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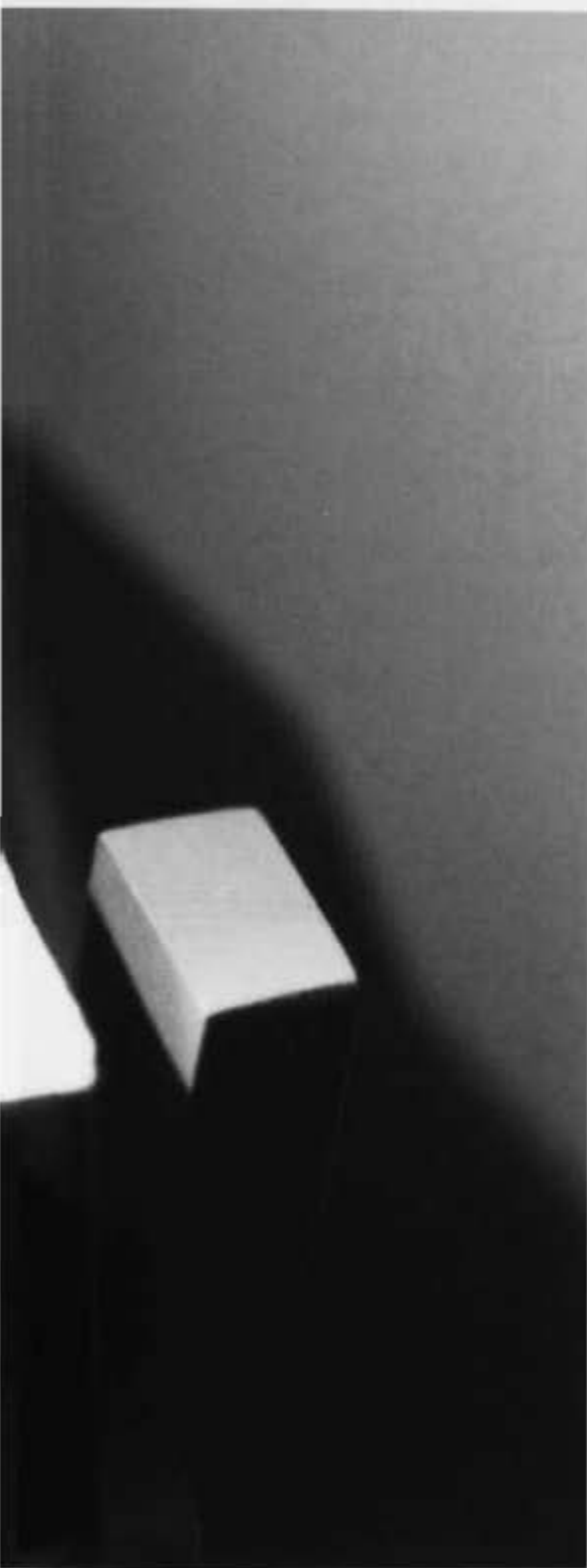

WHAT IS A NEZTAZ?

HOW DID YOU GET THE HOWARD COMMUNITY?

That transformed to me doing the Springfest fashion show, then the homecoming fashion show last year, and I'm doing it this year as well. The Howard community has been very, very helpful.

AS YOU'VE GROWN YOUR BUSINESS, HOW DO YOU SEE IT FROM TANZANIA, THE CLOTHING DESIGNER TO THE ENTERTAINMENT BRASSER?

I've always had the idea to come up with a large entertainment company and had a thing for doing interviews. When I went to London I knew I couldn't be on the radio anymore, so why not create a platform where I could keep doing interviews? That's when the Tanzania Show came about, where I'm doing celebrity interviews and ones with up and coming artists. I'm kind of new to it but the brand just happened. I didn't actually plan it, it just happened.

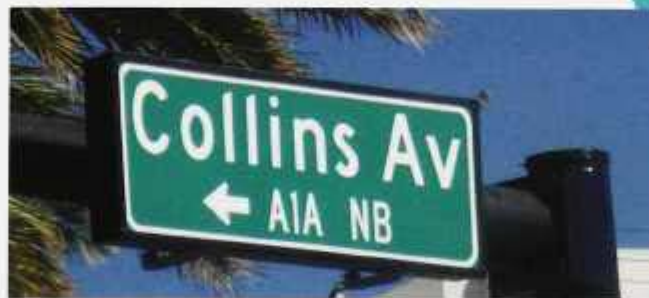


ULTIMATE

EXTENDING ARMS TO AYITI

Mass media coverage of Haiti, or "Ayiti" as its natives refer to it, after the 7.0 magnitude earthquake hit in January 2010 has since died down leaving the world to wonder, "What has become of Haiti?" Howard University as a part of Alternative Spring Break saw the answer firsthand.

A group of thirty began their journey to Haiti on March 12, 2011. Some were surprised at the view from the plane. "We saw beauty. We saw a majestic mountain range - half green and lush, while the other half was brown and arid. We also saw Caribbean water with shades of dark blue, sky blue teal, turquoise and white sand," Kerry-Ann Hamilton, media relations manager, blogged.

The beauty was a side of Haiti that hadn't been portrayed in the media, yet some media depictions remained true. "In some places it seemed like the earthquake had just hit yesterday," said Ryan C. Hamilton, alumnus of Howard.

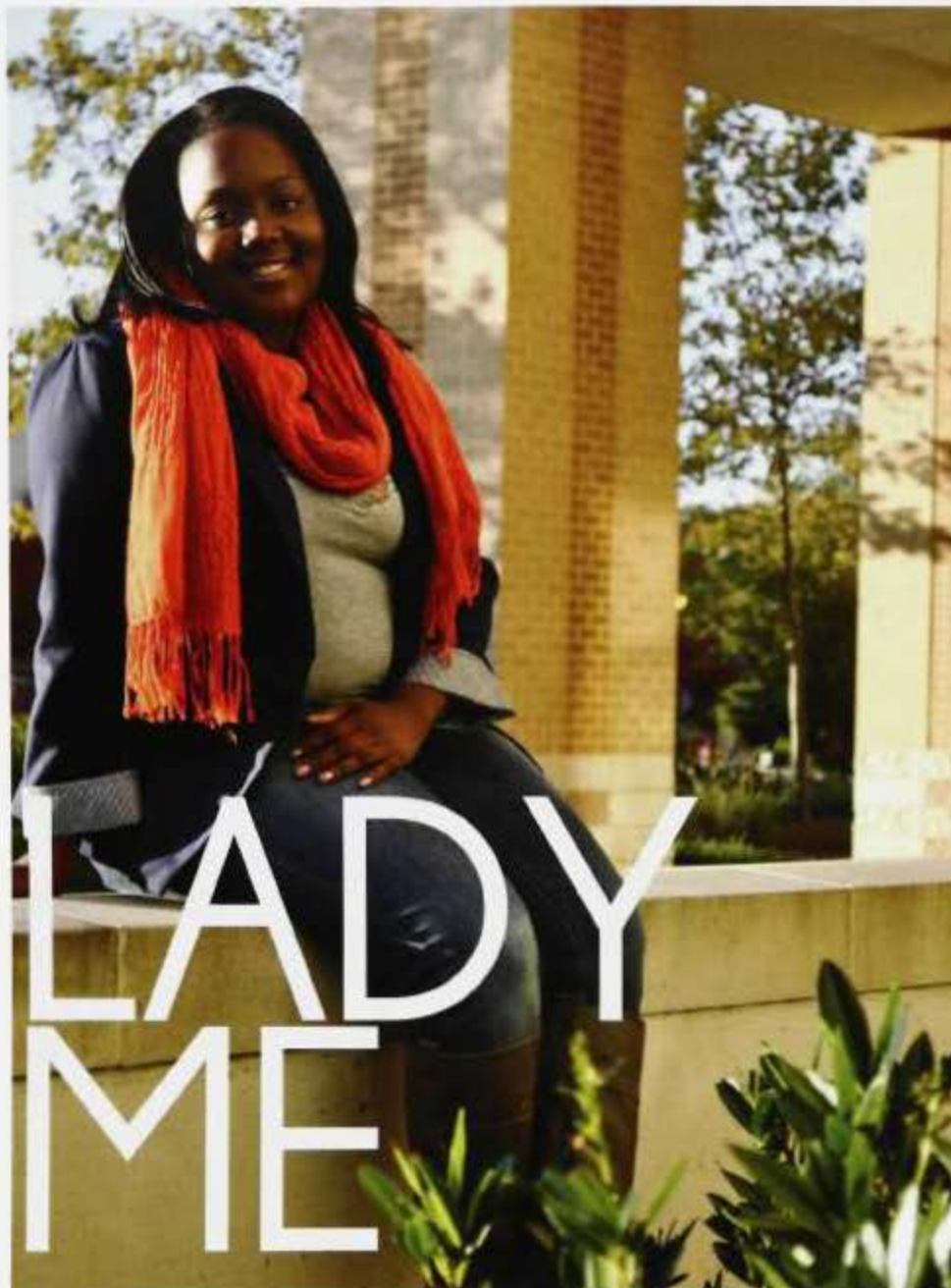
Some began their service in Haiti by building a wall around Ecole Bon Samaritan Orphanage and School for safety. Others, inside the school, taught the children mathematics and art and learned some Creole themselves.

Jasmine Carpenter, Howard Alumna, remembers a sentimental moment. A child had been reluctant to walk or join other children in recess because of a wound on his leg. The group was able to get him necessary treatment. Jasmine recalls, "When I walked into the school on our last day there, Watson was up and walking. I hid behind a tree and cried...That's when our purpose for being there really hit me."

The ASB Haiti experience also included a dark look into the lives of some Haitian women. The group heard the horrific tales of Alina and Helia who were once child slaves. Both experienced abuse and sexual assault. Their stories left much of the group in tears. "I realized that there were many problems before the earthquake, and it shows the resilience of the Haitian people, how they can go through so much but, always bounce back," Ryan Hamilton commented.

ASB Haiti made an impact on its participants. "In a country where people have relatively little possessions, they are always willing to give you the best of what they have," Carpenter said. "We laid the foundation for what Howard will be able to do in Haiti for years to come," Ryan said with Jasmine sharing the sentiment, "the university will embrace service from an even broader awareness now."





LADY ME

T-Kea Blackman sat in the middle of a pack of young girls in the University Town Center game room, all with pizza, pastries, games, and bottles of nail polish at hand. As they shared in laughs, mini-manicures, Wu dancing, food, and fun, it was apparent by the smiles on their faces that they functioned as a loving family. The name of that family is Lady Me mentoring program.

Lady Me, started by Blackman, a senior television production major from Elizabeth, NJ, focuses on building self-esteem, character, and confidence in young girls ages 13-18 living in underprivileged neighborhoods.

Inspired by the visible differences in the quality of life between her friends living in urban and suburban New Jersey, she created the program to help steer young ladies in the right direction, finalizing the name in the summer of 2011.

The experience she has with her mentees is what propels her to keep Lady Me alive and share it with young girls throughout the area. Her most impactful moment was when a young lady felt neglected by a pre-assigned mentor, and Blackman stepped in to fill that role. She was left behind during a bonding session, and Blackman drove 40 minutes to pick her up and meet with the rest of the group.

"I realized how going the extra mile can do a lot for someone," she said. "If I can do something as small as that to make someone feel more needed, my job is done."

Blackman plans on taking her small non-profit to the next level. By May 2012, she will have her non-profit license. After incorporation, which is the next step, the following item on her agenda is expansion.

Blackman plans on moving to California after graduation, and intends on setting up Lady Me at a local school in Los Angeles. Through other members of Lady Me, the non-profit will flourish in DC and spread to New York. "The goal is to have a branch in each city," she said. "Starting in DC is a stepping stone."

Top of Their Class



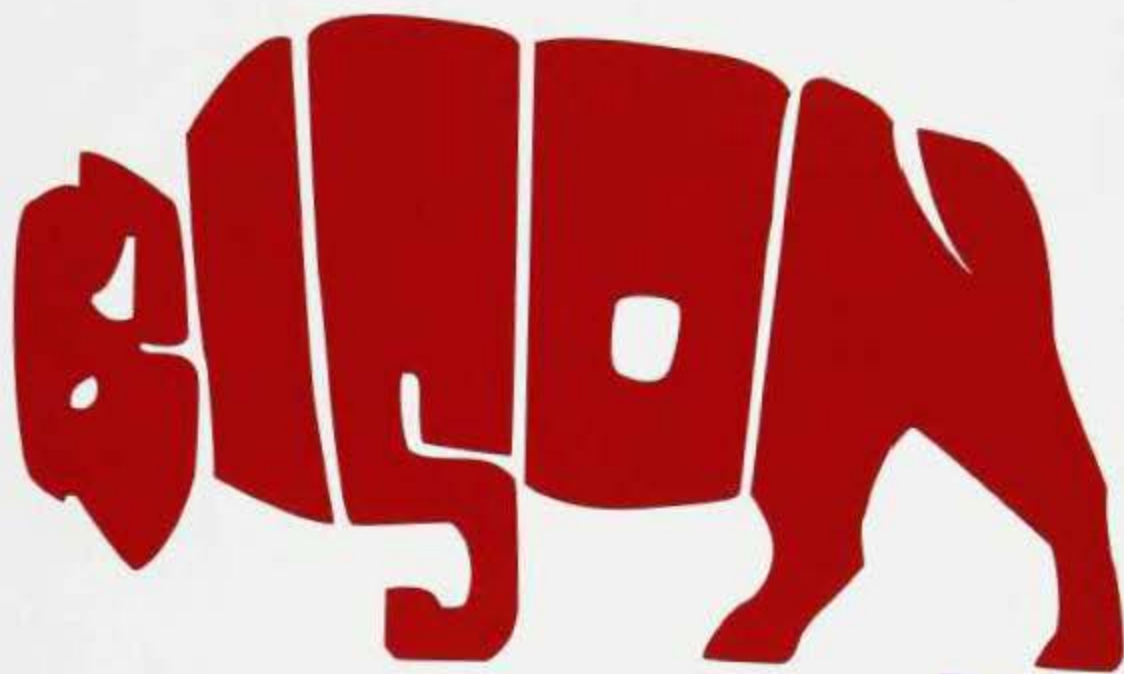

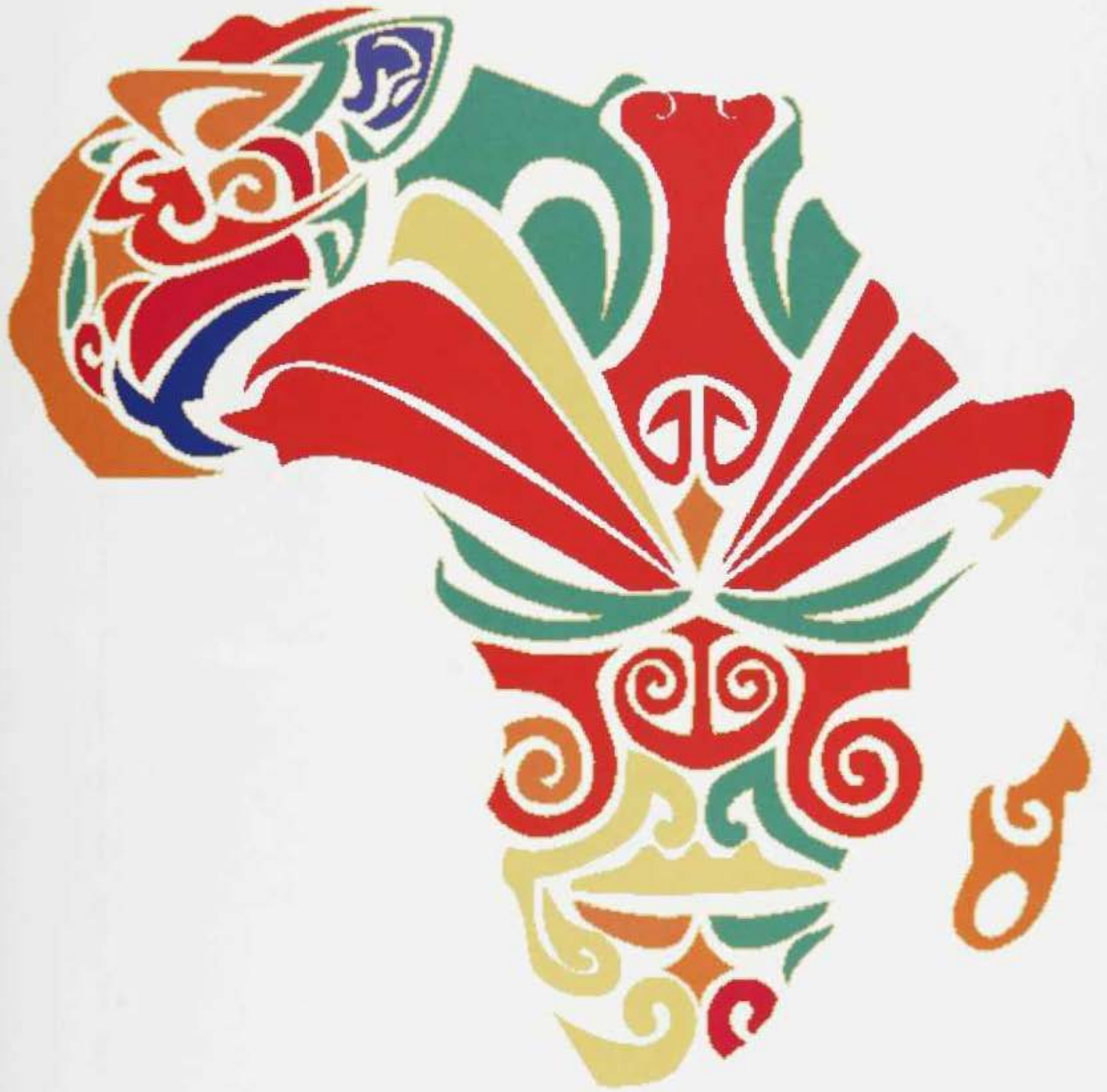

You have to build on stuff you've done. We set a new bar, but it wasn't instilled in student government. After doing it a second year, the people who come after me will be that much better because they've seen sustained change for two years.

HOW DID YOU ORIGINALLY EXPECT THE POSITION TO BE? WAS IT MORE OR LESS THAN YOU EXPECTED?

It was probably more strenuous than I think I realized because there's so much weight on you. Someone might not be able to stay in school because they didn't get financial aid. That will weigh on you. At the same time, it was the most rewarding experience because there were so many opportunities. You know you saved 300 students from really being purged. All of these things I wouldn't have expected to do under my tenure. It showed me things I didn't know about myself and I appreciate that.

WHAT MAJOR MILESTONES DID YOU AND HUSA ACCOMPLISH OVER THE COURSE OF TWO YEARS?

The HUSA grants have been what we're known for. It was a mechanism where students didn't have money, and we said we'll give you money as long as you do community service. That was innovative because student government didn't have an impact in peoples' lives. The second thing was getting rid of the purge. When I came my freshman year, the purge was infamous. It was the scariest thing that you'd ever heard of. Now look at the fact that there is no purge. There's a generation of Howard students that don't know about that.

HOW DO YOU PERSONALLY FEEL YOU AFFECTED HOWARD AND THE POLITICAL SCENE HERE AS HUSA PRESIDENT?

What we did as HUSA was finally make HUSA a problem solver. I think it's just being relevant, not because we're cool and throw parties, but because we change lives. Being a student government that changes lives is a huge statement, especially with a school with a legacy of leadership like Howard.

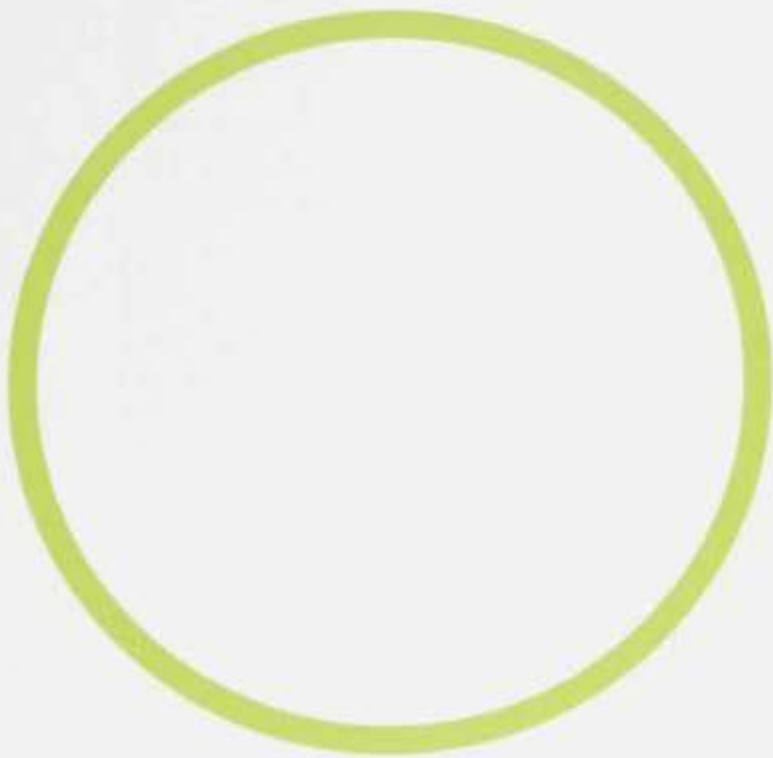

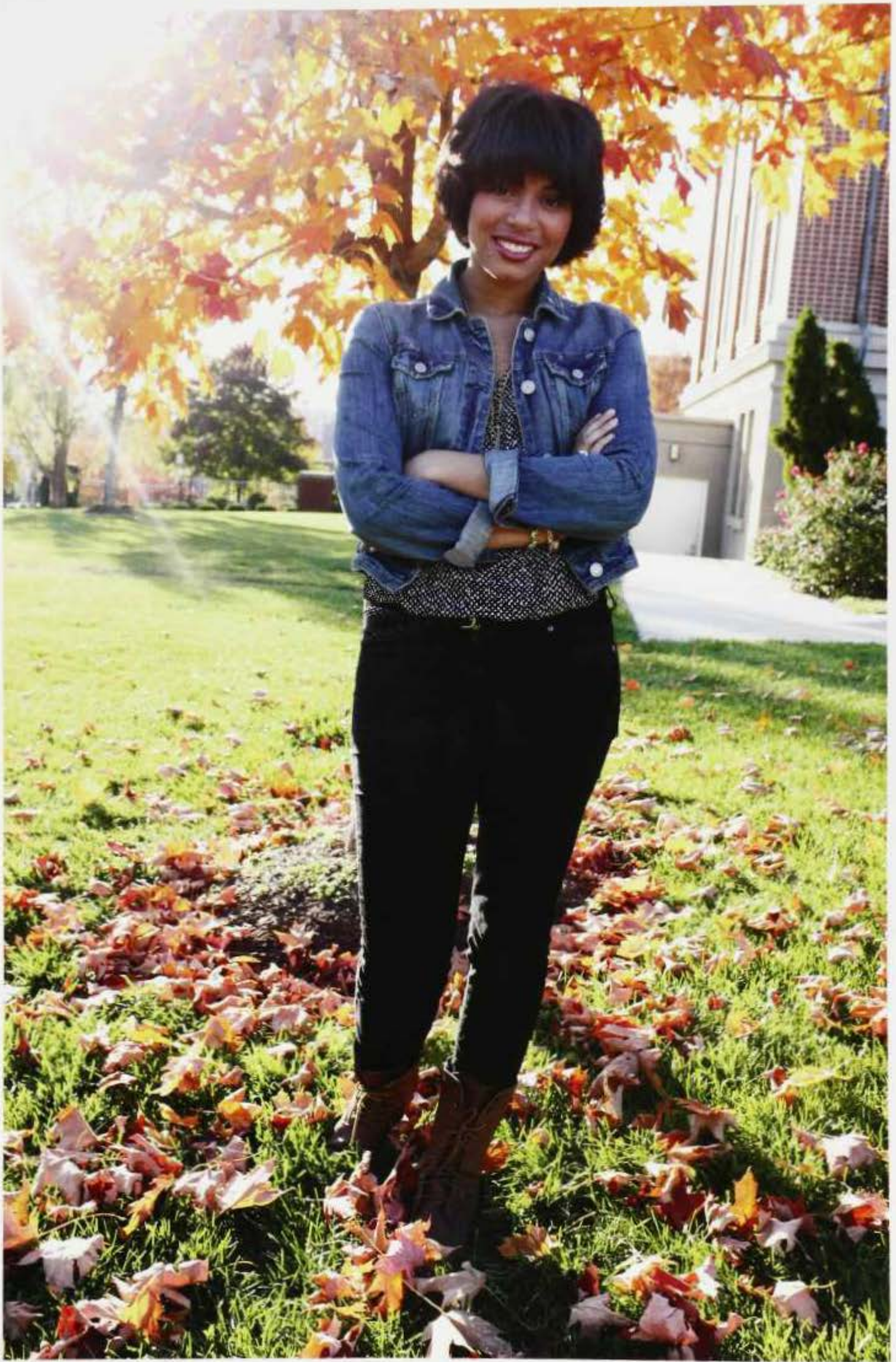

UGSA: THE LAST OF A DYING BREED

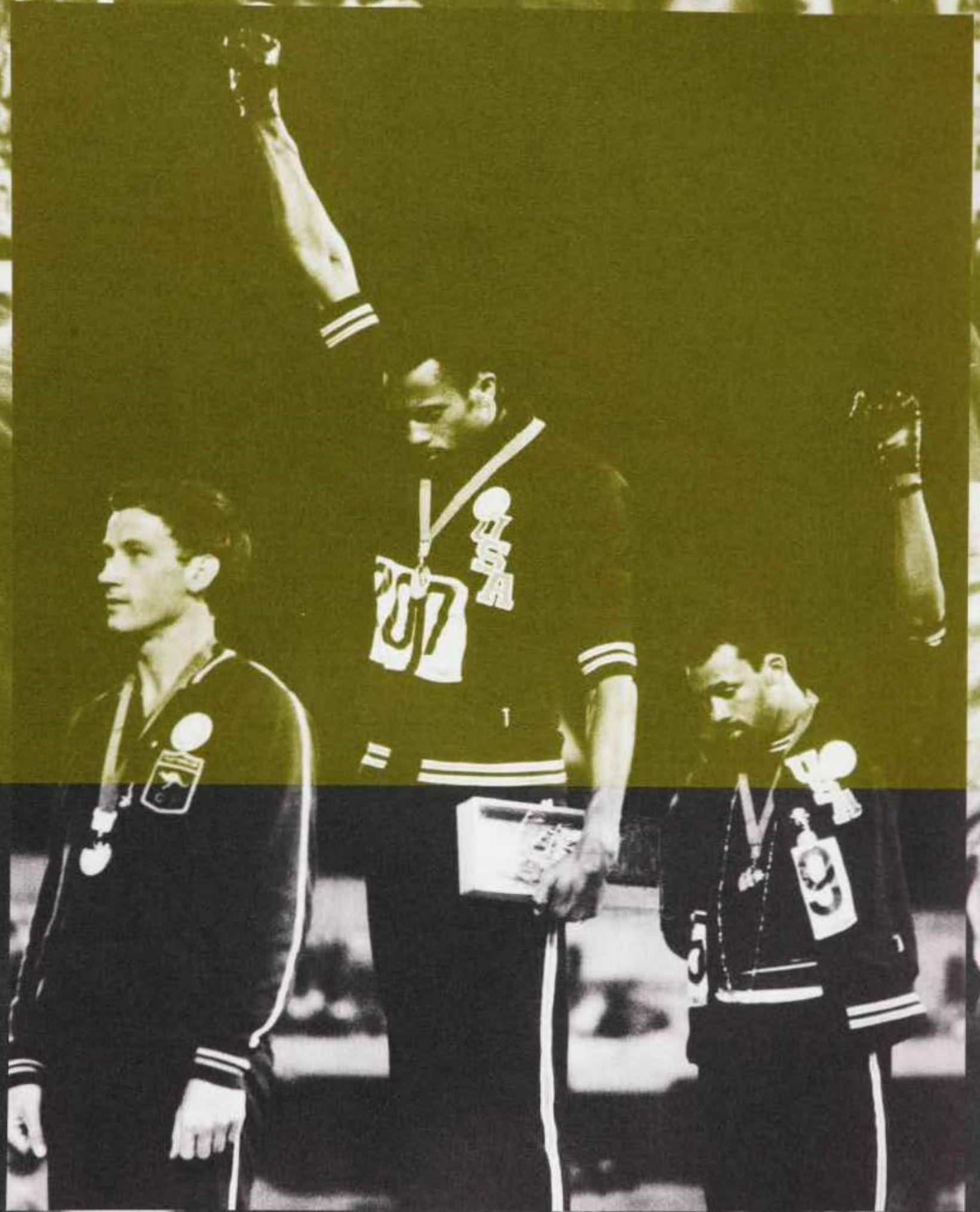

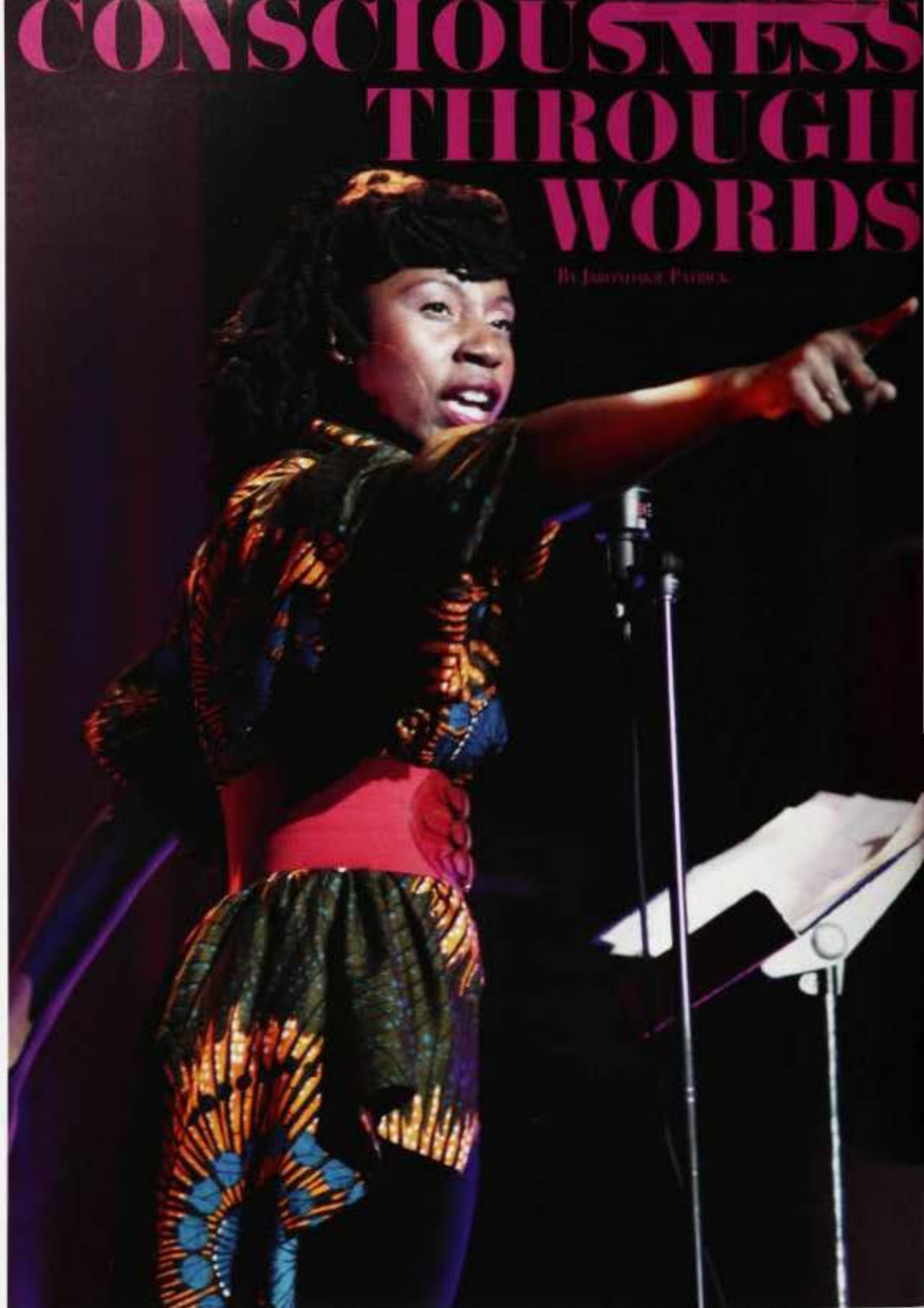

Despite the surprise performance by Travis Porter at the end, the topic of discussion among people exiting the venue was still the competition outcome. Let the debates begin.

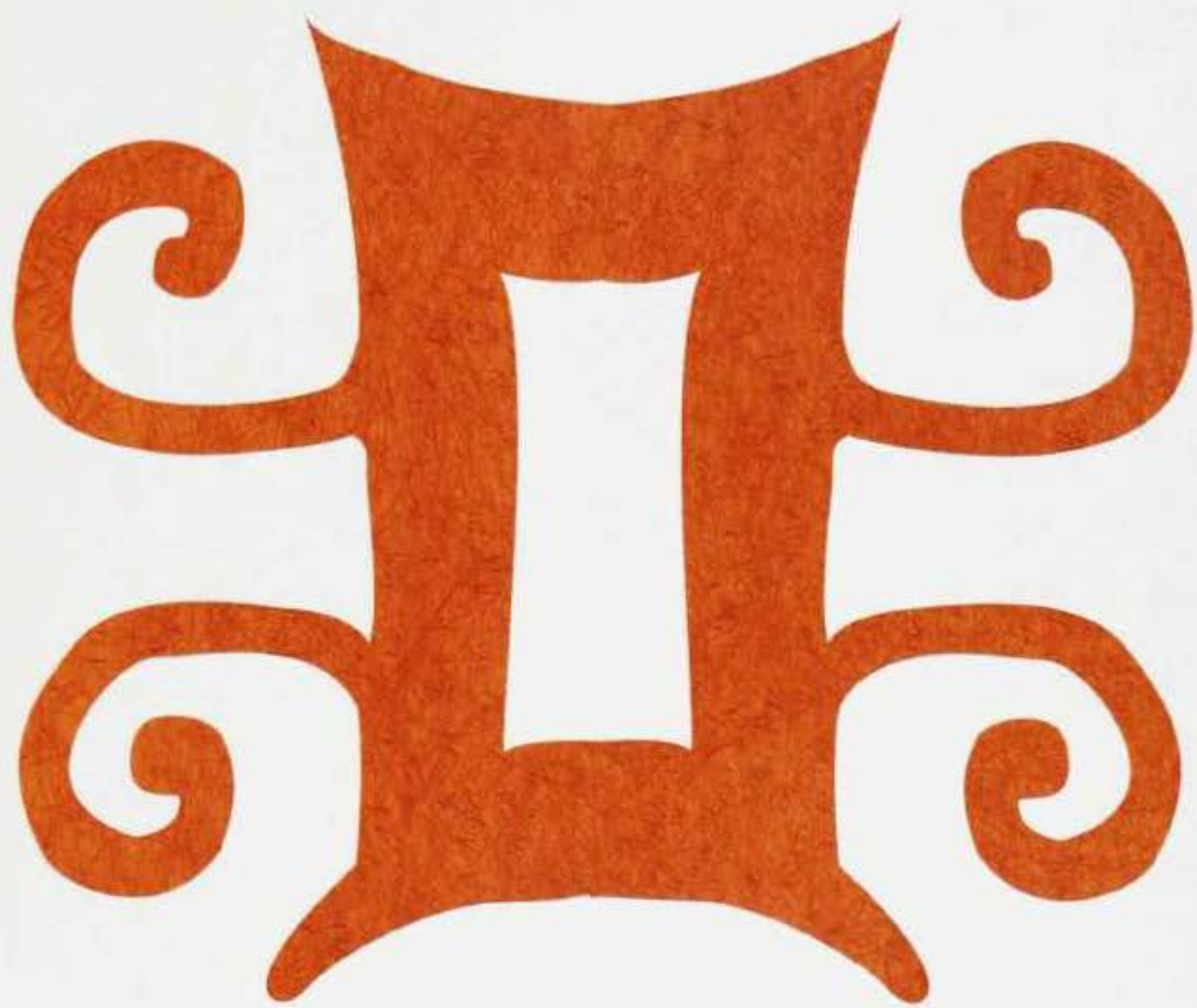

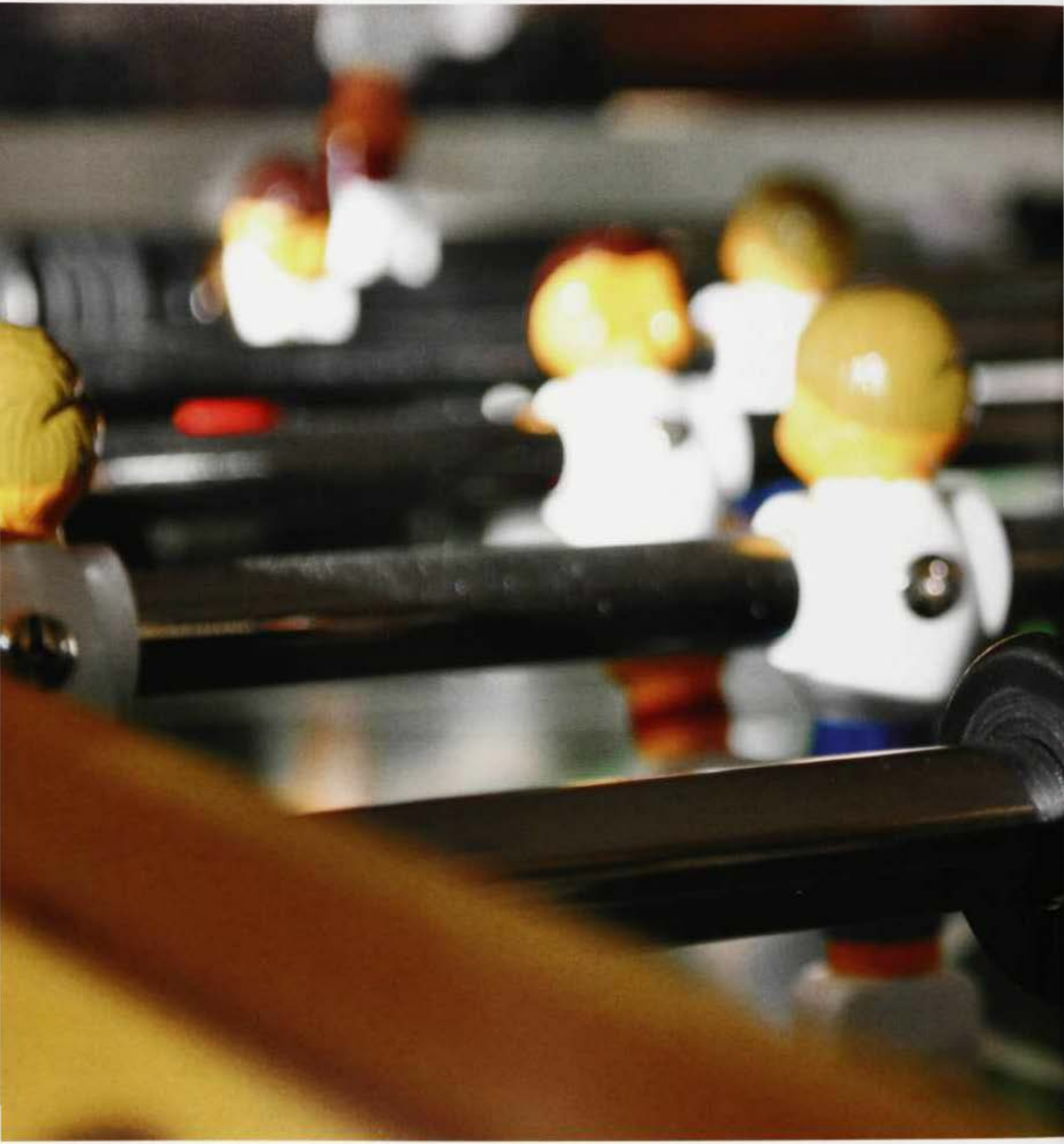

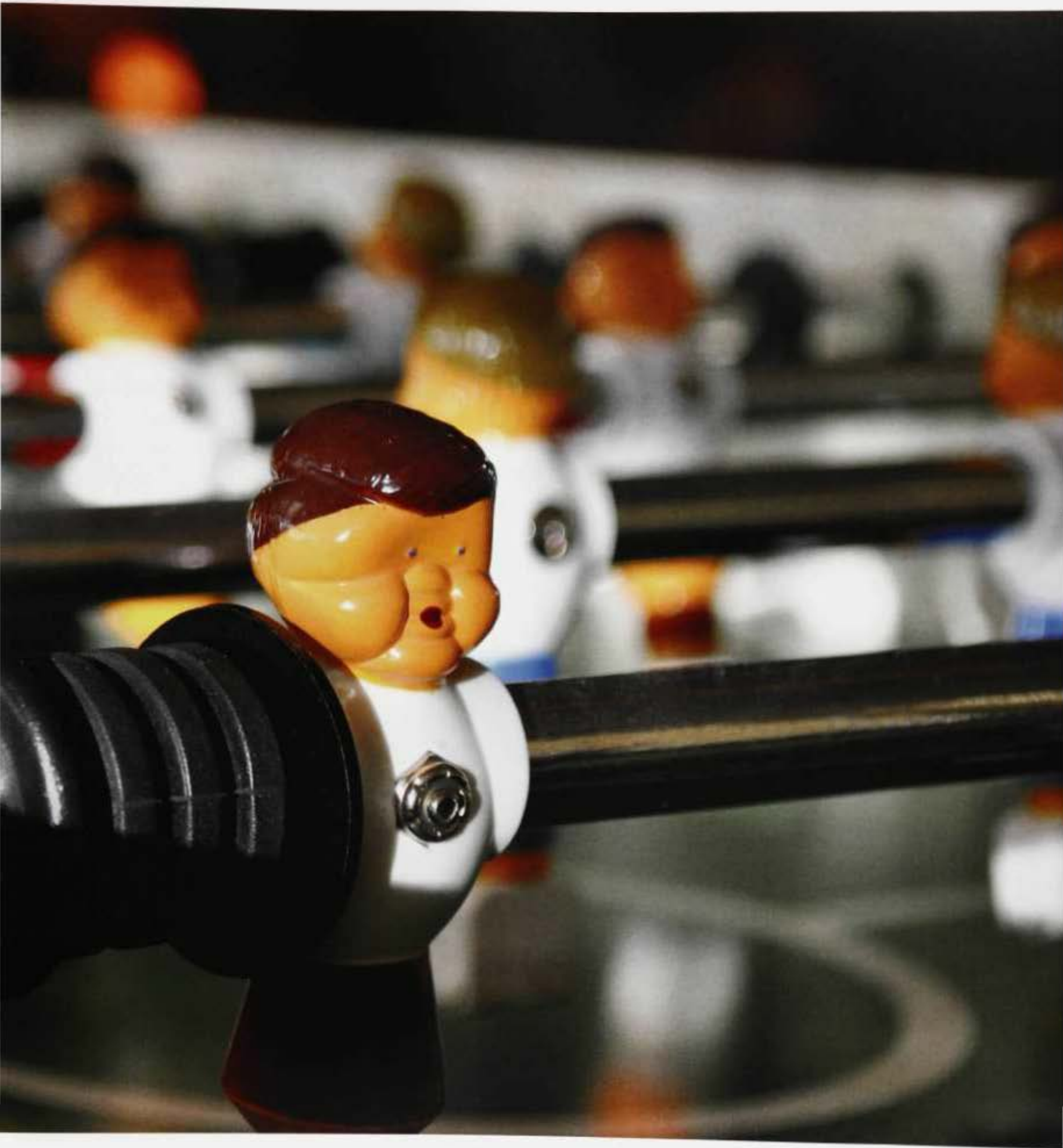

Keith Pough: I fell in love when I was like, 9, but I've been around the game since I was 3. I started off as a ball boy around 5 or 6 and my pops was the head coach. Around the age of 6 or 7 I started playing recreational football for a local team.

BY: HOW HAS YOUR FAMILY SUPPORTED YOU AS YOU'VE EXCELLED IN SPORTS?

KP: Yeah they support me in everything I do if it's the right decision. Actually, my mom and pops moved up to Largo, MD just so they could be closer to the games being that everyone has graduated and is out of the house. My mom is probably my biggest fan.

BY: HAVE YOU MISSED SOUTH CAROLINA SINCE THEY'VE MOVED?

KP: I miss home. I'm a country boy at heart, so I'm not really too fond of the city life, but it's a different experience meeting new people. Home is definitely where the heart is.

BY: HOW MANY COLLEGES WERE INTERESTED IN YOU COMING OUT OF HIGH SCHOOL?

KP: Every school in our conference: Norfolk State, Morgan State, SC State, etc. I had an offer from LSU, Gardner Webb, a military school back home, Vanderbilt, a partial offer from Clemson, New Mexico State, and a couple community colleges. I had a number of schools to pick from.

BY: SO, WHY HOWARD?

KP: To make a long story short, one of the coaches that recruited me and also played at Howard, he was from Orangeburg. He coached my uncle, who was one of my childhood idols growing up that I watched play football at South Carolina State. We had an instant connection. I felt like I was supposed to be here. Also, my mom is big on education because my mom and pops are both teachers. She was more focused on me getting an education and having a plan B than just relying solely on football. She told me that if I go to Howard I pretty much could get a job anywhere. She probably had the biggest influence on me choosing Howard.

BY: WHAT HAS YOUR EXPERIENCE BEEN LIKE PLAYING AT HOWARD?

YP: It's been a rough one. Coming from a winning high school and coming into Howard, it's been tough. You have to take the good with the bad and right now we're

turning it around and getting it back to how it's supposed to be, you know, back to when Howard was Howard in all aspects, academically and athletically.

BY: WHAT VALUES OR MORALS DID YOU GROW UP WITH AND HOW HAS IT SHAPED YOU?

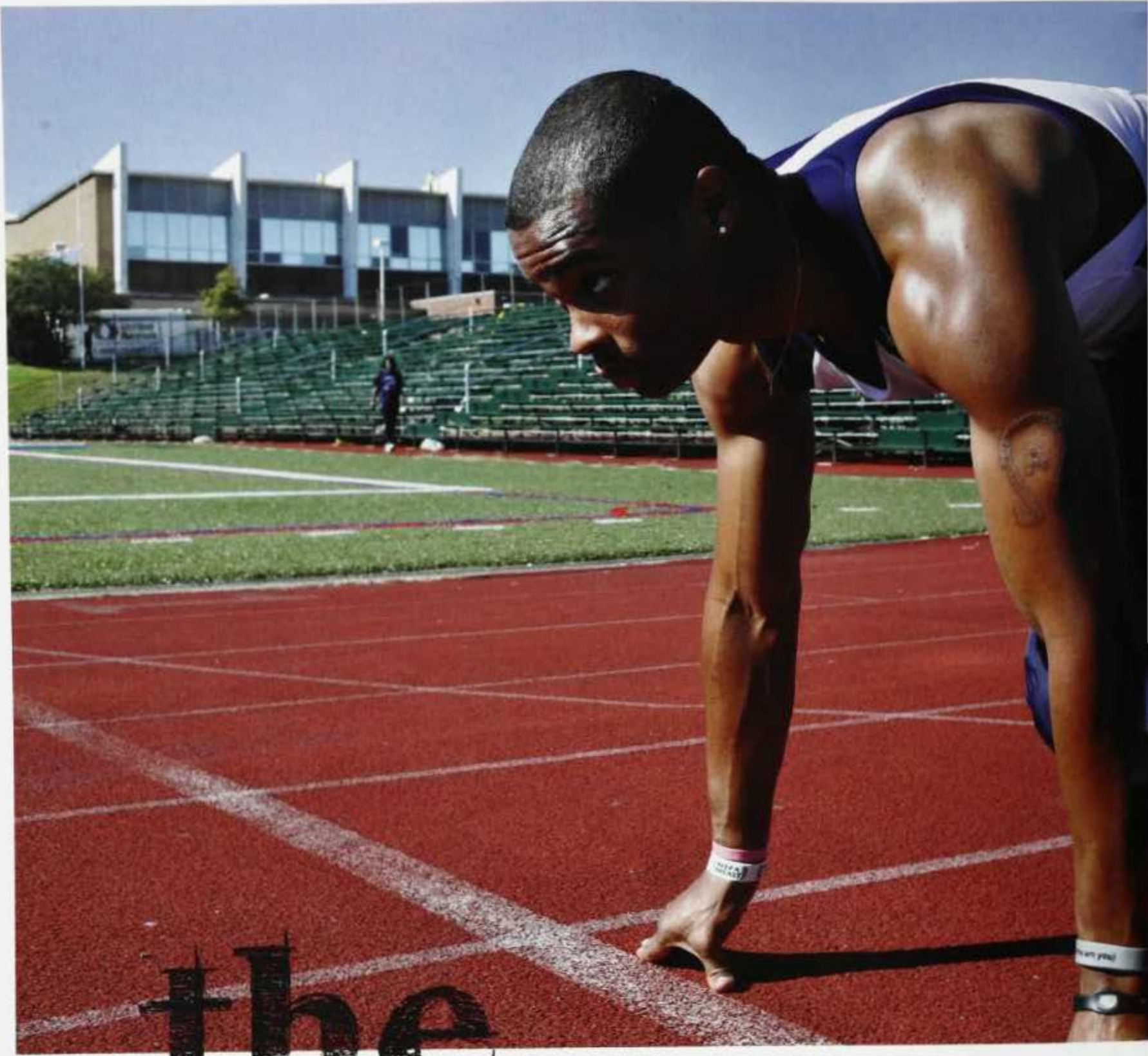
KP: I was born and raised in the church. My father is a minister; my mother's a missionary. God is the head of my life and I'm big on religion and Christianity. 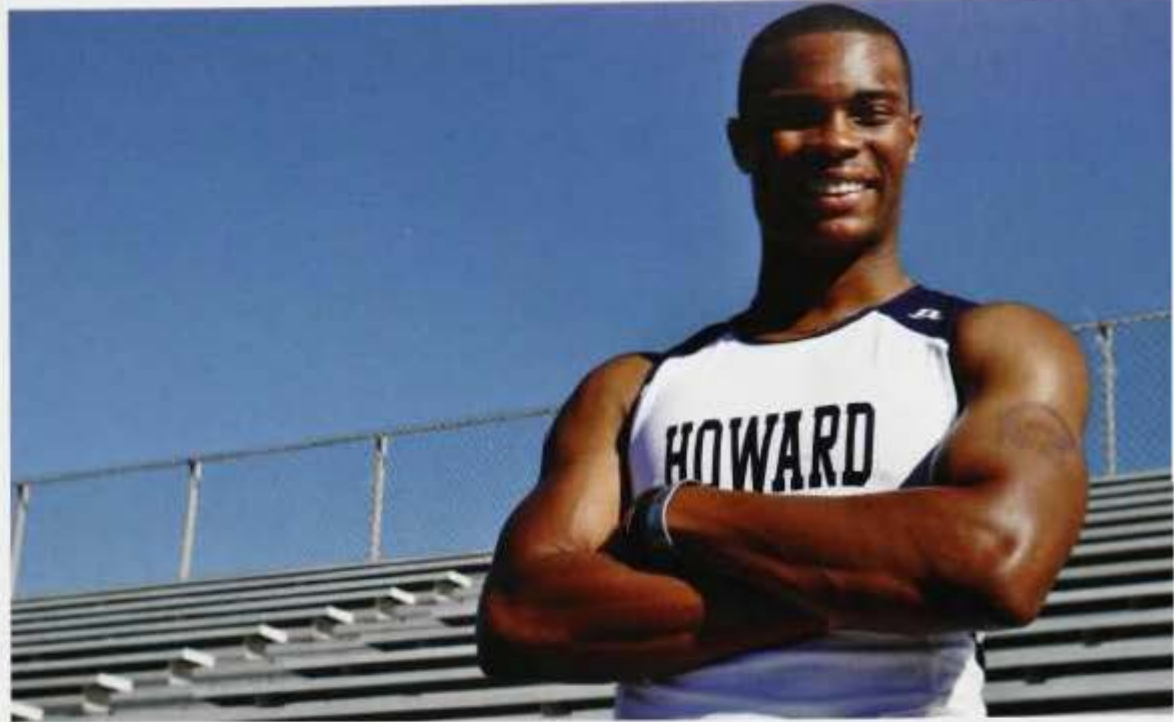

Picture this. Vaughn Holland sets his bag on the bleachers of Greene Stadium and steps onto the red polyurethane track every morning before most of his peers even breach consciousness. As he runs along the circumference of the track, to the onlooker there is little trace of fatigue, just the passion in his eyes as he speeds on by.

In reality, Holland, a senior biology major from North Carolina and high jumper on the Howard University track team, has to juggle a full day of classes and multiple practices on the daily.

"I HAVE TO BE A LOT MORE DISCIPLINED THAN YOUR AVERAGE STUDENT, YOUR NON-ATHLETE STUDENT," HE SAID. "WITH PRACTICES, MEETS, JUST BEING FATIGUED IN GENERAL, AND STILL HAVING TO GO TO CLASS, DO THE WORK, AND THEN GO TO PRACTICE, IT'S TOUGH."


In addition to his academic life, his social life has to adjust to his strict schedule. In the spring, the track team is gone almost every weekend, meaning no Friday night parties for Holland. "You can't do everything that everybody else does, but I still have friends and I'm involved in other things," he said. Apart from the track team, he holds membership on the Reslife Green Team, the HU Capoeira Club, Ubiquity Inc, and Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Holland uses the days he has fewer classes or some weekends to make time for his friends.

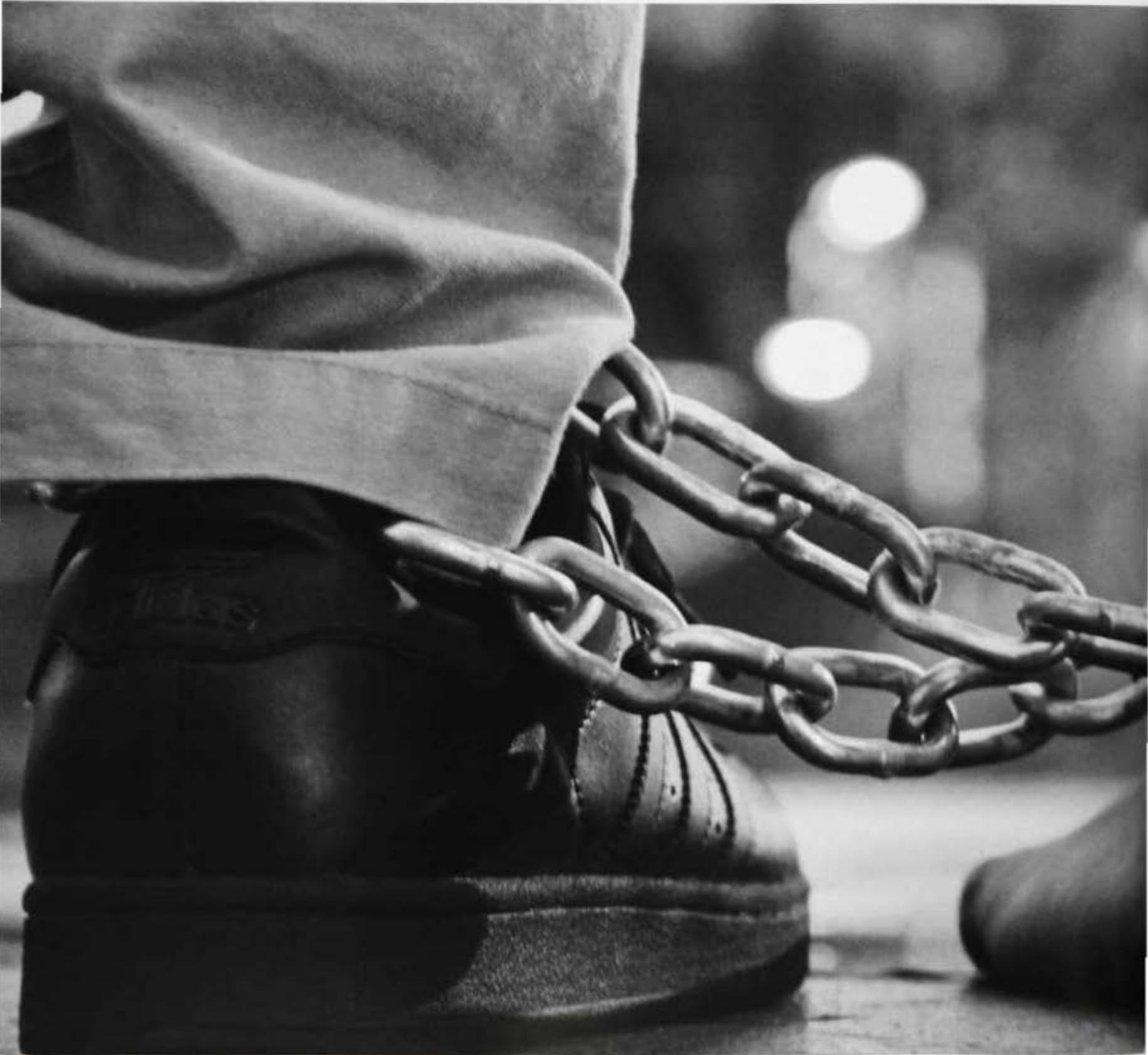

It's hard not to understand the hardships that come along with being on a sports scholarship. It's ends up being a game of time management; you're managing school, practice, social life and rest. Missing practices and classes can ultimately leave you without a scholarship and struggling to pay for classes. "The hardest thing about being on sports scholarships is facing setbacks like injuries," Lundi said. "When injuries occur, they can lead to bigger issues such as affecting your mental aspect, losing your scholarship, missing classes, and so on. You always put your body at risk, so it's something that you are always aware of." Though grateful for his scholarship, if he could change anything about it, he would make it renewable on a yearly basis, and make it a guaranteed four years.

Lundi spoke of alternatives to attaining a college education had he not received a scholarship. "If I didn't have a sports scholarship, I would be in a bilingual or French institution in Montreal, QC, Canada pursuing a degree in business," he said.

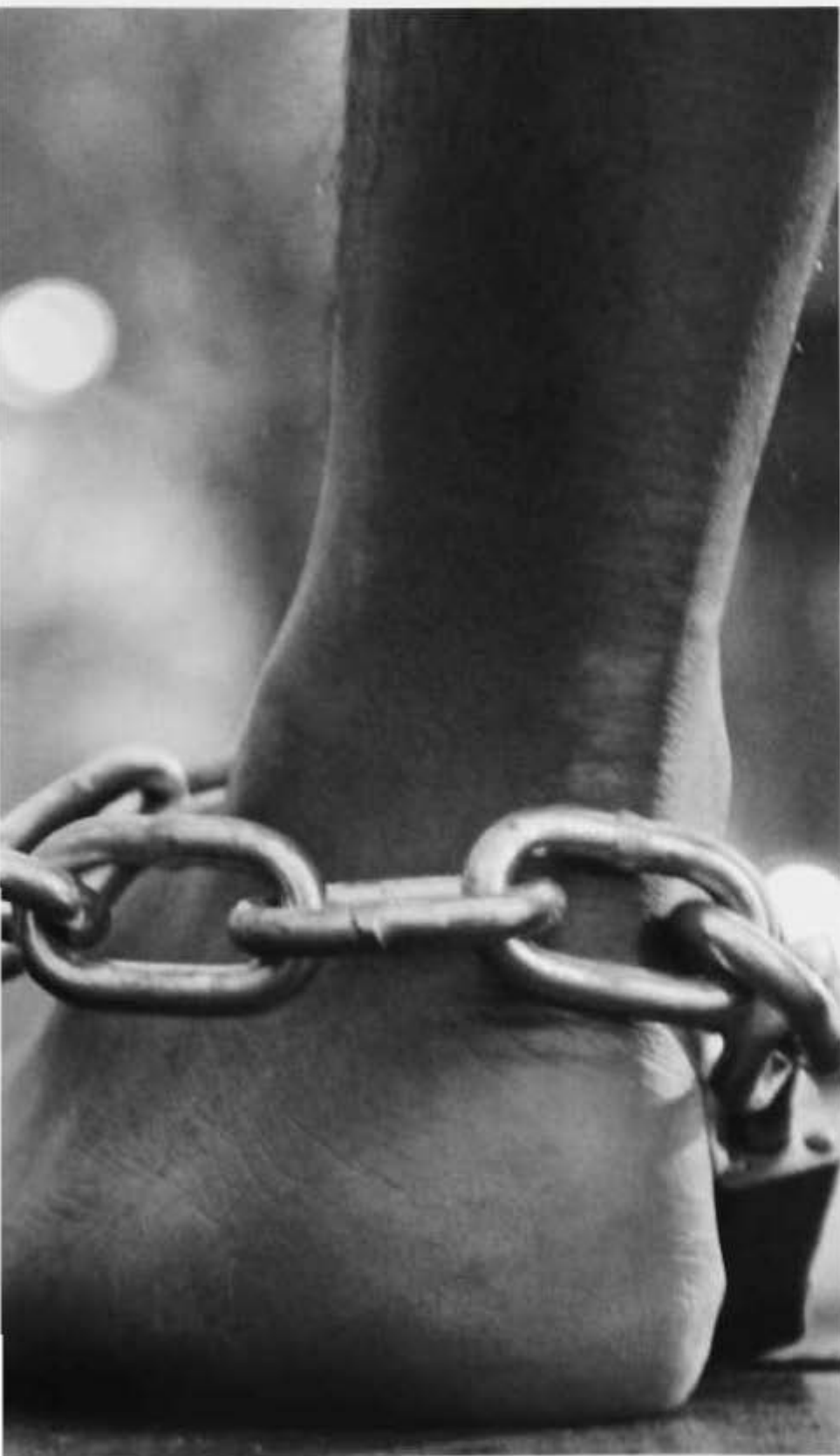
This goes to show that a college education is attainable through many different means, but you definitely have to be ready to work hard for it.

Sweat beads from their black foreheads drip down to their clammy palms clutching their family members as memories leading up to this moment speed through their mind. Did they do everything they could? Are they strong enough to make it through? Despite the loaded emotion in their doubts and fears, these questions are irrelevant. Their fate has been decided. Men—sharing a shade of white—owning property, land, and influence, draped in fine fabric, accessorized with hints of wealth, regulate these black men's future. They've put these black men through demanding physical trials away from their hometowns, studying their capabilities and calculating their utility and value. As the crowd watches with anticipation, these black men stand antsy and vulnerable with no choice but to go where they are told, leaving a life, their former life, behind.

To some critics, sports drafts are merely 21st-century slave auctions with HD cameras, polls, and Budweiser sponsorships. Well-built African-American men being publicly acquired by white men oozing with capital to make billions of dollars from the exertion of their athleticism makes some people uncomfortable, to say the least. Those exhibiting abilities of endurance, raw talent, and a malleable nature are most sought after by reputable, reworked plantations. The most promising ones are chosen first in the draft, invalidating the necessity for a black man's top-quality education. These men must simply perform well under pressure in order to prove their vitality and progress off the cotton field bench. Maybe this is a

bit too familiar.

But aren't those million-dollar contracts our athletes are signing the contracts that ensure cushy living for at least three years? Three years they can use to spoil their mothers (whom they will actually see again), learn to make investments, and brand themselves. And I don't recall Dr. Carr mentioning anything about white men being auctioned off to other white men in my Intro to African-American Studies class. This is different. Sports players fantasize about making the draft. They work two-a-days when they are fourteen years old with hopes they'll be the first one picked, even if it means not having a say in what team they go to. Before we cry "racism!" maybe we should celebrate the achievements of these athletes and recognize that they are in many ways throwing off shackles and writing their own history. That seems like a fair trade.

It started the day that he was walking in a march his first semester at Howard led by his good friend, then Mr. Howard University, Melech Thomas. Seeing someone in a leadership position with such freedom and influence inspired him.

After premature apprehension and with Thomas' avid persistence and encouragement, Daniel Cokes prepared his mind to take his first steps on his road to royalty.

The first stop for the senior, Pre-Law student from Dallas, TX was earning the crown of Mr. School of Communications in 2010, which presented its share of challenges in the process. "I had a lot to get used to, a lot of practices everyday," he said. "I had to do a lot of soul searching to find out what would be my talent, I wanted for whatever I did to be authentic and to tell my testimony."

His solid platform and heartfelt monologue won the hearts of the audience and, more importantly, the judges. The win thrust the scholar into the limelight and ushered him into the direct line of Howard leadership.

The only moves left for Cokes to make were upward. His eyes were set on acquiring Melech's old title. "After being Mr. School of Communications and walking in that leadership, a lot was on the line," Cokes said. "I feel like I did a good job in the School of C pageant, so the hardest part was finding something better but just as unique."

His victory at the Mr. and Miss Howard University Pageant, entitled "A Night at the Oscars," was a pivotal point in his life. All of the hardships he'd endured in life, being kicked out of elementary school and doubters of his success, hit him at that moment.

It was hard for him to articulate his emotions when his name was announced and the sash was put across his shoulders. "How can I put this into words?" he began. "I just remember crying and crying because the moment was like how peoples' lives flash before their eyes, but in a good way. I thought about everything I went through to get to this point. All I could really do was cry and thank God."

Since then, Cokes has made a conscious effort to best uphold the title and be the face of his soon-to-be alma mater. He has developed incomparable relationships with staff and students and has invested all of his energy and emotions into the betterment of the university.

"I get so preoccupied with what I am doing to make sure I'm leaving a legacy with my position, that sometimes I let it distract me from my destiny. You care so much that you don't know when to stop."

THE FACT IS....

IN NOVEMBER 1866, SHORTLY AFTER THE END OF THE CIVIL WAR, MEMBERS OF THE FIRST CONGREGATIONAL SOCIETY OF WASHINGTON CONSIDERED ESTABLISHING A THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY FOR THE EDUCATION OF AFRICAN-AMERICAN CLERGYMEN. WITHIN A FEW WEEKS, THE CONCEPT HAD EXPANDED TO INCLUDE A PROVISION FOR ESTABLISHING A UNIVERSITY. WITHIN TWO YEARS, THE UNIVERSITY CONSISTED OF THE COLLEGES OF LIBERAL ARTS AND MEDICINE. THE NEW INSTITUTION WAS NAMED FOR GENERAL OLIVER O. HOWARD, CIVIL WAR HERO, WHO WAS BOTH A FOUNDER OF THE UNIVERSITY AND, AT THE TIME, COMMISSIONER OF THE FREEDMEN'S BUREAU. THE UNIVERSITY CHARTER, AS ENACTED BY CONGRESS AND SUBSEQUENTLY APPROVED BY PRESIDENT ANDREW JOHNSON ON MARCH 2, 1867, DESIGNATED HOWARD UNIVERSITY AS "A UNIVERSITY FOR THE EDUCATION OF YOUTH IN THE LIBERAL ARTS AND SCIENCES." IN 1879, CONGRESS APPROVED A SPECIAL APPROPRIATION FOR THE UNIVERSITY. THE CHARTER WAS AMENDED IN 1928 TO AUTHORIZE AN ANNUAL FEDERAL APPROPRIATION FOR CONSTRUCTION, DEVELOPMENT, IMPROVEMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF THE UNIVERSITY.

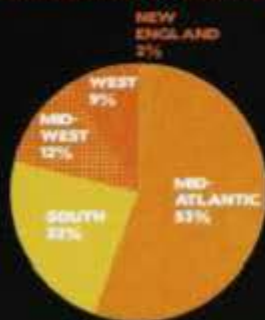

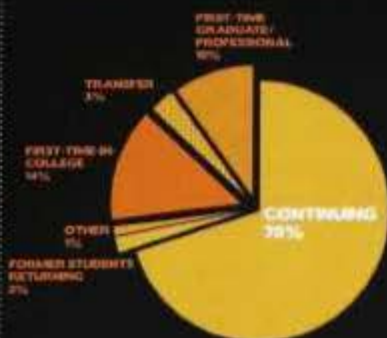

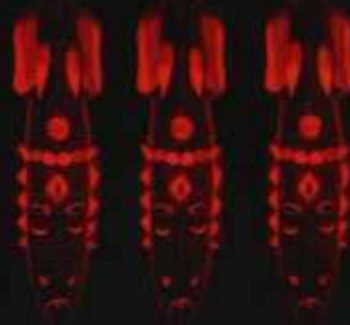

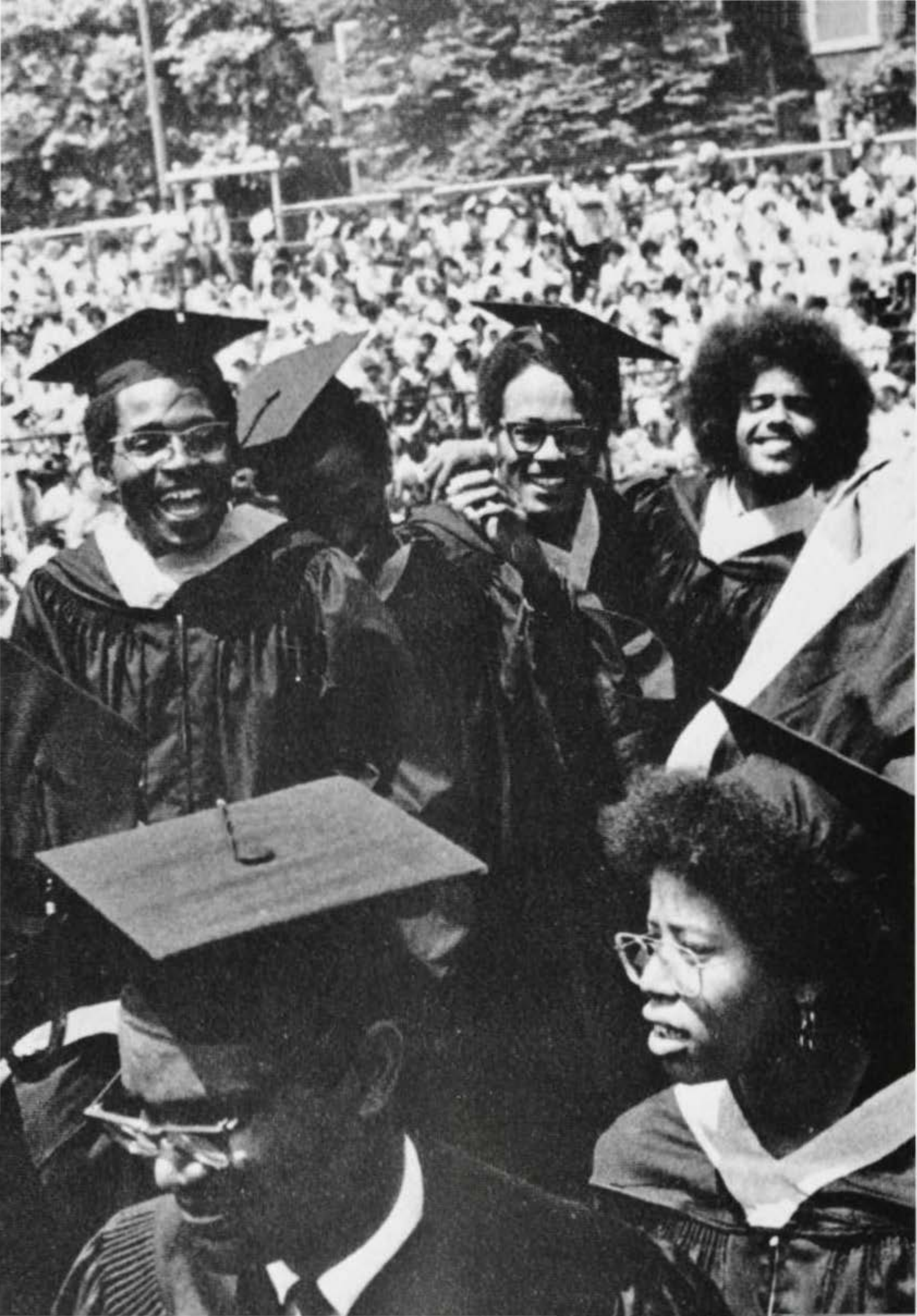

From the year 2000 until now, the District's population has jumped from 572,000 to over 600,000, according to the most recent Census data.

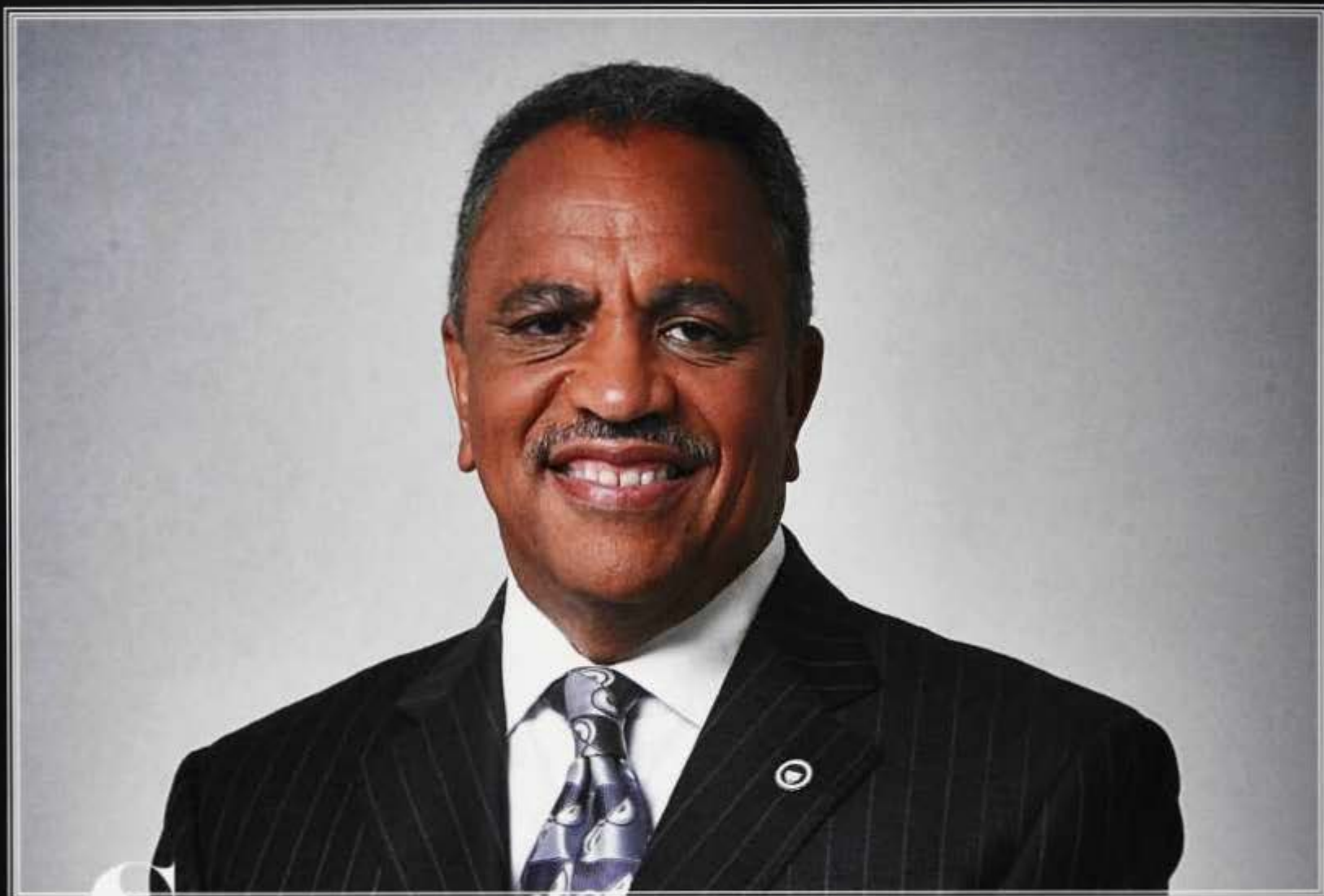




PRESIDENT'S CABINET

SIDNEY A. RIBEAU

PRESIDENT OF HOWARD UNIVERSITY



Sidney A. Ribeau, Ph.D., is the 16th President of Howard University and the sixth African American to serve as its Chief Executive Officer. Since taking office in August 2008, Dr. Ribeau has championed improving services to students through his Students First Campaign, strengthening research with emphasis in the STEM disciplines, enhancing the University's international footprint and building upon a legacy of service.

He was President of Bowling Green State University (BGSU) in Bowling Green, Ohio, for 13 years before coming to Howard. Under his leadership, BGSU was recognized for its residential learning communities, values-based education and innovative graduate programs.

President Ribeau began his career in 1976 as a professor of communication studies at California State University, Los Angeles. Eight years later, after being honored as an outstanding teacher and student adviser, he became chair of the University's Pan African Studies Department. He held that position until 1987, when he was named Dean of Undergraduate Studies at California State University, San Bernardino. Three years later, he became Dean of the College of Liberal Arts at California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo campus. In 1992, he was named Vice President for Academic Affairs at California State Polytechnic University, Pomona, a position he held until his appointment to BGSU.

On a national level, President Ribeau serves on the boards of the Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association-College Retirement Equities Fund (TIAA-CREF); Worthington Industries; and the Committee on Underrepresented Groups and the Expansion of the Science and Engineering Workforce Pipeline, under the aegis of the Committee on Science, Engineering and Public Policy. He has served on the boards of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the United Way, the Regional Growth Partnership, the Andersons Inc. (Maumee, OH), and Convergys Corp. Some of his numerous honors include distinguished alumnus awards from Wayne State University and University of Illinois, scholarly recognition from the National Communication Association and the President's Award from the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators.

President Ribeau received a B.S. degree from Wayne State University, and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in interpersonal and group communication from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. He and his wife, Dr. Paula Whetsel-Ribeau, are the proud parents of two daughters and one son.

LASALLE D. LEFALL, Jr., M.D., F.A.C.S.

INTERIM PROVOST AND SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT



Dr. Lefall, the Charles R. Drew professor of Surgery, Howard University College of Medicine, was born May 22, 1930, in Tallahassee, Florida but grew up in Quincy, Florida, attending its public schools. In 1948, at the age of 15, he was awarded the B. S. degree, with greatest distinction (summa cum laude), from Florida A&M College. In 1952 he received an M.D. degree from Howard University College of Medicine ranking first in his class. Completing his surgical training at Freedmen's Hospital (now Howard University Hospital) in 1957, he then took a surgical oncology fellowship at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, 1957-59.

He began his military career at the rank of Captain, M.C., serving as Chief of General Surgery, U. S. Army Hospital, Munich, Germany, 1960-61. He received an Honorable Discharge in December 1961 with the rank of Major. His membership on Howard's faculty began in 1962 progressing to Professor and Chairman, Department of Surgery in 1970 – a position he held for 25 years.

He was named the first Charles R. Drew professor in 1992. The LaSalle D. Lefall, Jr. Surgical Society was formed in 1995 and the Lefall Chair in Surgery was established in 1996. He received the first Heritage Award from the Society of Surgical Oncology in 2001. The Biennial LaSalle D. Lefall Jr. Cancer Prevention and Control Award, is sponsored by the Intercultural Cancer Council and the MD Anderson Cancer Center. The Pugh-Lefall Surgical Educational Fellowship (sponsored by a grant from Dr. Carla Pugh, HUCM '92 and former surgical resident) is awarded to outstanding sophomores with an interest in surgery and surgical education research. The LaSalle D. Lefall, Jr., Komen Fellowship in Health Disparities was established by the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation in 2006. The LaSalle D. Lefall, Jr., Learning Resource Center (made possible by a major contribution from Dr. Stephen Rush, HUCM '83 on behalf of his class) was established in the College of Medicine in 2006. The Howard University Press published his memoirs, "No Boundaries – A Cancer Surgeon's Odyssey" in 2005. The 2009 Howard medical school class members named him as Outstanding Faculty member during their Long White Coat Ceremony. In 2009, other honors were 1) Inaugural Recipient Charles R. Drew Award of Excellence from Charles Drew School of Medicine and Science 6/3/09 and 2) Special Recognition and Commendation as Chair, C-Change from 1998-2009, given at annual meeting, Kennebunkport, Maine 6/11/2009. (Invitation from President George H.W. Bush on occasion of his 85th birthday.)

He was Chair of the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation (now Susan G. Komen for the Cure) from 2002-2007. Currently he is Chair: 1) President's Cancer Panel; 2) member, Board of Trustees, Dana Farber Cancer Institute and 3) Chair, Susan G. Komen for the Cure 2011-. In 2011 he received the W. Montague Cobb Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Medical Association and was named a member of the Board, the Morris and Gwendolyn Caltritz Foundation.

DR. BARBARA GRIFFIN

VICE PRESIDENT FOR STUDENT AFFAIRS

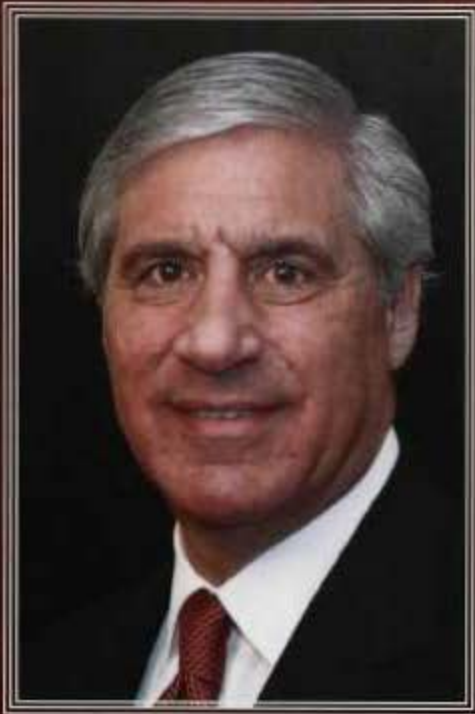


Dr. Barbara L.J. Griffin began her position as Vice President for Student Affairs in January 2010. She previously served as Associate Provost of the University and Associate Dean in the College of Arts and Sciences, working closely with undergraduate and graduate students. As associate dean, Dr. Griffin assisted in inaugurating the COAS Undergraduate Research Symposium as well as the Summer Study Abroad programs. Before coming to Howard in 1990, she taught African-American Literature, American Literature, and writing at Morgan State University, Towson State University, and Catonsville Community College in Maryland. During the University's last accreditation process, Dr. Griffin, then serving as associate provost, was a member of the 2009 University-Wide Self-Study Steering Committee and chaired the General Education Work Committee. Dr. Griffin has written a number of publications in her academic field as well as a textbook for freshman students entitled, *Transitions* (2004; rev. 2006), published by Kendall/Hunt Publications.

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT AND SECRETARY



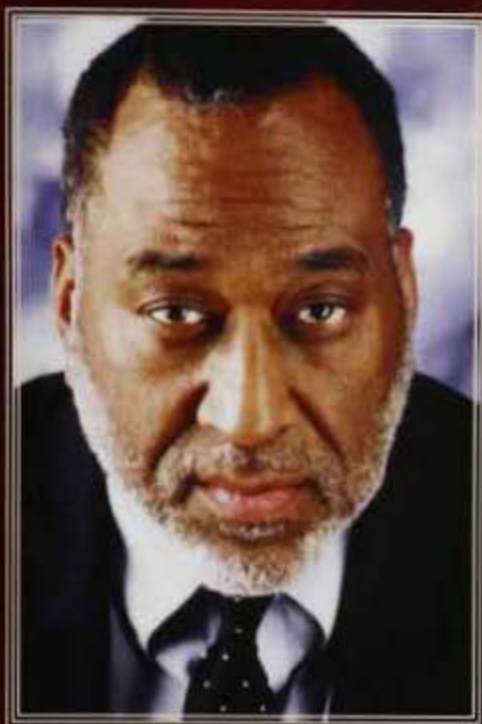

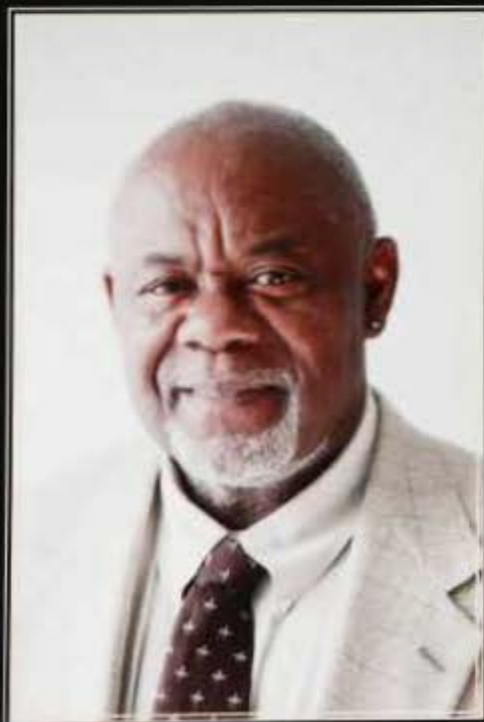

On March 8, 2011 Jones, best known as Jimmy Jones, was appointed to the Executive Vice President and Chief Human Resources Officer position at Howard University.

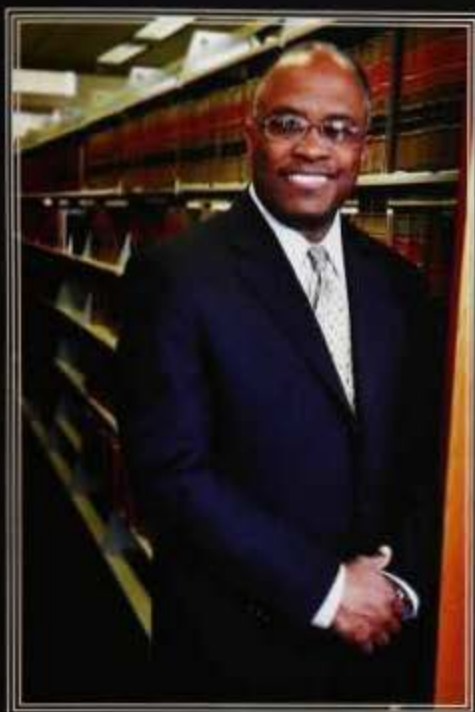

DR. WAYNE FREDRICK

INTERIM DEPUTY PROVOST AND SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT FOR HEALTH SCIENCES



Wayne A. I. Frederick, M.D., M.B.A. F.A.C.S. is the Deputy Provost for Howard University Health Sciences, the Director of Howard University's Cancer Center, and Professor in the Department of Surgery at Howard University College of Medicine. He initially joined Howard University in 2006 as an Associate Professor for the Department of Surgery.

Dr. Frederick's history with Howard University dates back to his college years where he left his homeland of Trinidad to join the University, ultimately matriculating in a combined BS/MD program and receiving his medical degree in six years, graduating at the age of 22. While completing his residency in General Surgery at Howard University Hospital, Dr. Frederick received several awards including the Chairman's Chief Resident of the Year Award. He completed his surgical oncology fellowship and post-doctoral research fellowship at MD Anderson Cancer Center, where he held the position of Chief Administrative Fellow.

In 2003, Dr. Frederick joined the faculty of the University of Connecticut Health Center where he held the roles of Associate Director of the Carole and Ray Naeg Comprehensive Cancer Center, Director of Surgical Oncology, and Assistant Professor for the Department of Surgery. He was also appointed to the position of Associate Program Director of the Integrated Residency Program where he was awarded the "Teacher of the Year Award" by both the residents and students for each of the three years that he was on the faculty. 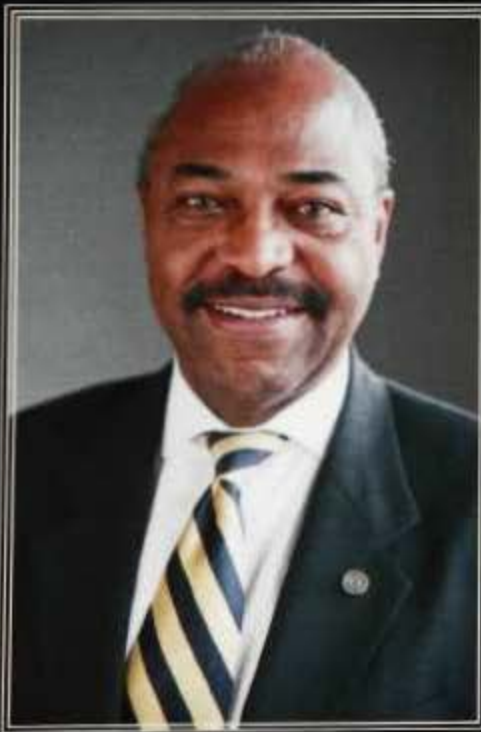

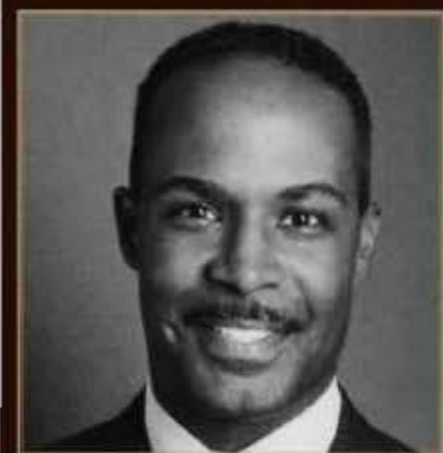

He began his teaching career in 1976 as a professor of communication studies at California State University, Los Angeles. Eight years later, after being honored as an outstanding teacher and student advisor, he became chair of the University's Pan African Studies Department. He held that position until 1987, when he was named Dean of Undergraduate Studies at California State University, San Bernardino. Three years later, he became Dean of the College of Liberal Arts at California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo campus. In 1992, he was named Vice President for Academic Affairs at California State Polytechnic University, Pomona, a position he held until his appointment to Bowling Green. Currently, he serves on the boards of the Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association-College Retirement Equities Fund (TIAA-CREF) and Worthington Industries. He has served on the boards of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the United Way, the Regional Growth Partnership, the Andersons Inc. in Muncie, and Convergys Corp. She directed the series Fame, Family Ties and Bronx Zoo, before signing on as director and producer for NBC's A Different World in 1988. She has extensive credits directing and producing for television, and has worked with Lena Horne, Sammy Davis Jr., James Earl Jones, Don Cheadle, Terrance Howard, Will Smith, Jada Pinkett Smith, Phylicia Rashad, Mariah Carey and Michael Jackson. She produced the Oscar-nominated Steven Spielberg epic film Amistad in 1997, and has choreographed the Academy Awards a record 10 times. She played Beneatha in the Tony Award winning production A Raisin in the Sun, and portrayed Anita in West Side Story, winning the Drama Desk award as Best Actress in a Musical. For her work in the title role of Sweet Charity, she was honored as the first recipient of the Astaire Award as Best Dancer. Her critically acclaimed Broadway directorial debut was an African American production of Tennessee William's classic, Cat On A Hot Tin Roof. She has been Artist in Residence at the Kennedy Center for over 15 years developing major works, including Omani...O Man! Representing America as Cultural Ambassador for Dance, she has fulfilled missions in China, India, and the Middle East. The founder of the Debbie Allen Dance Academy in Los Angeles, she devotes most of her life's work to the development and inspiration of young people in the Arts.



LARKYN ARNOLD, JR., a member since 2011, is an icon in the recording industry with a career of over four decades. His B.S. degree is from American University and his Juris Doctorate degree is from Howard University School of Law. He has achieved many firsts including: becoming one of the first African Americans hired as an attorney by any major entertainment company or law firm (Capitol) in 1970, before being promoted to Vice President; the first of his race to establish and run a self-contained black music division within a label (Capitol Records); the first black to have autonomous artists signing authority at a major label; first black to become Senior Vice President at any major label (Arista, then CBS/Sony Records); and first non-producing executive (of any race) to receive royalty points on artists he discovered or executive produced. He has the distinction of discovering and/or signing major talents such as Luther Vandross, Frankie Beverly and Maze, Natalie Cole, Peabo Bryson, Teena Marie, New Kids on the Block, Tavares, Hiroshima, Dr. Dre, Ice Cube, and others. He oversaw the marketing and promotion of the Michael Jackson Thriller album, selling over 25 million units worldwide. In 1988, he launched Arnold & Associates, one of the few wholly integrated legal and management teams in the record industry. He is a co-founder and six year Chairman of the Black Entertainment and Sports Lawyers Association; a former member of the Los Angeles Board of Governors of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences; a former trustee for the United Negro College Fund Ladders of Hope Program; and a former Los Angeles City Commissioner. He has received numerous honors including: HU Distinguished Alumni Award in 1990; Los Angeles NAACP Executive of the Year Award; Outstanding Graduate Award of HU School of Law; Congressional Black Caucus Outstanding Citizen Award; Thurgood Marshall Scholarship Award for Outstanding Community Leadership; and the Langston Bar Association Lawyer of the Year, and a member of its Hall of Fame, to name a few.



CHARLES M. BOYD, M.D., a member since 2010, is founder and medical director of the Boyd Cosmetic Surgical Institute, Birmingham, Michigan. He received his medical degree from Harvard University and M.B.A. degree from the University of Michigan, after graduating summa cum laude from Howard in three years. He holds double board certification and is a fellow of the American College of Surgeons. Some of his numerous appointments at the University of Michigan include Associate Chief of Staff, Chairman of the Risk Management Committee, and assistant professor in the Departments of Dermatology and Otolaryngology. He committed \$1 million to the Campaign for Howard, continuing his record of giving to Alma Mater from his undergraduate years when he co-founded a scholarship program to help students in need. Other philanthropic activities include: volunteer medical mission work in Kenya for the past ten years to repair children's cleft lips and palates; establishing a Math and Science Nurturing Program in Detroit; and currently serving as faculty career advisor, resident mentor program coordinator, and athletics department mentor in several mentoring programs. 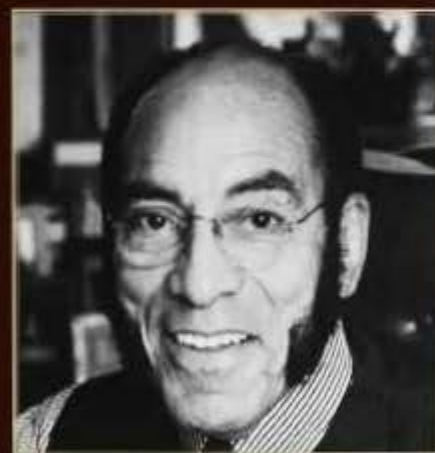

EARL G. GRAVES, JR., a member since 1989, is Chairman and Publisher of Earl G. Graves, Ltd., and Founder and Publisher of Black Enterprise in New York City. PATRICK T. Founded in 1995, The Hilliard Group was her first company. A former senior marketing executive with leading Fortune 500 corporations and entrepreneurial firms including Bloomingdale's, Gillette, and Pillsbury, she was the senior vice president of integrated marketing at Burrell Communications Group. 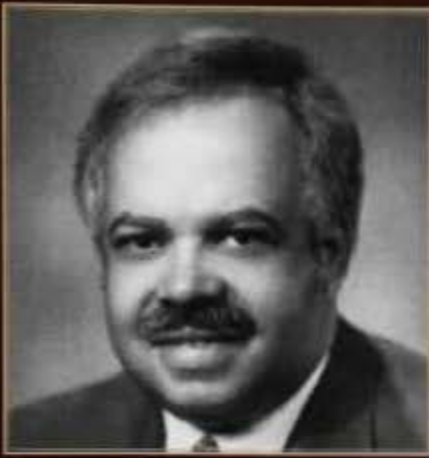

He also is the retired Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of AT&T Wireless Services. 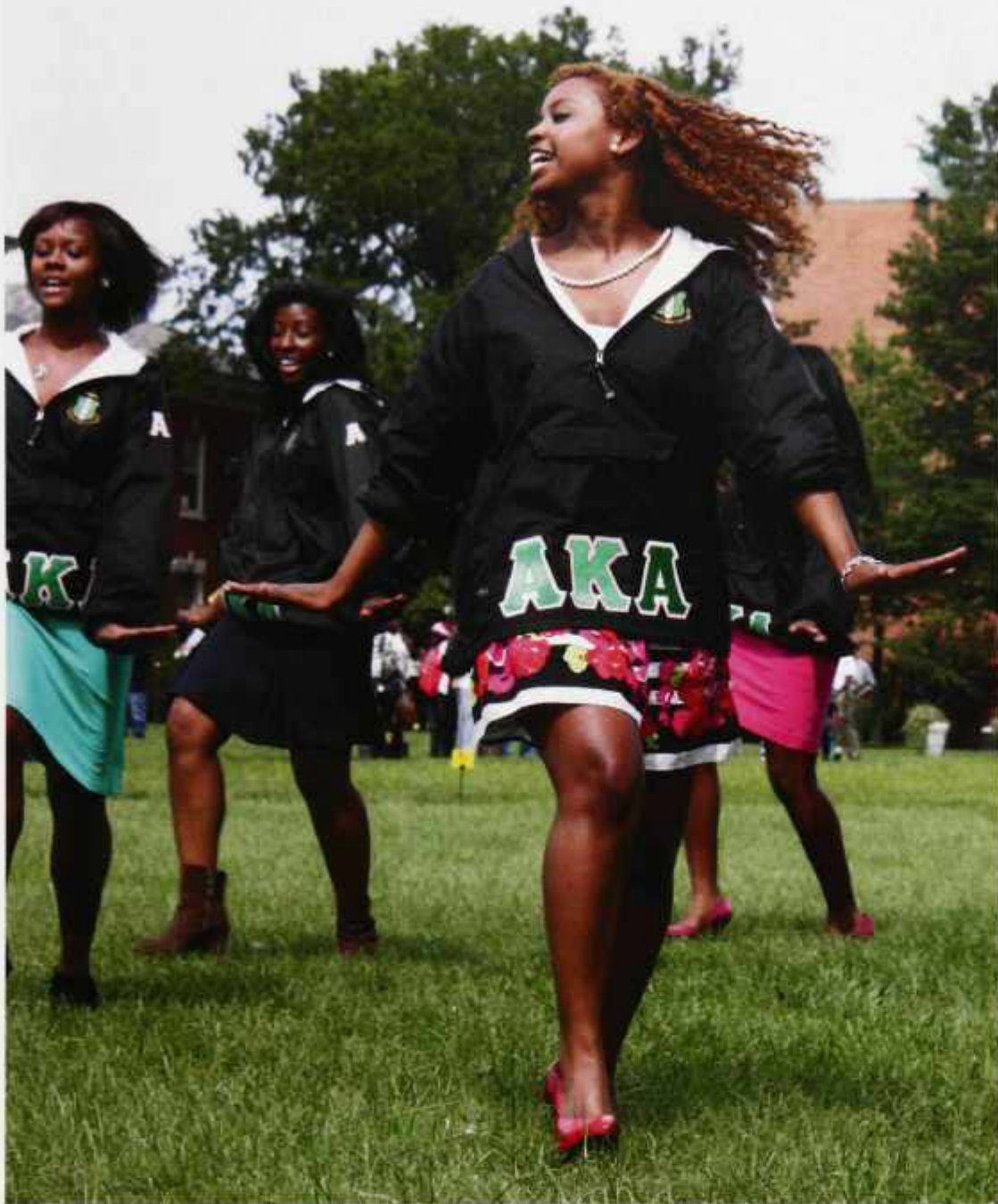






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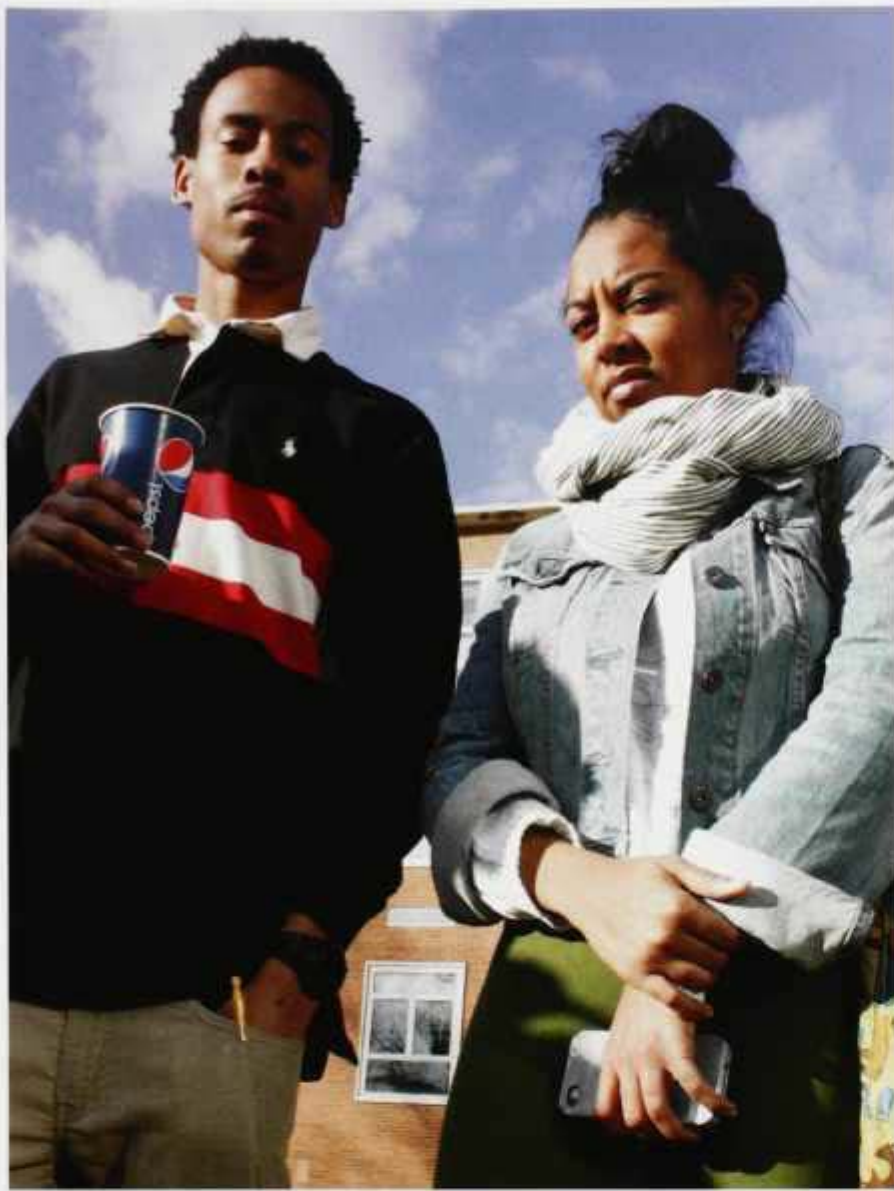

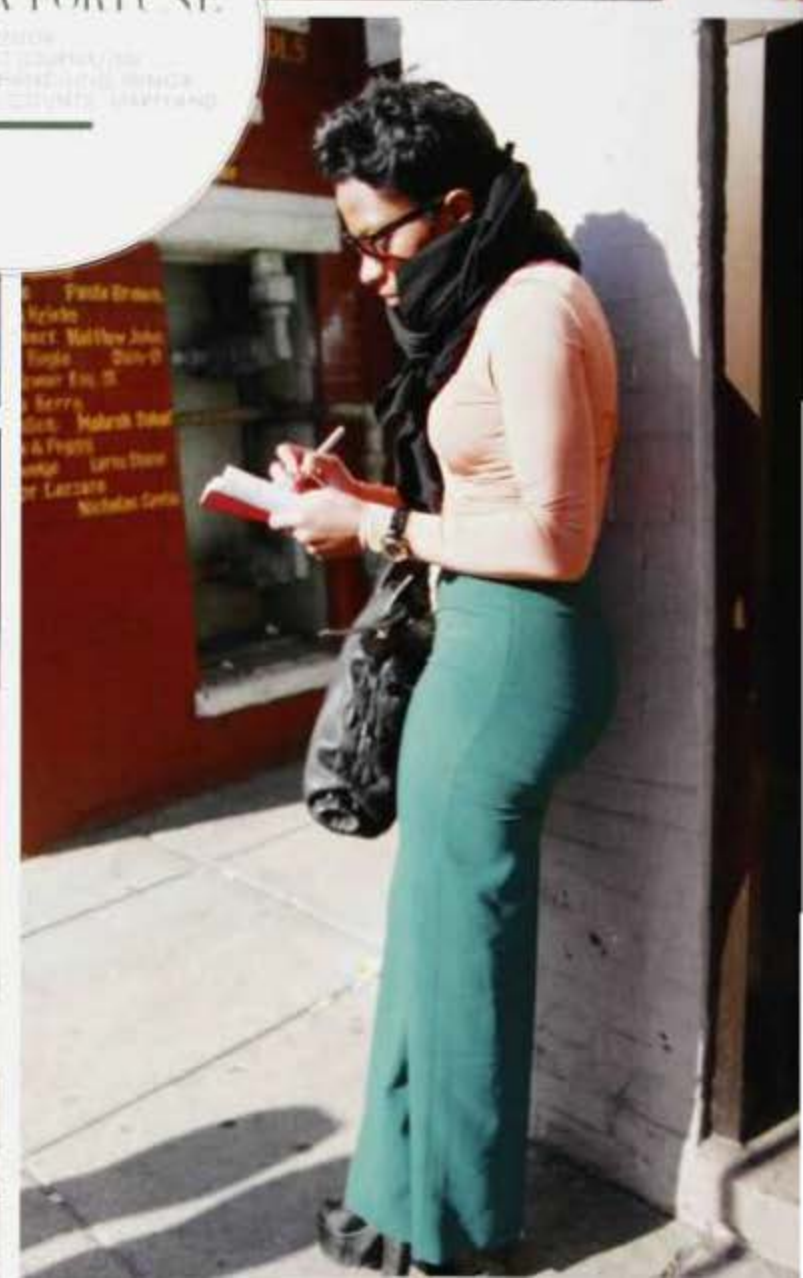

art for social and political sake

If you've ever taken a tour around the Smithsonian American Art Museum, there is at least one exhibit that should go on your mental "Most Memorable Art Pieces" list. From a distance, various shades of gold and silver shine as thoughts of the immense amount of money this exhibit must have required plague your mind. You move closer and read the small plaque next to it that reads: James Hampton 1909-1964, gold and silver aluminum foil, Kraft paper, plastic over wood furniture, paperboard, and glass. "The Throne of the Third Heaven of the Nations' Millennium General Assembly" created by folk artist, James Hampton, took him 14 years to complete.

"He saw a vision of the second coming of Jesus, so he made an actual throne completely out of found objects. I guess to mimic the quality of gold and silver that's prevalent in religious art," said fine arts student, Wilmer Wilson IV. "Since he was a janitor, he could never afford enough gold and silver. The notion that he made a throne fit for Jesus out of garbage is really striking for me."

The idea of installation pieces wasn't alive in the 50s and early 60s when Hampton was working on the exhibit; however, the act of creating them was certainly evolving. Wilson, senior photography major from Richmond, VA not only specializes in installation artwork, but also combines it with photography and performance art. As one of the only undergraduate students with his own studio space and having created at least 20 pieces, he has landed 4 pieces in official venues including the Strathmore Mansion in Maryland and the Art Museum of the Americas in Washington, DC.

From Band-Aids to plastic forks, the objects Wilson uses range from a vast variety of items you'd find in Target, Giant, or even in someone's backpack. "I use objects common to my everyday experiences," Wilson said.

A mixture of photography, performance and installation art may seem far fetched and completely unrelated, but Wilson makes it happen as ideas, issues, and social matters come to mind and strike up thoughts for new projects. His passion for the arts started in high school and he's been going full speed ahead ever since.

"I went to a magnet high school in Richmond that was for the arts and technology, but I was a technology major. Two years in, I wasn't expecting to be into art, but I wasn't feeling fulfilled by the tech program I was in," he said. "I ended up taking a photography course on a whim and I found out that art was a really useful tool to articulate challenging social and political issues in an aesthetic way."

The subject matters of his works focus mostly on social and political issues of everyday life and each issue is directly related to his choice of medium for that particular project. With pieces entitled "Self Portrait of a Model Citizen," "Self Portrait of Flesh and Camo Bandages," and "Starcharts and Implements," he summarizes his practice as representing "otherness."

"I'm interested in the idea that as a non-elite member of society, there are things that I don't have access to and there's a way that I'm ranked as inferior to someone else," said Wilson. "This series sources things that are immediately around me to try and make myself more adequate or appropriate to that disparity."

In addition to targeting societal issues, Wilson has other motives in using plastic silverware to create something aesthetically pleasing. The idea of creating something "ornamental" out of objects that everyone, him in particular, overlook on a day to day basis is what drives him to push his limits.

"Even though the context that I'm in isn't considered valuable, it's possible to find value in something that's not considered valuable," said Wilson.

When asked what his future goals entail, besides acceptance into a graduate school program, Wilson had one simple thing in mind:

"For right now, I just want to keep making art for as long as I can."



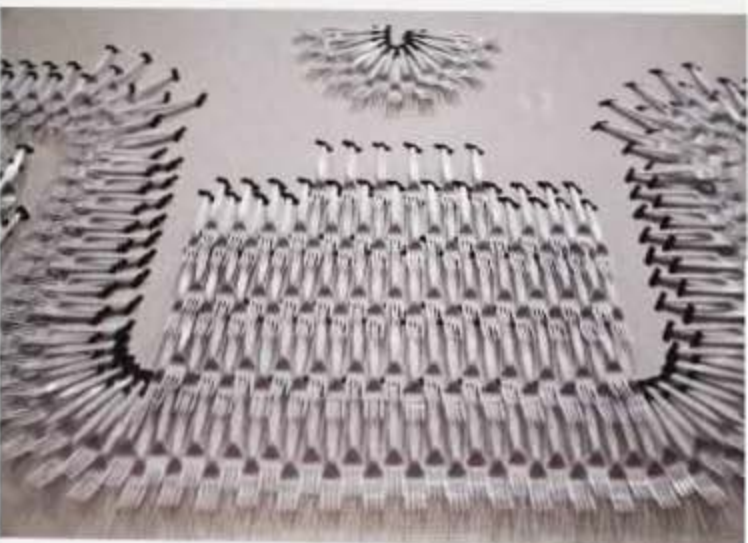

HU THEATRE DEPARTMENT

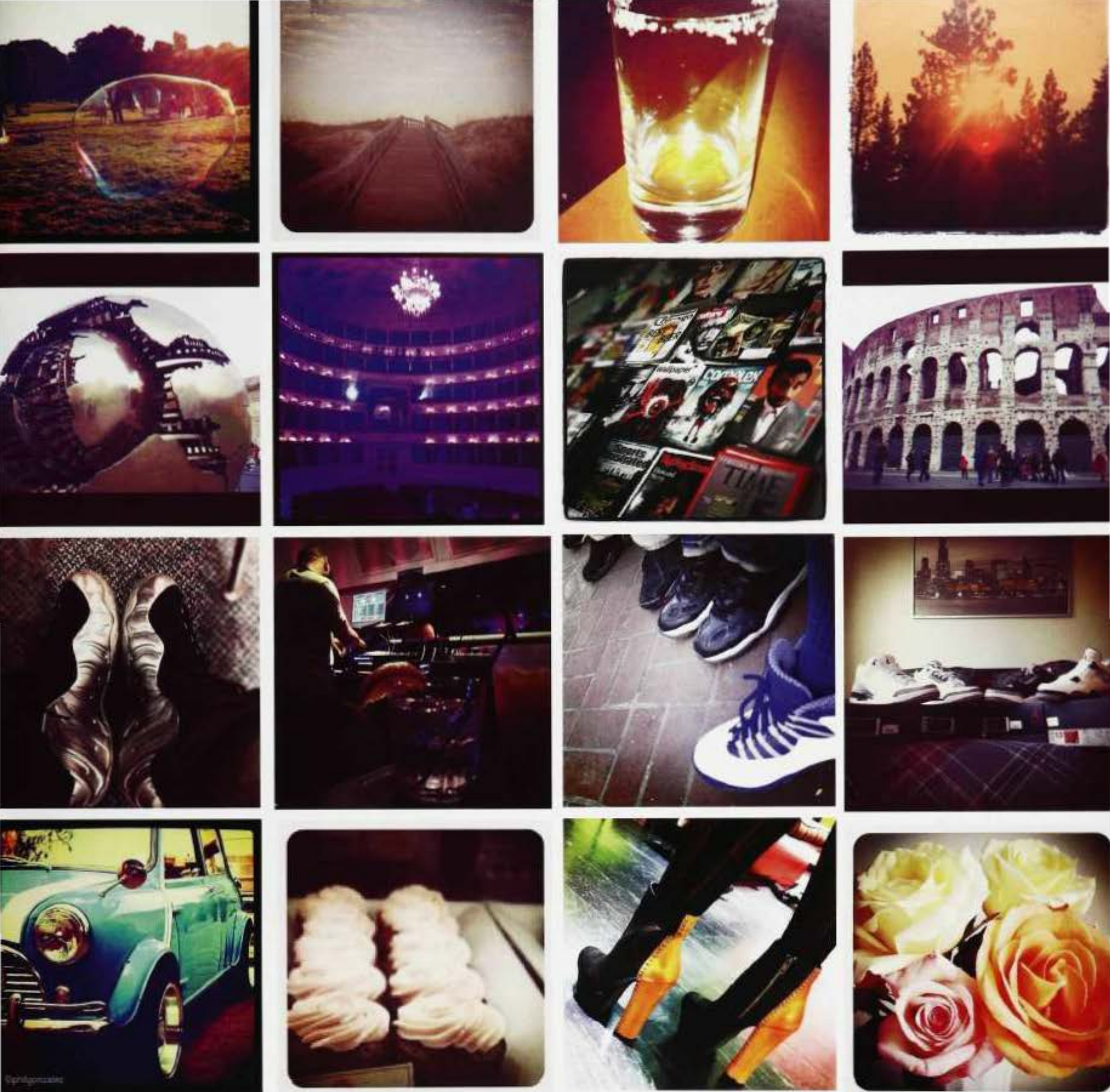

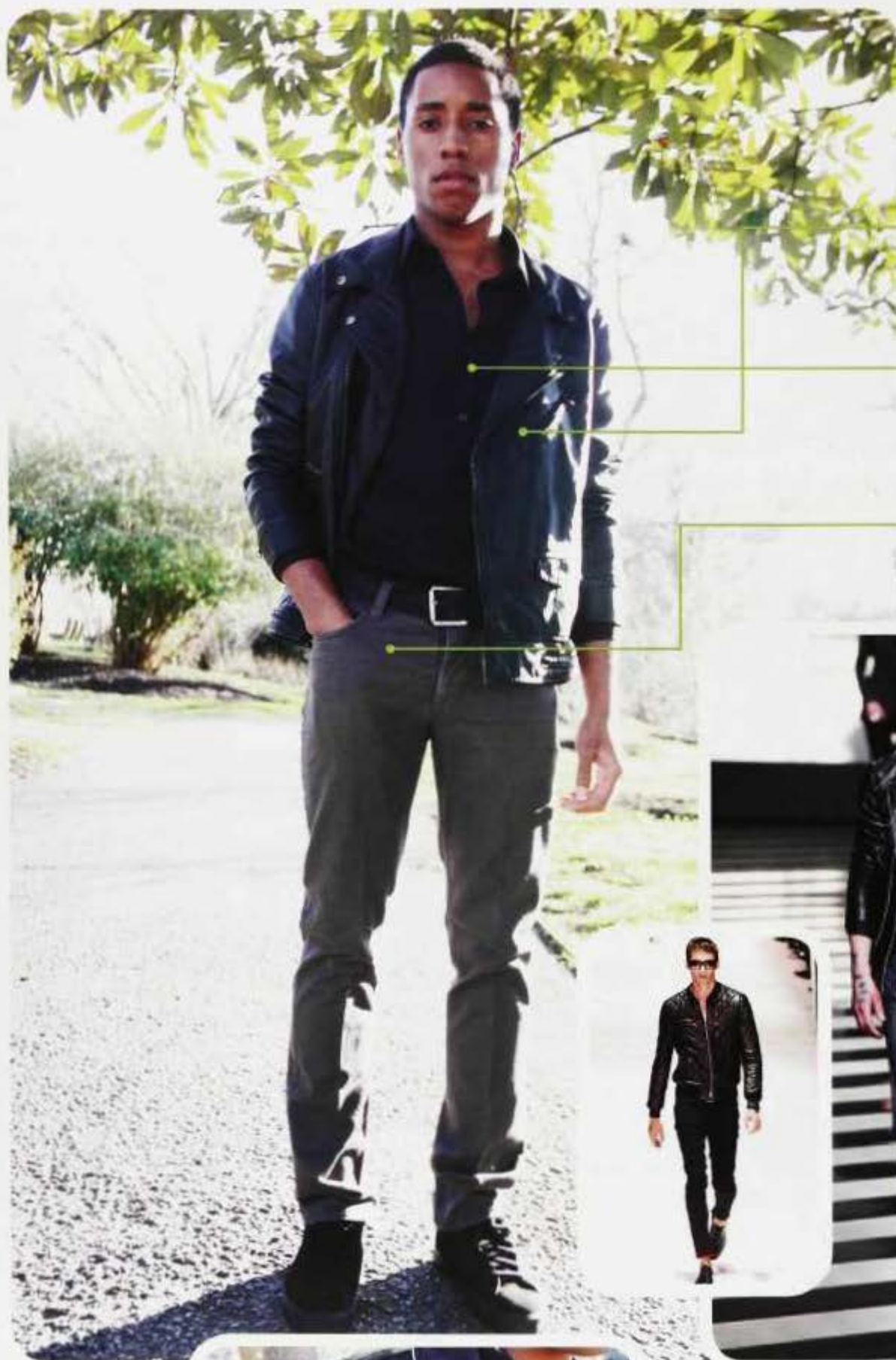

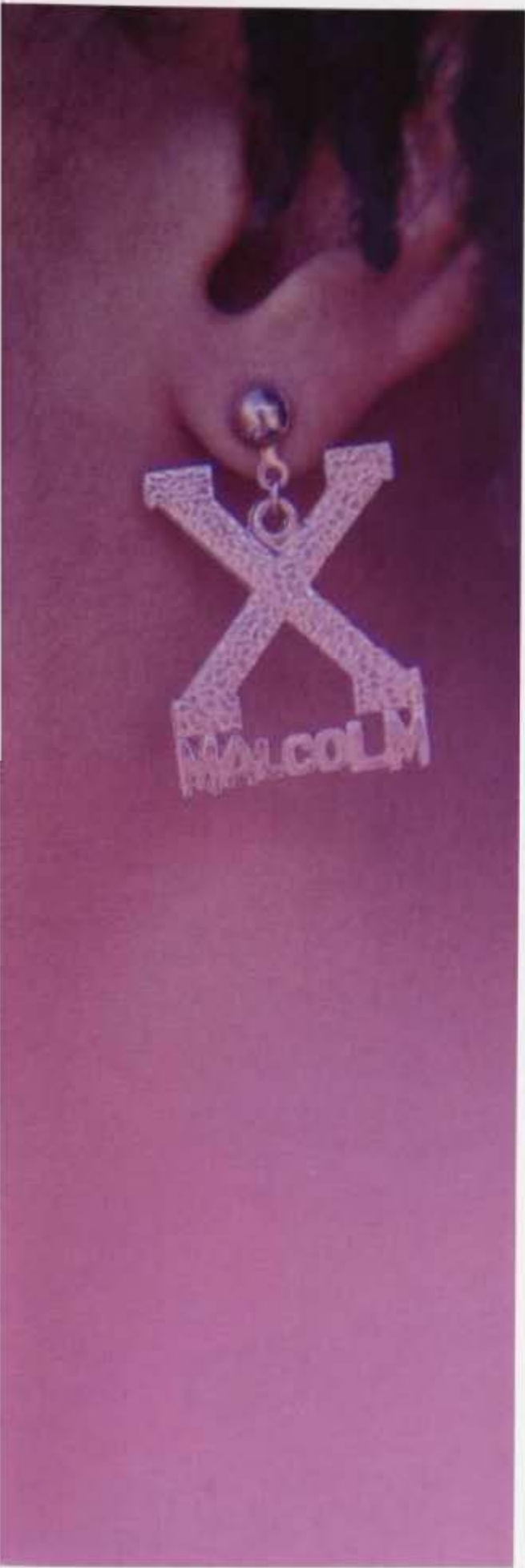

Best currently works as a Graphic Design Specialist and Sales Associate at The Papyrus of Princeton. She is awaiting her letter of acceptance from the Howard University School of Social Work.

Whether you are choosing to enroll as a Teach for America fellow, a volunteer for the Peace Corps, or plan to attend the Howard University School of Law, it is important to keep in mind that your post-graduation plans should benefit you and ultimately your career plans. The fear for the direction music is taking is alive and well. As universal of a language as music is, the language of drugs and tattoos may not be consumed as well in the long-term as it is right now.

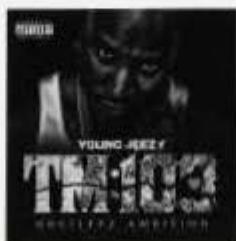

On Friday, November 17, 1911, three Howard University undergraduate students, Frank Coleman, Oscar James Cooper and Edgar Amos Love, met with Professor Ernest Everett Just in his office in Science Hall (Thirkield Hall) to establish a fraternity. At this meeting, they decided upon the motto "friendship is essential to the soul" as symbolized by the letters OMEGA PSI PHI, which are the initials of the three Greek words that represent the motto. They chose Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance and Uplift as the four cardinal principles of the fraternity and decided upon the design of the fraternity's pin and escutcheon. On December 15, 1911, prior to faculty approval, Alpha Chapter, The Mother Pearl, was established at Howard University with fourteen Charter members. Along with the Founders, these eleven stalwart men selected on November 23rd formed the foundation of The Mother Pearl.

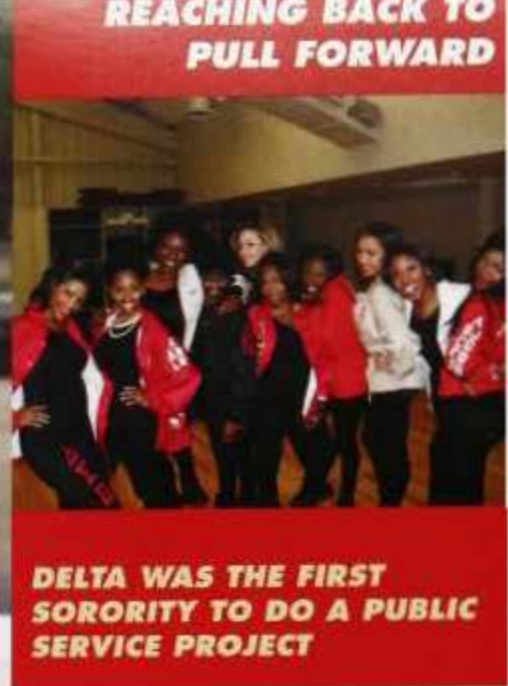

Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity was founded at Howard University in Washington, D.C., January 9, 1914, by three young African-American male students. The Founders, Honorable A. Langston Taylor, Honorable Leonard F. Morse, and Honorable Charles I. Brown, wanted to organize a Greek letter fraternity that would truly exemplify the ideals of brotherhood, scholarship, and service. The Founders deeply wished to create an organization that viewed itself as "a part of" the general community rather than "apart from" the general community. They believed that each potential member should be judged by his own merits, rather than his family background or affluence...without regard to race, nationality, skin tone or texture of hair. They desired for their fraternity to exist as part of an even greater brotherhood which would be devoted to the "inclusive we" rather than the "exclusive we".

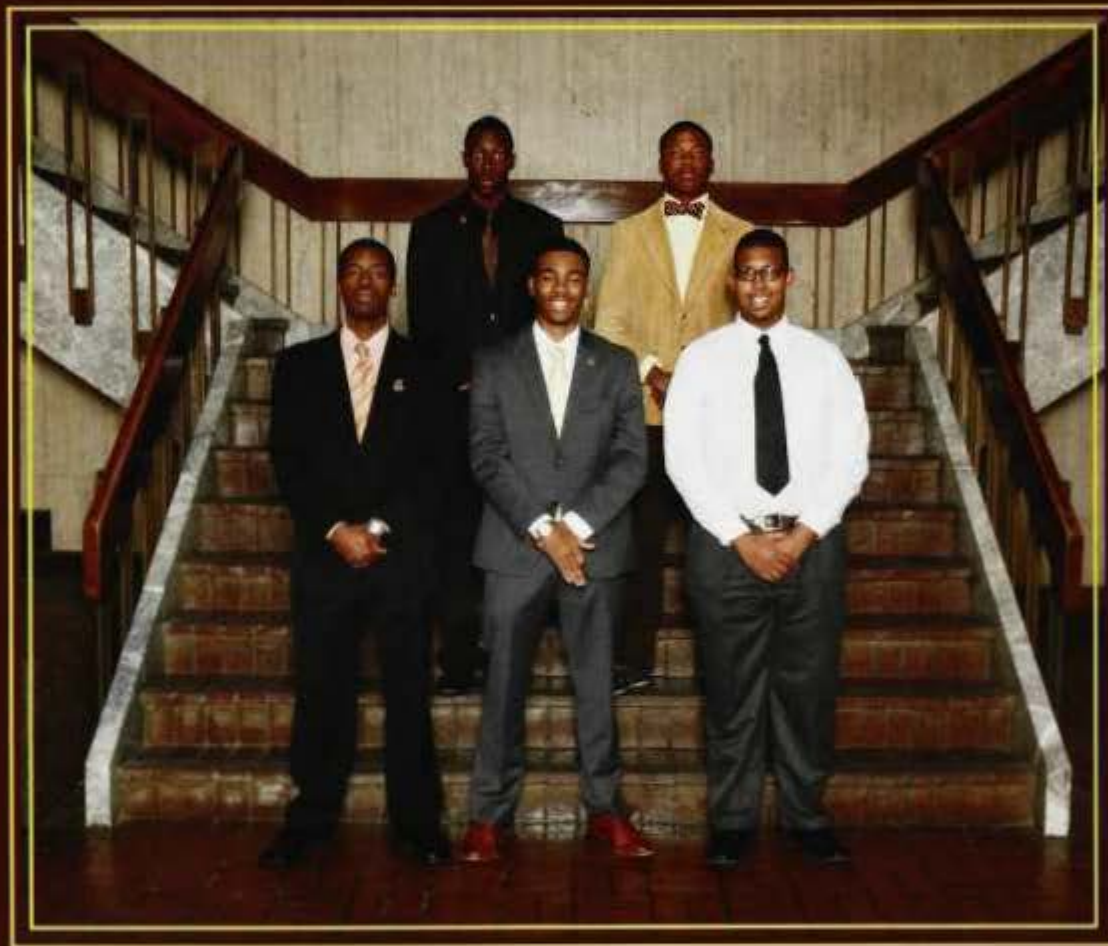

12 brown brothers founded the nation's fifth-largest predominately African American social service fraternity entitled Iota Phi Theta Fraternity, Incorporated. The founders were a diverse collective of individuals a few years older than the average Morgan State College (now know as Morgan State University) student, replete with full time jobs, families and in some cases military obligations. Founded on the steps of Hurt's Gymnasium on the Baltimore, MD campus, the fraternity was born out of the blood, sweat and tears of the black revolution of the 1960s on Thursday, September 19th, 1963. The need for a more positive, more focused organization to lead our people against injustice was how the founders intended to reflect the "New Negro" (for the new Black for Morgan students).

NO GUNS NECESSARY

Amidst the tumultuous, violent wars occurring around the world lie battles being won not with weapons, polls or campaigns, but with enduring presence and voices in great numbers. Before protestors encamped Wall Street's Zuccotti Park on September 27, 2011, Egyptians lead a campaign of non-violent protests, which renewed faith in the power of standing for a cause. For 30 years President Hosni Mubarak held his grip on Egypt after becoming the country's fourth president at the assassination of Anwar Sadat. The former air force commander managed to survive at least six assassination attempts, arrange himself as a Western ally, and suppress an opposition movement in Egypt.

But his people were exasperated. A fatal police beating of an innocent 28-year-old man inspired a group of young Egyptian organizers to form in June 2010. When Mohamed Bouazizi, a Tunisian street vendor incessantly harassed and humiliated by police, poured inflammable liquid over his body and set himself on fire outside a local municipal office in January 2011, the spirit of his protest spread to Egypt and ignited these young people to use their nearly half a million Facebook members and organizational support on the streets to call an end to injustice.

On January 14th, the youth organizers declared January 25th a day of Egyptian protest against the government and Mubarak's oppressively autocratic rule. An eruption of mass protests occurred on this day as tens of thousands of people flooded Cairo's streets and other cities to demand Mubarak's removal from prolonged presidency. Veteran opposition leaders inspired by the youth groups' success, joined forces with the next generation and intensified Cairo's front.

They tore down a poster of President Hosni Mubarak, defied the police, grew in numbers and took hold of Tahrir Square, but maintained peace with the military. Though President Mubarak sent armed police and thugs, unleashed a propaganda campaign, and suppressed foreign media, the people stayed. Police detained Google executive, Wael Ghonim, a key organizer of the youth movement, for two torturous weeks. His stirring interview upon release on February 8th, created a resurgence of energy and mobilization of the people to continue their fight.

On February 11, 2011, proceeding eighteen days of sleeping overnight in Tahrir Square, facing police brutality and corrupt tactics, protestors rejoiced and celebrated in the streets as President Mubarak finally resigned. Upon hearing the news, the crowd in Tahrir chanted, "We have brought down the regime," all without ever lifting a pistol.



JUSTICE HAS BEEN DONE

We hunted them like animals. Discussed them endlessly in the news. Made parodies about them. Maybe even feared them. And suddenly, they were dead.

- President Obama announced on Sunday May 1st, 2011 that Osama bin Laden was killed by U.S. forces in Pakistan in the midst of a firefight. For over two decades, American military contended with the terrorist mastermind's forces and for nearly a decade the Al Qaeda leader mysteriously managed to evade the grip of U.S. operatives fueled by the devastating 9/11 Al Qaeda attacks on American soil. His symbolic significance as the face of terrorism made his death most surreal and for some, a reason to questionably celebrate his death.

- Five months later, Colonel Muammar Gaddafi, Libya's ex-leader, was reportedly killed following an assault on Sirte between Gaddafi loyalists and transitional authority fighters on October 20, 2011. Prior to his death, in August Gaddafi had been dismounted from his 42-year-long dictatorship hold on Libya. As disturbing, graphic footage emerged on TV broadcast news of Gaddafi's bloody body, thousands spent the day remembering his victims and saw his death as Libya's achievement of revolution.

- Two months later, one of the world's most repressive leaders, Kim Jong Il of North Korea died mid-December from natural causes.

A VESSEL FOR CHANGE:

THE CASE FOR TROY ANTHONY DAVIS

At noon on Wednesday, September 22, 2011, the yard was anything but calm. The gong of the clock tower bells summoned the organization of the movement planned to save an innocent man's life.

Troy Anthony Davis was sentenced to death in 1991 for killing off-duty police officer Mark MacPhail in Savannah, Georgia on August 19, 1989. Seven of the nine witnesses who testified against him have since recanted or contradicted their testimony.

"I'm conflicted," said Alexis James, a senior English major from Virginia Beach. "Someone's father or husband is on the execution block with no evidence. Witnesses have recanted. How can this even be going down in America with Obama as our president?"

Students like John Saulters, Mr. Blue and White, were stationed at the Carnegie Building calling, faxing and emailing government officials, while the rest of the student body simmered their frenzy and prepared their spirits for effective protest.

"I definitely think the march will show unity and that we take a stand as students. We are not ignorant to the injustices that happen to black people in America," said Chanel Butler, a senior English and communications double major from California.

They joined in a moment of prayer before beginning the march. After the bowed heads were raised, one could hear a strong and resounding "Amen."

A mob of passionate, ball-fisted Howard University students marched from the flagpole to the White House, picking up supporters along the way. They held signs in the air reading: "No Legal Lynching," "Innocent Until Proven Guilty," "Too Much Doubt," and "We Are Troy Davis."

Students and supporters gathered at the White House until 7 p.m., the time initially scheduled for Davis' execution.

"Reopen the case, stay the execution!" the people chanted. Unfortunately, the public's wishes were not granted. After a few hours of delay, the government took Troy Anthony Davis' life at 11:08 p.m.

"I think this issue is why we need to pay attention to who we elect into powerful positions and how much control they have over our bodies," said Nneka Witter, a senior public relations major from Chicago. "Witness testimonies should never be the determining factor of do or die."

After a day of strain, strength, and sadness, the controversial case opened Black America's eyes.

"We don't need to kill someone to stop crime," said Eugene Puryear, a senior history major from Charlottesville, Virginia. "This is not just about Troy Davis. It's about the kind of country we want to live in. This Troy Davis case is the lynch pen of that case."

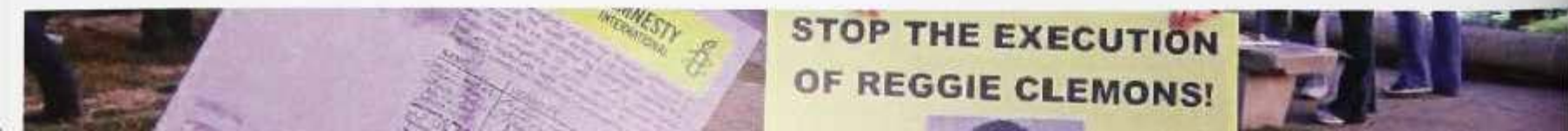

"It's the same as the Troy Davis case," said Carrie Henderson, a senior communications student from St. Louis, MS, "a black man being in the wrong place at the wrong time." Henderson is one of several Howard students rallying together to help Reggie Clemons. Clemons, a 33-year-old African-American man on death row, was sentenced for allegedly raping and murdering two white women in Missouri in 1991. However, there is no physical evidence linking him to the crime. Subsequent to his arrest, Clemons was threatened and beaten by police, coerced into making a statement and denied an attorney. "It's as modern day lynching," Henderson said. "There are a lot of people of color on death row who can't afford proper legal assistance. His family hit bankruptcy because all of their money is going towards trying to free him." Reggie Clemons activists are a part of various Howard organizations, such as the Howard chapter of NAACP, Howard University Student Association, Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity International, and Ubiquity, Inc., and use them as vessels for advocacy and awareness. Before the end of the semester, students can purchase "Free Reggie" pins, with all proceeds going towards the family's quest for affordable legal assistance. As a short-term goal, the Free Reggie supporters wish for Clemons to be free, but Henderson wants a little more: "Long term, I hope that injustices like the death penalty will no longer exist in society," she said, "because Reggie Clemons is not the only one that exists with this story."

SENSELESS

A college roommate squabble often ends with an argument or a room change, but recently these small college quarrels have escalated to physical harm and/or death. This year, college peer-on-peer violence stories have swept the nation. The Howard University boiling water attack, the Bowie State stabbing, and the Frostburg State shooting are a few acts of campus violence that took place this year.

Right here on the campus of Howard University, a pair of roommates got into a heated argument in the West Towers, ending in one infuriated roommate splashing boiling water on the chest and chin of a young woman that shared a suite with her. The argument began over dirty dishes and ended with one Howard University student being rushed to the hospital and left with third degree burns to live with for the rest of her life. We have all experienced the wrath felt after a roommate eats your last slice of bread or doesn't refill the toilet paper in the bathroom, but when has it ever been serious enough to leave someone with permanent physical damages?

Alexis D. Simpson was charged with first-degree murder after stabbing her roommate Dominique Frazier with a pair of scissors in a Bowie State dorm room. An argument over the volume of an iPod, escalated and turned into violence. Simpson said her former roommate bullied her and this led her to attack. Many students attending Bowie State said they lost their sense of security after the stabbing. Parents send their children away to school to experience campus life and broaden their education. Receiving news that a child was murdered by their roommate is the last thing they want to hear.

Students and administrators at Frostburg State University shared grief and disbelief Monday after a deadly weekend shooting shattered the usual peace of their remote campus in the Western Maryland mountains. Tyrone Hall, a sophomore attending Frostburg State, shot two members of the basketball team. He took fire Sunday morning after an off-campus fight that occurred the previous night after a party. Mr. Hall has been charged with first-degree murder and first-degree attempted murder and is being held without bond at the Allegany County Detention Center. Tyrone said he fired a shotgun in self-defense after the two men lunged at him. Brandon Carroll, a 20-year-old sophomore from Waldorf, was killed in the shooting. His teammate, 21-year-old junior Ellis Hartridge Jr. of Washington, D.C., was also shot but is expected to survive. Violence did not just occur on college campuses, T.J. Lane fired 10 rounds of a .22 caliber pistol in the cafeteria of Chardon High School in Cleveland, Ohio this past year. Lane walked into the cafeteria with a gun and knife, he randomly selected his targets as he opened fire. Students frantically ran out of the cafeteria in horror. Three students were pronounced dead the following day while two were hospitalized. Lane was described as being an outcast and bullied by his classmates. The local news reported that 17-year-old Lane would be charged as an adult. School systems (k-12) plan to "bully-proof" their schools. The main source of youth violence is bullying. This is an issue that needs to be taken more seriously within schools and Universities across the nation.

This kind of senseless violence is hard to understand. After the multiple campus murders this year, many questions have been raised. Is the American youth more violent, if so, why? What is the cause of such violence in reaction to petty disputes? How can college campuses prevent future aggressive acts?

8:46 AM FLIGHT 11 CRASHED INTO FLOORS 93-99 of the World Trade Center's North Tower. 9:03 am Flight 175 dives into floors 77 to 85 of the World Trade Center's South Tower. 9:37 am the Pentagon's west façade is pummeled by Flight 77's crash. 10:03 am Flight 93 crashes into a field in Somerset County, Pennsylvania, minutes flying time from Washington, DC.

77 minutes changed a city, a nation, and ultimately, the world forever. An observed silence held the memory of these nearly 3,000 lost ones precisely ten years later as a crowd assembled at GroundZero to reflect on the tragic day of September 11, 2001. The events of those malicious, unexpected, shocking minutes influenced the actions of years of unrest, insecurity, and rebuilding. That morning began a 9/11 era altering our foreign policy, focus on terrorism, and Americans' relationship with one another. Our country's leadership grew obsessed with counterterrorism, investigations, and overextended influence in the Middle East. We've presumptuously outstretched our opinions, policies, and forces into international affairs rather than allow their own leaders to create stability.

With our military footprints in countries like Afghanistan and Iraq, the United States has been fighting an uphill battle toward economic stability and progress. Trillions of dollars and countless lives spent on counterterrorism efforts and overseas stability has left us with a crippled economy and waning morale. Though employment rates have increased during President Obama's term and the media tries to ease our paranoid wounds, some things have changed forever.

Any hint of an explosion, a strange smell, even an earthquake, and our first instinct is a terrorist attack as 9/11 flashbacks flood our minds. In seconds we revert to an inner red threat level and brace ourselves for the worst. This country has seen some of the worst racism, criticism, and tribulation in the 9/11 decade. The open wound marred from the attacks created an outpouring of love, unity, and patriotism toward healing the country had not seen for so long. The brave actions and heartfelt sacrifices average Americans made on that day and every day since far outweighs every negative experienced and gives hopes for a brighter decade ahead.

It was the most beautiful morning. The brightest shade of cobalt unclouded by any cloud overcast above us. The sun sweetly warmed the pavement accompanied by a cucumber breeze as summer's humidity trickled away. As my siblings, mother, and I jogged The Promenade of Brooklyn Heights we gazed over at lower Manhattan and stopped to remark how perfectly beautiful the skyline looked as the glass buildings glistened like Emerald City.

It's that remark that haunted me. A conclusion to the workout back in our loft was interrupted by the loudest explosion. Out of the highest corner of our ten-foot window we spotted a mammoth charcoal cloud billowing from the North Tower of the World Trade Center. My brother and I raced down the stairs into the sidewalk where we had a clear view of the engulfing smoke across the Hudson River. To our left our neighborhood fire department we grew up with sped out of its driveway responded to World Trade Center call. None of those men ever came home as they sped across the Brooklyn Bridge to help anyone they could.

I cried that day. We spent the day glued to the television. Mom endlessly on the phone. My 11-year old self struggled to make sense of "terrorism," "homeland security," and "Al Qaeda" across the bottom of the screen. I didn't know what these terms meant and how they'd shape our country's future. What I did know was that my dad was on the same island millions of people were fleeing, on streets I rollerbladed through that looked like war sites on the news. What I know was that my friends were at Stuyvesant High School just blocks away from Ground Zero. Smoke from the towers blew over into my neighborhood, coating our windows, and seeping in my apartment. A whiff of a similar scent gives me chills to this day. My mother took to the streets to hand out water to the thousands that streamed off the Brooklyn Bridge on foot. No matter how many times the news replayed the plane crashes, it still looked surreal. Towers we saw just minutes ago standing were crashing to the ground with thousands inside. It had to be a movie. Crazy CGI. A nightmare.

By God's mercy, I didn't lose a loved one. What I lost, was my security. Since that frightful morning, there remains a gaping hole in the skyline. And not once can I watch 9/11 footage and not feel a resurgence of tears as I smell the smoke and remember the exodus of fleeing crowds and pray for those we saw jump from the 70th floor windows. Never Forget.
