

We'd all heard the horror stories. If you hadn't heard them, that's unfortunate; You should've been warned.

If you became sick and needed treatment, rumor had it that Howard University Hospital was by no means the place to go. Fortunately, there was one young man ready and brave enough to step forth, smash the rumors and attempt to make a few significant changes in the seemingly doomed facility.

Howard University hospital appointed Kevin Lofton, age 36, Executive Director of the hospital November 5, 1990, after leaving his position as Chief Operating Officer/Executive Vice President of the University Medical Center in Jacksonville, Florida. Lofton, who described himself as a "people person," wasted no time in trying to get his job done.

"I will bring a different leadership and management approach to the hospital," he explained. "People here are looking for a change and are willing to do [things] to make a better hospital."

One of Lofton's goals was to correct many problems that concern people about the hospital. Cosmetically, there was some repainting and relighting to help brighten and beautify the facility externally.

Finances presented huge problems for HUH in 1990 (so many that the facility was threatened to close down), and Lofton wanted to dig the hospital out of the deep financial hole it was in. Lofton admitted that he is very grateful for the warm reception he was given at HUH.

"The way I've been received here is extremely well. It's a great accomplishment to be accepted to come here. I have a proven track record and people here are willing to look past my age. I'm very confident HUH will be at a point where it will be one of the top ten university hospitals in the country."







The Bison fought to regain their momentum with two touchdowns by Danald Carr and Harrell, but to no avail, the Aggies were too tough. The Bison lost its first homecoming game in five years, 33-











he early success of the Bison squad brought back memories of the 1987 squad, and again the team seemed poised and ready to take the title as the 1990 MEAC Championship team. 


Tennis Team Nets Success







Fewer Sharks in the Pool

Suppose you were a former athlete and you were offered a position as head coach of your particular sport. This would not appear to be a problem for most people, but what if you had recently graduated from this program?

Well first year Head Coach of Howard University's swim team could be of some help. Brown who was formerly of the Trinidadian swim team, swam for the Sharks for four years.

Brown says the transition from athlete to head coach was difficult considering his unique circumstances. "It's hard to be a good coach, it's something that requires a lot of patience. In my situation I'm looking at the same sport but at a different level - the instructional level. You have to try not to let up on your friends and at the same time be able to push them and motivate them to succeed."

Although the team may have had some initial doubts about him at first, Brown says that most of them knew him and had confidence in his ability to coach. "Being a former athlete for this program enabled me to be more knowledgeable about problems facing student-athletes here at Howard."

Chris Gayle, a senior from Kingston, Jamaica says adjustment to a new coach is always difficult. "The fact that most of us were friends with him (Brown), probably made the transition harder, itwas like having your teammate coach you." Gayle who swam 20.7 in the 50 yard free-style last year was chosen to participate in the Pan American games and the Carribean Central American games this year. Gayle is one of two possible qualifiers for the NCAA division I championships.

Another possible qualifier would be Mike Houston, an outstanding senior who, along with Gayle, broke pool records at Georgetown and


American Universities this year. Both of these athletes aspire to be the first qualifiers from a black institution. Not being able to participate in those crucial big meets may have hindered their chances, says Gayle. "In order to gain exposure we need to be competing against bigger and better schools to prove that we are just as competent."

Finishing with a 3-5 record last year, the Sharks were faced with several problems which as yet haven't been resolved. Financial difficulties along with low recruitment plaqued the ream. "We have a twenty member team which is barely enough with all the events you have in a meet," says Lisa Lightfoot a senior Graphic Design major. Lightfoot is one of five women on the ream. "Having only five women on a swim ream is difficult, some of us have to participate in up to three events." Lightfoot says that a new rule was imposed this year stating that

"I think that the program will grow because we have a lot of spirit and we're eager to succed."





dealing with it."



Under New Management

n October 15, 1990, a major change took place for the men's baskerball ream. There was a new face around, a face that transcended a look of determination and dedication. Who was this man? What kind of changes was he looking to make within the men's baskerball program? And how did he plan to tackle the outstanding problems that plagued the team over the previous years? His name: Alfred "Butch" Beard. His mission: To coach the Howard University's men's basketball team and make the program successful. Beard was hired by the university last June to replace 15 year coach A.B. Williamson, A. native of Hardinsburg, Kentucky, Beard started his collegiate career of baskerball or the University of Louisville in 1966. During his three years at Louisville (1966-69), he maintained a 19 point career scoring average and earned All-America honors during the 1968-69 season. In 1969, Beard was drafted by the Atlanta Hawks in the first round of the N.B.A. Beard also played with such reams as Cleveland, Seattle, Golden State and the Knicks. After leaving to pursue his baskerball career, Beard returned to school and graduated

with a B.S. in education in 1972. Following his N.B.A. career, Beard moved on to the coaching level as an assistant to Red Holfzman of the New York Knicks for four years and two years for the New Jersey Nets. Beard says he accepted this position as coach because he wanted the opportunity to be head coach and instill some values in younger players. Junior transfer, Julius McNeil says the thought of having a new coach was a frightening experience. "People are afraid of the unknown; you don't know what to expect from someone you've never met before." Although, there may have been some complaints in the beginning, Beard says the team has made tremendous progress from day one. "After the guys realized that they could do most of the things I asked of them in practice, they became more confident" Being receptive to change will be a determining factor in the Bison success. One may not see immediate results from this transformation, but you can be assured that in a few years the men's basketball ream headed by coach Alfred "Butch" Beard will be a competitive force in



Dr. Yang, who has coached the Howard University's Tae Kwon Do team for the last 23 years, brought much national and international prestige and success to the university.

"He is a strict disciplinarian who has high expectations. You have to be successful not only in fighting but in the classroom as well," said Larry McMullum, who is a black belt second degree.

Dr. Yang, who is an eight degree black belt from Seoul, Korea, said recruiting members for the team isn't hard. "Many students who take elementary Tae Kwon Do as a P.E. course enjoy it so much they want to join the dub." From there, many of the experienced members eventually make the team.

Patrick Renarck, a senior from West Africa, has been studying the sport for fifreen years. "I had good skills when I came here, but Dr. Yang developed all of my rechniques. He can take anyone and bring our the best in them because of his experience."

Tae Kwon Do, an individual sport, originated in Korea. This form of martial arts teaches mental discipline as well as physical conditioning. Learning From Adversity

uick question: In two words, who had lightening speed, uplifting positivity, steadfast endrance, and undeniable strength? After taking one look on Howard University's track team, the answer was obvious: Suzie Tanefo.

Standing 5'8" and weighing 134 pounds, the sophomore powerhouse from Cameroon, West Africa, began her track career by running for her country under the coaching of Lee Evans, world record holder in the 400 meter dash. Knowing Tanefo could have better athletic opportunities in the United States, Evans sooke with William Moultrie, coach of the men's and women's track teams at Howard, and Tanefo signed the necessary

papers and obtained a full four year scholarship.

"She's a fierce competitor and that's something you can't coach," Moultrie said. "When they [the athletes] bring those kind of ingredients with them to the track, all you can do is improve on them a little bit and let them go."

And "go" she did. Since her arrival at Howard in January 1989, Tanefo's abilities immediately placed her on the mile relay team as a freshman. She and the relay team also beame All-American athleres after they qualifid for the NCAA Championship Trials last March.

Tanefo knew, since coming to Howard, her opportunities were limitless, and her hard work and

perserverance paid off.
Although she was thankful
for the scholarship, Tanefo
definitely didn't describe it
as a free ride.

"I wouldn't say for free because you work hard for that [scholarship], and I believe that track is one of the more difficult sports. You've got to run the whole year-nonstop. And it's not like a team sport. It's you and only you on the track. Mentally, physically-just you."

Holli Walker, captain of the team, strongly believed in Tanefo's abilities and determination. "She's one of the best athletes on the team. You don't want to let her down because you know [even if] she's hurt, she's going to run her hardest every single relay," Walker said.

Olympic glory is not too

far out of reach for Tanefo. She believes her Olympic aspirations can be realized.

"I'm not trying to set a goal when I'm running. If I set a goall now, I may do bettewr than that and I feel I'm limiting myself. I'm trying to tell myself, 'You do the best that you can do.'

I want to be good, and if one day I can be up there with the best, I would love that!"

Perhaps one day Tanefo will be the best, but one thing was for sure-she was definitely on the right track.



Home Again

r. Franklin Jenifer made history April 1 1990, and started what will hopefully become a Howard tradition, when he became the first Howard alumnus to head the university since its founding in 1867.

Since Howard's founding, only four of its presidents have been of African-American descent. Howard University is a Black educational empire with its 18 schools and colleges, four campuses, and 12,000 students. Until Jenifer took over the reign of this empire, nor one president had actually stood in the long lines to register, cheered on their fellow Bison at a Homecoming game or stayed up all night, studying in Founders Library.

President Jenifer understood first hand the concerns of Howard students and came back to his alma mater vowing "to be about the business of putting Howard on the front burner of educational players in the United States." It was the essence of those experiences that made President Jenifer believe that his administration would be unique.

"I have a desire to see Howard be all it can be. Howard is my alma mater. There is truly something special about coming back." said Jenifer.

Jenifer hit the ground running. He assigned task forces to research where improvements needed to be made in the university staff and was very visible on campus.

Dr. Jenifer came to Howard via the Massachusetts Board of Regents of Higher Education where he served as chancellor for four years.

Before embarking on a career in academia, Dr. Jenifer spent several years in scientific research. From 1962 to 1970, while studying for his advanced degrees from Howard and the University of Maryland, he worked as a plant virologist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Jenifer's wish is that Howard will meet the challenge of being the hub of excellence. "If we do not train the highest caliber of scholars-no one will."

Λ New Perspective

The one wish that former addemic affairs vice president, Michael Winston had for Howard was to end what he called "institutionalized partying." The new vice president, Dr. Joyce Ladner, is ready to see that wish become a reality, "I, too am very concerned with institutional culture. What students perceive is an institution that emphasizes having fun and demphasizes academics."

Dr. Ladner wants to make it clear that she is by no means a spoilsport, but at the same time her position does not allow her to be a party advocare. "It's [Howard University] an easy place to have fun. God knows I'm not apposed to having fun. I do think we have to strike a balance," said Ladner.

Howard does have a reputation for its hardcore social activity, but with Ladner in charge, that reputation will be changing soon. Ladner takes personal offense to Howard being referred to as a "party" school.

Among her many goals for the university is an extended orientation program for freshman. Her proposed program would go beyond the usual Campus Pal events to include year long assemblies where students can get to know each other, faculty members, administrators, and school history.

She also wants to see the registration and financial aid programs expand, "I want to know before they get here how much financial aid they'll get rather than coming to Howard unprepared."

"If I can achieve anything in this office it would be to give students more of a sense of belonging," said Ladner. She admitted that since being promoted from her position as Dean of the School of Social Work, she has less interaction with students than she'd like to have.

Ladner, who is originally from Hattiesburg, Mississippi, says having eight sibllings and a strong mother helped develop her deep convictions about family and community service. "Part of who I am has to do with where I grew up in segregated Mississipi," said Ladner. She added that her mother taught her that her place in the world had to be made, it was not guaranteed.

According to Ladner whose mother also stressed community involvements, a college education is not complete until the student gives back to the community.

Participating in the Civil Rights Movement was the giving back that Ladner did early in her academic career. For her efforts, Ladner was awarded a week long stay in jail, an experience she says helped her not to be so "narcissistic and self-centered."

The self described shy Ladner says that she does not "hang out a lot."

She is very active in her church and says her one child, a sixreen year old boy, is "the center of my life."

"I want students and faculty to be able to debate inside and outside the classrooms," said Ladner. In her quest to create a stronger spirit of collegiality and enthusiasm at Howard, the Mecca of historically black education, Ladner just might be changing the world. To that she says, "If we don't chane it-we're going to go down with it."



Legal Eagles

If you were interested in combining legal expertise with a grasp of the major social, political and economic problems facing the world today, the Howard University School of Law was the place for you. The School of Law has promoted social justice and equal opportunity since its conception. Always on the cutting edge of legal and social equality, the law school graduated the nation's first black female lawyer, Charlotte Ray, in 1872.

In the decades that followed, the School earned a national reputation as the "legal think tank" of the civil rights movement as professors and students alike united to challenge segregation through the courts.

The School offered three degree programs. The Juris Doctor program consisted of a rigorous course of studies designed to qualify its students to take the bar examination in all states. The first two years of the program emphasized the fundamental concepts of the law and the manner by which it was administrated. In the final year, students are able to concentrate on a specific area of speciality.

The Master of Comparative Jurisprudence program was designed to give graduates of foreign law schools a better understanding of the American legal system.

For those interested in business, the Joint Juris Doctor and the Master of Business Administration programs were most beneficial.

Graduates of the School of Law could move in any number of directions, whether clerking for a judge, taking an entry-level position in a major corporation, working in a private firm, or even teaching, they were well-equipped to face the legal world.

A Lasting Impression

If one had to name a school in Howard University out of the 18 schools and colleges that personified excellence in its field, the School of Divinity would undoubtedly be mentioned.

Once called the School of Religion, the religious institution was once housed in the Carnegie Building on Howard's main campus, built by private, not government, funds. In April 1987, after an increasingly growing student enrollment, the school was able to move to its present home-a beautiful 22-acre building in northeast, Washington, D.C.

Over the years, the school has continued to grow. The nondemoninational theological school includes a library, several meeting rooms, offices, and the Howard Thurman Chapel. Professor Crawford, instructor of social ethics and Dean of Rankin chapel, explained the amount of growth the school has achieved.

"We've been blessed to be able to have enough space [to hold] a variety of conferences and consultations on the compus."

National commissions, such as the NAACP, and local church and community groups have used the school's facilities. One of their main goals is to increase the communication between the Howard student, the D.C. community, and the church.


The curriculum of the School of Divinity carefully examines the Christian faith and other religions of the world, as well as studied moral, humane and ethical values. According to one student, the School of Divinity wants to become a "Loving, caring community." They were concerned about the church's welfare and future as well as the quality of life available to all people, especially those who seem to be down and out.

Upon graduation, the school's graduates serve as ministers as well as reachers, administrators, counselors, and Christian educators.

As one scribe stated, "Even those graduates who choose to pursue other types of work find that their studies at the School add a long-lasting spiritual dimension to their lives".

Divine Inspiration

If one had to name a school in Howard University out of the 18 schools and colleges that personified excellence in its field, the School of Divinity would undoubtedly be mentioned.

Once called the School of Religion, the religious institution, built by private funds, was once housed in the Carnegie Building on Howard's main campus. In April 1987, after an increasingly growing student enrollment, the school was able to move to its present home—a beautiful 22-acre building in northeast, Washington, D.C.

Through the years, the School of Divinity has continued to grow. The non-denominational theological school includes a library, several meeting rooms, offices, and the Howard Thurman Chapel. Professor Evans D. Crawford, instructor of social ethics and Dean of Rankin Chapel, explained the amount of growth the school has achieved.

"We've been blessed to be able to have enough space (to hold) a variety of conferences and consultations on the campus." National commissions, such as the NAACP, and local church and community groups have used the school's facilities. One of their main goals is to increase the communication between the Howard student, the D.C. community, and the church.

The curriculum of the School of Divinity carefully examines the Christian faith and other religions of the world, as well as the study of moral, humane and ethical values.

Upon graduation, the school's graduates serve as ministers as well as teachers, administrators, counselors and Christian educators. As one scribe stated, "Even those graduates who choose to pursue other types of work find that their studies at the School add a long-lasting spiritual dimension to their lives."



"I have cheated," said Mark Fudge, a junior Political Science major, "but I don't practice it. I'm scared of cheating because I don't want to get caught."





Many people dream of writing the best selling novel that will make them the next Baldwin or Walker, but few think of the people behind the book. Howard University Press' Book Publishing Institute has been considering the business of training young people for the book publishing industry for a decade.

The Institute was founded by the Howard University Press with a grant from Time Inc. in 1980. Since then, more than 100 graduates have gone through the West Campus headquarters.

The summer program involves a five week training that introdues students to all facets of book publishing. Those enrolled are required to live on campus because the demanding schedule often calls for weekend and evening meetings.


The four key areas of instruction are editorial, production and design, and business and marketing. Program graduates are exposed to instructors

HUSA recovers from leftover deficit

The slogan was "Leadership For the Masses"--from the masses. Softspoken April Silver and "that militant" Ras Baraka were running for HUSA President and Vice-President? The mere thought had many administrators shaking in their boots. But despite opposition, they ran--and won, leading Howard University into one of the most Afrocentric administrations in the school's history.

"When April and I first decided to

run," Baraka said, "we wanted to make [HUSA] people-oriented-that's why we said 'Leadership For the Masses', because we felt the [HUSA] government wasn't necessarily representing the whole student body... I think we've successfully done that."

HUSA introduced various Afrocentric programs, and a networking conference entitled "Hip Hop At It's Crossroads."

Unfortunately, the last HUSA

administration left Silver and Baraka a large deficit to repay. The new administration sold "Support Black Colleges" buttons, keychains, T-shirts, and hars through a non-profit organization called "Student Bodies," and were able to pay their bills and have a little over \$2,000 left in the bank for the next administration.



ach year, a great number of students are faced with the reality of having to find offcampus housing. Most students find this experience a big adjustment that makes them become more responsible and selfsufficient than their peers that reside in the dorms.

Because Howard's residence halls are only equipped to accommodate abour 3,409 students, the remaining must live offcampus in D.C. Maryland, or Virginia. The recent addition of the Howard Plaza Towers apartments has added 1,349 new

spaces.

Students pay an average of \$400-800 a month for one bedroom apartments and \$600-1200 a month for two bedrooms in the District. This leads many students to seek roommates who will share expenses, or jobs to pay for housing necessities.

Students realized that off-campus housing had it's disadvantages. Daris Minikon, a student living in suburban Maryland, said, "When you live off campus, you are not as up to date with campus activities."

And so the night ended. Students walked home with a somewhat different outlook on the homeless, knowing-if they hadn't already-that these people were simply unfortunate victims of society, not peasants to be insulted and ignored. They learned that it is important that we, as human beings, do not turn our backs on them because indeed, one day the tables may be turned.





















Upward Bound

hroughout the school year on Saturdays you might have noticed that the students on campus looked a little younger than the average Howard student you saw on "The Yard" during the week. On Saturdays, the students that filled the School of Engineering building appeared to be less serious-minded than those who live in "The Valley" on weekdays. Those students were involved in the Upward Bound program.

Upward Bound has been on Howard's campus since

1965, serving over 6,000 high school students. The federally-funded program is available for students in grades 9-12 with the grade point average of "C" or better. The program is designed for students from low-income families or students who will be the first in their family to attend college. Upward Bound places emphasis on assessing interests, abilities, academic skills, and career goals. Formal instruction, however, is only offered in English, mathematics, science, reading, SAT preparation, and study

Students attend Saturday classes throughout the regular school term. During the summer they live in on-campus dormitories for six weeks to get a glimpse at what living at college is really about.

Shawn Pelore, a Howard student who participated in Upward Bound in high school, felt that the best part of the program is that "it allows students to experience some of the trials and tribulations of college life without actually being in college."

Assistant Director, Joseph B. Hill, has been involved with the program at Howard since 1981. The program has been quite successful in placing over ninety-five percent of its graduates in prestigious colleges and universities throughout the country. Upward Bound is one of the few federally-funded programs that place emphasis on shaping today's youth. Hopefully, it will continue to expand and produce the leaders of tomorrow.




















Figures Increase

International Students

amaica, Puerto Rico, London, and Hong Kong... The list reads more like a vacation brochure than four of the 109 countries students travel from to attend Howard University.

Of the estimated 12,506 students enrolled, nearly 2,000 are international students. During the 1990 91 ocademic year, international students made up 15.1% of the Howard community. Of the 1,892 international pupils, 39.8% were from the Caribbean, 36.1% from Africa, 8.8% from North, Central or South America, and 15.3% were from the Far East

and Pacific region, the Near and Middle East and Europe.

Unlike the average student, international students dealt with more than sharing a closet-sized space with a stranger or adjusting to new academic demands. He or she must also adust to a new culture.

Christine Dunbar, a native Jamaican, said a big problem has been mingling with American students. "They don't know anything about the Caribbean. There are a lot of misconceptions about the West Indies." She felt that most American

students, "don't think about the Caribbean as they think of New York or Washington."

African Students Association Interim Chairman Charles Curtis-Thomas agreed, "The Americans are more lacking in knowledge about Africans than the Africans are lacking in knowledge of Americans."

Curtis-Thomas, from Sierra Leone, added that Howard is a great placeeducationally and socially,"despire the problems international students and American students may have coexisting on The Yard."

The education of international students is being threatened by the ten percent tuition increase that went into effect during the 1990-91 academic year. This percentage is slated to increase until it reaches fifty percent. Continued increases may severely lower international enrollment which has declined by more than 400 students since 1985.


We can go any damn where we want to go....but we have to make them understand that our money is very important."




