Financial Aid Vows Are Not Validated

The Howard University Student Association (HUSA) received about 15 complaints on Friday after university administration fell flat on promises to make student financial aid services more accessible.

"We acknowledge that upcoming deadlines to fulfill validation requirements heighten students' anxiety," Ribeau wrote in a letter to the student body on Wednesday in response to a university protest on Sept. 4, which raised concerns including the amount of time students wait to inquire about financial aid related

"To address this concern, we have further extended the hours of Student Financial Services to a schedule of 8:30 a.m. until 7 p.m. Monday through Friday until Sept. 25," Ribeau said in the letter. "To accommodate the expected number, selected Student Financial Services functions will be moved to the Blackburn Center beginning on Friday, Sept. 11. Appropriate staff will be available to assist in processing outstanding student accounts."

Financial Aid staffers were available in Blackburn Friday morning, Interim Provost and Chief Academic Officer Alvin Thornton said, "but students did not seek to access service there because of the success of the online

Former Blagojevich Staffer Dies of Possible Suicide

Christopher Kelly, former fundraising coordinator for ex-Illinois governor Rob Blagojevich, died Saturday in Chicago, from an apparent a suicideoverdose. Authorities said that prior to his death, Kelly told police that he overdosed, according to CNN.

On Tuesday, Kelly pleaded guilty to two counts of mail fraud, stemming back to his work with Blagojevich.

Kelly recently underwent surgery and was on a series of prescribed medications. The names of the medicines have yet to be released, and officials are still determining if this was an intentional overdose.

Blagojevich said in a statement hat the pressure from the federal government was the real cause behind his friend's death.

Scarlet Knights Slay Bison Prey

Football season opens with 45-7 loss to Rutgers

After suffering a 45-7 loss to the Scarlet Knights of Rutgers, the Howard University Bison football team began what they are hoping to be their comeback season with an 0-1 record.

"I think that it is all first game jitters. We have to get the kinks out," said Terry Sims, defensive back coach for the Bison football team. "We have guys who haven't played and guys who have played, having their first game of the year."

The Scarlet Knights began the game with a fumble by Evan Lampert, forced by Howard University defensive back Arando Jamison, and picked up by fellow defensive back Lanny Kelly.

Just as the Bison entered the Rutgers red zone, quarterback Floyd Haigler fumbled the ball for a loss of five yards and a turnover.

A touchdown came for the Bison when Haigler threw a 40yard pass to Willie Carter for the Bison's only scoring drive of the game late in the second quarter making the score 32-7.

Carter, who made five catches for 94 yards, led the Bison

in receptions. The Bison held off the Scarlet Knights for the remainder of the fourth quarter.

"I think that they went_up against a very good team. I'm not surprised, but then again I still had my hopes up," said Ariel Amey, a sophomore supply-chain manage-

ment major. Tom Savage, a freshman quarterback, led the way for the Scarlet Knights with a total of 223 yards thrown for two touchdowns.


The Bison had three turn-

Students Put First

This year marks the commencement of Phase II of the Students First Initiative. Phase I consisted of collecting data, and Phase II will be the process focused on addressing students concerns. Below are the recommendations from Phase I, which reflects over 100 students input. Each recommendation reflects needed improvements in eight highlighted areas.

Process and Organizational Improvements for All Eight Target Areas

Provide staff development and customer service training to all staff. Design and implement data collection systems that track performance as seen by students (the "customers").

Financial Aid

Automated imaging system with electronic records to avoid misfiling, redundant requests to applicants, and faster/ easier access to records.

Web site overhaul - the Financial Aid office will redesign and update its Web site by either doing its own maintenance or working out with ISAS (Information Systems and Services); a mechanism where they will do this on a timely basis.

Records

Improve communications with the campus – (a) Improve the Web site, (b) develop an information kiosk in the Administration building, (c) enhance the Bison page, (d) develop a "live" chat line to answer questions, and (e) consolidate and publish academic policies on-line.

Student Accounts, Loans and Collections

Improve student communications - Create a Facebook group that sends messages alerting and updating students to increase the speed of student access to needed information; establish accountability for providing information correctly the first time; improve customerfriendliness.

Revamp filing system

Redesign the current filing system and work towards an automated system of storage and retrieval of student records, including document imaging; as quickly as possible move to an automated system that will produce accurate audit trails, eliminate lost paperwork and checks, and provide complete information to students about their status and next steps.

Residence Life

Establish off-campus housing Web site-- Site will provide external links and postings of opportunities/options as well as generic advice about "how to," cautions, and resources.

Share information - Increase student and parent information about housing policies and procedures and properly set expectations; review visitation policies; provide a mechanism so that student concerns or complaints can be received, tracked, and resolved, with information systematically shared with in-

volved parties. Student Life and Activities

Establish Graduate and Professional Student Services Office - Assign one staff member to work with grad/professional students; work with other offices to improve the range and quality of services for grad/professional students (most grad/professional students see these offices as primarily serving undergraduates).

Academic Advising

Improving Consistency -Establish a counseling advisory council to coordinate advisement across all schools/colleges.

Access to information – Provide print and electronic access for catalogue information, as well as university policies and procedures; provide college/ school and department-specific information, logistics, and policies and procedures.





appointment system."

However, as reported by The Hilliop on Thursday, many students were unable to receive confirmation notices through the new system to schedule financial aid appointments online, which was established during the second week of classes.

Thornton maintains that the online system works, removing the need for students to wait in lines to receive service.

Nijeuel Porter, a junior theatre arts major was one student disappointed by the lack of a Blackburn service center. "Based off the letter that the President sent out to the student body, I went to Blackburn to turn in my application so that I could be validated," said Porter, who then turned toward the administration building around 6 p.m. on Friday when he did not find financial aid staff in Blackburn to help him. The office in the administration building was closed when he arrived.

HUSA Director of Student Advocacy Corey Briscoe, who oversees both undergraduate and graduate grievances fielded the student complaints on Friday.

"It is our job to hold the President's office accountable," Briscoe said.

Representative Wilson Refuses to Apologize Publicly

South Carolina Representative Joe Wilson has said that his personal apology to President Obama and the administration should be sufficient

South Carolina Republican representative, Joe Wilson, said Sunday that he would offer no further apologies for his outburst of "You lie!" President Barack Obama's speech to Congress last week. "I am not going to apologize again," Wilson said on FOX News Sunday, when asked about pending disciplinary actions against him by the House of Representatives. "I have apologized to the president: I believe that's sufficient."

Immediately following Obama's speech Wednesday, Wilson issued a statement that apologized for inappropriate behavior.

He also said that he apologized to the White House as a whole after the incident, and that President Obama accepted his apology on his behalf and his administration's behalf.

Democrats in the House of Representatives are planning to introduce a resolution of disapproval of Wilson's actions next week unless he publicly apologizes on the floor of the House of Representatives.

Wilson said a resolution would show that Democrats simply wanted to play politics and divert attention from a health care overhaul that is lagging in Congress.

"I will not be muzzled. I'm going to be speaking on behalf of the American people, but I will be doing it very civilly," Wilson said.

The outburst followed the statement in President Obama's health care speech when he said that the health care would not provide coverage to illegal immigrants.

Awareness to the issue has led to the review of the health care bill by Senate negotiators to make sure there are provisions in place to make sure illegal immigrants do not get federally subsidized coverage.

Obamia and other Democratic leaders insist that there is nothing in any of the health care proposals currently presented to Congress that includes health care coverage for illegal immigrants or would provide taxpayer money to help illegal immigrants buy private health coverage.

Wilson released a statement following the FOX News Sunday interview which said, "The American people are fed up with the political games in Washington, and I refuse to participate in an effort to divert our attention away from the task at hand of reforming health insurance and creating new jobs. Having apologized on Wednesday to the White House, we agreed that we must move forward in a civil manner to do the work the American people have sent us here to do. Health insurance reform is too important to take a backseat to political partisanship."

Following his outburst, both Wilson and Democrat Rob Miller, his opponent for re-election next year, each have raised more than \$1 million, according to aides for each.

In the first 24 hours after Wilson's outburst, Miller's campaign offers swelled by \$200,000, according to Jessica Santillo of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee. The contribution came in from 5,000 individual contributions, she said.

As for Wilson, news of that cash haul comes after he directly asked in a Web video for campaign cash to fend off attacks from political opponents and said he is standing by his opposition to Democratic efforts at health care reform.

Wilson was elected to his first full term as a representative in 2002, after serving the remainder of his boss' term following his death in 2001.

Simone Hall, a senior history major, believes Wilson should publicly apologize. "I think it was rude, and [Wilson] knows the rules and regulations of Congress. He should follow them despite his feelings."

Fallen Firefighters Honored in Open Ceremony

On Saturday, mourners gathered to celebrate the life of two firemen who died while fighting against one of Los Angeles' biggest wildfires this year.

Captain Ted Hall, 47, and firefighter specialist, Arnie Quinones, 35, died on Aug. 30 while trying to help more than 50 members of their crew and inmates find an escape route out of the Los Angeles National Forest.

Everyone reported to have reached safety except Hall and Quinones; sources said that their vehicle slid down a steep embankment while trying to look for a safe passage.

Hall was a 26-year veteran of the L.A. County Fire Department and was the reigning superintendent of his fire camp. Quinones also had eight years in service.

This explains why 15,000 uniformed firemen and 20,000 people were expected to attend the memorial service that was held at Dodger Stadium. Among the speakers were governor of California, Arnold Schwarzenegger, and Vice President Joe Biden. Both gave their condolences to the families.

Victor Jones, a junior psychology major and resident of Minnisee, Calif., said he believes this is

all too familiar. "It's not uncommon; we see fires, but year to year, they're still devastating. Everyone knows someone who knows someone who's affected by the fires," Jones said. "It's really hard when you know you're close to them—all I can do is pray for whoever is impacted by them."

According to the California Department for Forestry and Fire

Protection (CAL FIRE) the fire season usually runs from mid-May to November. Yet, many consider fire season to be a year-round season; the battle to neutralize all of the fires may be getting harder and harder in some areas. So far this year, there have been more than 6,000 fires reported, which is up 25 percent from 2008.

Many assume the causes

of these fires to be either arson or lightening. According to a study done by CAL FIRE, equipment use was said to be the biggest cause. Twenty-seven percent of the causes was said to be either miscellaneous or undetermined, which happens to be the situation with the fire that took the lives of Hall and Quinones.

Governor Schwarzenegger

issued an executive order in May in an effort to provide California firefighters with more resources to fight fires in the future.

According to a press release from the Office of the Governor, he also directed the state agencies, including the California Emergency Management Agency and the California National Guard to "coordinate their actions with federal and local agencies, propositioning resources and maximizing California's fire prevention and fighting capabilities." This order allows CAL FIRE to mobilize more crews, engines, helicopters, planes and equipment when there are heightened fire emergencies.

The specific date of implementation was expected to be immediate, but it is unclear whether the fire that took the lives of Hall and Quinones was affected by this

Hall is survived by his wife, Katherine, and two sons, Randall, 21, and Stephen, 20. Quinones is also survived by his wife, Loressa, who is expecting their first child within the next couple of weeks. In the memorial speech, Vice President Biden said the country owes them for leaving their families to save others. "The only thing we can do for certain, is to promise and keep the promise; we will give the Teds and the Arnies all the support they need."

Leaders Demand Meeting With Zimbabwe


Leaders of the European Union (EU) have requested to have a meeting with the president and Prime Minister of Zimbabwe. A few days after sending the message, Zimbabwe officials got back in touch with EU leaders with a specific date and time for the meeting. Although the time and date for that meeting has not been released, EU officials have said they will want the varying leaders to resume talks and end politically driven violence, strengthening of the law, improvement in media freedom and major reforms carried out in government institutions that will lead to reconsidering lifting of the sanctions placed against the country by the EU. Even after signing of the power-sharing pact early September last year, the coalition government is still divided on issues of equal sharing of posts, and continued rivalry among the two coalition parties' supporters continues to pose threats to a lasting peace.

Gambia Leader Wins Law Suit

A high court in Lusaka has awarded Zambia's main opposition leader damages in a suit he filed against the government and police for defamation. Michael Sata sued the government for defamation over his 2002 arrest for allegedly stealing two government vehicles. He was later freed for lack of evidence. Presiding Judge Justice Martin Imasiku ruled that opposition leader's indictment was malicious as it lacked evidence and was generally based on a newspaper claim. Popularly known as "King Cobra," Sata lost the 2006 presidential election to Zambia's late president, Levy Mwanawasa. He came close to winning in 2008 after Mwanawasa's death, but lost narrowly to current president, Rupiah Banda, according to official results.

Jordan Enshrined to NBA Hall of Fame

Friday marked the induction of an athlete who some epitomize as the greatest basketball player of all time into the James Naismith Hall of Fame.

Former NBA guard, Michael Jordan, was inducted along with David Robinson, John Stockton, Jerry Sloan and G. Vivian Stringer at Springfield Symphony Hall in Springfield, Mass.

Jordan has been ridiculed since his speech as a result of some feeling that he was "bitter" about things that happened in his career. Jordan poked fun at his former boss Jerry Krause, former NBA guard Isaiah Thomas and other athletes

"Everyone was just geeked. Michael Jordan runs the city," said

Scott. "He impacted my life a lot, and I've never even met him."

Jordan is still recognized by some as the greatest athlete to play sports and agree that his impact on sports will last forever.

"Michael Jordan is one of the greatest basketball players of all time and maybe the most recognizable face in all athletics," said Washington, "I watched the whole induction. It was pretty good. I got a little bit emotional when he went on stage. I felt like he kept it real, 100 percent."

An Athlete to Know: Soccer Legend Pele

Within the Black Diaspora, there are countless people of African descent who have excelled in academia, sports, politics and other arenas. Soccer legend Edson Arames do Nascimento, better known as Pele, is such a person.

Pele is an Afro-Brazilian soccer player who played for the Brazilian National team for most of his career. Pele accomplished a great deal in his career, opening doors for many athletes who followed him.

To this day, Pele still has a lasting impact on soccer. He had an international fan base, and was one of the most electrifying players on a soccer field. He was inducted into the Soccer Hall of Fame, and the International Olympic Committee named him player of the century. He played soccer in America from 1975 to 1977 and caused an up-and -coming American soccer league to rise in popularity. Pele became the highest paid player in the sport, but insisted that he played soccer for

the love of the game. The life story of Pele is just as inspiring as his accomplishments on the field. He lived in poverty in a Brazilian barrio. 
