Scope Note

The Carter G. Woodson Papers cover the years 1922 to 1941 and are contained in one box measuring 1/2 linear feet. The collection contains correspondence, clippings, papers and statements pertaining to the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, manuscripts, financial statements, an address book and a photograph of Carter Woodson's mother.

Correspondence between Woodson, his sister, Bessie W.

Yancy and business correspondents concerning the purchase and upkeep of a house in Huntington, West Virginia, make up the bulk of this collection. It reveals Woodson as having an adroit acuteness for minute details in business transactions and a somewhat paternalistic attitude towards family affairs.
