Freshman Orientation week, run by student organizations like the Campus Pals, International Pals, and UGSA, keeps the campus buzzing with informational sessions and fun parties.



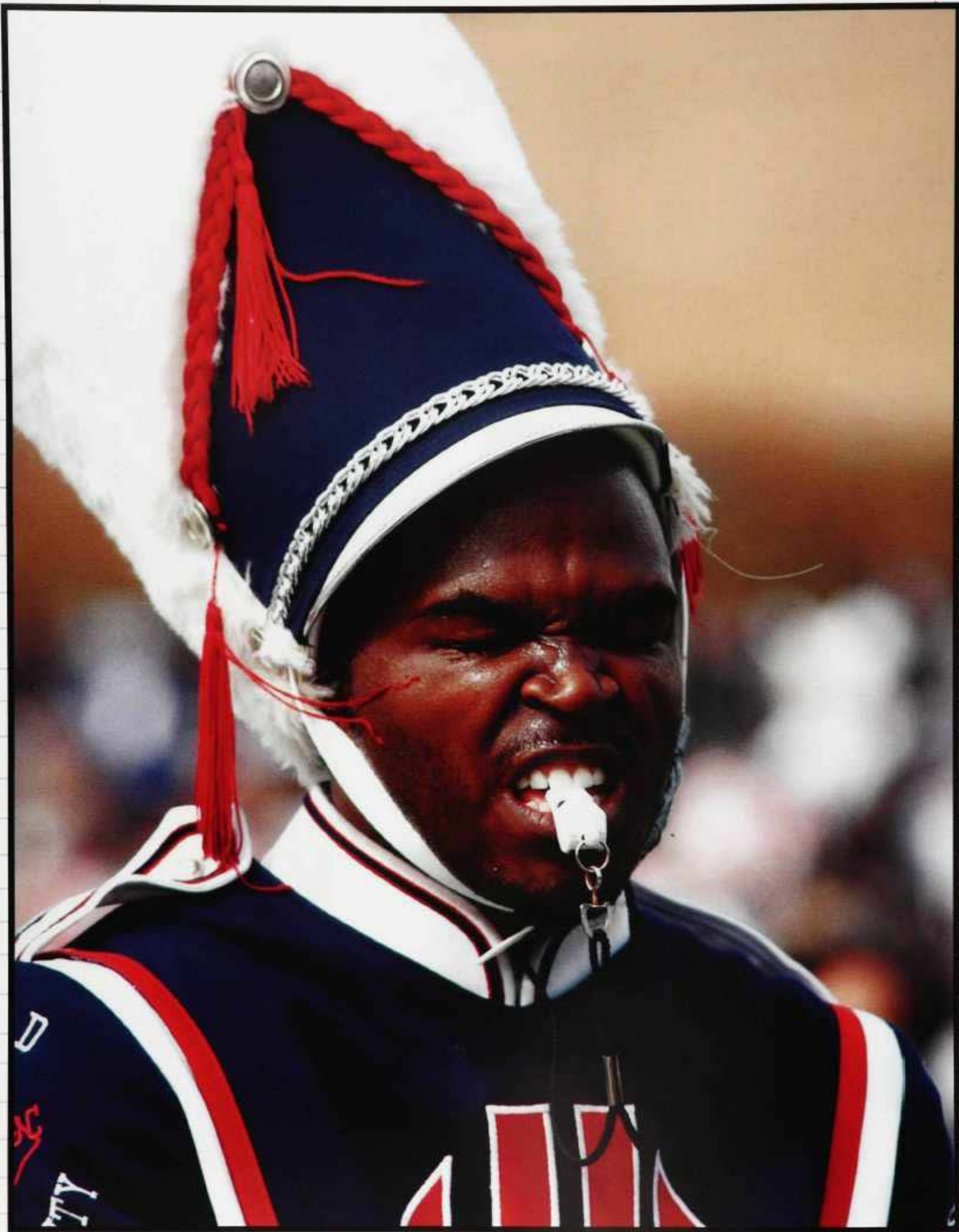

Half-time shows are the main event at black college football games. Continuing the black college tradition, Howard's "Showtime" Marching Band is known for its sound and dazzling dance routines. One hundred and fifty members strong, the marching band holds

the distinction of being the driving force of school spirit for the university.

The making of the "Showtime" Marching Band begins the second week of August. The day begins at 4:30 a.m. with push-ups, stretches and jumping jacks. At 6:30 a.m., it's time to learn and master complicated half-time marching patterns. The band is up from dawn to dusk learning selections with arrangements that will keep the crowd entertained during games.

This year, the "Showtime" Marching Band took on the challenge of performing at a "Battle of the Bands" competition. At a competition in Charlotte, North Carolina, Howard beat out FAMU, and Benedict College for a second place finish.

During the 1960's, The Yard we know to be a social scene was the meeting ground for political demonstrations, voting rights marches and civil rights protests. Historic activist like Stokely Carmichael, Malcolm X and Angela Davis once walked this campus and were joined by students and administrators alike in the pursuit of equality and civil liberties.

But as the times have changed, so have the political and social issues. While it may appear that we have all the rights and privileges we once fought for, it is important that we remain aware and mindful of the world around us.

Student organizations like NAACP and Amnesty International have set out to prove that activism at the Mecca is not dead; it has simply changed form. Jesse Jackson once complained that Howard students would no longer follow him out onto the streets, but this was proved untrue when hundreds of Howard students marched to the Supreme Court this year in protest of the University of Michigan Affirmative Action Case.

On another stand, four Howard University Law students continued the legacy of activism by filing an Amicus Curiae brief to show our opposition to the Affirmative Action Case before the court.

Howard has been instrumental in the Save Morris Brown campaign, as well as the continual struggle to keep alive the legacy of the HBCU. Students continue to protest over inter-university problems as well as world threatening concerns such as the War in Iraq.

Petitions may replace the pickets of the past, but Howard students still make certain that their voices and concerns are heard.

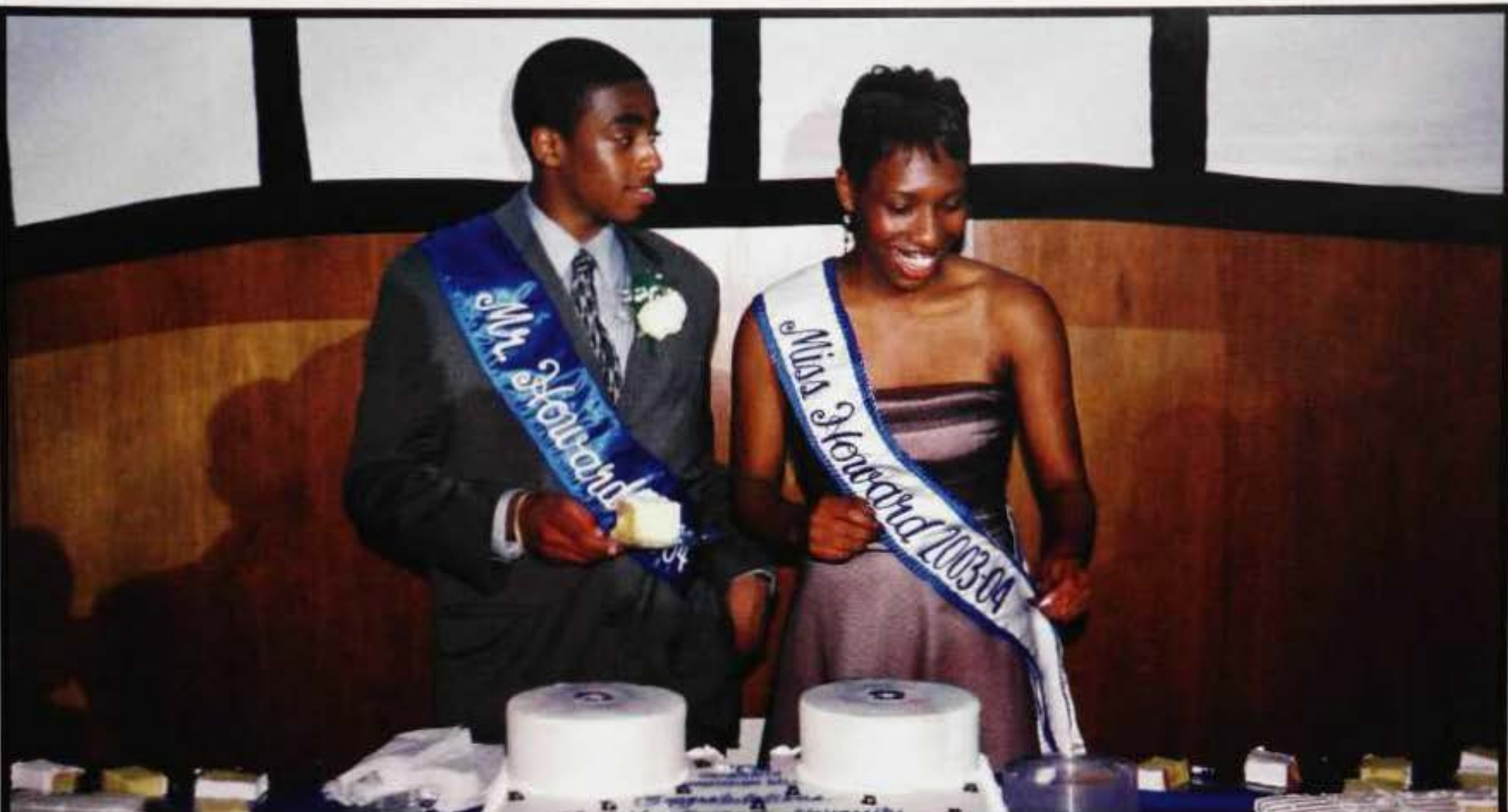

Comedy Show

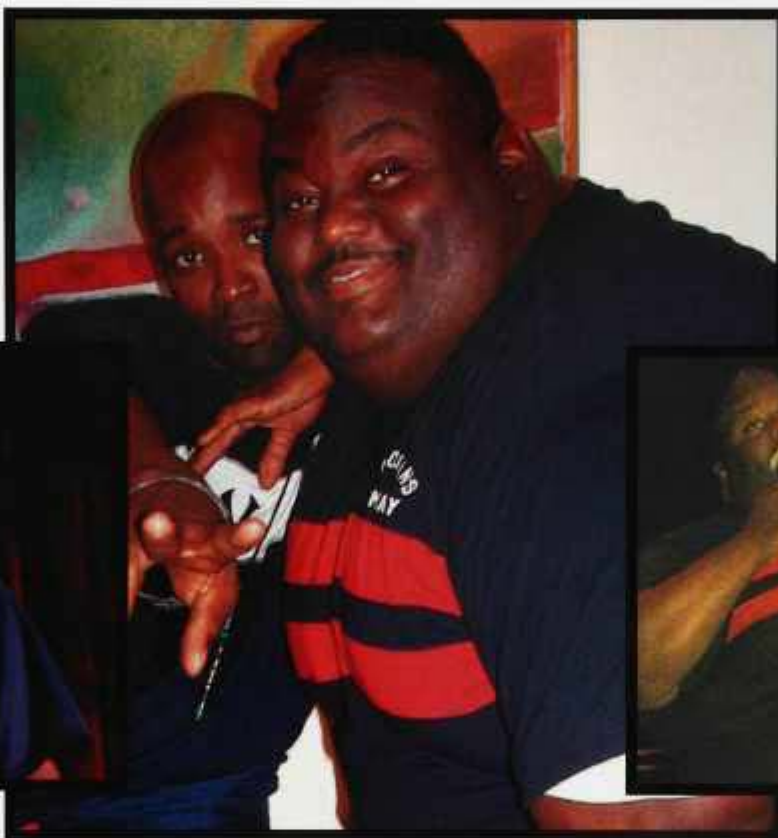

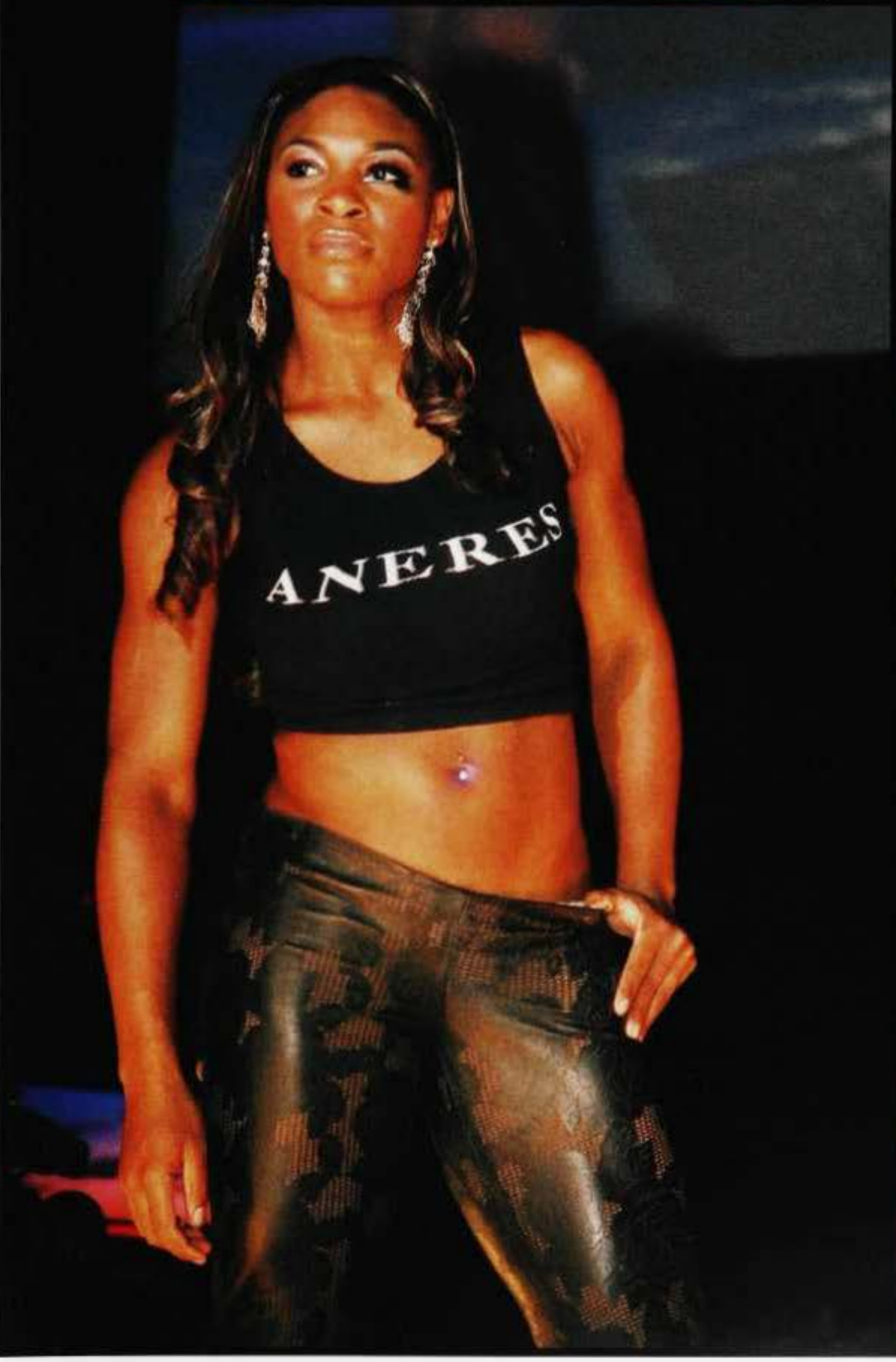

There's nothing better than winning the Homecoming game in front of alumni, students and friends. If the Bison doesn't win any other game during the entire season, they can't lose the Homecoming game. After breaking that cardinal rule last year, the Bison football team came prepared to crush arch enemy rival Florida A&M University. With this season as FAMU's last season in the MEAC (the team will soon be moving up to Division 1-A), Homecoming was the last time the rivals would meet on the football field. "It was our last opportunity to play FAMU. We wanted to make sure they remembered the last time they came here," said Bison Head Coach Ray Petty in a post-game



interview. At halftime, the close game was tied at 7-7. In the remaining two quarters, Howard effectively controlled the clock, took advantage of Rattler weaknesses and had several standout players. Freshman running back Antoine Rutherford rushed for 137 yards and scored two touchdowns. Senior Travis Gilliam helped by catching 6 passes for 32 yards. The Bison defense really brought the team to victory with the help of sophomore safety, Antoine Bethea's 8 solos, 5 assists and one forced fumble. Other great defensive players included senior safety Brian Johnson with 9 tackles, junior linebacker Mike Sanders with 9 additional crucial tackles and senior linebacker Greg Spriggs with 5 tackles and a fumble recovery. The win came down to one field-goal kick. After a time-out was taken by each team, FAMU kicker Juan Vasquez attempted a 38-yard field goal that would have given the Rattlers a one-point lead. The field goal attempt was no good. Just like that it was all over. The Bison had not beaten the Rattlers at home since 1993, but one decade later, the Bison gave FAMU a MEAC division farewell to remember. Howard will go down in history and the record books will permanently, proudly read: final score Howard 16, FAMU 14.

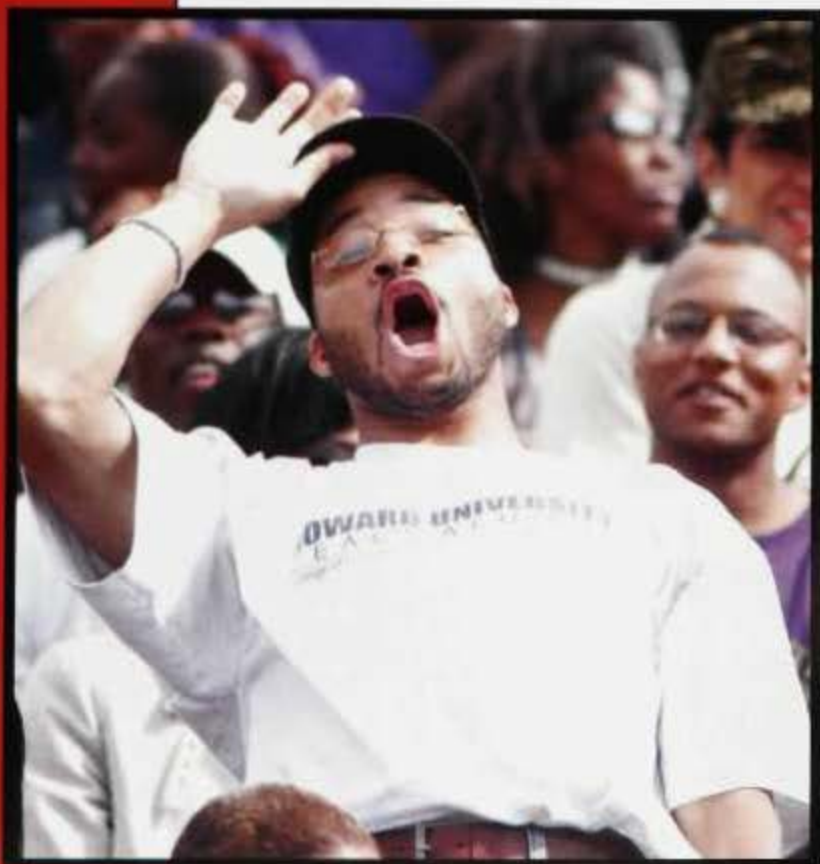

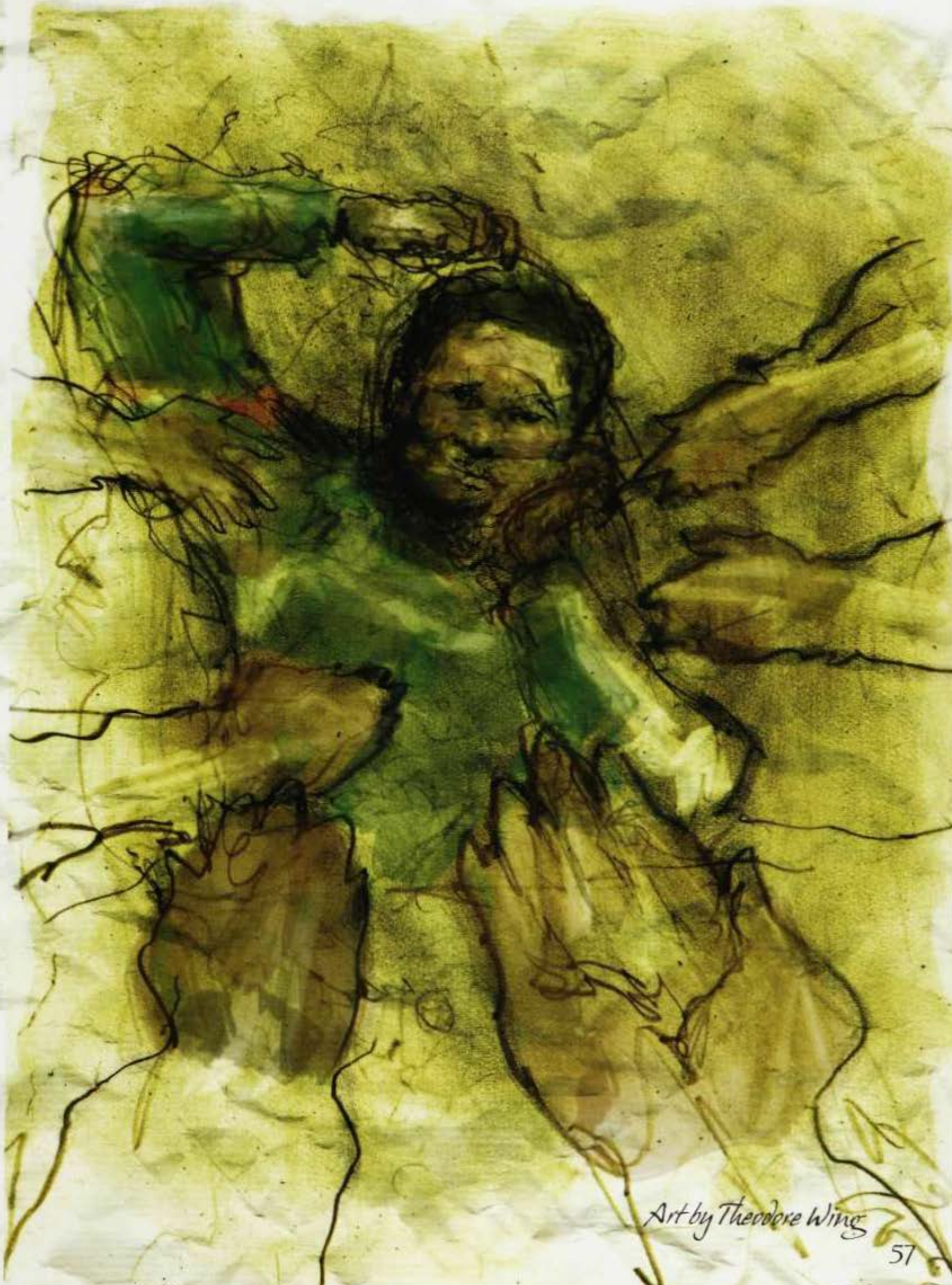

This is not to rule out the infamous "Howard Man," who I confidently believe still lives and breathes among us. I just don't know where he is.

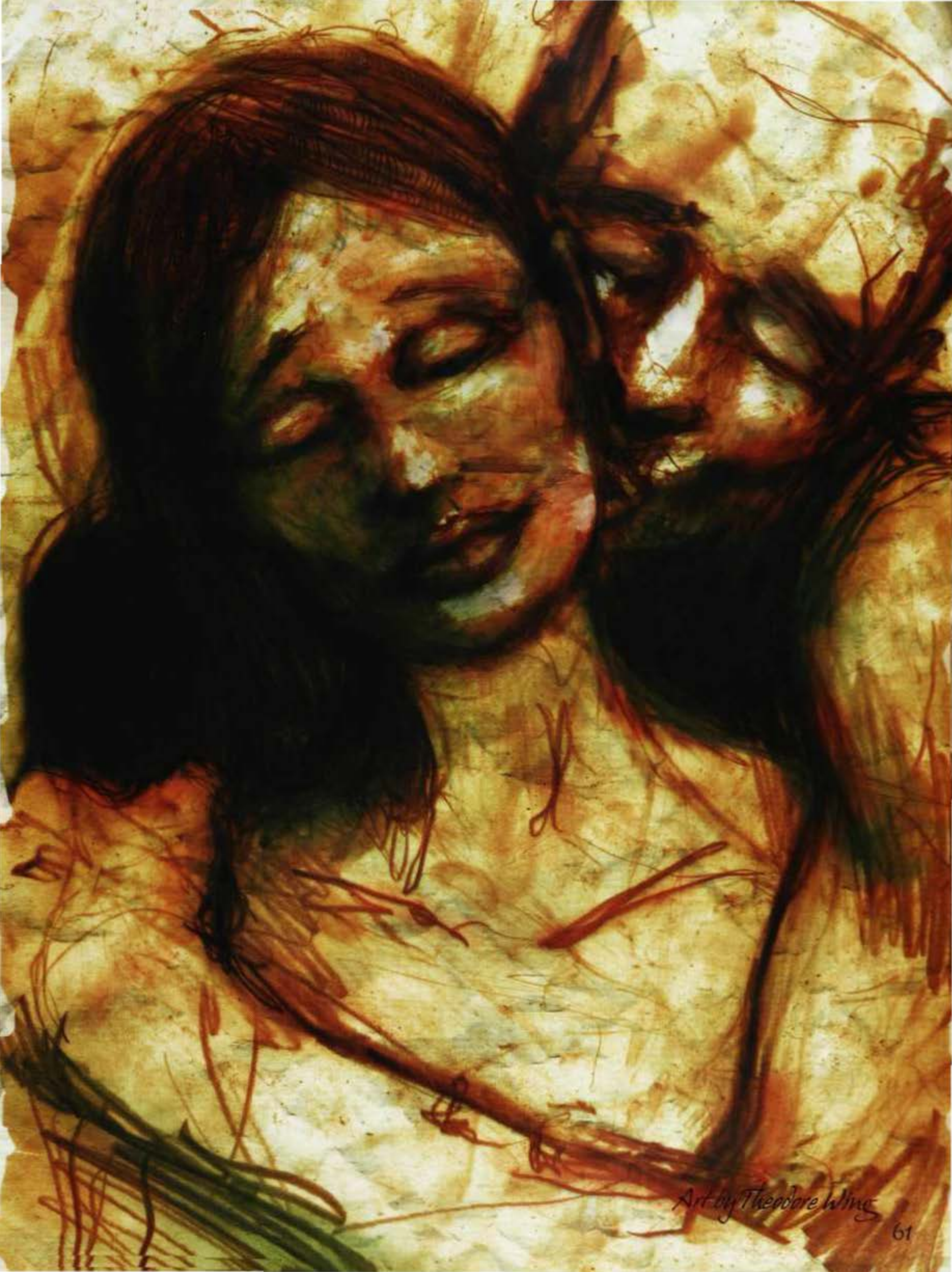

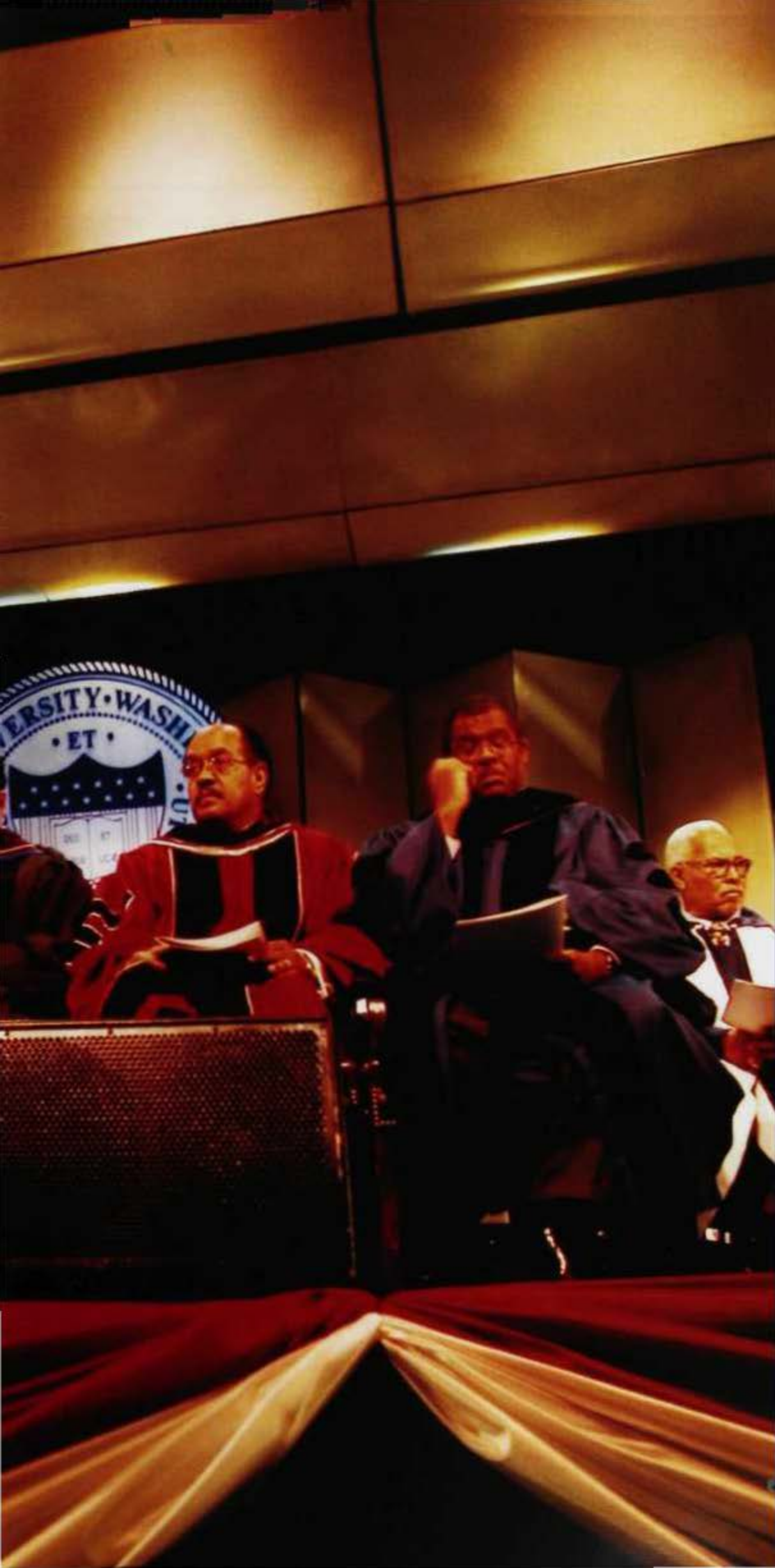

Fall Play

"Shakin' The Mess Outta Misery," by Shay Youngblood and directed by Kim Bey was a colorful performance staged in The Environmental Theater Space, which created a unique intimacy between the audience and the actresses. The storyline followed the tradition of "going to the river" in preparation for womanhood. Every woman in the cast was a mother to Daughter, the motherless child, who was intent on learning about her history from women who lived through Jim Crow laws, segregation and discrimination of all kinds. Daughter was given advice that reminded her to "always honor your ancestors," and that "a try ain't never failed." The script was beautifully written and executed through the arts of storytelling, dialogue, dance and song. At the end of the play, the audience walked away with Big Mama's words ringing in their ears: "If you've got a dance, a dream, or anything, don't let anything get in your way."



Staged at Ira Aldridge Theater, "Cut Flowers," written and directed by Gavin Lawrence and Eric Ruffin respectively, is a 6-man cast full of testosterone and inquisition on the role of the black man in contemporary society. The characters and the issues they face are as colorful as the flowers that pass through the scenes of "Cut Flowers". There is no such thing as

ensorship in "Cut Flowers," which confronts issues such as alcoholism, promotion, and homophobia. Music mixes with comedy and camaraderie to provide the type of dramatic energy to keep the audience waiting to see what the next scene will bring. The theme of the play is best captured when Mark, a victim of domestic violence, vocalizes the purpose of cutting flowers: "so they can stay alive so they can have new life." The play concludes with a hug conveying that they have all learned "how to open up" to their collective struggles.

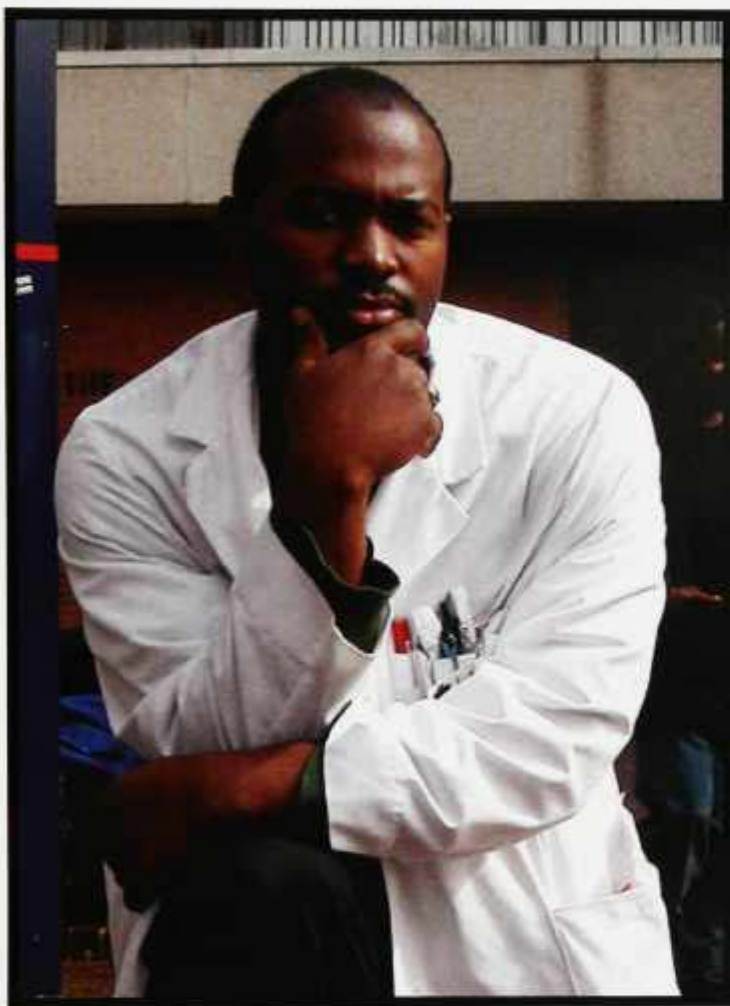




Graduate Leaders

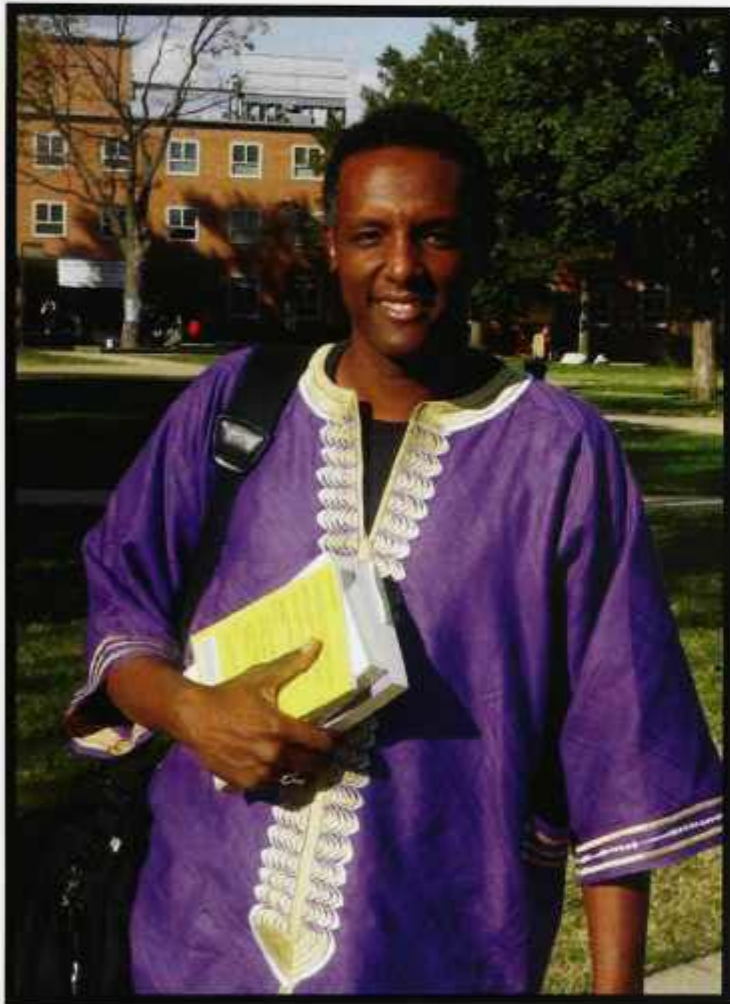


The Art of Teaching

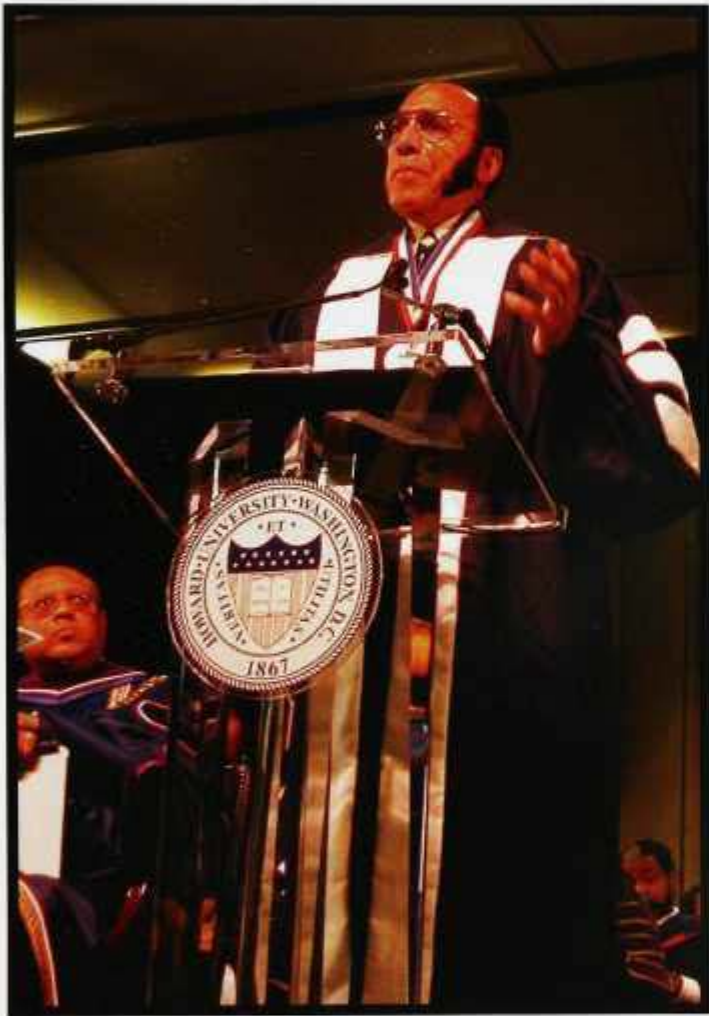

Also recognized at the convocation ceremony was the 50th anniversary of Brown vs. the Board of Education, the landmark Supreme Court case that desegregated public schools. Posing the question, "What does Brown

mean to you today?" Graves suggested: "It means that you attend Howard not because you have to, but because you choose to be here."

The U.S. Navy performance choir and orchestra joined the Howard University Choir and Orchestra for a moving musical selection. 2000 Convocation orator, Rev. Jesse Jackson, Rev. Bill Gray, Ozzie Davis, Ruby Dee and many other notable black leaders were all in attendance at this year's Convocation.

Convocation 2003 truly lived up to its purpose of filling the Howard community with words of wisdom, encouragement and support from some of the biggest black media leaders in the nation.

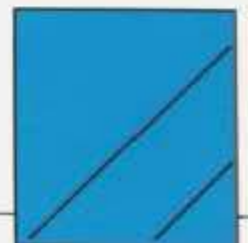

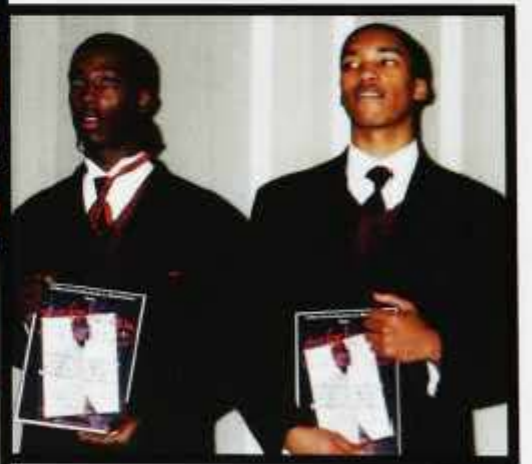
teacher's assistant knows my name; the professor is there only to lecture.

Honors Programs

What is an honors student? According to Ms. Carol Henley, Director of the School of Business Executive Leadership Honors Program, an honors student "always strives for excellence, never settles for second best and is determined to make a difference in the world." The standard of academic excellence has been raised for these students through their participation in various honors programs.

The College of Arts and Sciences Honors Program, the School of Communications Annenberg Honors Program and the School of Business Executive Leadership Honors Program challenge students to extend their academic boundaries beyond general education requirements. The 40-50 page thesis required by the School of Communications, the College of Arts and Sciences and the corporate case study competitions in the School of Business are mere examples of the caliber of work expected in these programs. Students must also incorporate various honors courses, seminars, lectures and retreats into their curriculum every semester. The 120 participants in the School of Business program and the 200 participants in the College of Arts and Sciences program must also maintain a minimum GPA of 3.2. The 80 members of the School of Communications Annenberg Program must maintain a minimum 3.5 GPA.



For their continuous commitment to hard work, the students are highly rewarded.

Among other things the School of Business Executive Leadership Honors Program provides students with laptops for each school year, plus an all expense-paid retreat to London every other year. Students in the Annenberg Honors Program get \$250 stipends every semester. Honors students also receive honors housing in the East Towers and the chance to register for classes before the general student body. In

addition there are many opportunities for scholarships, internships and full-time employment. The honors designation is also something extra placed on students degrees and resumes, making them stand out about the average scholar.

Tiffani Turner, an honors student in the School of Communication's Annenberg program says, "The honors program is a wonderful resource that forces me to stay on top of my academic pursuits. I'm definitely glad to be a part of it." The academic experience coupled with the countless opportunities provided to honors students helps Howard's honors programs achieve their goal of successfully preparing students for leadership roles both now and in the future.

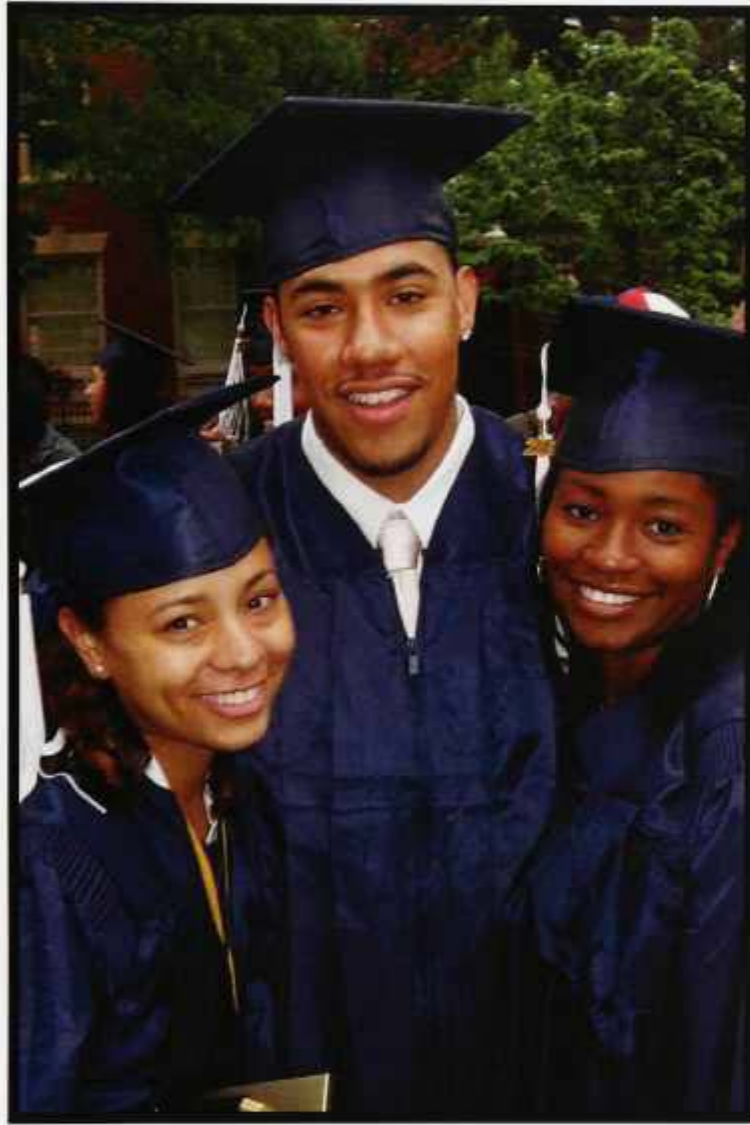


Commencement 2003

Despite the confusion that occurred during the day, the Class of 2003 left The Mecca with a sense of accomplishment and pride.

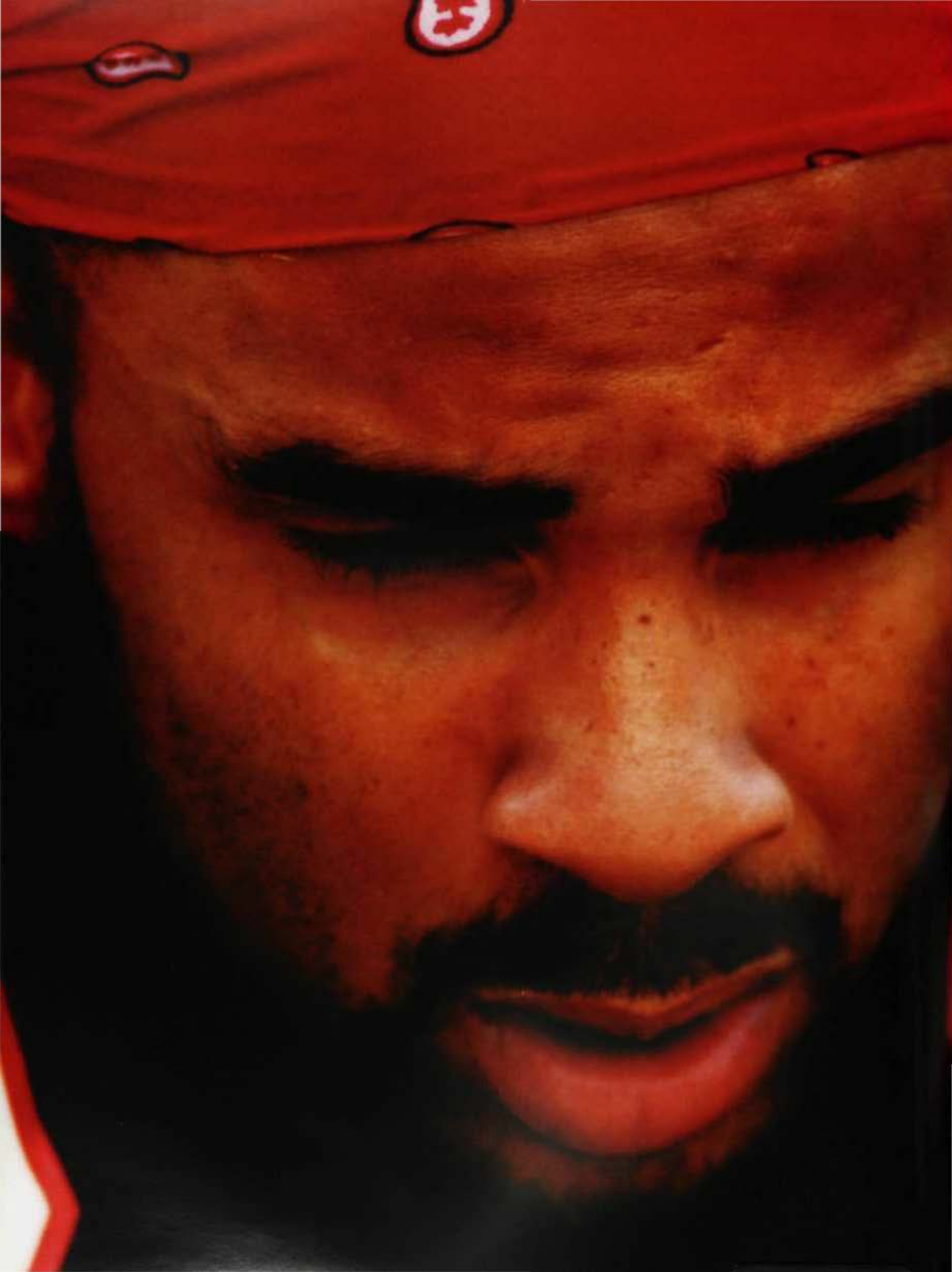

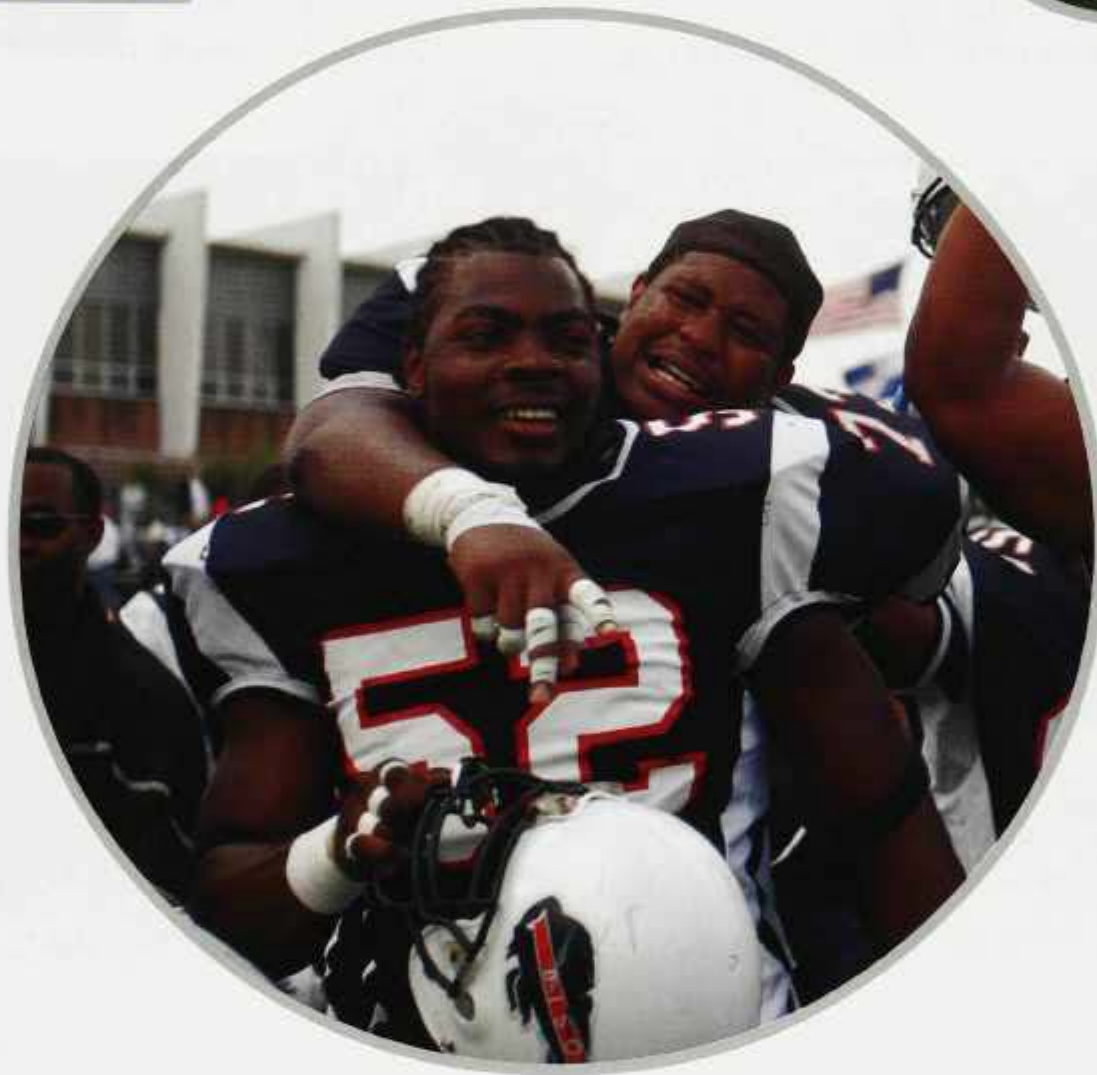

Volleyball

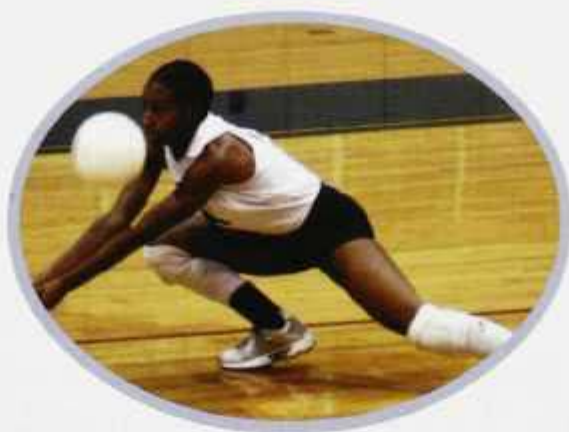

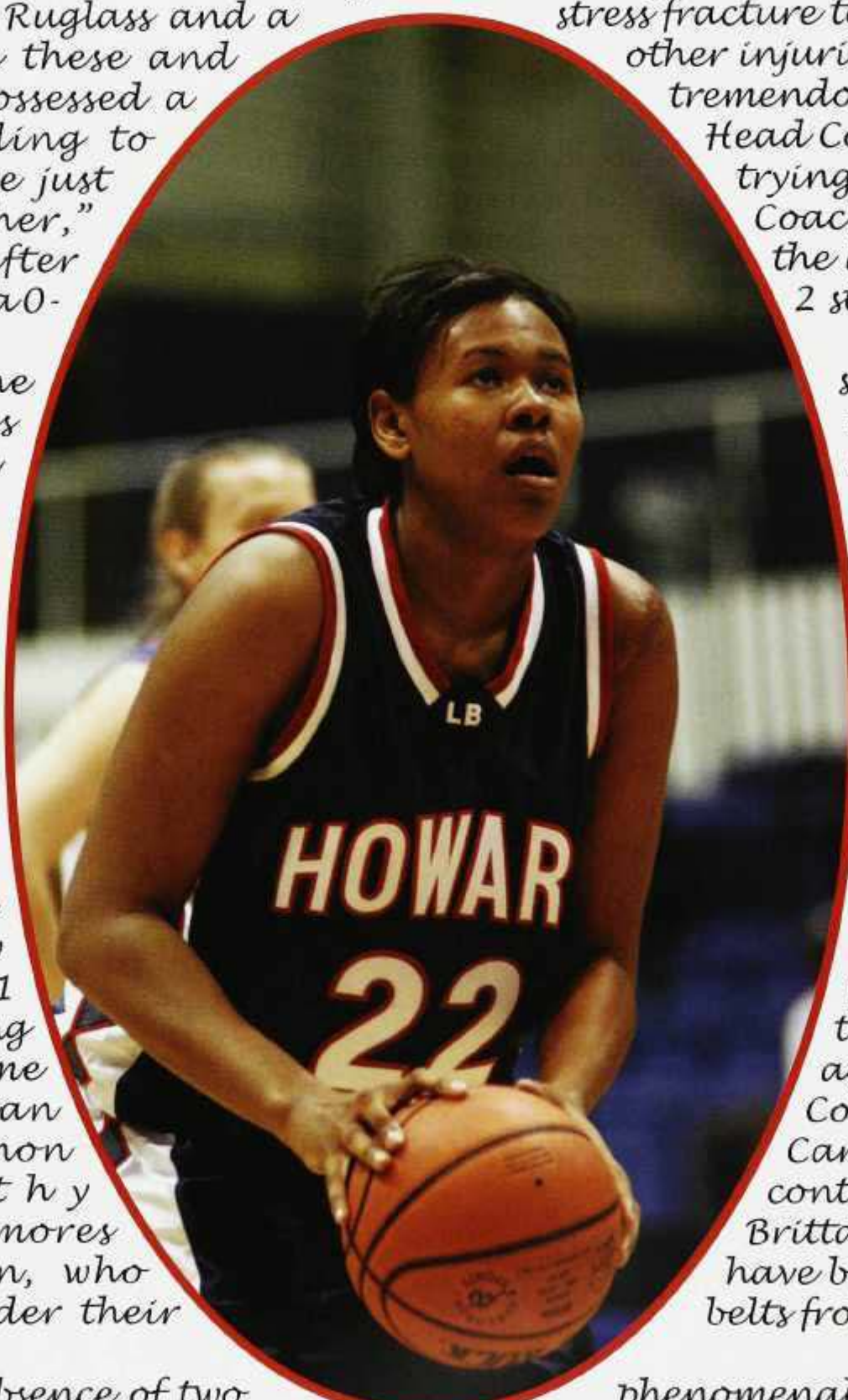

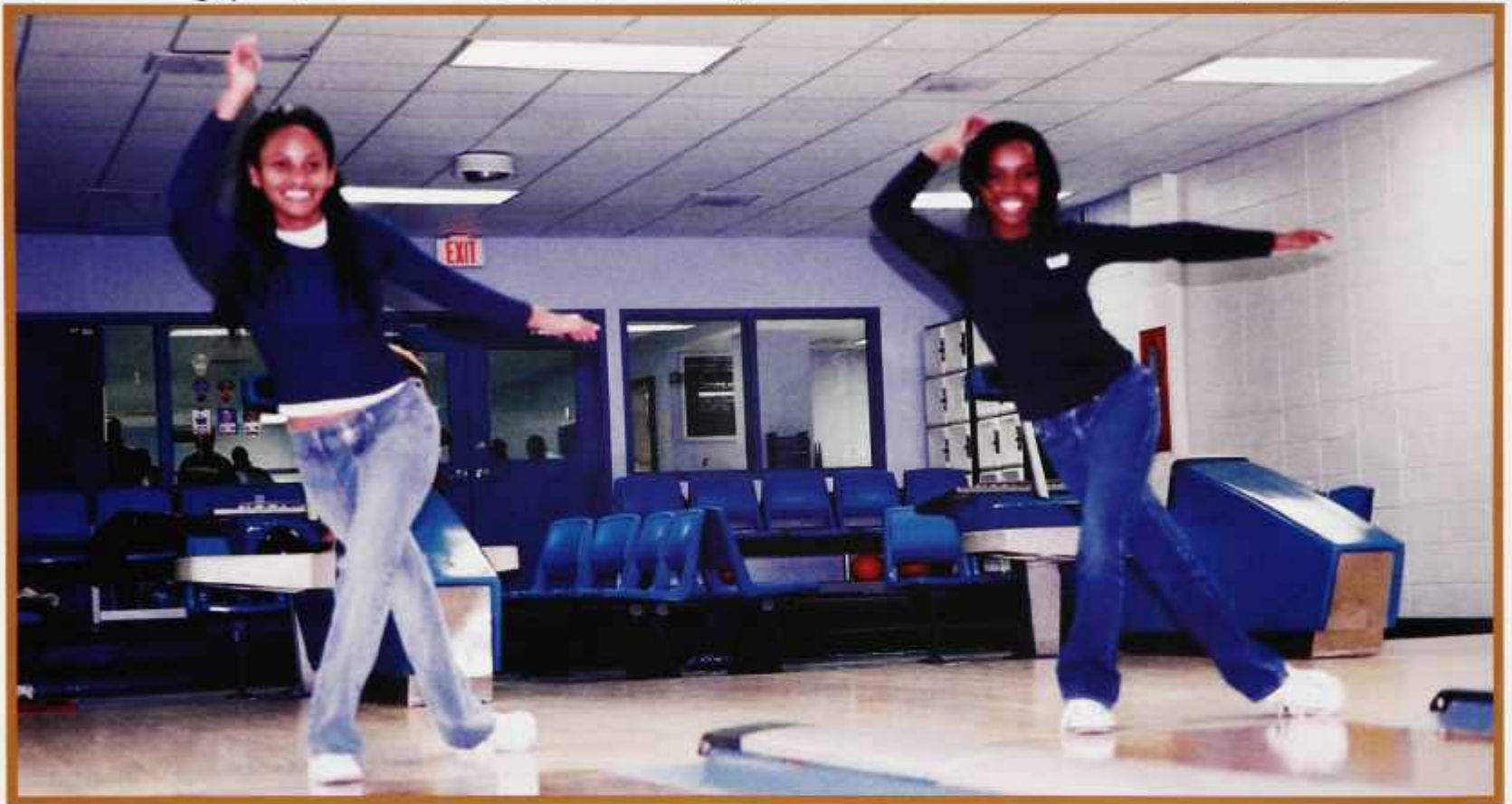

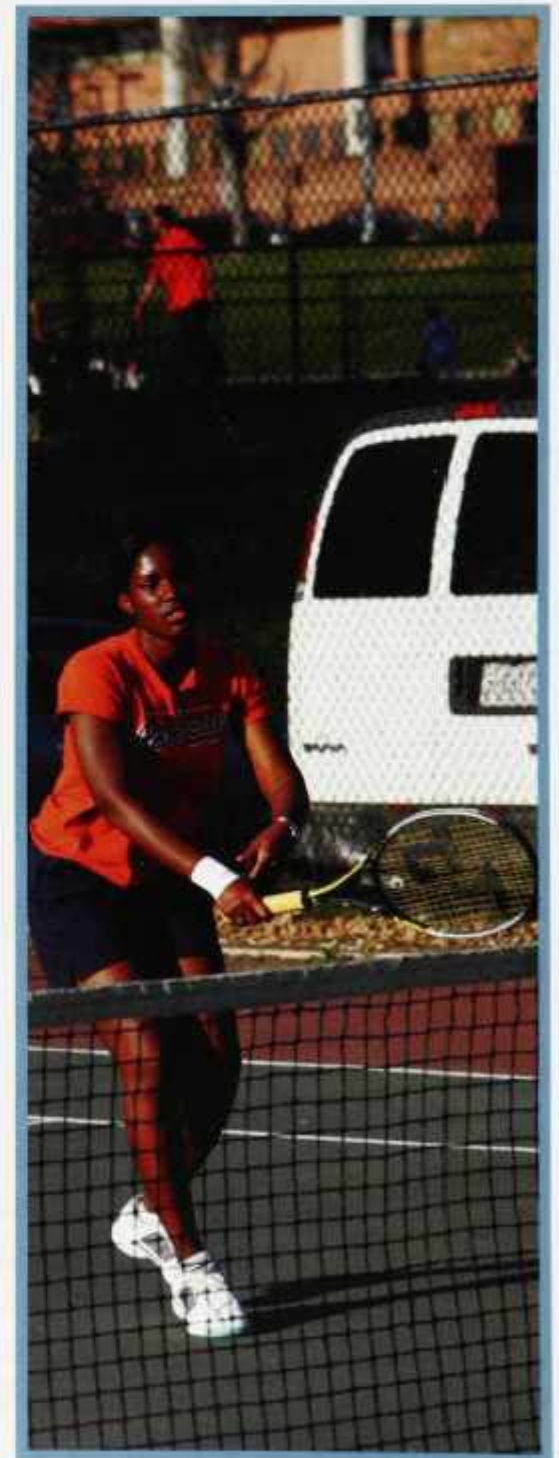


team members can deliver a promising run for the title. Strickland's primary focus remains on ensuring that his players are in a position to reach their maximum potential for every game.

KEENE

As an undergraduate student at Howard University, Mr. Keene participated in the honors program, received an academic scholarship and was selected for Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities as a senior. He was active in student government, his fraternity and early student protests for student rights.

Having met the second day of their freshman year, he married his college sweetheart in their senior year at Howard. After graduating in 1966, with a degree in Psychology, Mr. Keene entered the U.S. Air Force with a ROTC-based commission as a Second Lieutenant. He rose to the rank of Captain.

He entered Cornell University, where he studied Guidance, Counseling and Student Personnel Administration. Mr. Keene became the Coordinator of Black Student Activities. His beautiful wife, Carole, had the last of her education at Cornell.

Mr. Keene accepted a position as Associate Director of Student Affairs at Howard University. Mr. Keene was Assistant to the Vice President for Student Affairs. He successfully sought more than \$5.7 million in low interest federal funding for the housing facilities to address the severe housing shortage. He served as Executive Assistant to the Vice President for Student Affairs; Acting Director of International Student Services; and Acting Director of the Center for Black Student Development for nearly two years.

Mr. Keene served as Dean for Residence Life at Howard University from 1985 to 1988.

Mr. Keene and their three children while in 1972, Mr. Keene was promoted to Executive Director of Student Activities at Howard. He was in competitively awarded purchase of student housing until 1985, although he was Director of Student Services for

Armour J. Blackburn University Center at its opening in 1979; and, before appointment as Dean for Residence Life in 1985, he served as Acting Dean for 18 months.

Mr. Keene is a former member of the Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation at Howard and of the Advisory Board of the Dupont Group Homes (for young men referred by the courts.) For several years, he and his wife helped to organize African Liberation Day in Washington, D.C. and beginning in 1973 for about 20 years. Mr. Keene is an active member and former President of the National Association of Student Affairs Professionals, from which he received its highest award. (Most NASAP members serve at Historically Black Colleges and Universities.) Mr. Keene is also the recipient of the Armour J. Blackburn Award from the Division of Student Affairs at Howard University.

He and his wife, whose African names are Damani and Ife (ee-fay), are strong advocates of Pan-Africanism, African-centered education and are long-time supporters of Ujamaa School and Watoto School in Washington, D.C. They are the very proud grandparents of Nandi Anika Carson and Khalid Valentine Keene, II.

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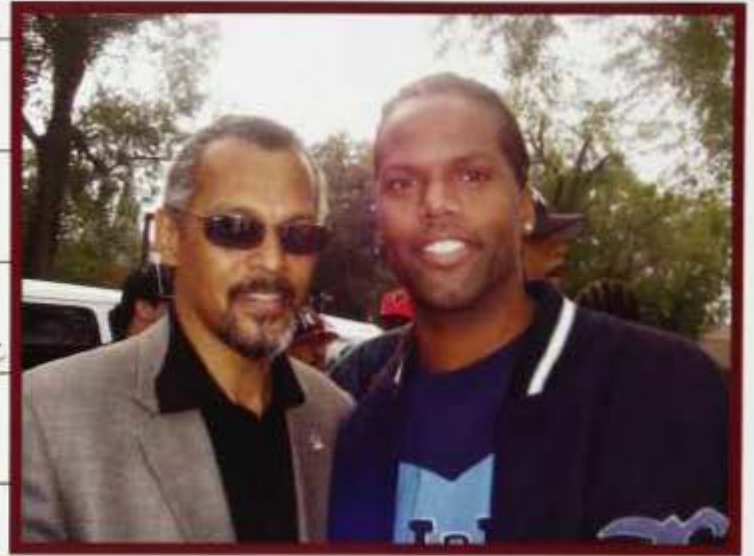
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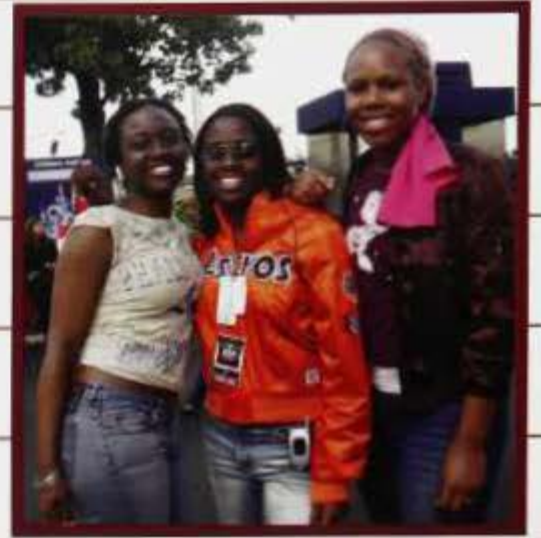

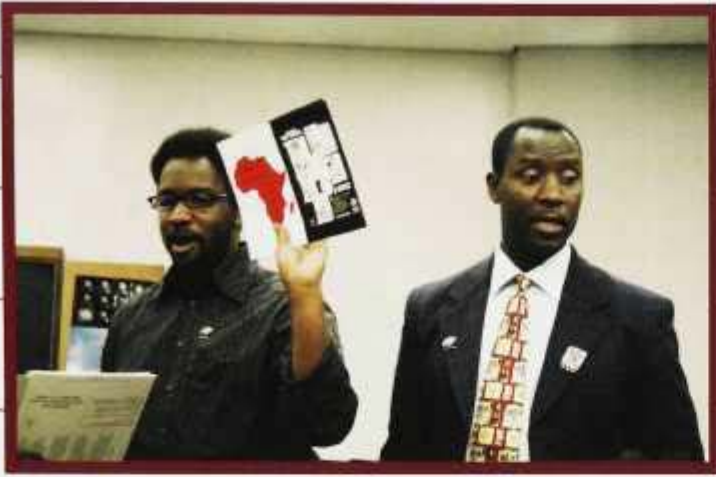
