Scope Note

The papers of Thomas W. Turner (1877-1978), scientist, educator, and activist, pan the period from 1894 to 1980. The bulk of the papers covers the period from 1918 to 1978 and the collection totals approximately 9 « linear feet. Turner, a biologist and botanist, taught for ten years at Howard University and twenty-one years at Hampton Institute. He is also known for founding and presiding over the Federated Colored Catholics of the United States (FCC). This collection documents his academic and scientific careers and contains an abundance of materials concerning Turner's life-long search for 'justice for Blacks, particularly within the Catholic Church.

The Federated Colored Catholics of the United States (FCC), an organization whose objective was the eradication of discrimination in the Church, had its roots in 1917. In that year Turner founded the Committee Against the Extension of Race Prejudice in the Church, which two years later became the Committee for the Advancement of Colored Catholics. In 1925 Turner established The Federated Colored Catholics and modeled it after the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, of which he was a founding member in the Baltimore chapter. Turner served as president of the FCC and the National Catholic Federation for the Promotion of Better Race Relations (the name changed in 1932) from its inception until 1933.

The FCC aimed to integrate the Black Catholics into the corporate life of the Church. One of its primary objectives was increased access to Catholic educational institutions- secondary schools, universities, and seminaries. Turner's efforts reflected this goal.

Turner resigned as president after a period of infighting over leadership and purpose of the organization.

Among Turner's correspondents were Church officials Pietro Fumasoni-Biondi, Apostolic Delegate to the U.S.; Michael Curley, Archbishop of Baltimore; and J. Cardinal Gibbons. He also frequently corresponded with FCC officials H.M. Smith, secretary, and Eugene Clark and George W. Conrad, vice presidents, concerning approaches and progress.

Because of Turner's extensive involvement in the Federated Colored Catholics of the United States, and his tenures at both Hampton Institute, and Howard University, papers pertaining to these groups comprise their own series and sub-series. Hence, correspondence, writings, printed material, etc. concerning these institutions are separate from general correspondence, writings, printed material, etc.

In 1972 Turner donated one box of materials, primarily relating to Howard University. Four years later he added a microscope, which is now part of the Howard University museum's holdings. In 1987, Lois Broadus, Turner's niece, donated the bulk of the papers.

Box 153-1	Includes biographical data, information relating to his wives, Laura Miller and Louise Wright, academic credentials, legal and financial documents, and programs in which Turner's name appears.
Series B	Writings about Thomas W. Turner
Box 153-2	Consists primarily of newspaper clippings. Also includes two published articles, one by Marilyn W. Nickels, who interviewed Turner in 1973 and 1974, and wrote her doctoral dissertation on the Federated Colored Catholics of the United States. See also Series E, F, and G.
Series C	Correspondence
Box 153-2 to 153-5	Contains mostly personal and professional correspondence, including letters from fellow scientists and former students. Also includes condolence cards. There is no early family correspondence. See also Series E, F, and G.
Series D	Writings by Thomas W. Turner
Box 153-5 to 153-9	Comprised of notes, published articles, speeches, holograph and typescript drafts primarily concerning scientific topics. Also includes his unpublished memoirs and "The History and Heritage of the Black Catholic." See also Series E, F, and G.

Series E	Federated Colored Catholics of the United States
Box 153-9 to 153-14	Consists of the following subseries: Correspondence, Annual Conventions, Writings by Turner, Writings by Others, and Printed Material. The Annual Conventions subseries contains resolutions, programs, minutes and speeches. Frequent writers include two white priests, John LaFarge and William Markoe, with whom Turner differed about the purpose of the organization. Includes three complete issues of The Voice, FCC's publication. (see also oversize box for poster advertising the seventh annual convention).
Series F Box 153-14 to 153-16	Hampton Institute Includes the following subseries: Writings about Turner, Correspondence, Writings by Turner, Faculty/students, and Printed Material. Among the correspondents is W.E.B. DuBois, who, in 1927, inquired about the unrest at Hampton, and Arthur Howe, president of the Institute. Most of Turner's writings concern science education.
Series G Box 153-16 to 153-18	Howard University Includes the following subseries: Correspondence, Writings by Turner, Printed Material,Department of Agriculture, and Writings by others. Much of the correspondence with J. Stanley Durkee, Lewis Moore, and Emmett J. Scott concerns Durkee's denial of the position of Dean of Education to Turner, after Turner served as the Acting Dean for two years (1918-1920). There is also regular discussion about Turner's inability to secure adequate lab equipment.

Box 153-18 to 153-19	Contains primarily printed material about black, Catholic, or educational, groups. Includes the Cardinal Gibbons Institute, a school for blacks in Ridge, Maryland, founded by LaFarge and modeled after Tuskegee Institute. Also includes programs from and clippings about awards dinners of the Secretariat for Black Catholics, an organization which named its highest award after Turner.
Series I Box 153-19 to 153-21	Certificates, Awards, Honors, Tributes Among the honors are an honorary doctorate from the Catholic University of America, and a citation from Howard University. Most of this series consists of cards and party information on the occasion of Turner's one hundredth birthday. See also Series E, F, and G.
Series J Box 153-21	Printed Material Comprised largely of Catholic magazines and other religious publications.
Series K Box 153-21 to 153-22	Writings by Others Primarily reprints of scientific articles (particularly entomology and botany). Black biologist Charles Henry Turner authored six of the articles.
Series L Box 153-22 to 153-23	Photographs Consists mostly of photos taken at Turner Is one hundredth birthday party and at the Catholic University graduation ceremony. There are a few, however, from institutions where he worked. Also included are photos of Turner, including some of his family and early life.

Series M Box 153-23 to 153-24	Oversize Contains certificates (photocopies are in the Personal Papers series), a felt banner from Phi Beta Sigma fraternity, and a poster announcing an FCC convention.
Series N Box 153-25	Restricted Contains brittle manuscripts and correspondence, and some sensitive documents related to personnel matters at Hampton. Photocopies of the brittle materials are interfiled throughout the collection.
