The year ended in a turmoil of Cadaver "Waltz", Med-Dent Dance, Bone Walk, and final examinations, Fortunately the year ended and The Dean sent us a letter that began. "I am happy", and we were also.

We were sophomores, upperclassmen, and veterans in dental education; but we were unaware of what was to come. In our sophomore year, we had the four "P's"; Physiology, Pathology, Pharmacology, and Percy Fitzgerald. This was the year that a blues record became very popular. The record was entitled, "Have mercy, Mr. Percy." At one time in Pharmacology 72 was an "A" and the very next exam 92 was a "C".

The second semester we spent so much time in the labs that most of the class developed claustrophobia. The highlight of the year came when our clinical smocks were issued. We were so anxious to get to the clinic, we knew just what to do on the mannequin. That summer we entered the clinic. Our first patients! We had never realized that there was so much difference between a patient and a mannequin.

For our class the Junior year could best be called "The Joe Henry Period." We were formally introduced to "Jumping Joe", when he told us that all of the records and routine in the clinic were being changed. We did not get to really know him until we were in his classroom. The Junior year was very fateful for some of us, Their letters from The Dean did not start with, "I am pleased". This was the first major loss to our class and we were grieved to lose several of our classmates whom we had gotten to know so well.

Then we were seniors, the "know-it-alls" of the school; but as our problems increased we realized how much we did not know. The struggle for points continued with some "toolers" surging far ahead of the class. This struggle still continues interspersed with practical examinations.

Our ardent hope is that commencement for us will be the true beginning of an even greater dental education.

Class History

TEMPUS FUGIT

The year 1954 is one not soon to be forgotten by any of the persons mentioned herein; it was the year that this class began its unrelenting, unswerving, uncompromising drive to wrest from the minds of the faculty and from the tomes of the library all there was to be known of that vague and illusory spectre—The Law.

We were a sophisticated, cosmopolitan group: debonair Joseph Miller; young, industrious, irrepressible William "Gus" Butts; suave, immaculate Lincoln Pitts and Earl Johnson; the brilliant Goler Butcher; Norman Wilson, arrogant, tempestuous and eloquent; Jesse Johnson and Thomas Hicks, determined and aggressive; Olga McLaughlin, fashionable and pretty; Alvin Echols, Williams Woodson, and George Minor, scholarly and studious: Lisbon Berry. We drafted our Wills for Mr. Daniels and proceeded to do battle with the rules of Evidence. We framed "thumping, bumping, sophisticated" issues which were Dean Johnson's joy, but which taxed the basis of all our gifts. We Credited our Transactions and set our Sales for the Federal Jurisdiction of Labor Law. Our Government Regulations created many Conflicts in our Domestic Relations, but the Final Legal Accounting proved that our Creditor's Rights had no place in Administrative Law. We argued our cases before Judge Hayes and hung our juries until the cases became Moot. No one will deny that but for Mr. Till we would still be searching for the Rule in Shelley's Case.

Class meetings were a constant source of joy, for here we argued and fought with no holds barred. Can we ever forget the great debate over the Class Gift? Resolved: That the Class of 1957 should present the Law School a statue of a golden albatross with bolts of lightning in its beak and serpents entertwined in its talons. Our able presidents (Jesse Johnson, Goler Butcher, Lisbon Berry, and Solomon Seay) proved their mettle in presiding over such stormy sessions.

We worked hard. Goler Butcher, Earl Johnson Thomas Hicks, Alvin K. Echols, and Williams Butts produced masterly articles for the Law Journal. Thomas Cunningham led a tremendous crusade to enroll the entire student body in the NAACP, Earl Johnson and Norman Wilson electrified the Moot Court with their brilliant "Defense of M'Naghten."

We played well. The Annual Barrister's Ball was an occasion of great merriment as we looked forward to the torrid laments of our blues-singing buddy, Joe Miller. Certainly, among our lighter memories, we catalogue "Gus" Butts' "theory."

We are pardonably proud of the fact that ours is the first class to graduate from the magnificient new building. Our study has been challenging and enriching. We face the problems of a dynamic society with a serenity born of confidence—a confidence instilled in us by an able and devoted faculty. The feeling is inescapable that we were extremely fortunate in being able to study at the cradle of Civil Rights litigation. We pray that the efforts of the faculty in our behalf have not been in vain; we pray ever to be worthy of the effort they expended on us.

And so, with a zeal to serve, and a confidence in our ability to serve, we leave—






