It is a Wednesday evening on Eastern Ave within the 4th ward district, currently under the political supervision of Councilman Adrian Fenty. Fenty, a candidate for the mayor of Washington, D.C., is joined by members of his staff as they march up the avenue knocking on doors, seeking support for the upcoming election.

Unsurprisingly, the members of this community and Adrian Fenty are far from strangers; they warmly embracing his visit, stepping from their vehicles and hailing from their porches.

PG County Officer Killed in Iraq



Prince George's County Police Corporal Robert Hernandez of Silver Spring was killed in Baghdad Tuesday evening. Hernandez was initially a community officer in Hyattsville, Maryland before going to Iraq. The PG County Police Department said Hernandez was killed after his convoy was struck by an explosive. Hernandez was a 24-year military veteran, though he had only been in Iraq since last

summer. Officials from the Prince George's police department told NBC 4 that Hernandez received multiple awards during his career with the force, including a good conduct award before he left for Iraq. Hernandez leaves behind his family in Silver Spring, which includes his fiance, adult son, and two children. Hernandez's parents and other family members live in Puerto Rico.

'To Withdraw or Not to Withdraw...' Students Take 'Ws'



Withdrawals have to be completed by April 8. Professors, students and academic advisors say W's can save students but may hurt them if they abuse the system.

As students go to class faithfully everyday, many get well acquainted with the person sitting to their left. Then, unexpectedly, it happens. That person has withdrawn.

Withdrawals, also known as "a student's saving grace," are popular around this time in the semester. Students begin to realize that maybe the class is not what they thought it would be. Or perhaps, they cannot get the grade they had wanted.

Some students and professors feel that having the chance to withdraw from a class can be beneficial.

"I think withdrawals are helpful," said Zaree Walker, a sophomore broadcast journalism major. "A lot of times, students are debating on the likelihood of making a good grade in a certain course."

Donald Roe, Ph.D., a history instructor, said withdrawals "are a part of any academic environment." He said that there are circumstances where this way is needed, but said a grade should not trump what is being learned.

"If it's a good class, don't withdraw because you won't get an A or a B," he said.

Junior history major Darren Murray said he appreciates the concept of withdrawals, but that "some people abuse it."

Some students do abuse their right to withdraw from classes by not applying the time and effort needed to be successful in the course. According to Sandra Gaines, a School of Communications academic advisor, withdrawals should be kept to a minimum because of the image W's give

to transcripts, even though they do not affect the grade point average (GPA).

"If you have too many [withdrawals], it looks bad," she said.

Other down sides include the effect withdrawals have on the opinion of prospective employers, opportunities for financial aid, and that too many withdrawals may leave you with a shortage of classes.

Withdrawing from a class requires filling out a form, getting it approved by the instructor and turning it in to an academic advisor. When a student withdraws from a class, he or she is admitting having been enrolled in a class, but leaving it is their best interest to get out while possible. It is discouraged, and intended only to be used as a last resort, as an accumulation of W's can result in academic penalty.

Most colleges and universities have some type of withdrawal system. At the Georgia Institute of Technology, freshman students have the option of exercising "Freshman Forgiveness," where freshmen students are allowed to make up to two classes that they received an "W" in without penalty.

At Carleton College, in Minnesota, students can drop classes up to two weeks in without a penalty as long as they pick up a new class. Also at Carleton, students have the opportunity to let their academic advisor know, before the class is taken, that they do not expect to do well in the class and would prefer a "pass" or "fail" marking on their transcript instead of a letter grade.

It seems that this type of system is necessary for college students. It helps those who need it and hurts those who abuse it.

Distinguished Speakers Mark the Legacy of Rankin Chapel

For over seven decades, the Andrew Rankin Memorial Chapel has served as a pulpit to some of the world's most renowned authors, as well as national and international dignitaries.

"I know that Dr. Martin Luther King and those before him try to choose people who have contributed to the African American community as speakers for the chapel services," said Charlotte Young, freshman broadcast news major and chapel assistant.

The list of speakers is extensive, with legendary pastors, religious scholars and authors seeking to inspire and civil leaders who have stories to tell.

According to Calvin Smith, program coordinator, the list includes Frederick Douglass, former trustee and leader of the abolitionist movement; Mary McLeod Bethune, champion for civil rights; Booker T. Washington, the first black president of Howard University; W.E.B. DuBois, distinguished author and noted social historian; President John F. Kennedy; Martin Luther King, Jr.; Nobel Peace Prize winner; President Bill Clinton; Vernon Johns, prolific preacher and college president; Desmond

Tutu, Samuel Proctor, Bishop Vashti McKenzie, Howard alumna and the first female AME bishop; Maya Angelou, poet laureate; Gardner Taylor, one of the nation's greatest poets.

The chapel stands on campus as a place where each and every student, faculty member and guest can be enlightened, inspired and comforted. Throughout time, it has become a staple, and the legacy of Howard University has shed light on Rankin Chapel, attracting the type of distinguished speakers expected of the Howard name.

"Most speakers welcome the opportunity to address students who will be leaders of the nation and global community," Smith said. "They also cognitive of the great legacy of the Chapel and the University and feel privileged to be a part of it. As Howard has assembled some of the greatest scholars, it is considered the center of Black intelligentsia. The University [has] sought to bring some of the most effective preachers in the nation to address its student body."

The chapel's history directly reflects the University's focus on meaningful and continual improvements in the life of its students and

the African-American community.

"Howard, as a whole, has maintained a legacy of leadership and service to the community with a strong commitment to religious life along with it," said Victoria Ransom, junior political science major and faithful chapel service attendee. "Andrew Rankin Memorial Chapel and its many facets is the wonderful result of this."

Not only does the legacy of Howard remain strong, but the legacy of Rankin chapel endures as well.

"It is a tremendous privilege that we have, Sunday after Sunday, these great speakers, and just as they acknowledge so must we in that to whom much is given, much is required."

Zora Neale Hurston, as she witnessed Convocation in Rankin Chapel, whispered a prayer to the spirit of Howard and said, "I am a tiny part of you and I pray that I will never do anything to make you ashamed of me. That is the spirit of Rankin Chapel that we are a part of something great and when we participate and when we worship, we too become a part of the legacy of Howard University," Smith said.

94th Cherry Blossom Festival: An Event for All

The weather's getting warmer, and thousands of visitors are flocking to D.C. The 2006 National Cherry Blossom Festival began March 25 and runs through April 9. The peak blossoming has been forecasted today, and people are ready to get out and enjoy the plethora of events scheduled for the next two weeks.

This year's festival marks the 94th celebration of the original gift of 3,000 cherry trees from Tokyo to the city of Washington, D.C., in 1912. Since then, the festivities have grown, and 2006 brings daily performances on the Tidal Basin, multiple demonstrations at Union Station, and the annual Cherry Blossom Parade on April 8.

For the sports lover, the National Cherry Blossom festival sponsors a Soccer Tournament. The tournament will feature competition between amateur, club and recreational teams. The tournament will be held April 1 and 2 at the JFK Soccer fields.

If soccer isn't enough, this weekend is also the 10th annual Cherry Blossom Freedom Walk. This non-competitive walk honors Japanese-American citizens for their sacrifices during the Second World War.

Also this weekend is the much anticipated fireworks display along the waterfront. Saturday night, the National Cherry Blossom Festival will sponsor a fireworks show at the southwest waterfront. In addition to hosting the show, the festival will also sponsor a fireworks cruise on the new and improved Spirit of Washington.

Spectators will be able to enjoy food, music, and the fireworks show.

Aside from pure recreation,

this year's festivities will also include cultural exhibits. Through the entire duration of the festival, traditional Japanese kimono will be on display at the Fashion Centre at Pentagon City.

The exhibition 'From Geisha to Diva: The Kimonos of Ichimaru' is the story of an early 20th century Geisha through her personal kimono and accessories. This exhibit, however, runs after the Cherry Blossom Festival, through April

23. Of all the Cherry Blossom Festival activities, perhaps the most popular event is the Cherry Blossom Parade. For years, the parade has been one of Washington's biggest spectator events. The parade runs down Constitution Avenue Saturday April 8, and is led by Wheel of Fortune's Pat Sajak. One of the American Idol finalists will perform during the parade, and the current Miss America, Jennifer Berry, will be on hand for parade events.

Alongside the parade, the Japan-America Society of Washington, D.C. will sponsor Sakura Matsuri, a Japanese Street Festival. The free event, now in its 45th year, will feature music, food, and art displays.

WHAT'S A CHERRY BLOSSOM, ANYWAY?

The Cherry Blossom tree, or Sakura in Japanese, is native to Japan, and is revered as a cultural symbol. Cherry fruit, however, come from a different species of cherry tree. The cherry trees come in different species, the most popular variety is the Somei Yoshino, with flowers that are nearly pure white, with pale pink near the stem. Other varieties include the yamazakura, yaezakura, and shidarezakura. These varieties have petals with more pink in them, and resemble the trees around the tidal basin. Cherry blossom flowers bloom annually, and within a week, the flowers fall before the leaves come out. During World War II, the cherry blossom tree served as a motivating symbol for Japanese people.

Keeping Black Businesses on Board

The Philadelphia Tribune, one of the oldest African-American newspapers, is now losing employees due to a low wage strike. "For far too long, union employees at the Tribune have suffered under plantation-like conditions, with sharecroppers' wages, astronomical health-insurance premiums and a lack of overtime compensation," the union statement said in a Philly.com article.

A headline comparing the conditions to slave wages struck one Hilltopper because one wouldn't normally associate a black-owned business with slavery. In terms of employment, this scenario applies to all Howard students, not just journalism majors. Once we graduate, we will have the critical decision of working at a black or mainstream business.

There is probably a little part

of all of us that might feel more comfortable working around black people. The assumed pressures of racism, discrimination and unfair treatment seem to diminish when we think about working around other people of color versus in an all-white boardroom. Many Howard students understand the mission of

estined in working there and stay in business?

One problem black businesses tend to face is the availability of money. This applies to HBCUs as well when we look at schools losing accreditation and closing down. We pass them and pop shops on Georgia Avenue to go to Chipotle. We pick up

the Washington Post instead of The Afro. Black companies and businesses will have trouble staying open and making money if we don't support them... so we should start there. The more we support our businesses the better they

will do. The better they do... the more attractive they become to potential employees. As budding entrepreneurs and money-minded students, if we start a company, we will need the support from the black community. It is an input/output cycle that we must invest in.

This is evident in his new album, "King," which includes appearances by UGK, Jamie Foxx, actor/comedian Mike Epps, R.G., and street favorite, Young Jeezy, just to name a few. The tracks that stand out the most are produced by New York's own Just Blaze, proving that he is one of the most versatile beatmiths in hip-hop music today.

Tracks such as "King Back" showcase T.I.'s southern drawl and laid-back delivery over hype production. It's also clear that the southern artist also has an interest in east coast music as well, particularly the track "Why You Wanna." This is his testament to a woman with ill feelings toward him, with brilliant production that samples "Gypsy Woman" by Crystal Waters and



a chorus borrowed from A Tribe Called Quest.

T.I. also represents the South heavily with bass-booming tracks like "Front Back" with UGK and "I'm Straight" with R.G. and Young Jeezy.

Although he has help from a number of artists on this project, there are some flaws. Some of the heavier production doesn't fit T.I.'s flow, making him sound uncomfortable with his words jumbled by his ad-lib and voice overs. An example of this is "I'm Talkin'

To You," where Just Blaze's horns and drums drown out T.I.'s vocals, especially in the third verse as he attempts to rap in a fast-paced delivery. Despite this, one would find that he's throwing darts at a certain prominent southern artist in this verse, and also in the third verse of the lead single "What You Know." Those who have followed T.I.'s history of rap beefs could generate an idea of who this person is.

However, the lively production works in his favor in "Get It." This

Swizz Beatz track, as well as "Stand Up Guy," are sure to keep the clubs jumping as the infectious chorus and smooth transitions blast through the speakers.

T.I. also shows his introspective side in "Live In The Sky," with lyrics expressing that when he dies, he hopes to lead to heaven.

One of the most interesting collaborations of this album is "Goodlife" with Pharrell Williams and Chicago's own Common. In between Pharrell's melodic chorus, T.I. shares lyrics such as "Fear ain't in the heart of me, I learned 'just do it' you got courage from your fears right after you go through it, now I come through on the come up... [and] that ain't bad for a [brother] who ain't even finished school." Meanwhile, Common drops his always potent lyrics with "Sales projected ain't show how effective lessons learned, sessions turned to life reflected, and everything I found real in life, I kept it they say life's a teacher, you're going to get tested."

"King" shows growth in T.I.'s artistry and is definitely an entertaining CD to ride around playing. He may not be ready to be crowned king just yet, but he's getting closer to the throne.



VIRTUAL REALITY GAMES MAY HELP CORRECT 'LAZY EYE'

People with lazy eye (amblyopia) may benefit from playing virtual reality (VR) computer games, say researchers at Nottingham University in the U.K.

They found that it's possible to use this approach in order to encourage the lazy eye to be more active and to get both eyes working together. As a patient plays a game, the computer sends different images to each eye. The eyes have to team up in order for the patient to be successful at the game, BBC News reported.

"Traditionally, VR has been used to present realistic environments in 3D so you imagine you're there because of the depth of the world around you," said researcher Richard Eastgate. "But we're using VR to make something unrealistic. You could call it virtual unreality."

In one experiment, one hour of a virtual reality racing game achieved the same results as 400 hours of the traditional approach that forces the lazy eye to work harder by wearing a patch over the good eye, BBC News reported.

WHO: HIV Treatment Program Misses Goal

Each day, about 15,000 babies worldwide are born with HIV because their mothers don't get the antiretroviral drugs they need, according to a World Health Organization (WHO) report that said a program to expand access to the drugs had failed to achieve its target.

The report said fewer than 10 percent of pregnant women with HIV in developing countries received antiretroviral drugs between 2003 and 2005.

Currently, about 1.3 million people get the drugs, which is well short of the goal of three million by 2005 set by the WHO and UNAIDS in 2003, BBC News reported.

Marijuana Tar Levels Seven Times Higher Than Cigarettes

Marijuana smoke has seven times more tar and carbon monoxide than cigarette smoke and the health risks of smoking three joints are about equal to the risks from a whole pack of cigarettes, according to a French National Consumers' Institute study.

The study also found that marijuana smoke contains more toxic chemicals than cigarette smoke.


Researchers used an artificial smoking machine to compare 10 specially-rolled joints of marijuana leaves and resin to regular Marlboro cigarettes. The machine measured the smoke's content for tar and carbon monoxide, and for the toxic chemicals benzene, nicotine and volume, Agence France Presse reported.

Duke Lacrosse Players Under Investigation for Alleged Rape

Multiple Players on Team Previously Charged with Various Offenses

Court documents showed that fifteen players of the 47 man Duke roster that were alleged participants in the rape of an exotic dancer were charged with various other charges. The offenses range from underage alcohol possession to loud noise and public urination.

The team is in the middle of an investigation stemming from allegations that they raped an exotic dancer at an off-campus party on March 13.

Duke University president, Richard Brodhead, suspended the team, which is ranked number three in the nation, until further information is discovered regarding the allegations brought against the players.

"In this painful period of uncertainty, it is clear to me, as it was to the players, that it would be inappropriate to resume the normal schedule of play," President Richard Brodhead told ESPN news services Tuesday.

The president led a forum to discuss the issue with Duke's student body. The forum was closed to the press, Duke spokesman Geoffrey Mock said.

"It was a meeting at which the students could share their thoughts about the topic," Mock said. Although the number of students in attendance to the forum was undetermined, the meeting was opened to all students.

The woman told Durham police that she and another woman were hired to perform at an off-campus, private party on March 13. The woman, who is a student at North Carolina Central University, told police that she was pulled into a bathroom and raped by three men.

room and raped by three men.

Forty-six members of the 47 man roster were required to give cotton swab DNA samples. The only player who wasn't tested is black, because the woman said that the alleged attackers were white. The woman is black.

"I needed to have the information about who will be charged," District Attorney Mike Nifong said. "I feel pretty confident that a rape occurred."

Team captains of the Blue Devils issued a statement to President Brodhead in which they stated that it is in the best interest of the university that the team be disqualified from play.

"Because of the intense emotions surrounding these allegations, we feel it is in the best interest of the University,

the community and our families

that the team should not play competitively until the DNA results verify our unequivocal denial of these allegations," the statement said.

The statement also predicted that the allegations were false.

Duke's campus and the town of Durham, which has a history of racial tensions among lower class black and white people, have been tense as a result of the allegations.

The circumstances of the rape indicated a deep racial motivation for some of the things that were done," Nifong said. "It makes a crime that is by its nature one of the most offensive and invasive even more so."

Nifong said that all of the team members are sticking together and not talking to investigators. He also warned

that he may bring aiding and abetting charges against several of the players.

Several citizens of Durham have demonstrated in response to the silence of the lacrosse team and the way the university has handled the situation.

Groups have demonstrated outside of the house in which the alleged attack occurred and gathered outside of the house of Duke Provost, Peter Lange, where they knocked together pots and pans until Lange came out to answer various questions.

Lange said on Monday that it would be in the students' best interest to come forward and cooperate with authorities.

"The students would be well-advised to come forward. They have chosen not to," Lange said.
