The Mecca is Saturday nights at the Gardens or 2K9.

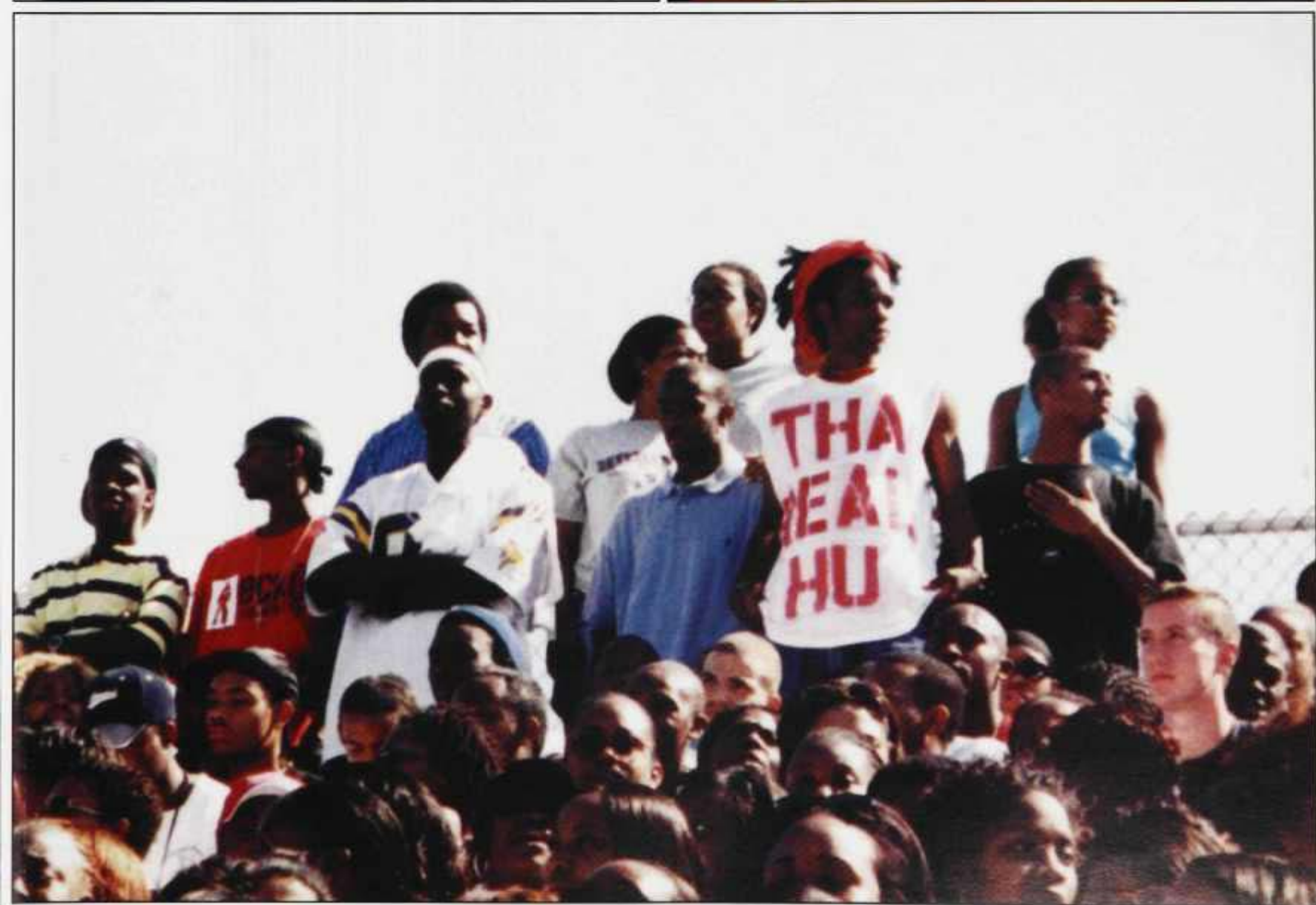
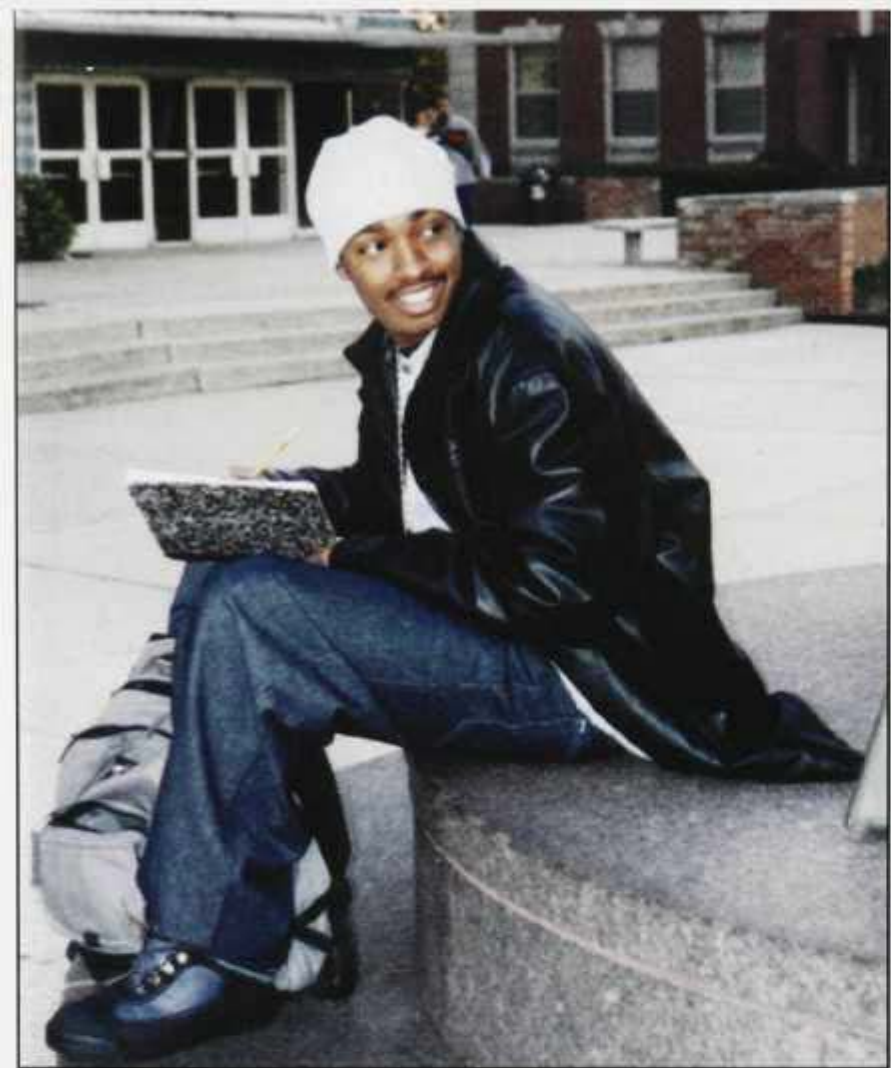
The Mecca is Fridays at noon.

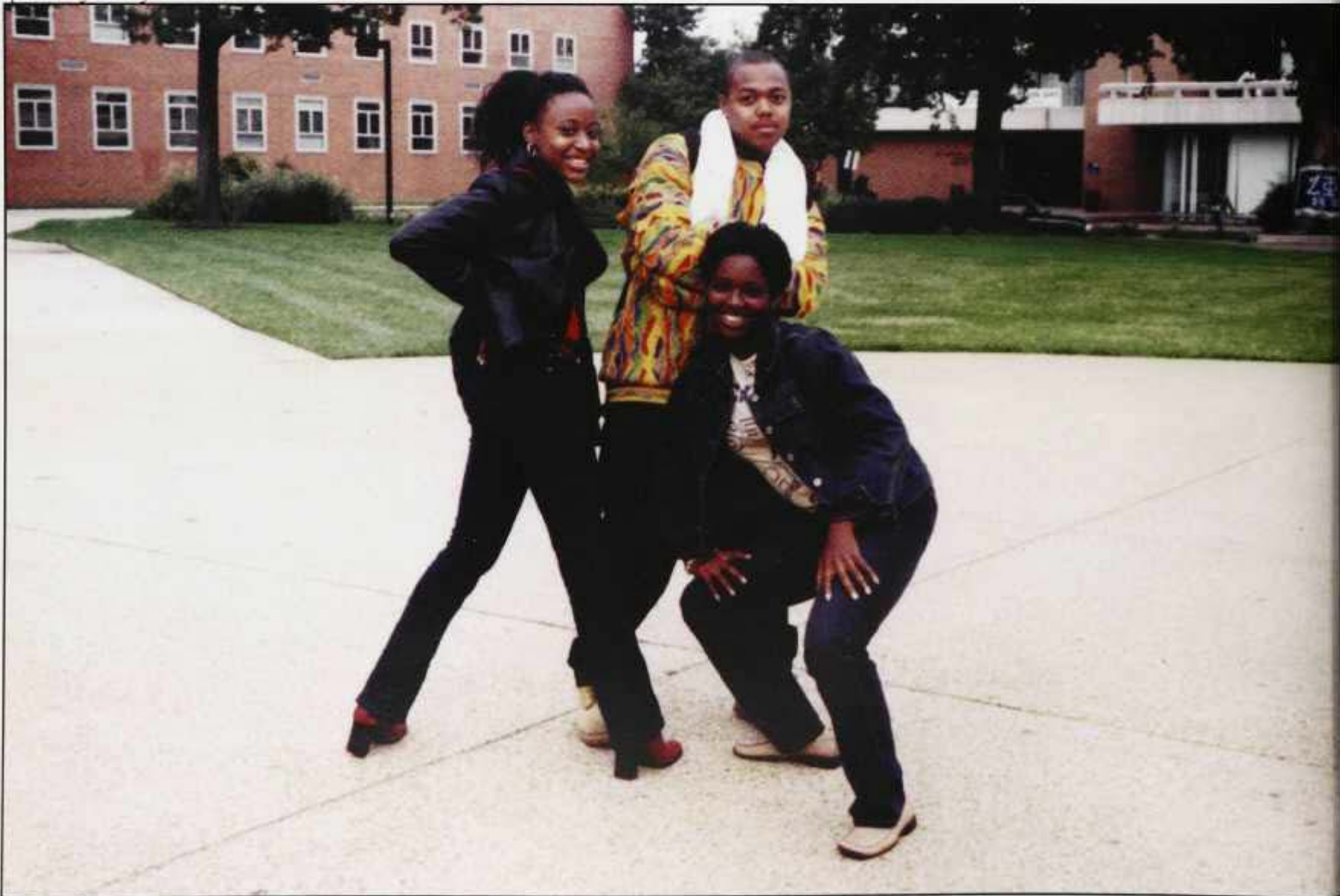

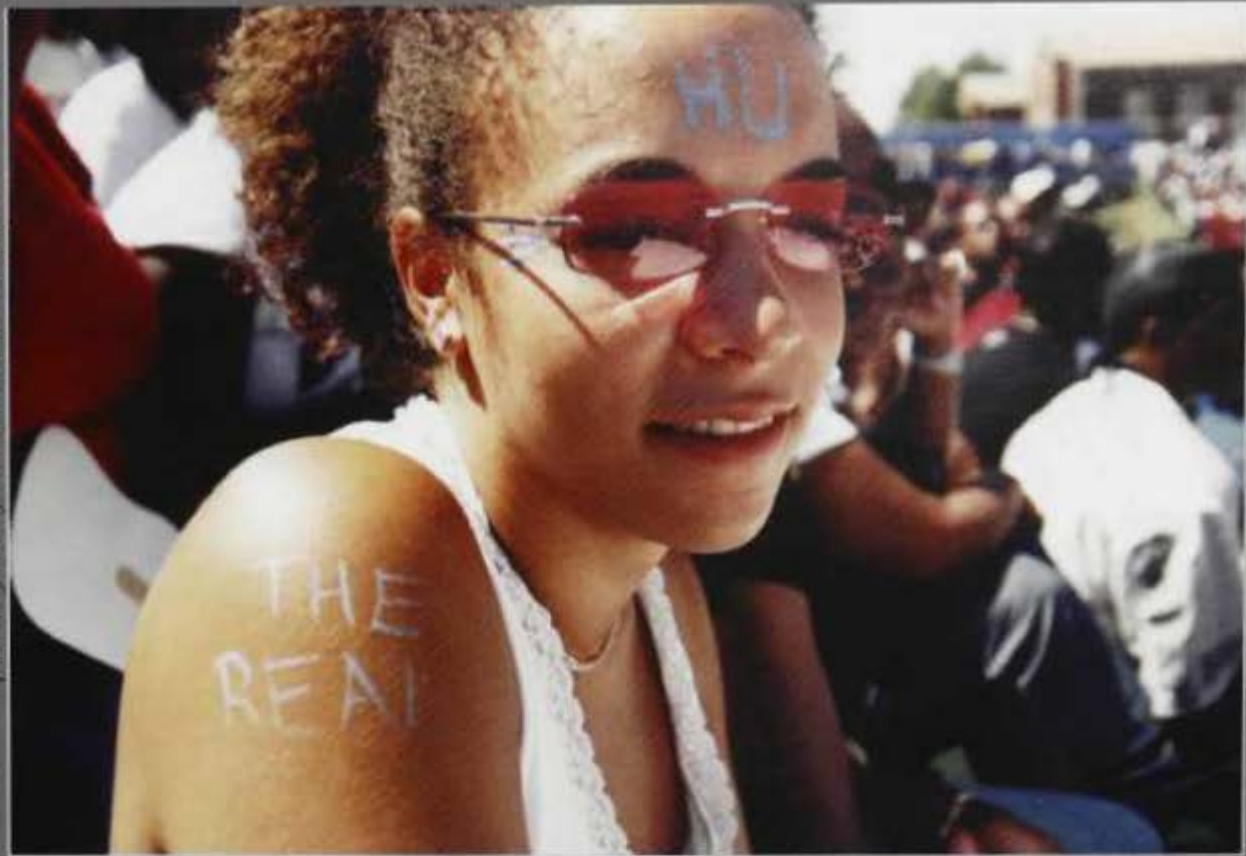

What is the Mecca?

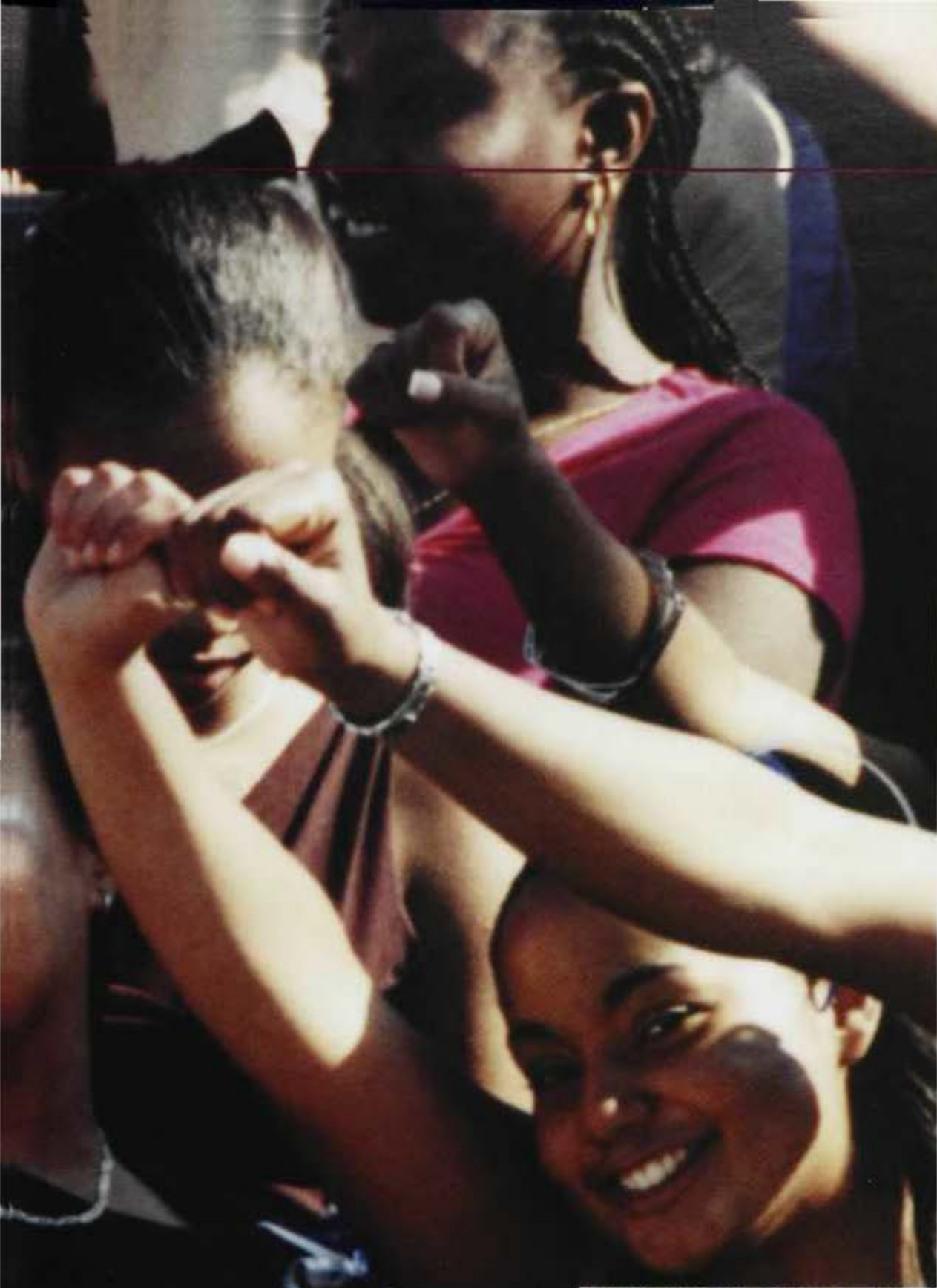
The Mecca wakes up around 10:30 a.m. on a Friday morning, dresses to kill, and refuses to rest until the club closes at 4 a.m.

Because all work and no play makes a hella borin' Bison.



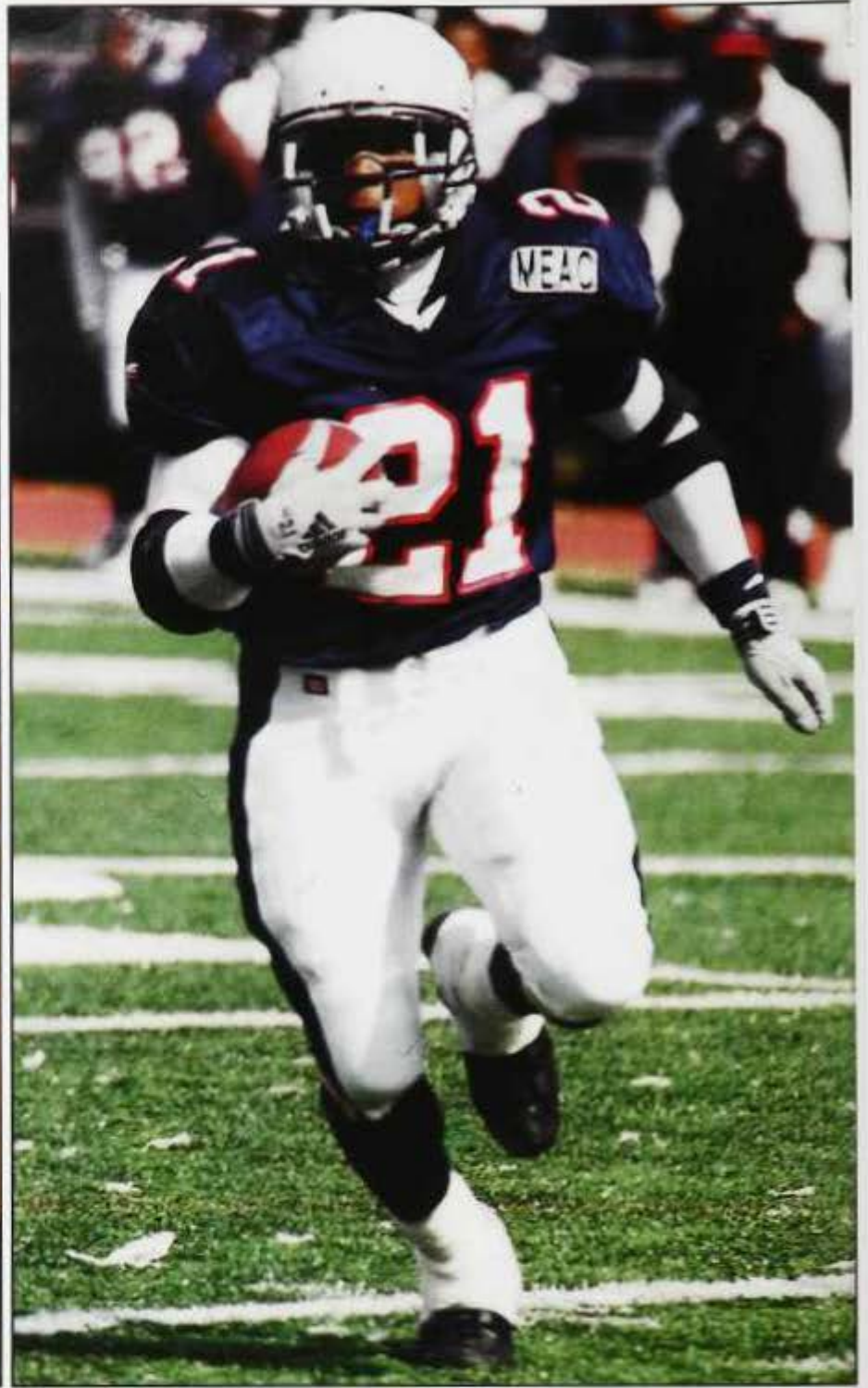

On that scorching Saturday, September 8, 2001, Howard University and Hampton Institute (!) continued the spirit of a long rivalry in the Battle of the H.U.s. The rivalry has been played in various venues since 1908. For the past five years, the game has been played as a classic in neutral stadiums; however, this year, the Battle was staged at Howard's own Greene Stadium.

Vendors, tailgaters, and "crunk" students crowded the stadium and its periphery as the Howard Bison and the Hampton Pirates went to battle on the turf for the 78th time. The game took over four hours and, on this blazing day, with more than 11,000 people crammed into Greene Stadium, every single moment was felt. "Despite the hot weather, I had a

lot of fun with my people," states senior Mike Brown. "It's always beautiful to see a large group of Black people get together."

At halftime, the Bison were down 13-0. After the marching bands retreated to their respective territories, the Bison came back with full force... but it wasn't enough. The Institute won, 27-20. "Our cheerleaders were tight, our band was tight and our team played its hardest," notes sophomore Jennifer Burrell.

The loss didn't bring down the spirits of Bison fans. What mattered was the fun we had, the number of successful waves that went around the entire stadium, the chants that we urged the cheerleaders to do over and over and over ("Shake these!"), the excitement of the class of 2005 ("Let the freshmen do it!"), and the pride that we collectively demonstrated for our team - for Howard.

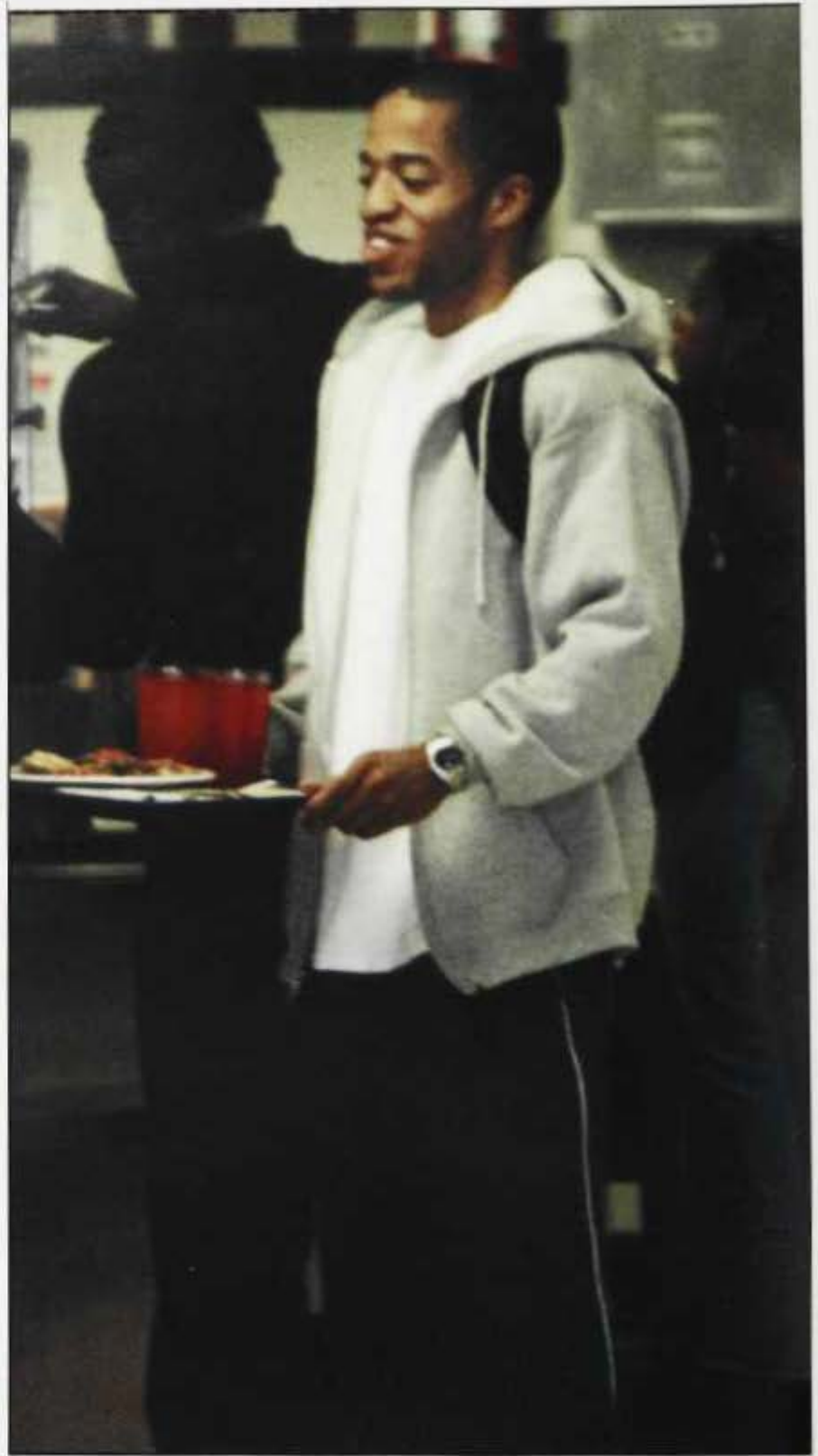

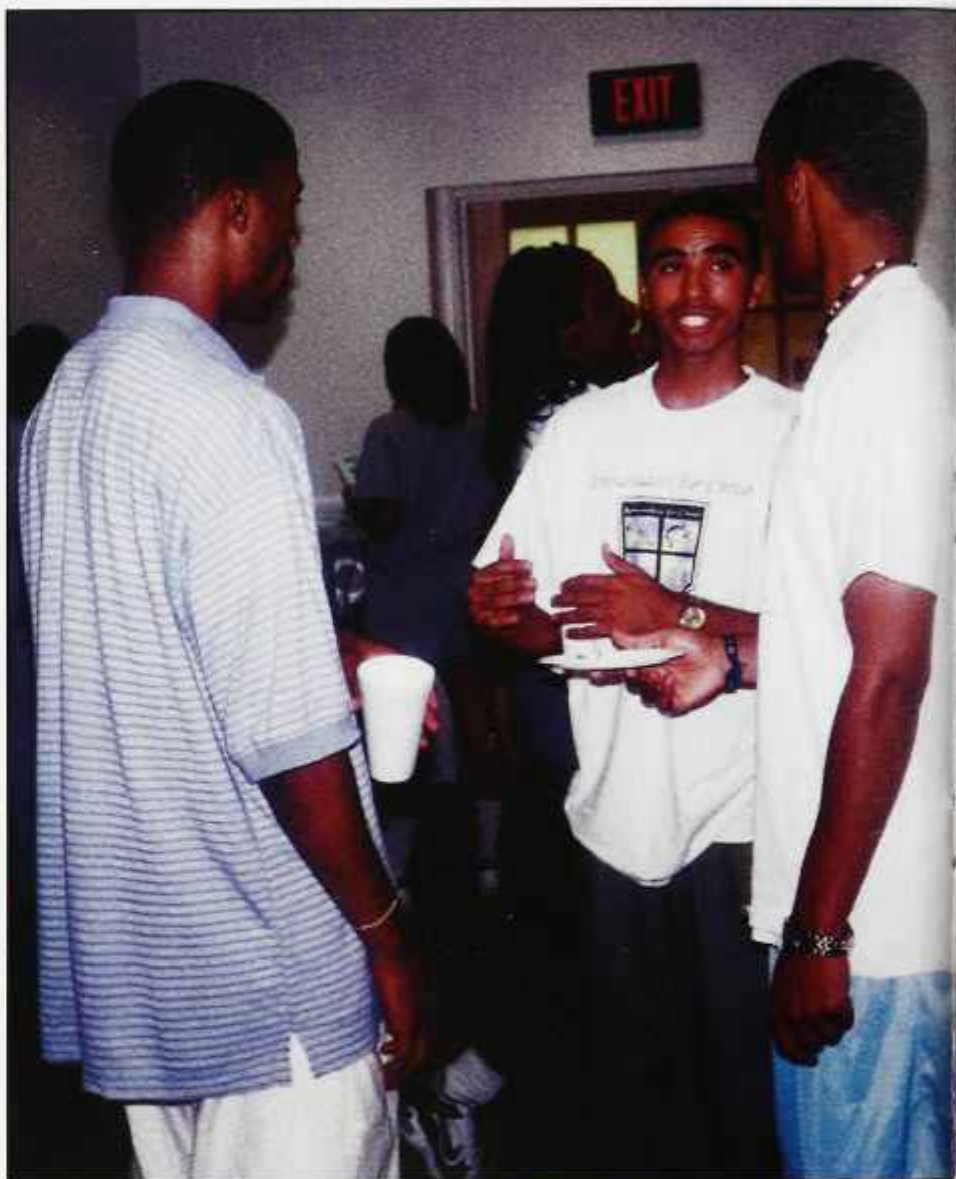

Their vision was brought to life with the formation of Ambassadors For Christ (AFC), a mentorship program that has taken off since its inception just two years ago. "There are a number of organizations and mentorship programs that promote career development, social behavior, and a smooth adjustment to Howard upon arrival," says senior Halleemah Nash, founder of AFC. "There was a need for a formal mentorship program designed for spiritual nourishment, encouragement and building incoming students in Christ."

Members of AFC go through extensive training on how to share the gospel with other students and provide guidance on living a life without compromise. Junior Safia Mohamed is eager to provide her testimony. She is proud to have assisted two mentees last year, as she was able to share her Christian experience. "I wasn't a Christian when I came to Howard," says Mohamed. "I was saved freshman year."

In the spring of 2001, AFC succeeded in organizing the first ever HBCU Christian Leadership Conference, "Commissioned to Conquer," which brought students from across the nation to Howard and further demonstrated that Christ has a tremendous presence on this campus. Students from several HBCUs united to participate in workshops and events geared toward promoting spiritual growth and fellowship through worship. The Ambassadors started this school year with AFC Week: "Kickin' It with Jesus," which introduced the organization to the Class of 2005.

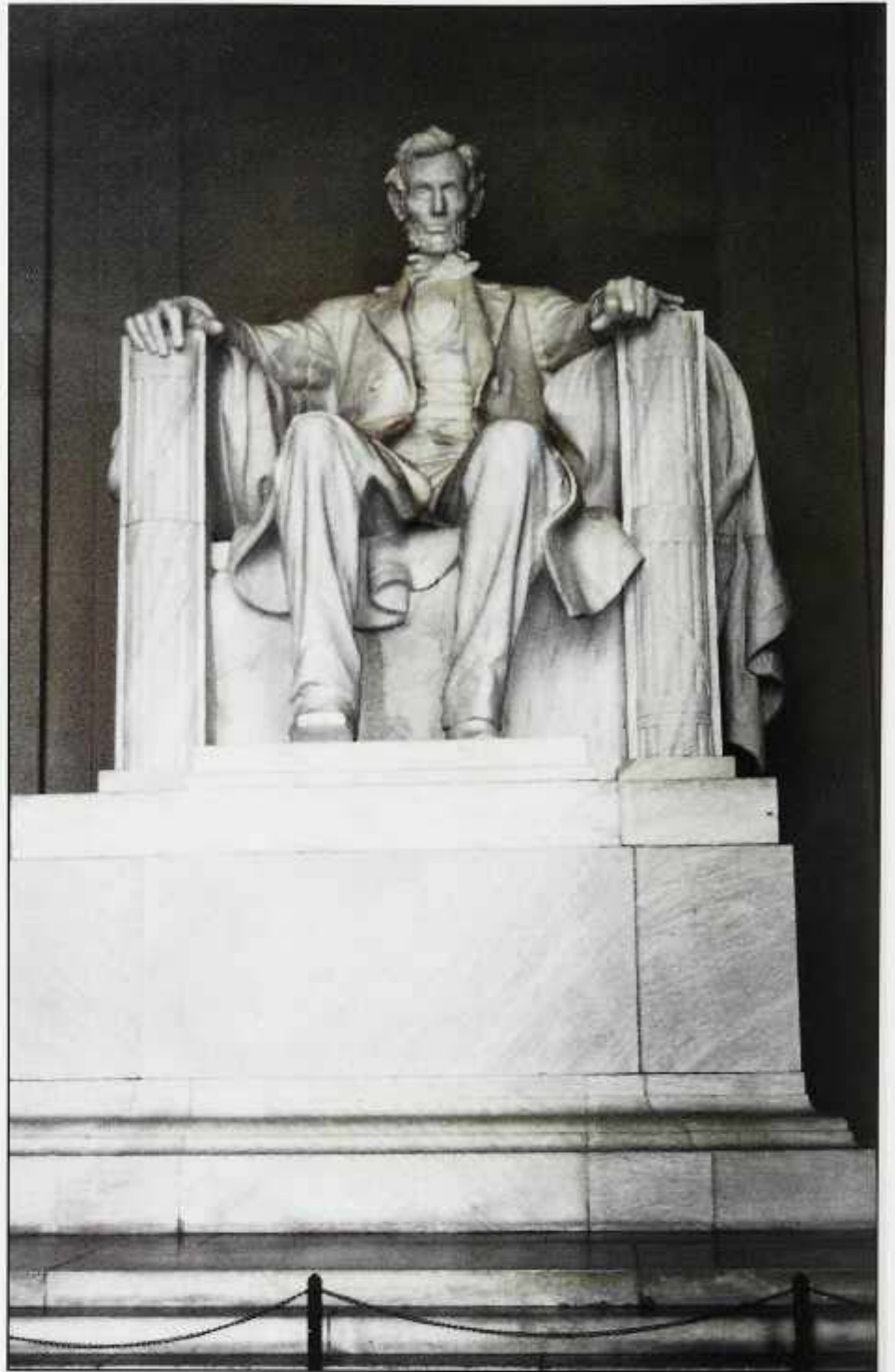
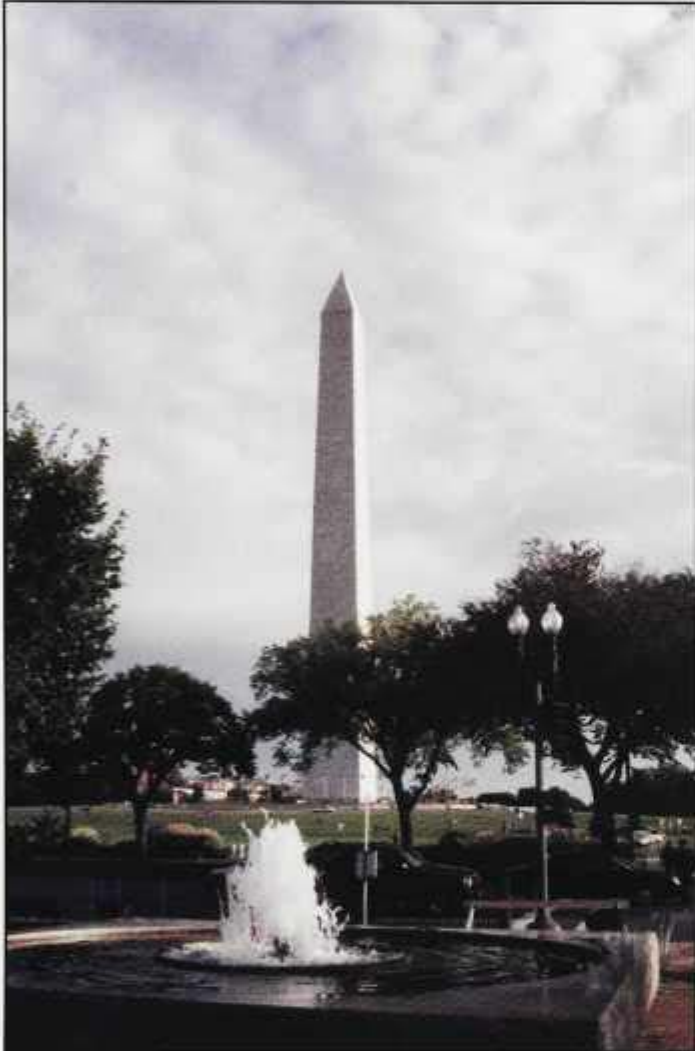

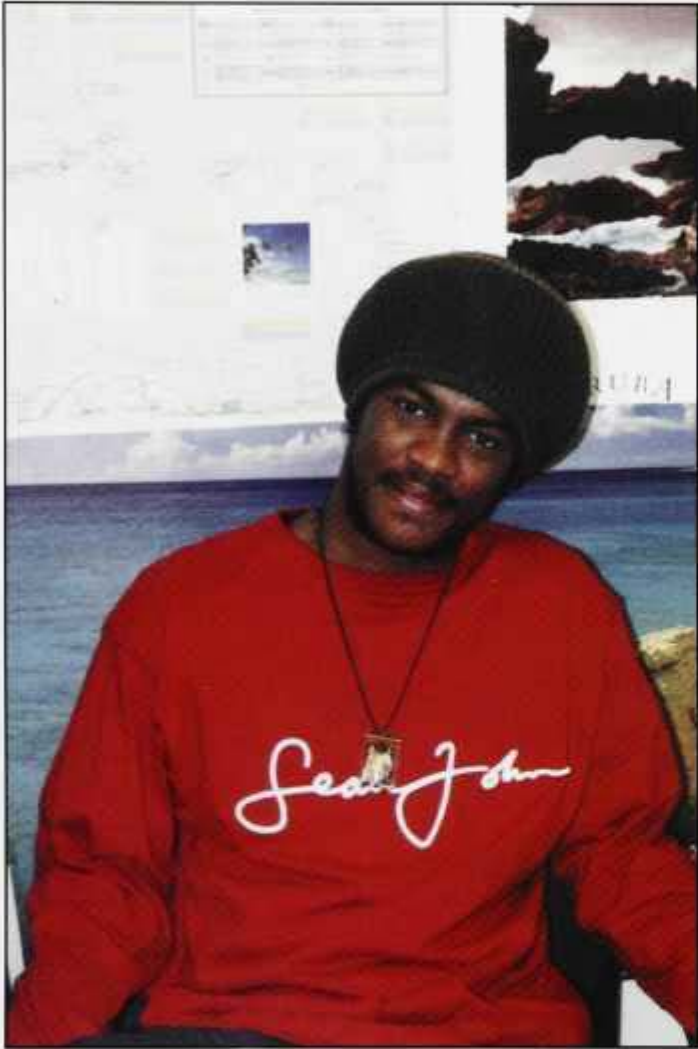

ROOTS

As D. Augusta Straker, a native of Barbados, walked proudly across the Commencement stage in 1871, he not only became the first Caribbean student to graduate from Howard University, but he also became a role model for members of the Caribbean Students' Association, better known as the CSA.

The CSA, officially recognized as a campus organization in 1944, is a group that seeks to ease the transition from Caribbean islands to Howard's campus for international students. Its mission is to promote Caribbean unity, service and leadership. In accordance with its mission, the CSA has strived to combat the feelings that accompany dislocation and gain a sense of harmony. "[The CSA] provides a community in which international students from across the Caribbean can find a home away from home," states sophomore Engineering major and Trinidadian Jonathan Granam.

Events held by the CSA allow members to get to know one another and learn more about their culture and that of individuals from other Caribbean communities. The Freshman Mixer, held at the beginning of each academic year, allows incoming Caribbean students to become acquainted. Early December brings "Christmas in de Caribbean," an event that is open to all Howard students. Guests may experience the holiday spirit of the Caribbean through music, dance, poetry, theater, and cuisine. "Howard students to have an appreciation of Caribbean culture," says Danielle Fraser, a junior Biology major who serves as Secretary for the organization.

The CSA is about more than social events. It provides support for Caribbean students in an unfamiliar environment. As senior Ato Lawrence states, "CSA is more than an organization; it is a family that is dedicated to bring us together."

You've seen them in Blackburn, just outside the Café, distributing Lifestyles by the handful. It is certain that many Bison have benefited from every Friday's handouts by the newborn organization called BLAGOSAH (Bisexual, Lesbian and Gay Organization of Students at Howard). BLAGOSAH was established in October of 2000 to provide support for bisexual, gay and lesbian students on campus. "I thought there was a need for it," states Co-Founder and President Sterling Washington. "We've certainly made people aware that we're here."

BLAGOSAH is not the first organization of its kind. During the late 1980s, students came together to form the Lambda Student Alliance whose purpose was similar to that of BLAGOSAH. Unlike Lambda, BLAGOSAH is determined to combat resistance from administration and student body with several programs and initiatives that emphasize awareness and acceptance at Howard. This year brought

BLAGOSAH Week, which addressed common issues faced by homosexuals, especially those in the African American community. It is the organization's belief that controversial programs like "Black Churches and Sexuality," and a showing of the Gay and Lesbian Film Festival hit, Punks, will help provide support for bisexual, gay and lesbian students, in addition to creating awareness and educating the entire student body.

BLAGOSAH is also a community service organization that acts as a liaison between several area service organizations and the Howard University community. Condom distribution and free AIDS testing is provided on our campus courtesy of US Helping US, Inc. In fact, when one Howard student received hate e-mails concerning his sexuality, BLAGOSAH put the pressure on the President of the University, as well as DC representative Eleanor Holmes Norton and other community leaders, to take corrective action to ensure the safety of all students, regardless of race, religion, age, gender, or sexuality.

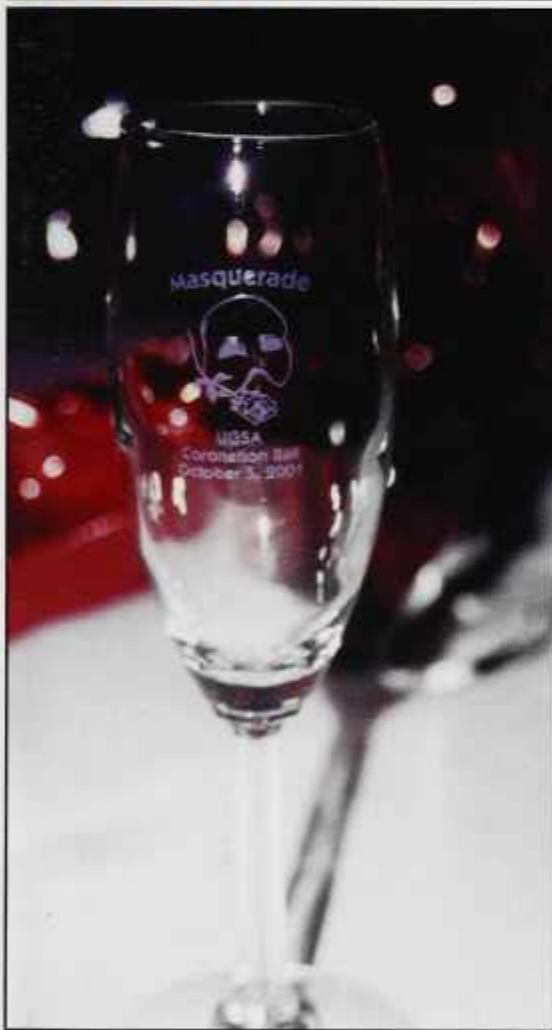


Howard 2000-01 Vallyn Smith presented Muhammad with the crown pin that she received a year ago.

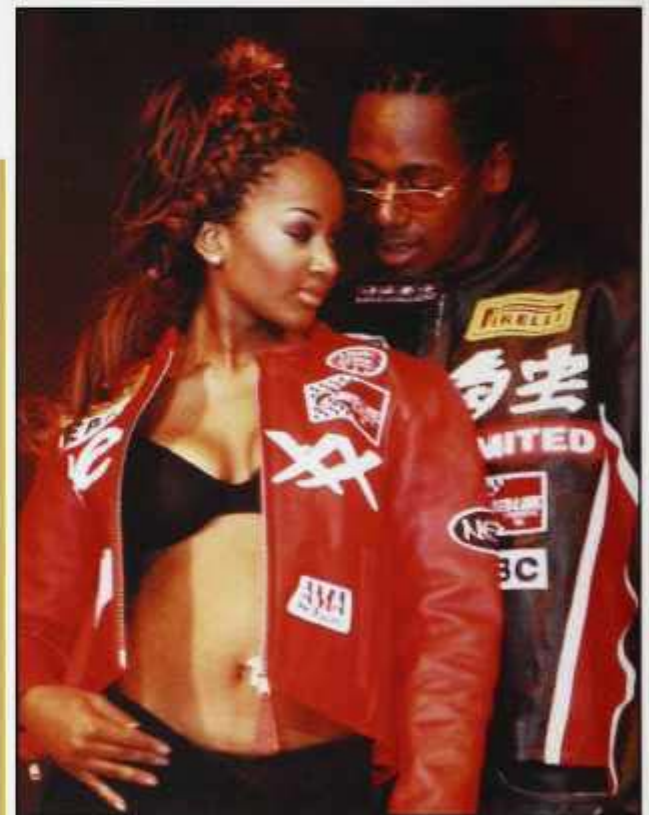

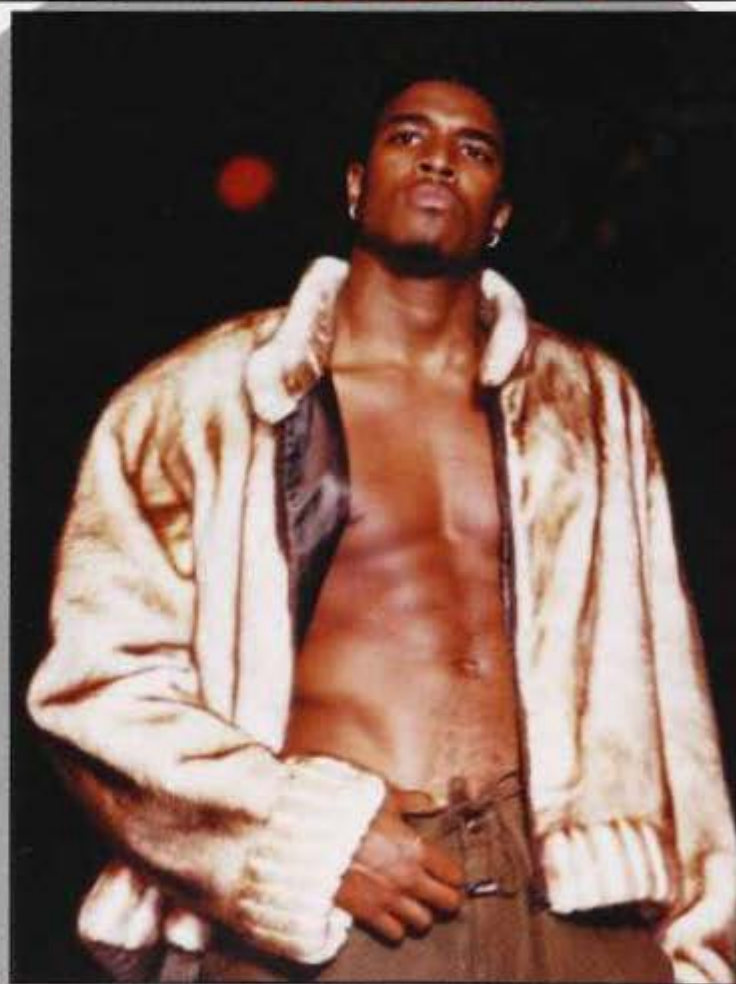

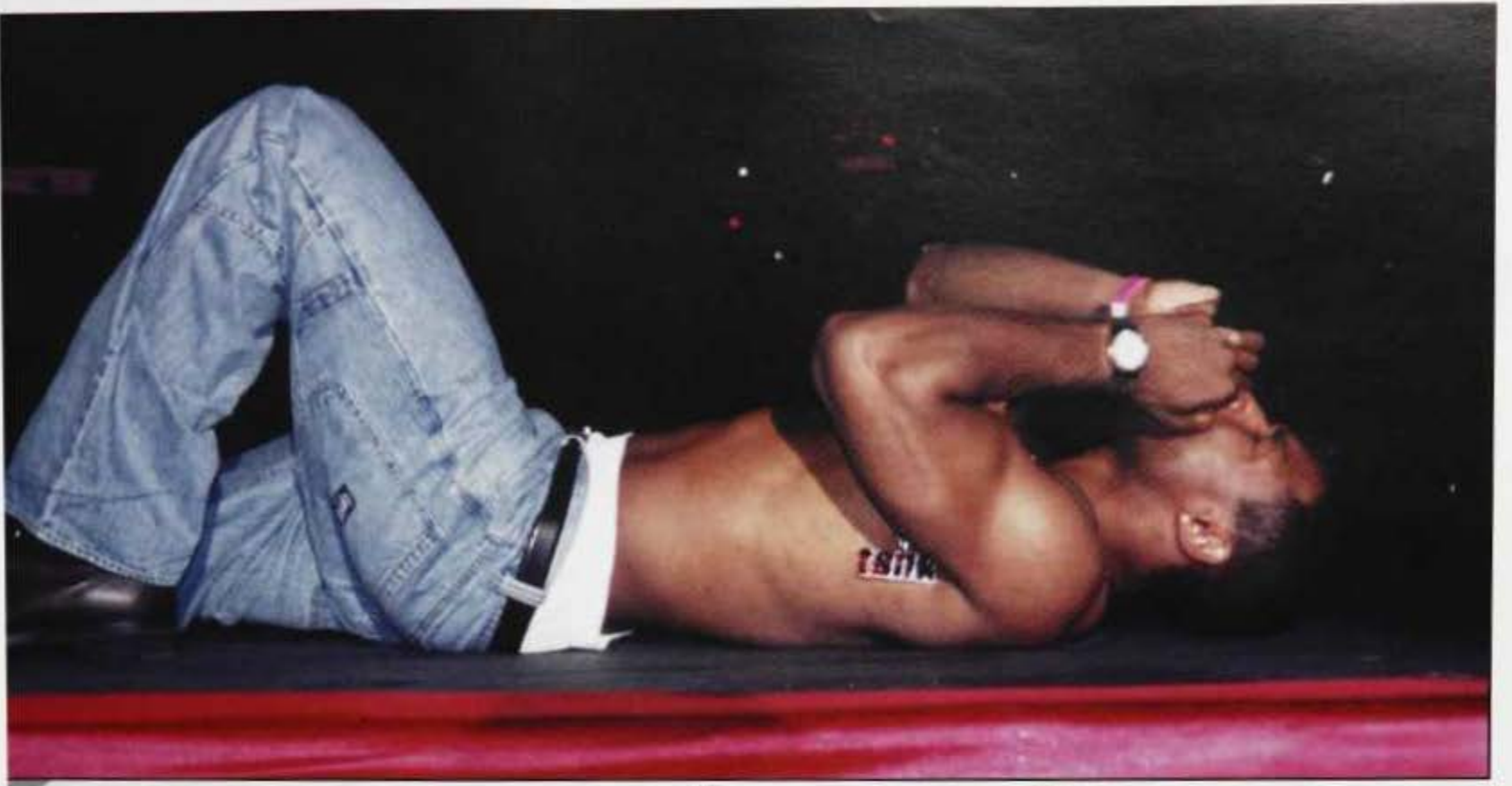
I graduated high school," he said, before he blessed the crowd with his unique performance.

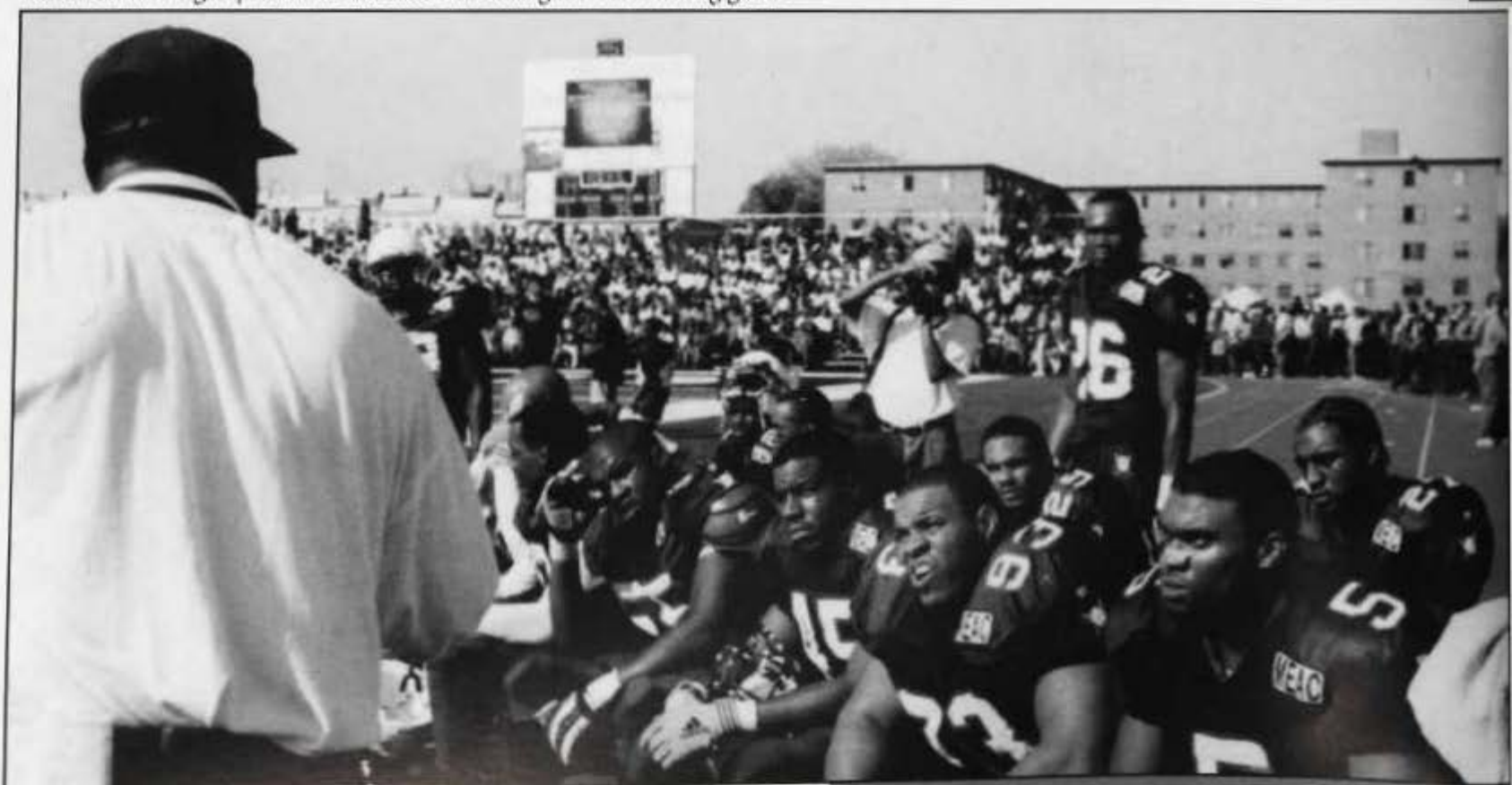

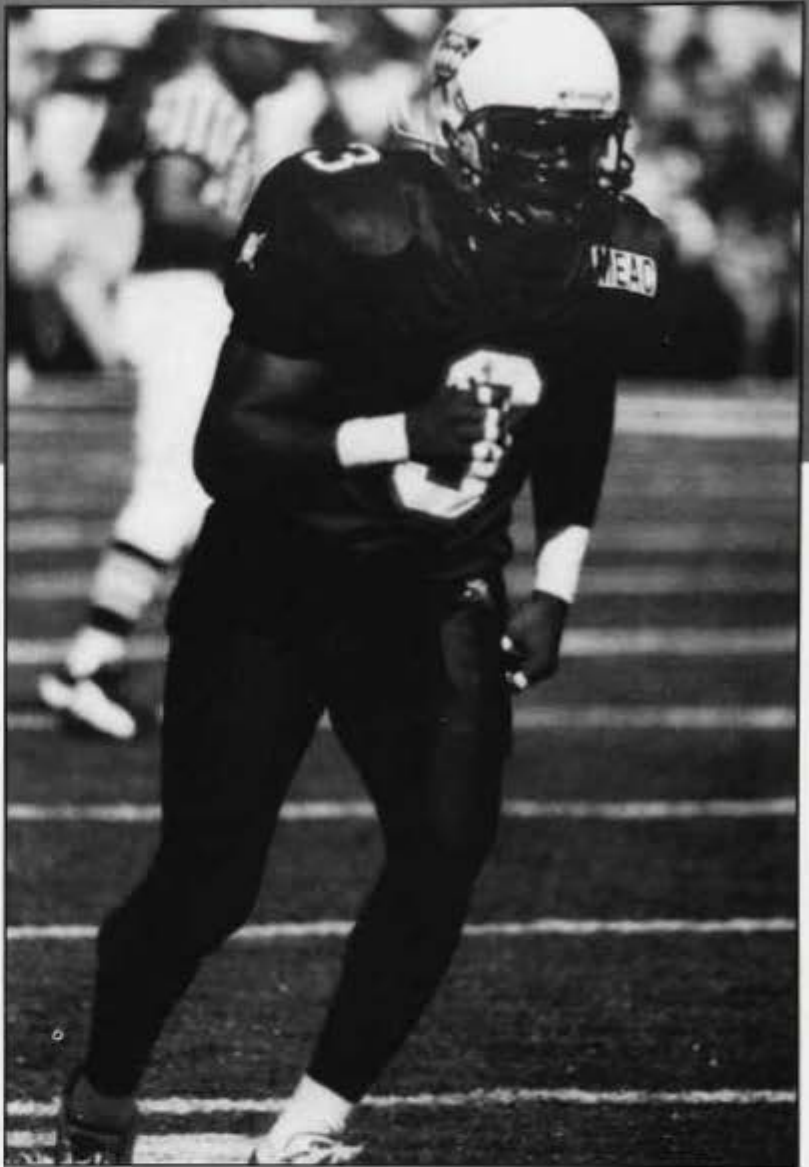

After losing five seniors last year, the team had three senior players who led by example. Senior Deniece

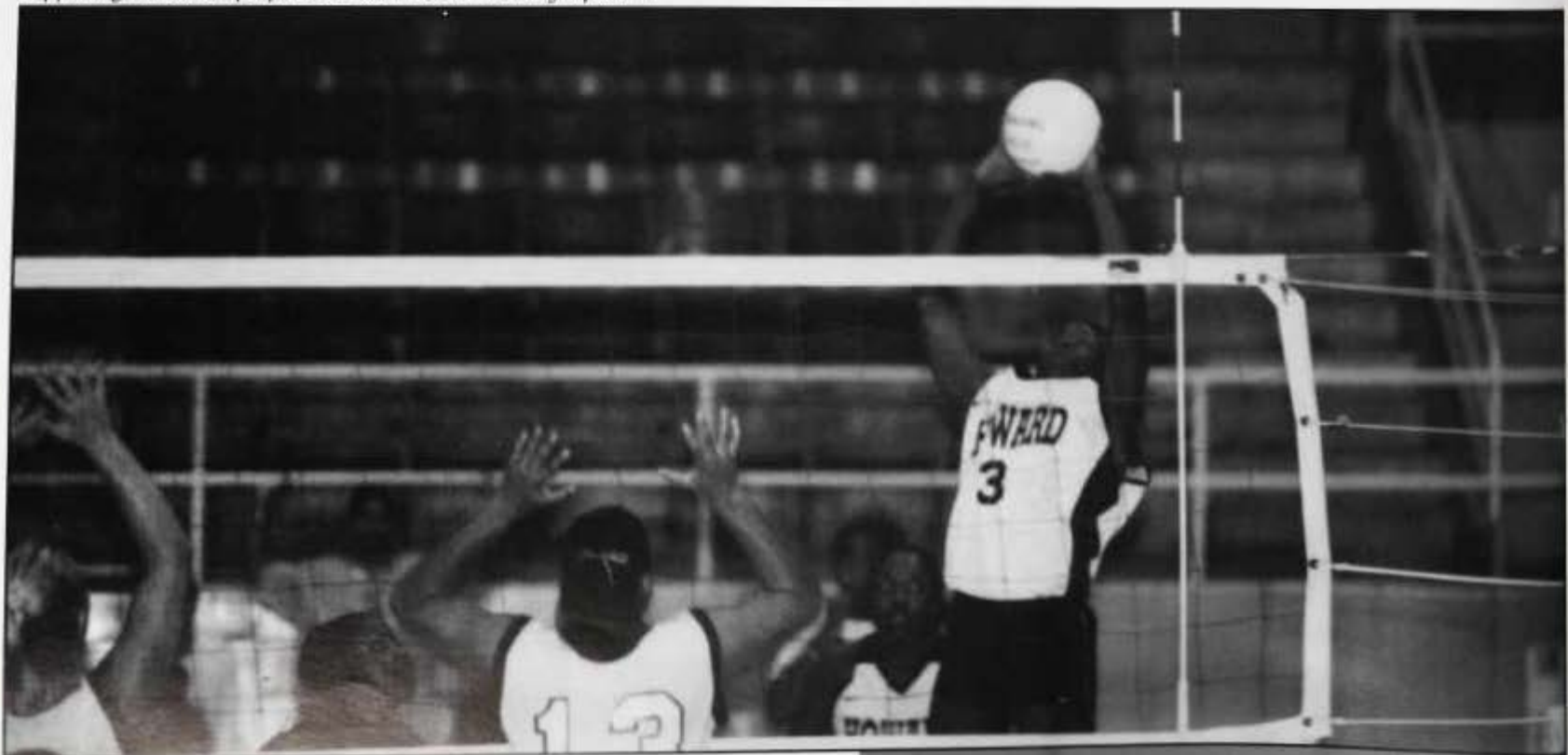

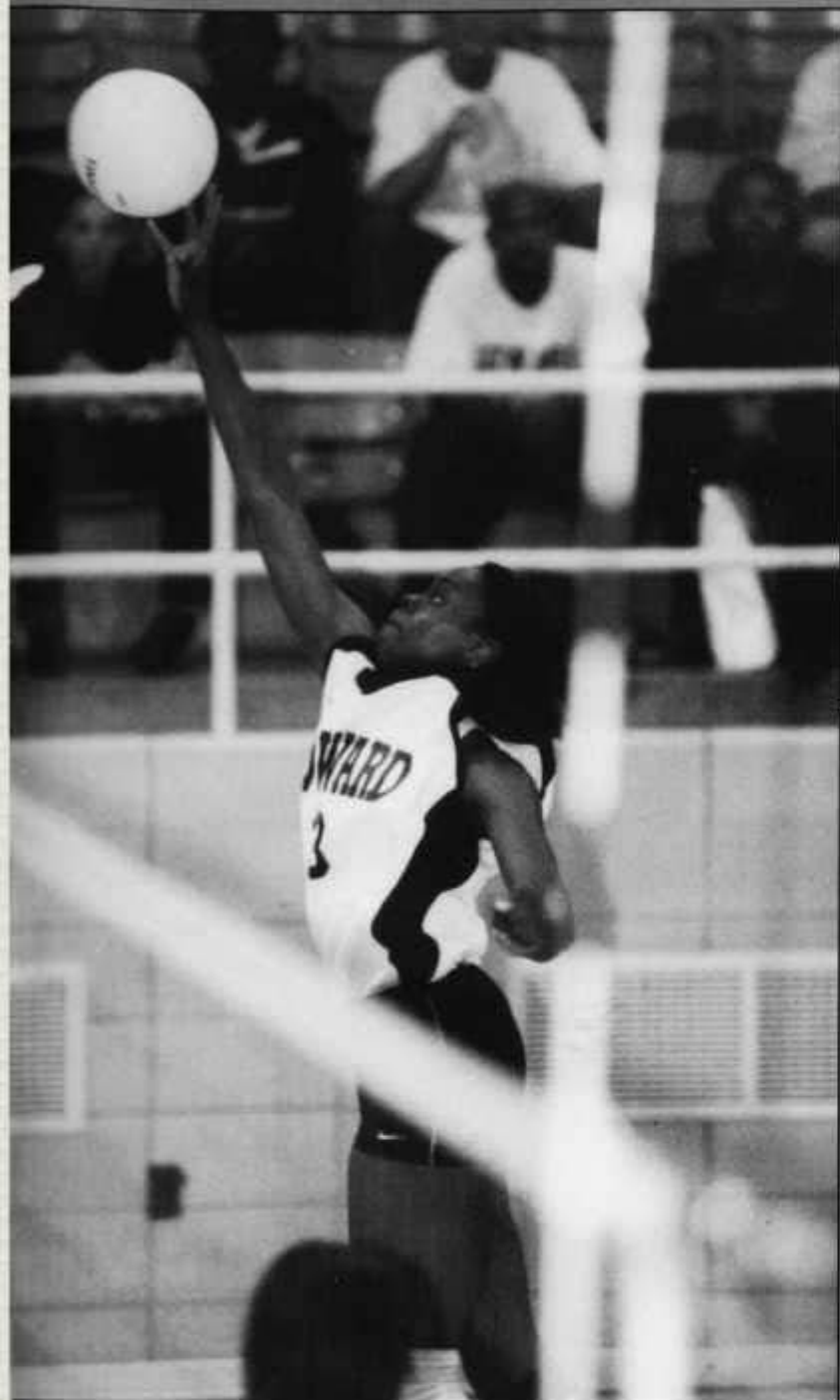

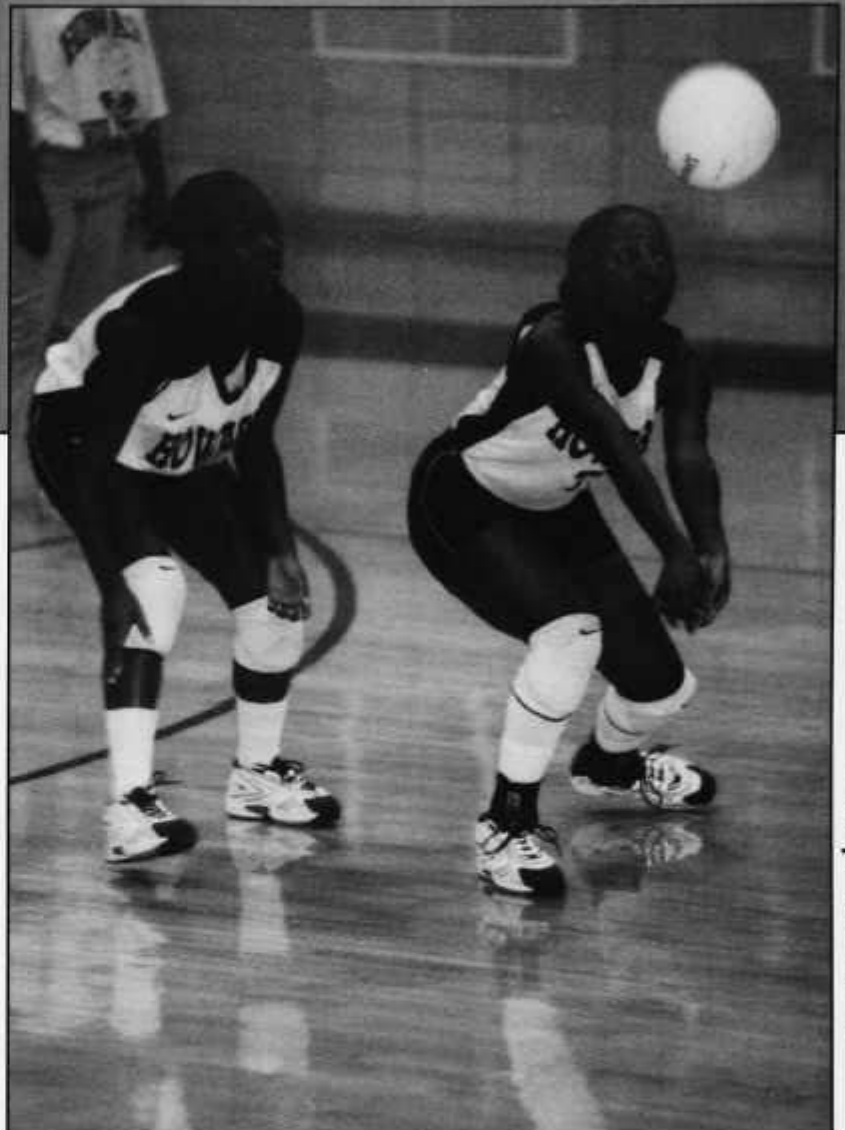
This year the team hosted the Howard Classic, which included Virginia Commonwealth, St. Francis of New York and Hampton University.

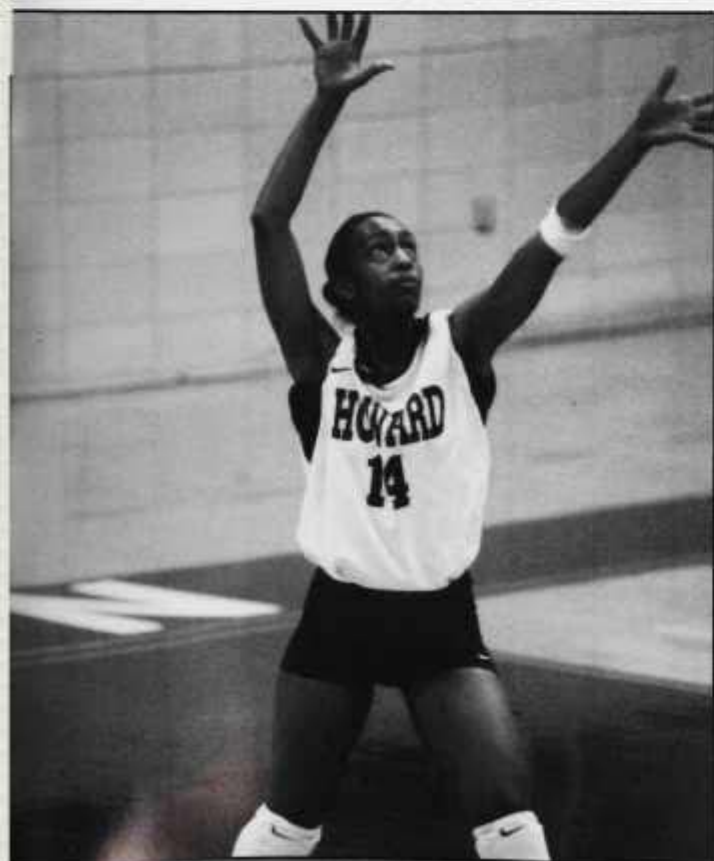




(top, left) Outside Hitter Dawn Thomas stretches to return the ball.

Howard University is energized and looking forward to cheering along with the new and improved cheerleading squad.

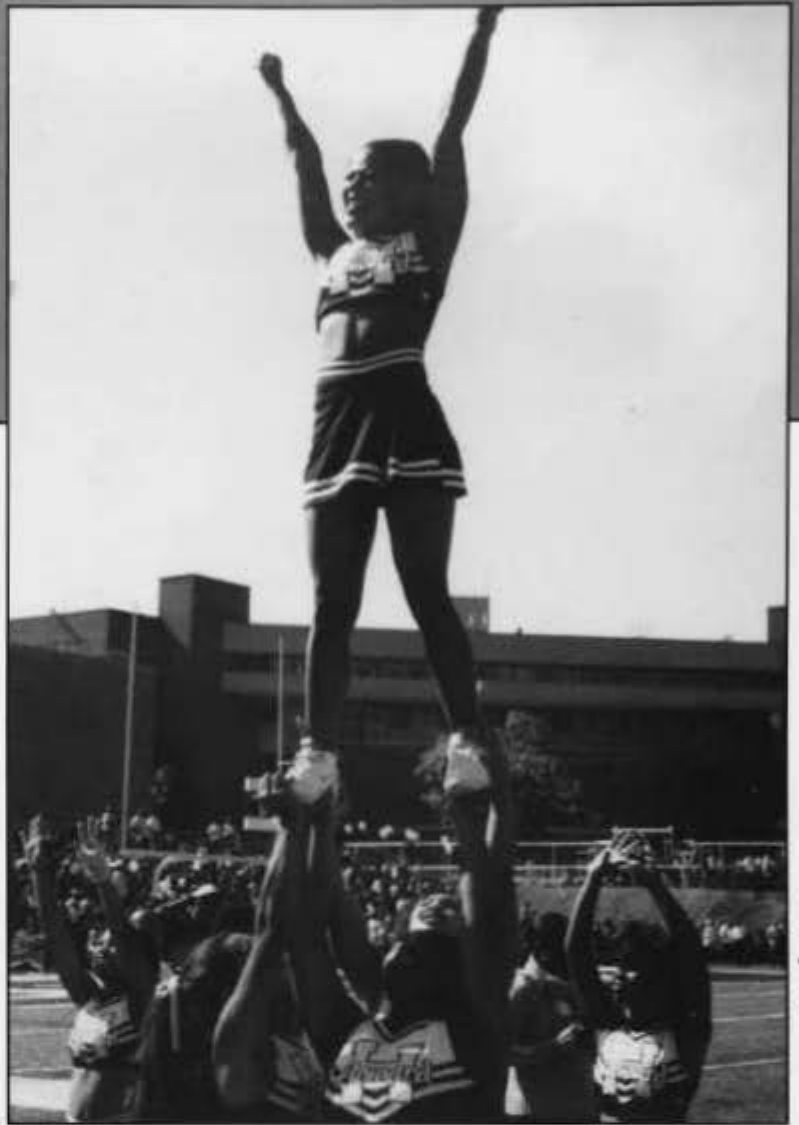

The team expects to perform exceptionally well during both their indoor and outdoor seasons. The team practices hard with the hopes of securing a victory at the MEAC.

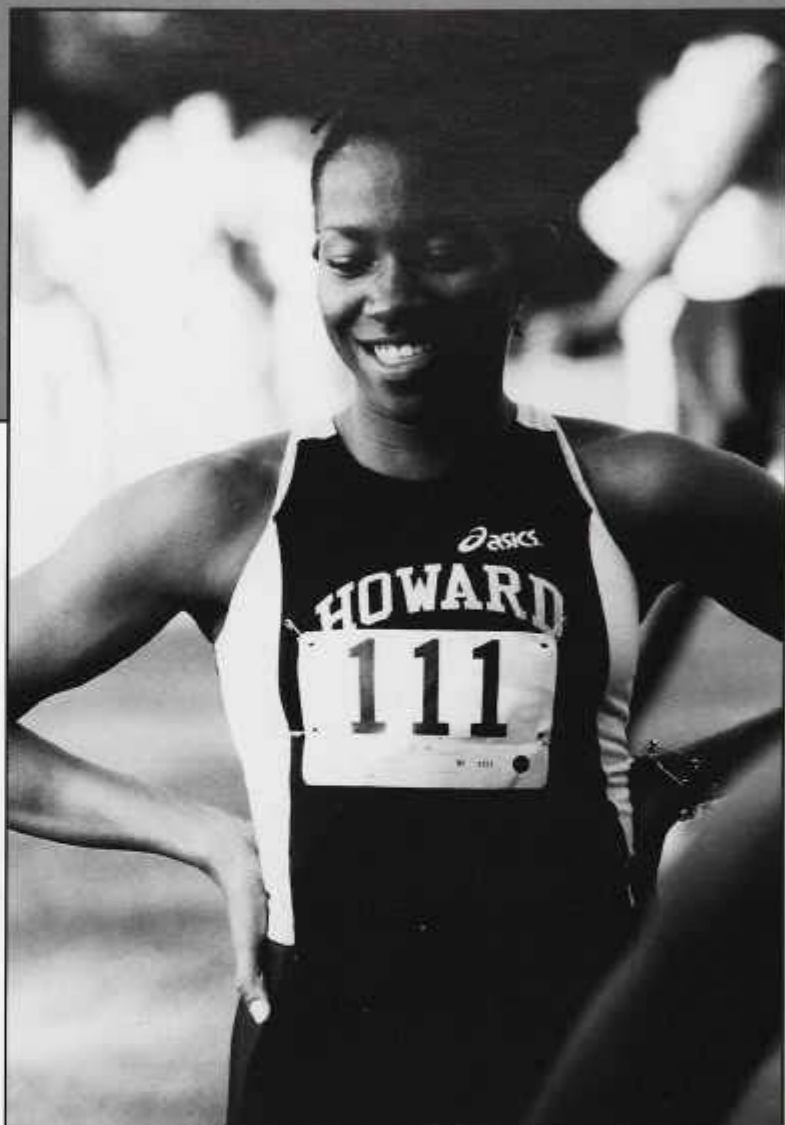

The indoor and outdoor season for the team shows great promise as it gears up to compete against teams in the MEAC conference with plans for a victory.

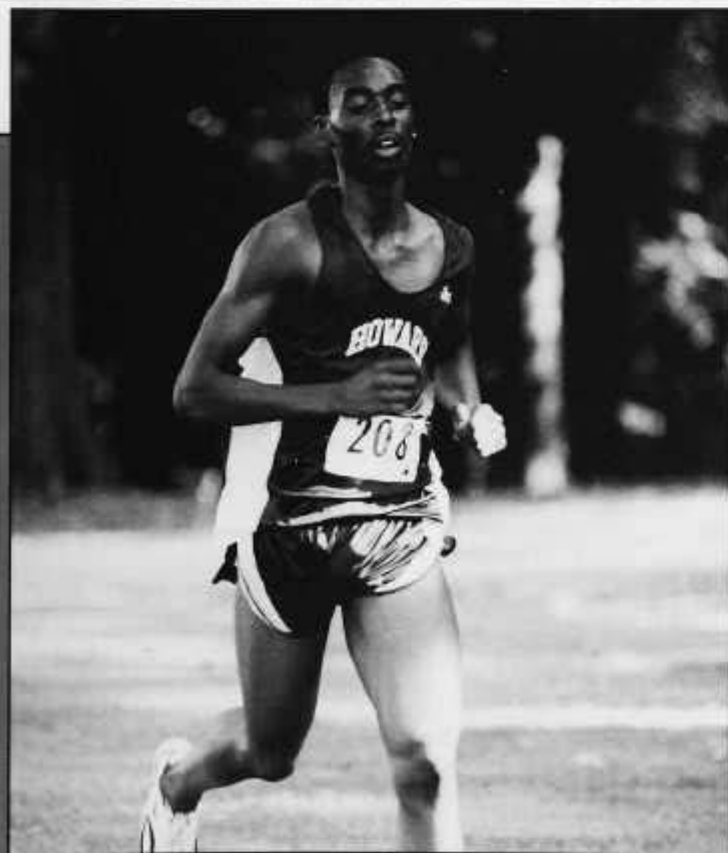

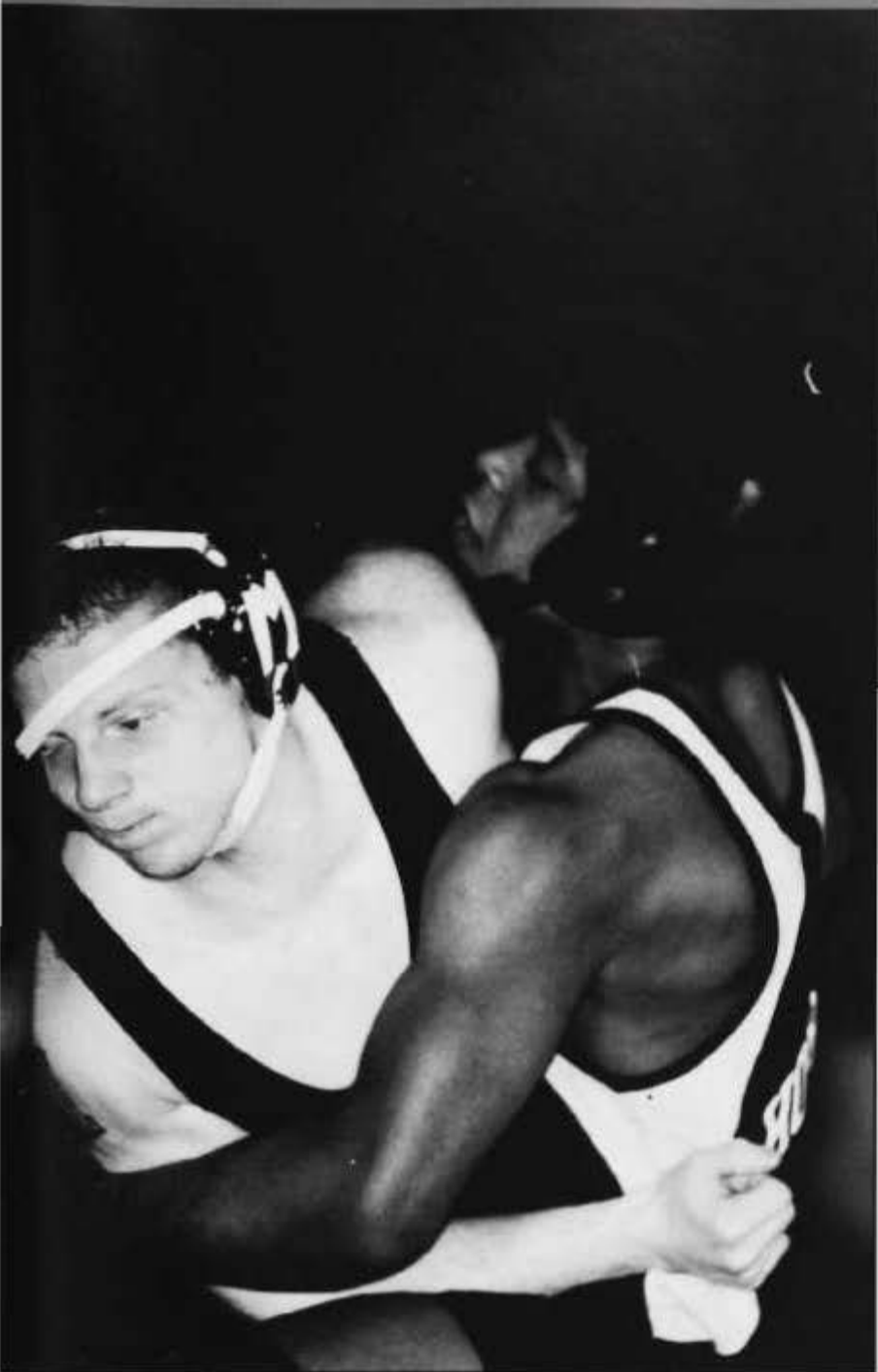
ences and motivation will benefit our team, and will contribute to building a strong squad."

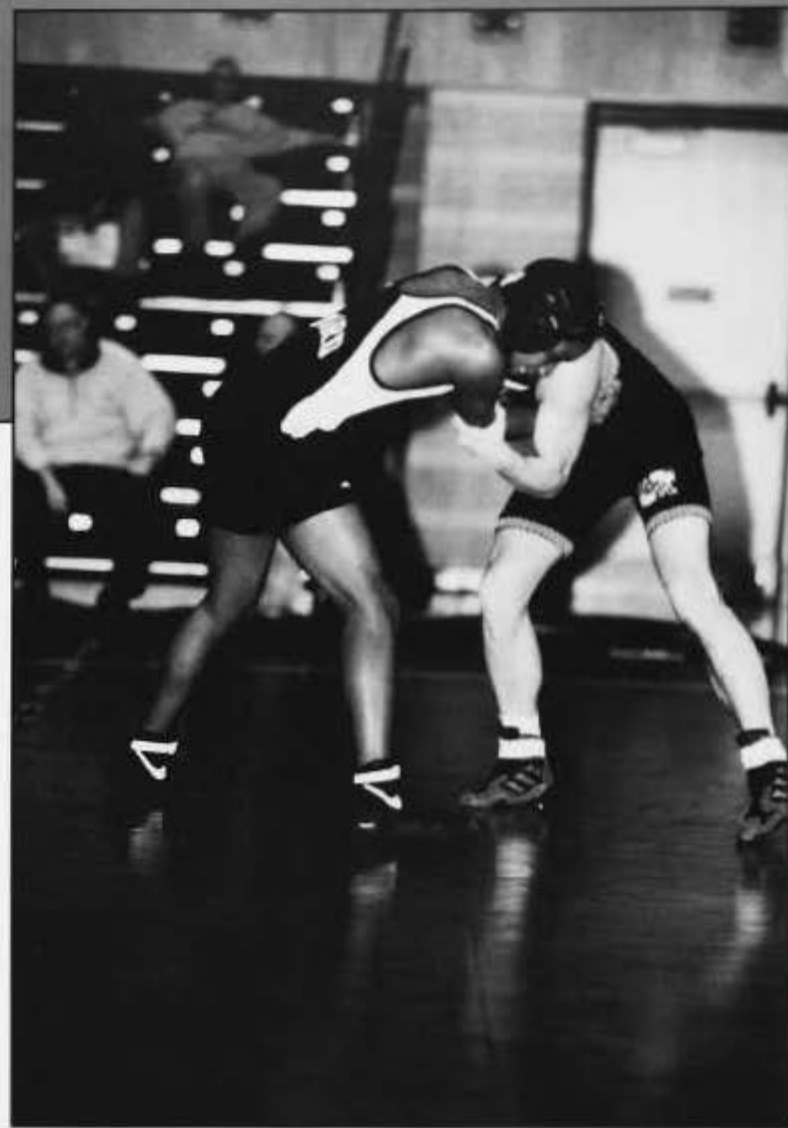
Derek Butts applies pressure as he dominates his opponent.



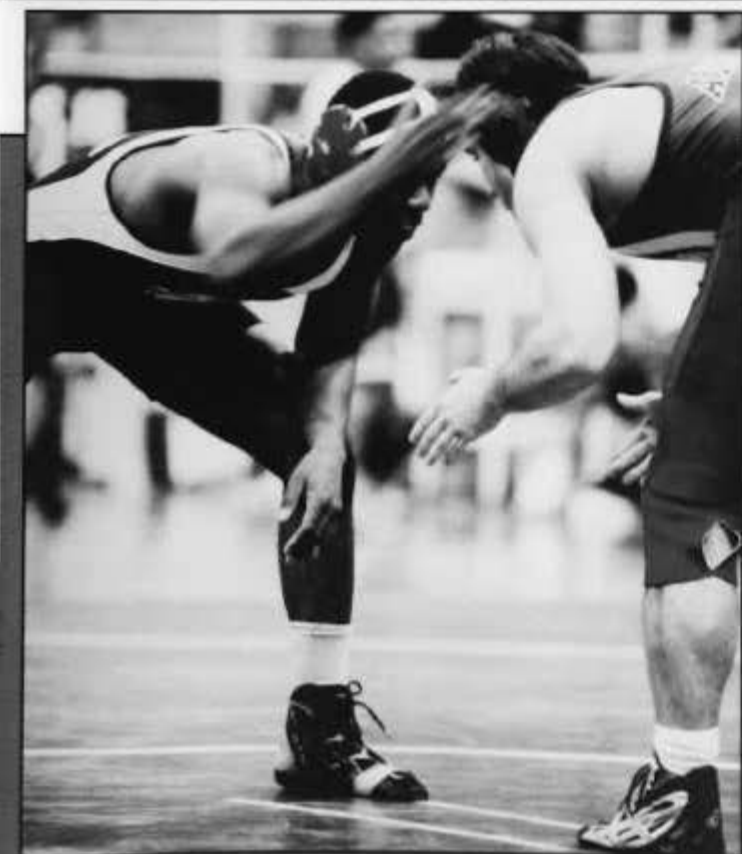


(top, left) Reggie Torrence squeezes tight as he works for the pin to help lead the bison to victory.

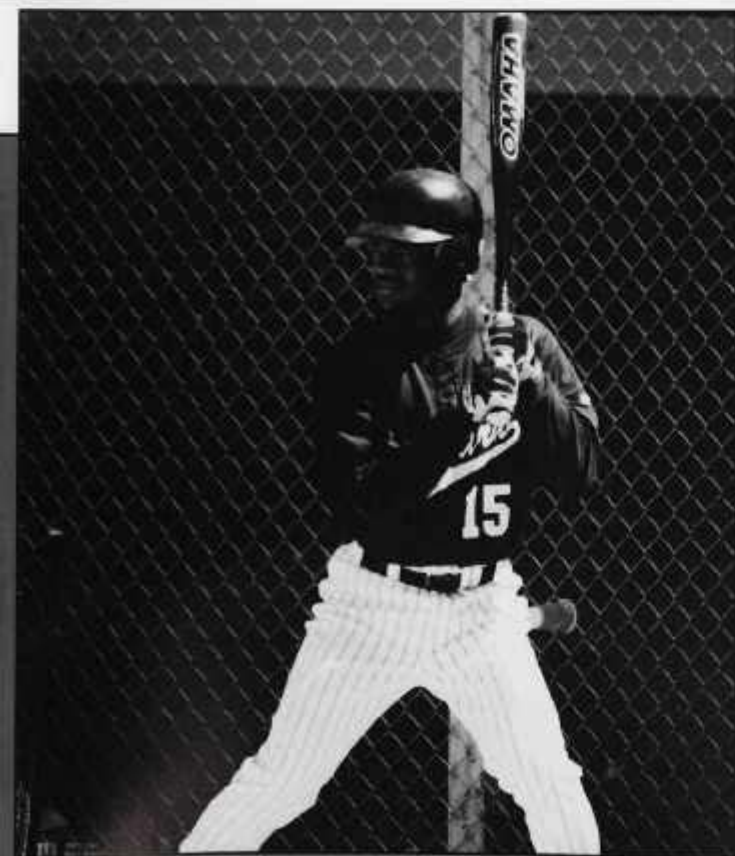

How to become a "recognized" organization

So, you've got an idea for a new campus-based organization? Great! But do you know how to become a "recognized" organization (becoming eligible for organizational funding from HUSA, use of university facilities, etc.)?

Well, if you don't know, now you know. Use this checklist to obtain official recognition by the University.

- Be certain that your proposed organization meets an expressed need of the student body.
- Develop a constitution for your organization. There is a template available from the Office of Student Activities. There may be changes needed after it has been reviewed.
- Complete the "Petition for Recognition as a Student Organization" form. You will need the signatures of at least ten (10) students who are currently enrolled in the University (five (5) of those students must be charter members of the organization).
- Compose a letter that states that the organization will abide by the policies of the University. An advisor must sign this letter.
- Submit the constitution, the "Petition," and the letter to the Office of Student Activities.
- Be mindful! If your organization will be an affiliate, branch, or chapter of a larger organization, there will be additional requirements (do your research!).
- Prepare to meet with the Director of Student Activities to discuss all University guidelines.
- Await the approval of the Director of Student Activities, the HUSA President, and the Vice Provost for Student Affairs.

Don't forget to complete your organization's Census Form each fall in order to maintain your rights as a recognized organization. All of the forms may be obtained from and questions may be directed toward the Office of Student Activities.

Afrocentrism

History is a clock that people use to tell their time of day. It is a compass that they use to find themselves on the map of human geography. It also tells them where they are, and what they are. Most importantly, an understanding of history tells a people where they still must go, and what they still must be."

Dr. John Henrik Clarke (1915-1998)

Howard University prepares its graduates to assume leadership for America and the global community. Great leaders must draw upon the lessons of the past and the strengths of the communities from which they come. This allows them to lead by example and with clear direction. As Afrikan people, it is our moral obligation to draw from the well of our collective wisdom in order to reach our potential as human beings in every way.

To be Afrocentric is to use the worldview and history of Afrikan people as a framework for living. It is not just a concept or a random theory, but a way of life that dictates behavior and thought patterns. It is the foundation from which a person engages in the critical analysis of their environment and the challenges facing their community. From there, an Afrocentric perspective demands that the value of any course of action be measured according to whether it is of benefit or detriment to Afrikan people.

An Afrocentric person can say that they have worked for the advancement of Afrikan people. Some people have taken the time to educate themselves in the history and issues that affect Afrikan people so that they might

share their understanding with others. Others may have simply placed their dollars in another Black hand to establish and encourage economic stability. Being Afrocentric can be as simple or complex as it needs to be in order to meet the needs of Afrikan people.

Many lack a true understanding of what it means to be Afrocentric. Wearing an Ankh ring because a popular performer does, or combining a head-wrap with booty shorts misses the point: each expression of Afrikan culture is linked to a network of cultural significance. Therefore, all things related to cultural expression should be done with a respect and understanding of their meaning. The Afrocentric person does not preach; they teach through actions and behavior.

Being Afrocentric is not about wearing a dashiki, a head-wrap (gele), an Afro, or pumping your fist real hard (although it can include these things as well). It is about how one lives his and her life: people can be Afrocentric and not classify themselves as such. These people are identifiable by how they analyze, what they advocate, and by the goals they set and pursue. People who are Afrocentric understand that they have a responsibility to their people, not only to give back through community service, but by sharing their spirit, intelligence, and talents with the community which has prepared them to assume the awesome mantle of leadership.

I choose to be Afrocentric, not to follow popular trends or because it is now socially acceptable. My way of life is in recognition of our collective debt to our ancestors and to the struggles and sacrifices of our elders. I feel that everything I accomplish in my life will be the foundation for the next generation as we have stood upon those laid for us.

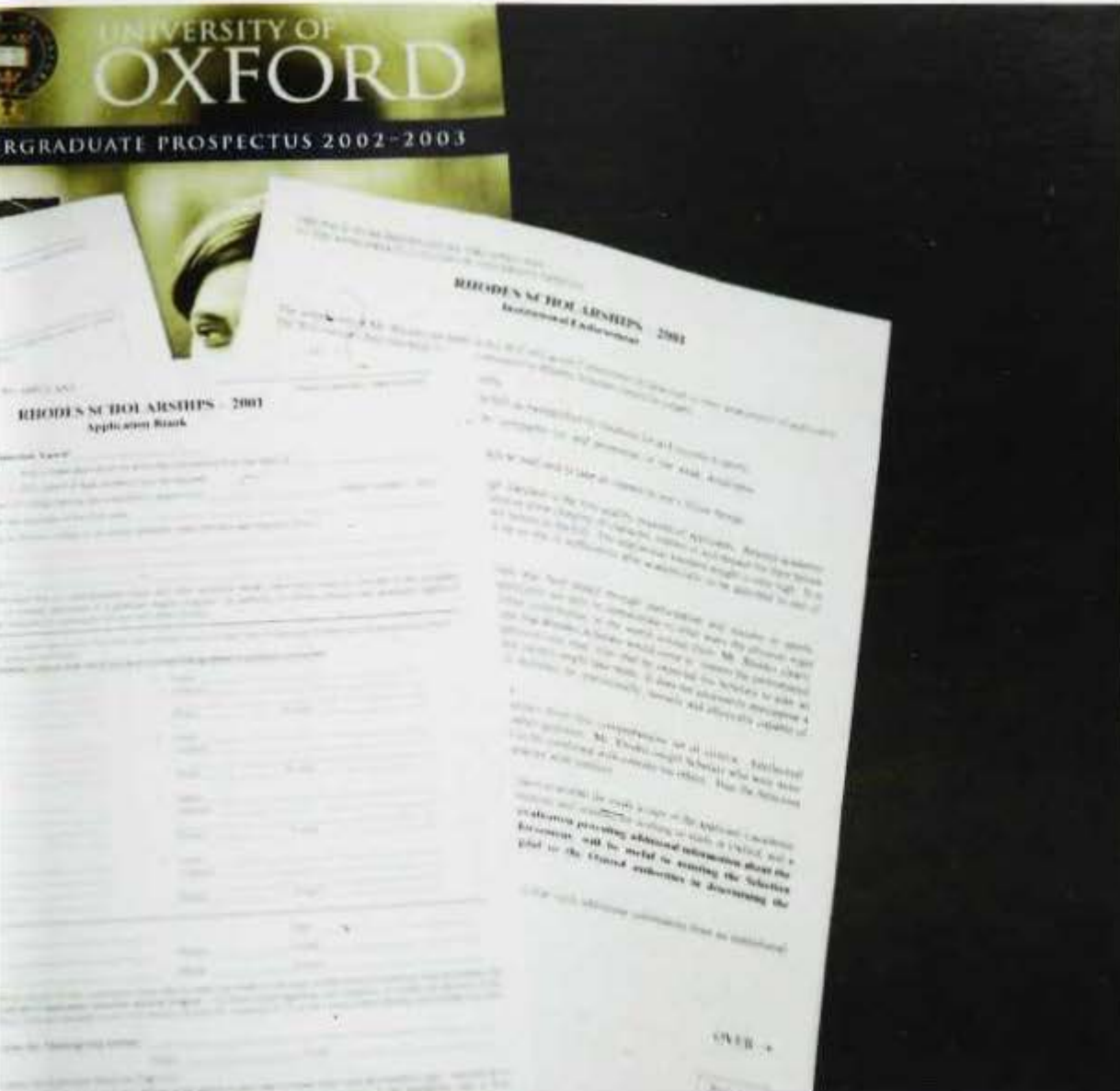

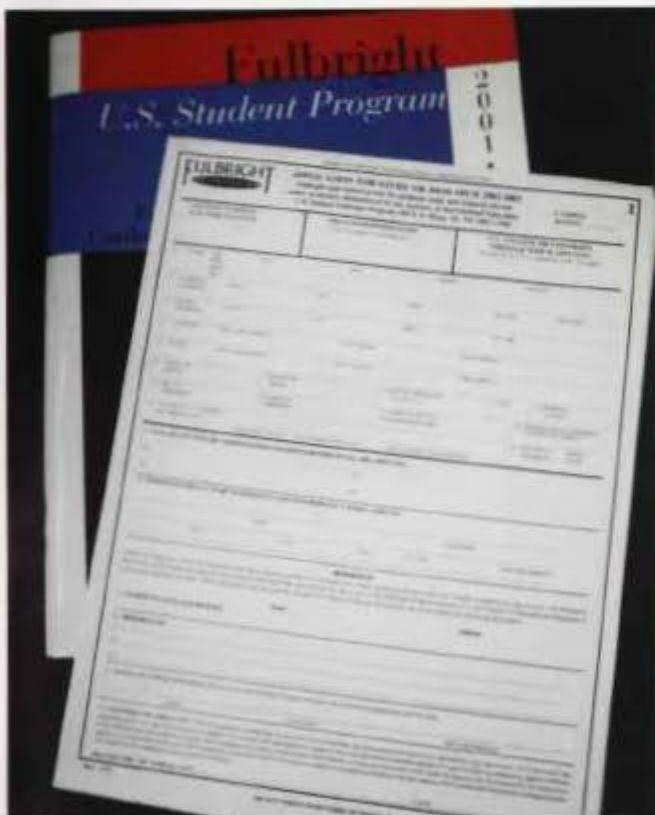

Fellowships

We know that we are “la creme de la creme,” but in this land of dynamic leaders, superior academics and stellar public servants, who is really “the tightest?” Even at Howard, the best rise to the top and receive both national and international recognition. In their attempts to shine, Capstone students compete for some of the most prestigious academic awards in the world including the Rhodes, Truman, and Fulbright programs.

Rhodes Scholars are selected to study at Oxford University in Great Britain following a highly selective process in which candidates must prove their abilities in the areas of academics, athletics, community service and moral character. In 1986, Mark Alleyne, a graduate of the School of Communications, was named the British Caribbean Rhodes Scholar and in 1999, Carla Joy Peterman became the first African American female from a historically Black college or university to receive the honor. “The field is extremely competitive because, each year, the Rhodes Trust only selects 32 American Rhodes Scholars,” says Dr. Daniel Williams, Director of the College of Arts and Sciences Honors Program and the Faculty Representative for both the Rhodes and Truman scholarships.

The Truman Scholarship is bestowed upon only 75 American students a year who are interested in pursuing careers in public service. In order to apply for any of these programs, one must be “endorsed,” or recommend, by one’s university via the Faculty Representative, who also provides guidance for the application process. “It was a lot of work,” notes 1999 Truman Scholar Louis Sterling. “Dr. Williams was certainly beneficial to my application process. He helped me get in contact with past Truman Scholars from Howard.”

Funded by Congressional appropriations, the Fulbright Program allows Americans to study and conduct research abroad. Three Howard students have received the award recently including Madika Bryant, who currently conducts research in Japan. “The founders of these fellowships are investing money in people to make society better, hoping that the scholars will make an impact,” notes Dr. Williams. “There are many qualified students, but you have to really want to win it.”

Smith, a senior Physics major, ran for her position because she wanted to change the relationship between administrators and students. Her "F.R.E.S.H." campaign was centered upon improving academics and facilities, as well the improvement of student recruitment and retention.

"What you say you're going to do when you're campaigning and what you actually do are two different things," said Smith. "It's not for lack of want, instead it is a lack of time."

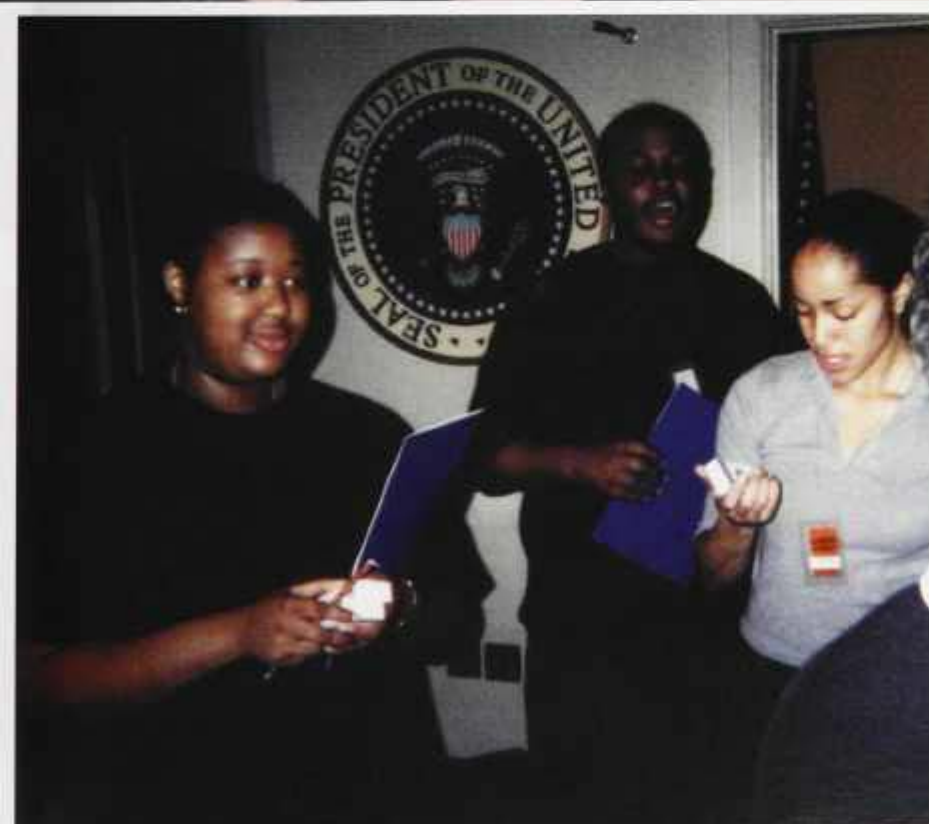

In case you haven't heard, the Howard University section of the National Council of Negro Women (NCNW) is "leaving no one behind." With over 120 members and a host of volunteers, the organization is moving in sync with late founder Mary McLeod Bethune's goals for all women: self-dignity, respect, equality and sisterhood.

As one of few collegiate sections of NCNW, the Howard section is especially important because it serves as a voice for youth throughout NCNW. This section hopes to unite the women of the Howard community by serving as an umbrella for all female organizations on campus.

New Libraries

Howard has made some noticeable additions to the campus. That which some students can distinctly remember as piles of dust has been transformed into two aesthetically pleasing storehouses of knowledge - the Louis Stokes Health Sciences Library and the Law Library.

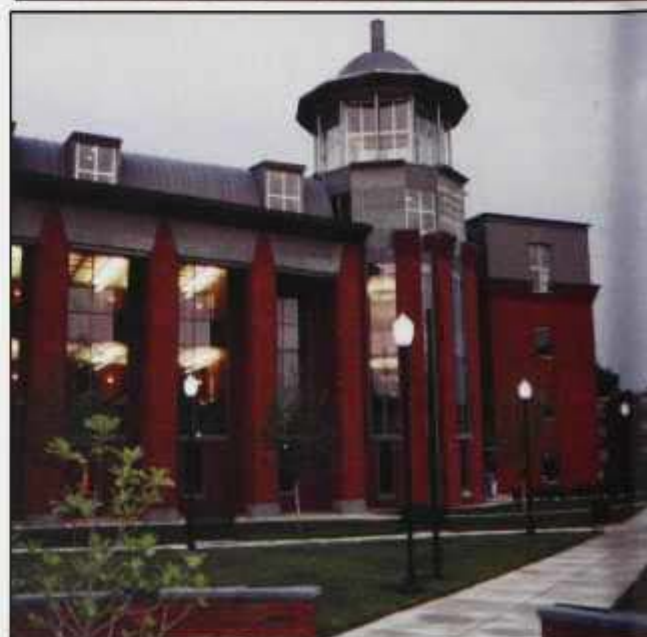
The new Law Library is an addition to the 19-acre, five building Howard University Law School campus. The building is a four story, 76,000 square foot creation that caters to the needs of approximately 300 students. The facilities include a periodical reading room, a Rare Book Collection, exquisite rooms of wood and brick designated for special collections, and audiovisual and microphone amenities. There are also ninety study carrels, fully equipped with data ports for laptop use.

Dr. Rhea Ballard-Thrower, Director of the Law Library, is proactive in the type of development she envisions for the technological advancement of the library. One idea is to modify the electronic interface, "Millennium," which is a system that connects all Howard libraries, and allows patrons to review records and access articles on reserve. "A patron of, for example, the Health Sciences Library can request a book from the Law Library, and have the book delivered to Health Sciences," she says.

Like the Law Library, the Louis Stokes Health Sciences Library, which is located at 501 W Street, NW, just across from the C.B. Powell Building, is also equipped to provide patrons with optimum service. Described by Director Dr. Larry S. Ellis as a "service entity to academic enterprise," the library boasts a video conference room, a telemedicine center, electronic classrooms, a Special Collections room and a Community Resource Room. Ellis sees the library as not only a source for information, but also as a medium that will connect the patron with tools to gain optimal search results. "You shouldn't have to come to the library for basic information," he says.

Aside from being distinct creations of architectural design, the buildings will serve as a bridge to the ever-changing road of technology at Howard. Sophomore Theatre Arts major Latoya Haynes agrees "I expect the information that I get from my library to be more convenient and accessible. I hope to see that in the new libraries." With the two libraries comes a new focus and new hopes for other improvements.

Before it Hits Home

In Cheryl West's "Before It Hits Home," Wendal Bailey, a bisexual male living with AIDS, uses the disease as a vehicle to reveal his true identity to his family. Driven by society's oppressing ideology, Wendal leads a double life, a life in which he is forced to wear a two-sided mask. One side of the mask represents his love for a man, Douglas; the other, the love for a woman, Simone.

In the September production in the University's Environmental Theatre Space, the juxtaposition of Wendal's conversations with his lovers coupled with the intimate, circular setting, created a palate on which both sides of Wendal's masks were drawn. With precision and passion, the characters involved in the love triangle delivered a phenomenal performance depicting the double life of one man. The production felt, not like a performance, but rather like eavesdropping on lovers.

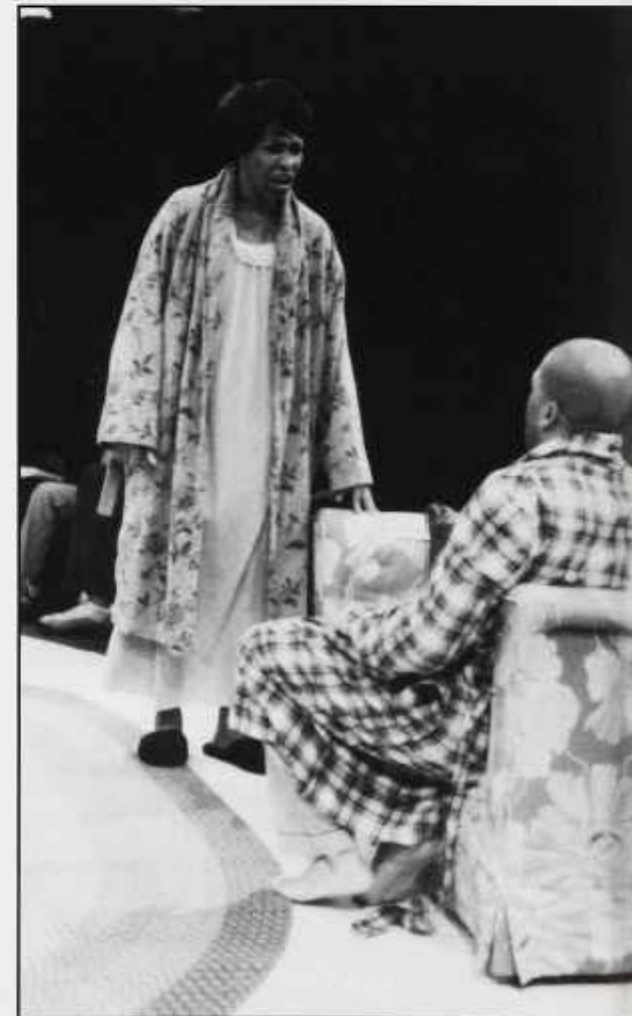

The performance by Jovan Hicks (Simone), Ronald Hysten (Douglas) and Steven Claiborne (Wendal) were outstanding. The proximity of the characters to the audience created a realistic mood; therefore, their deliverance was not merely heard and seen but felt and understood. Senior Valerie Thomas states, "I almost became fearful that they would catch me listening to their conversation."

The genius of Director Mark Jolin made it possible for the audience to feel the confusion, the chaos and the clutter in Wendal's life. The dynamics of Simone and Douglas' relationships with Wendal became clearer only because the stage turned into a symbol for Wendal's soul - a soul that was divided into two internal conversations between a socially accepted relationship and a controversial relationship.

The production was effective in drawing the two-sided mask of a man who has not come to the realization that he even wears a disguise. "He was one confused brother," declares Charles Williams.

The love triangle takes the audience into Wendal's life, bares his soul and uses AIDS as a vehicle to display the mask of a person whose identity does not fit into the narrow box constructed by the hegemony.

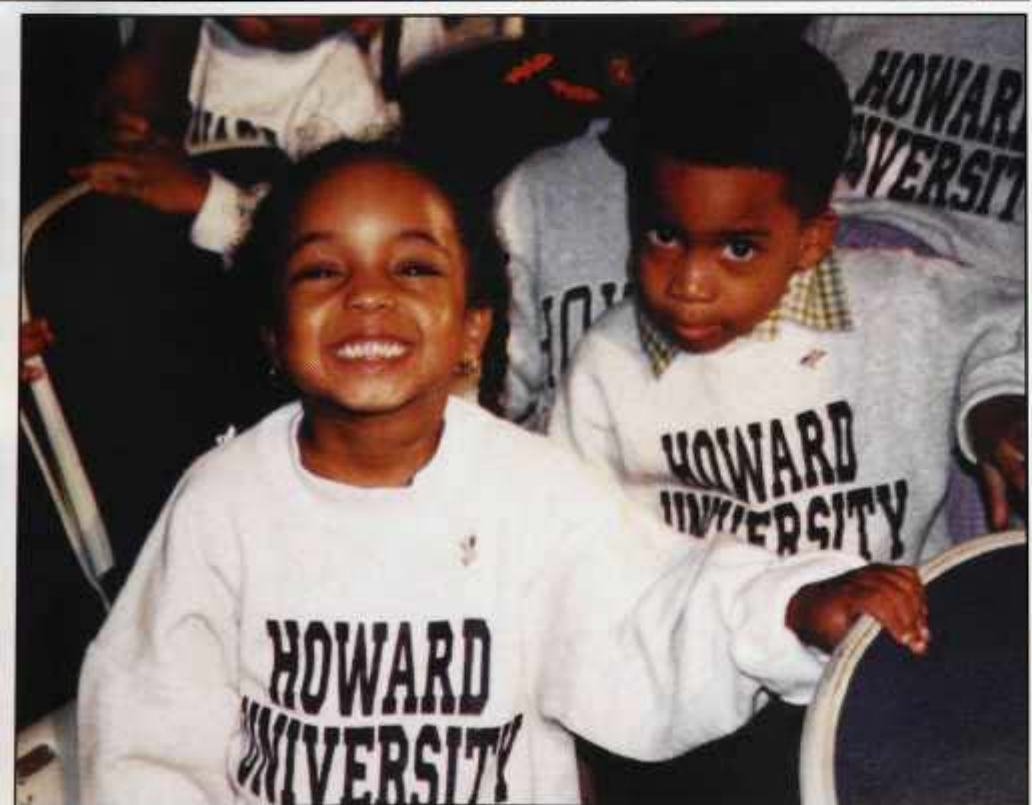


(top, left) President Swygert prepares to address the audience at this year's convocation.

Convocation

The 134th academic year of our University began on a solemn note. Though normally a quite joyous occasion, this year's Opening Convocation occurred only a week and a half after our national tragedy on September 11th. The thickness of anxiety filled Cramton Auditorium as faculty, staff, and students were engrossed by thoughts of that which could happen next.

The topic of the hour was that which Dean Bernard Richardson of Andrew Rankin Memorial Chapel called "the darkness of a thousand midnights." The body received greetings from the Board of Trustees via Vice Chair Dr. Floretta Dukes McKenzie, who challenged the University community to remain vigilant and noted that tragedy makes "gatherings like this [have] greater importance."

Though new Provost and Chief Academic Officer of the University, Dr. A. Toy Caldwell-Colbert, had the intention of sharing her vision for Howard, as Convocation orator, she deferred to the 15th President of this institution, H. Patrick Swygert, as the nation faced extreme uncertainty and, instinctively, "we look to our leaders" for guidance.

President Swygert, noticeably shaken by the recent events, remarked that the Howard community had gathered as a family in times of deep despair. He reminded the audience that the history of this great institution demands that we serve as leaders for America and the global community. "We must prepare ourselves for the challenge of tomorrow," admonished President Swygert, and use the core values of the University – *veritas et utilitas*, truth and service – as our anchor.

The audience was noticeably moved by the address. Upon the closing of Convocation with the Howard University Choir's rendition of "Lord, I Don't Feel in No Ways Tired," a noticeably audience rejuvenated departed to answer the President's charge for greatness in leadership.

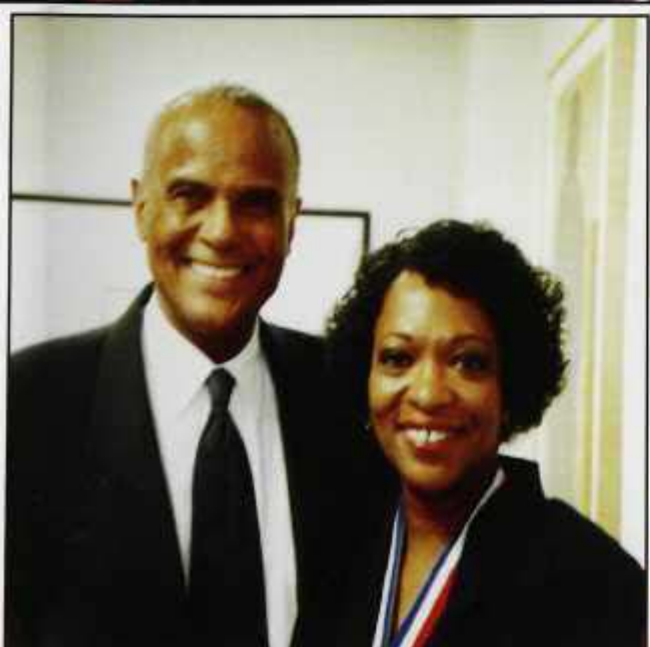

Capstone Commencement

An aerial view would have shown a sea of blue robed graduates, accented by specs of color from their hoods. It would have shown a periphery of well wishers, including family and friends. On Saturday, May 12, 2001, Howard University added to what President H. Patrick Swygert considers "a collective stream of alumni commitment that spans the globe."

This year's Commencement address was delivered by CBS Early Show host Bryant Gumbel, who joked that he didn't know a single person "who could recall the words of their Commencement speaker beyond a few short years of their graduation." He admonished the Class of 2001 not to seek "the superficial Ebony magazine view of life." Though capitalism has its rewards, he noted that with their "newly earned status as one of our educated elite" comes responsibility. Gumbel was also honored with a Doctorate of Humane Letters.

This year's honorary degree recipients also included the "King of Calypso," Harry Belafonte, who was honored for his work for the rights of the economically challenged and racially oppressed with UNICEF and USA for Africa. Pulitzer Prize winner Rita Dove, the first African American and the youngest person to serve as Poet Laureate of the United States and Consultant in Poetry at the Library of Congress, and the Honorable John Edward Porter, a 21-year veteran of the U.S. House of Representatives, were also honored.

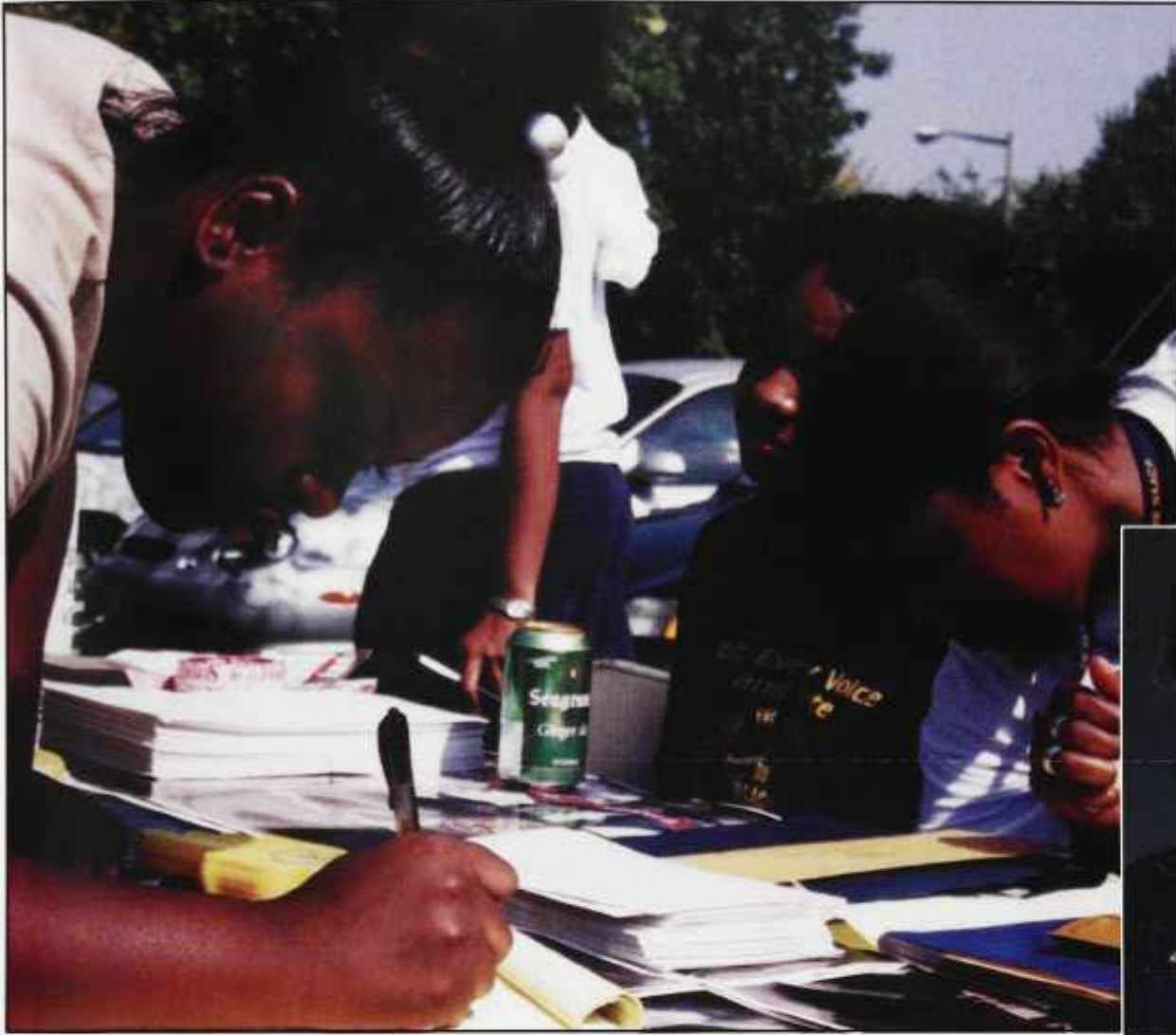

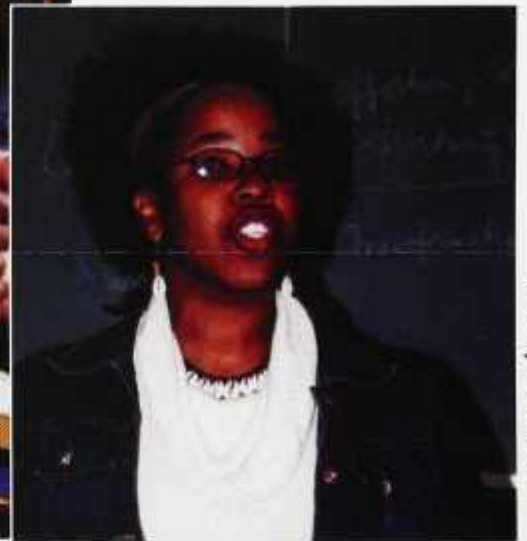

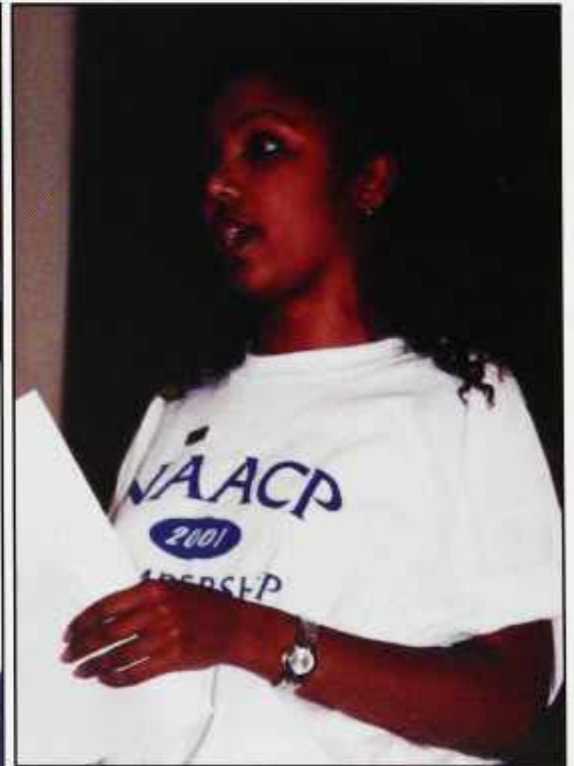

Through the implementation of programs focusing on education, political involvement, and health issues in the African American community, the NAACP encourages students to make a commitment to the success of their community. "I choose to be actively involved because I want my voice heard and I want to see our programs be successful," states volunteer Stephanie Jackson.

With student membership in the Howard chapter up 70 percent, voter empowerment has been the organization's main focus this year. Politically, members have worked on the University of Michigan affirmative action case and also traveled to Capitol Hill to lobby for at least three bills. Carmen Calloway, President of the Howard chapter for the NAACP, states, "We want to show the political presence of Howard University and the African American community on Capitol Hill to convey that we are aware of what's going on."

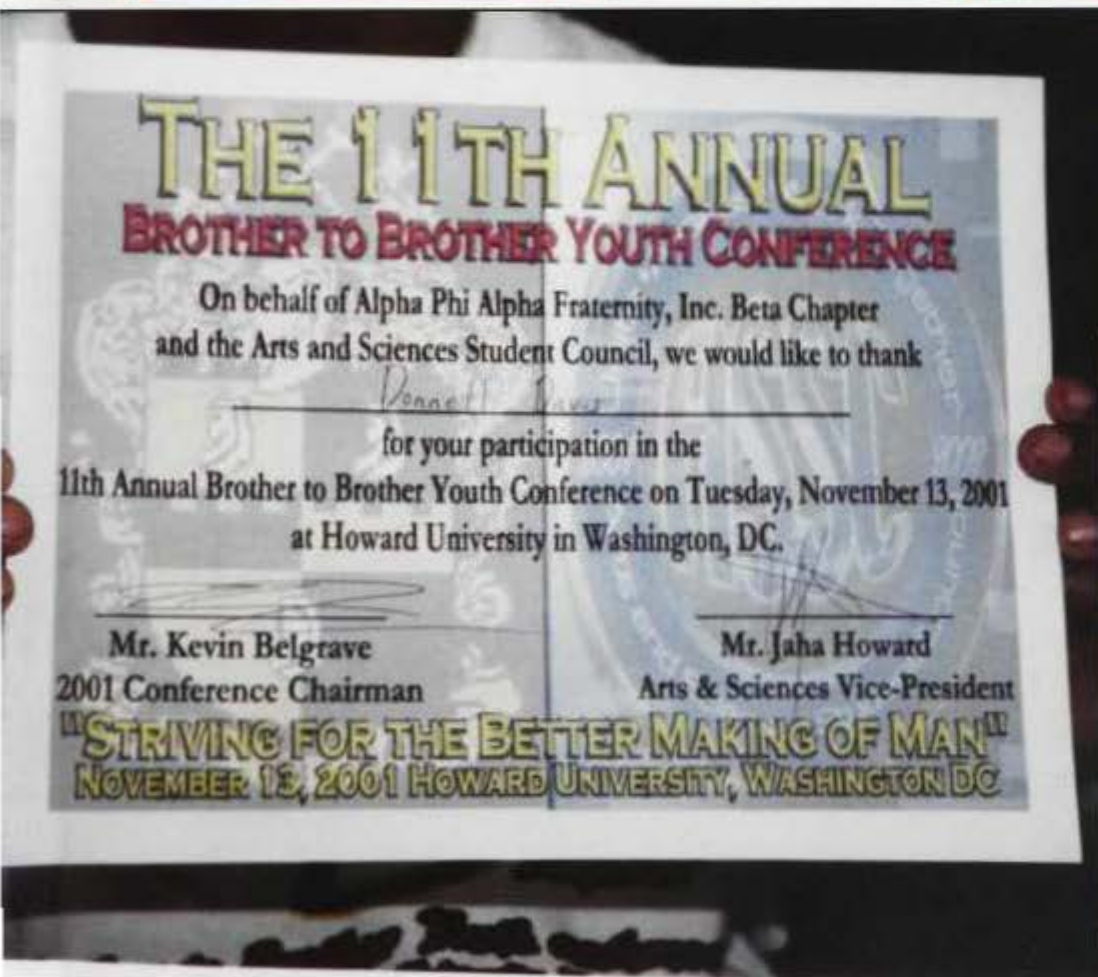

As "leaders for America and the global community," Howard students are taught to reach for the stars. Howard sorority and fraternity members have taken the initiative to stress the importance of reaching back to share their experiences with the African American community. The Ladies of Alpha Chapter, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. and the Most Noble Lords of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., Beta Chapter have made serious strides to empower local youth through their major community service projects - the Woman to Woman Conference and the Brother to Brother Conference, respectively.

Now celebrating the tenth year of their event, the Ladies of Alpha Chapter, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. organize and sponsor the Woman to Woman Conference annually to help shape the dreams and visions of young women of the Washington metropolitan area. The Conference, which started as an Alpha Chapter community service project in 1992, promotes self-awareness, self-love and sisterhood. Each year, approximately 500 young ladies are invited to join the women of Howard University for a day filled with inspiring workshops that provide an opportunity for them to interact with positive collegiate and professional role models. The Conference also includes a luncheon and a follow up retreat on the weekend following the actual conference. Though both conferences are gender specific, "they have the same goal," explains Djinge Lindsay, Chair of the 10th Annual Woman to Woman Conference. "Both organizations

seek to ameliorate the lives of young African Americans and make them aware of their options."

With a similar objective in mind, the Brother to Brother Conference makes strides toward empowering young African American males. Members of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., Beta Chapter provide the young men with an opportunity to attend workshops on African history, current issues in their community, and the importance of giving back. The Brother to Brother Extension Program, through which Howard students and local high school-aged young men participate in community service projects, takes place both before and after the conference in order establish and maintain the bonds formed during the Conference. This year, the Brothers of Beta Chapter also added a new element to the Conference: social awareness. "Although we will stay true to the focus of the Conference," explains Chairman Kevin Belgrave, "we are adding a much needed dimension because history is not being taught in their classrooms."

Both Conference Chairs attribute the success of their events to the support provided by the Howard community. Each year, hundreds of Howard students come out to volunteer during the planning stages and the actual events. Senior Stephen Jenkins has volunteered for the Brother to Brother Conference for four consecutive years. "When a young man told me that he wanted to come to Howard after attending the Conference, I knew that we were making a difference."

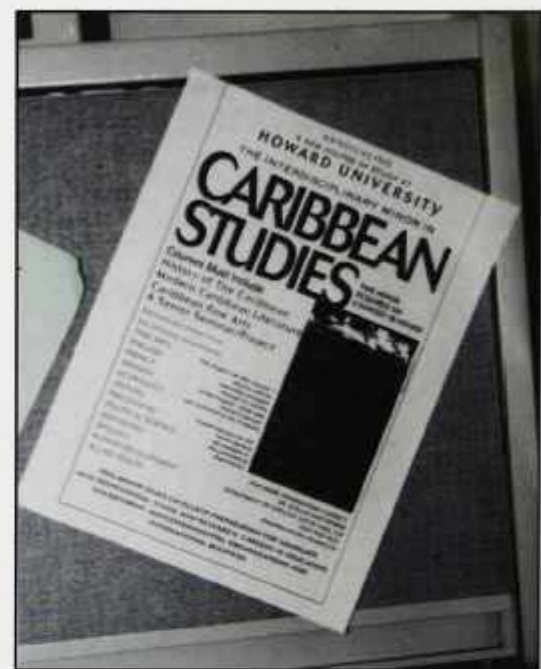

Just how much do you know about the Caribbean? Last summer, after senior French and English major Jame' Johnson studied on the islands of Martinique and in Jamaica, she decided that Howard students "just don't know enough." Due to her rich cultural experiences, Johnson became one of a growing number of students who have opted to become Caribbean Studies minors this year. "We know about the Diaspora in Africa and the U. S., but we usually don't hear about the Caribbean," Johnson remarks.

The Caribbean Studies minor is an interdepartmental program designed to promote studies of the multi-linguistic region that involves the English and History departments and the Division of Fine Arts. The minor requires six courses in Caribbean history, literature, and arts. Students may also select to pursue electives and an internship.

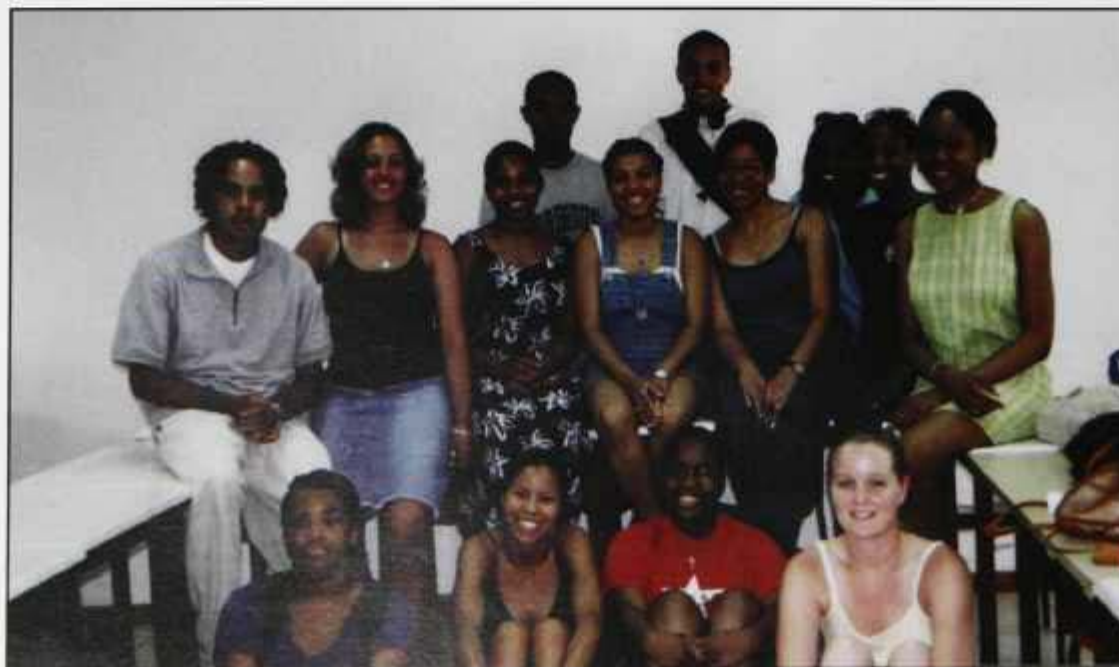
The program, created and headed by Dr. Evelyn Hawthorne, celebrated its first full year in January, as the 2001-02 academic year is the first full year that the minor has been available. It is the director's hope that the program will broaden to include a major in the near future. "Howard University is probably the most qualified school, nationally, to have such a program," says Dr. Hawthorne. "Our rich Caribbean history, the large number of Caribbean students, and our faculty expertise are all factors that put Howard in an enviable position."

Most Howard students have heard very little about the program. Dr. Hawthorne recognizes the need to publicize the courses more, as there is an interested body of Howard students. "I didn't know that the program was in existence," said junior Engineering major Erin Smith. "It sounds interesting . . . I just may have to check that out."



All of the students enrolled in the program have not studied abroad as Johnson has; however, one of the objectives of the minor is to ensure that each student has the opportunity to travel. The program also features conferences geared toward further educating Howard students on a variety of topics in the realm of Caribbean studies, including literature, music and economics.

Lois Mailou Jones, who designed the first stain glass windows in Andrew Rankin Memorial Chapel, paved the way for artists like Akili-Ron Anderson who designed the Deans' windows to commemorate the chapel's history.
