# Health Care Reform Goes to Capitol Hill



The debate continues as Students for Health Care Reform leave the Hilltop and head to Capitol Hill today to host "Howard on the Hill", a discussion with the "Any Other Options?" student run campaign. The forum asks congressional leaders about why health care is essential to young

Each volunteer for the "Any Other Options?" campaign committed to bringing 20 people between Sunday, Sept. 20 and today, Sept. 23 in hopes to bring a strong presence to Capitol Hill. The groups will leave in two shifts, 11 a.m. and 2 p.m., and travel to a hearing room on the Hill where they will have the opportunity to voice their concerns about the overall health care reform debate.

Students were bombarded by fliers throughout campus on Monday and Tuesday with a headline that read, "We're Not Too Young to Die...Join the Fight for Health care Reform". Below the headline was a mock obituary cover with a picture of first year Howard Law student Marcus Ware who is still living, but appears dead.

"A lot of college students and young adults do not emphasize health care much because we often consider ourselves young and healthy," Ware said. "We are all one sickness or one accident away

from really needing health care

before it's too late."

The cover of the flier contains a sunrise and sunset date, a date of demise and Dean of Rankin Chapel, Bernard Richardson, Ph.D., listed as the officiant for the pretentious service.

Students for Health care reform have also partnered with

the NAACP Howard Chapter, as well as chapters all over the D.C. area to bring more awareness toward health care in the black community.

School of Divinity SGA President, Joseph Smith chat with Howard students about the rising issues in the health care reform.

Joseph Smith, SGA President of the School of Divinity at Howard University and executive board member of Students For Health care Reform hopes that more constituents of Howard University will read up on the overall health care bill and reform plan.

Smith also mentioned that the thoughts and ideals expressed in the hearings are being recorded and documented, and Howard University students need to be heard.

"We will continue to lobby until this bill is passed," Smith said. "We have a commitment to the DMV area, students and the NAACP to continue in our activism. We just want Howard University students to make their voices heard amongst all of the advocates for this."

### Immigrants Allowed College Credit

Friday, Sept. 18, the North Carolina Board of Community Colleges voted to allow illegal immigrants to enroll at all two-year colleges within the state. This was the second vote that the legislative body has had on the matter. Thursday's previous vote had the same outcome.

The policy allows students who are not legally in the country to obtain out-of-state tuition at rates of \$7,000 a year. Students who are "lawful residents" would retain priority seating for crowded classrooms.

Scott Rolls, president of the North Carolina Community College System, released a statement on the policy change. "I commend our State Board on a positive conclusion to a very difficult task this policy reflects the admissions standards of other states and of the public universities by offering educational opportunity to those who are willing to work hard to obtain it."

In 2003, Stateline.org, the nonprofit online news site that reports specifically on state policy

### Obama Meets to Combat Pollution

President Obama attended his first U.N. summit on climate change Tuesday, with

much discussion about greenhouse pollution. Both China and America are the world's largest greenhouse gas

polluting nations. More than 50 presidents and 35 prime ministers attended the

event Though America is making efforts to recover from the economic recession, the President believes that an environmental clean-up is necessary.

"We understand the gravity of the climate threat. We are

determined to act, and we will meet our responsibility to future generations," said President Obama in an NPR posting.

China and the U.S. are responsible for nearly 20 percent of the world's greenhouse gas population. Whenever coal or natural gas is burned, greenhouse gas pollution is created.

According to NPR, Chairman of the United Nations believes "Heat waves, droughts, melting glaciers, loss of the

Greenland ice sheet and other dangers are fast approaching. The science leaves us with no room for inaction now."

President Obama is urging that progress is made and action takes place.



Action may be difficult if the Senate must vote in favor of the effort.

Over the summer the U.S. House of Representatives passed a bill that sought to set restrictions on greenhouse gas emissions: however the bill did not pass in the Senate.

"The threat from climate change is serious, it is urgent, and it is growing," said President Obama.



Despite investigation and deportation efforts, such as those pictured above, North Carolina has seen a constant rise in the amount of illegal immigrants in the state. The Board of Directors for the state community college system has voted to allow illegal immigrants to enroll in two-year programs. Ilegal allens, however, cannot receive in-state tuition for the state's public universities and colleges.

# Illegal Aliens Allowed College Enrollment

and politics, reported on the methods by which many states' governments were tackling the topic of illegal immigrants obtaining postsecondary education. The report said that between 2001 and 2003, 23 states had proposed bills that would allow "undocumented students" to obtain in-state tuition. California and Texas were among the first to pass the bills into law. According to a report done by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, the bills have also become law in Illinois, New York, Oklahoma, Utah and Washington state.

Ironically, North Carolina was among the states that introduced a bill to prohibit undocumented students from receiving in-state tuition. North Carolina Lt. Gov., Walter Dalton, was the only board member to vote "no" in Friday's vote. "People are losing their jobs. Unemployment is at its highest since the Great Depression, Dalton said. "These are the times when North Carolinians are turning to their community colleges for workforce retraining Now is not the time to increase the demands on our already overburdened community college system."

Rashod Wynn, a junior prepharmacy major from Kinston,

N.C., has mixed feelings about the change. "That's kind of messed up, because there are a lot of kids in North Carolina who aren't going to college and they're legal," Wynn said. He believes that illegal immigrants should be able to receive education because they will be more of an asset to the country, just not at the expense of others.

In his 2008 race for Lt. Gov., Dalton advocated for stricter policies on illegal immigrants, specifically policies concerning obtaining driver's licenses. "Every vote I ever cast was always intended to make it stricter," Dalton said, following a debate about the issue.

The Census Bureau does not

ask people their immigration status, but according to the Pew Hispanic Center, a research organization on the U.S. Hispanic population, the number of illegal immigrants was a reported 11.9 million in March of 2008 with an average increase of 275,000 a year.

Latino activist groups were said to have been excited about the decision the Board made on Friday. Yet, Gov. Beverly Perdue was not so supportive. "In all honesty and with due respect to the Board of Community Colleges, it's hard for me to understand why we would give an education to those who can't work legally in the country," she said to a North Carolina news station.

with President Obama's proposed Immigration Reform and Amnesty Bill, more "illegal immigrants" will have the opportunity to become official U.S. citizens. "We are not going to ship back 12 million people - We're going to make them pay a fine; they are going to have to learn English; they are going to have to go to the back of the line...but they will have a pathway to citizenship over the course of 10 years," Obama said.

The North Carolina Community College system is the third largest community college system in the nation, but is the first to vote to allow illegal aliens to enroll in twoyear programs.

## Kwame Speaks: Our Intellectual Moorings

In the 21st century academy, it is possible to earn a Bachelor's degree in any discipline or field of study and not be knowledgeable of the contributions of individuals of African descent to that specific discipline.

This statement is inclusive of some disciplines offered at some Historically Black Colleges and Universities. Regardless of the area of study, Africans and African Americans were largely responsible for the shaping of every discipline in the academy. Where they were not responsible for shaping it, they succeeded in using the various modes of inquiry inherent in these disciplines to examine the African

Africana Studies stands out as the one discipline that seeks to draw from these intellectual moorings to shape a unique discipline designed to explore the intellectual, cultural and social foundation of African people throughout the world.

However, as Professor Jules Harrell has said, "Everyone cannot be in Africana studies." Therefore, it is important that we cultivate scholars in the tradition of the intellectual forebears of Africana studies, to use their discipline as intellectual instruments for social change and new ideas in scholarship.

In the discipline of History, Africans have been major contributors in terms of correcting the European scholarly fraud inherent in the field. Carter Godwin Woodson, known for creating and instituting Negro History Week, was also one of the most important intellectual forces in the field. Author of works such as "The Negro in Our History," and "Handbook for the Study of the Negro" were early major

Creation of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History and the "Journal of the Ne-

ard professor, Rayford Logan, were watershed moments in the study of African-American history.

However, historians such as William Wells Brown, George Washington Williams, Hosea Eaton, Edward Wilmot Blyden and notably Martin Robinson Delany wrote seminal works in the field.

These are just a few of the 19th century contributors to African-American history. The American Negro Academy, headed by Alexander Crummell, is but one of the many organizations that advanced the study of African-Americans. Delany, William Leo Hansberry and Druscilla Dungee Houston among others pioneered the study of ancient African history giving rise to a cadre of scholars that included Chickh Anta Diop,

gro history," later headed by How- John Henrik Clarke, Jacob Carruthers, Chancellor Williams and many others.

The great interdisciplinarian, William Edward Burghardt Dubois, was instrumental in the field of Sociology, his work, "The Philadelphia Negro," stands alone. Other key African sociologists include: Horace Mann-Bond, Horace Cayton, Charles Johnson, E. Franklin Frazier, and St. Clair Drake. Drake, along with Zora Neal Hurston known for creating The Hilliop), were two of the first African-Amer-

icans trained in Anthropology. In the area of Philosophy, African Americans have also long been pioneers; Alain Locke was instrumental in the development of Africana Philosophy and a forerunner to Lucius Outlaw, and Howard's own Segun Gbadegesin. Afri-

can Americans have also produced scholars in literature that broke new ground; chief among them is J. Saunders Redding, whose seminal work "To Make a Poet Black," changed the game.

African-American literature owes much of its reawakening to Delany, Dubois, as well as Sterling Brown, James Baldwin, Toni Cade Bambara, Amiri Baraka, and Addison Gayle, Jr. The contributions in Linguistics by Lorenzo Dow Turner are monumental and the work of Theophile Obenga contributes to the understanding of Ebonics, not only in English but in all languages African people have adopted. Political science should include the seminal the works of W.E.B. Dubois, David Walker, Maria Stewart, and the work of Ronald W. Walters and Mack Jones

Charles Hamilton Houston should be known as a pioneer and not a footnote in the study of Law. In African-American education, names such as Asa Hilliard and Barbara Sizemore must enter the conversation. In Psychology, the name Allison Davis is one of a slew of African-American psychologists whose names should resonate for their contributions to the field. Recent contributions in this field by Na'Im Akbar, Asa Hilliard, Wade Nobles, should be studied by all.

In Business and Economics, the name Hubert Henry Harrison should enter the conversation for his contributions to economic theory. In Mathematics, contributors such as Abdulalim Abdullah Shabazz should be known. In Communications, a study of individuals such as Gil Noble in broadcast journalism would greatly shape the minds of students in the field. In the arts, Romare Bearden (visual), Jacob Lawrence (visual), Alvin Ailey (dance), Haile Gerima (film), and in music and drama such as August Wilson, Lorraine Hansberry, W.C. Handy, Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, Dizzy Gillespie, Miles Davis, Ella Fitzgerald, Sarah Vaughan, among countiess others should be known and studied.

Medicine should continue to elevate the works of Daniel Hale Williams, Charles Drew, as well as the countless African-American non-traditional physicians from the 18th and 19th centuries.

This list is by all means not nearly exhaustive of the intellectual contributions of Africans and African Americans to the academy, it however shows the range of African intellectual ability much of which is ignored in the traditional disciplines.

As African Americans in the academy, it is our job to understand their contributions and in many cases update their analysis to address present day conditions in our

First of all, if you can't answer the, "for what?" question, your movement will be unsuccessful and move merely toward mediocrity. The goal needs to be clearly defined and explicitly articulated throughout every aspect of the campaign. Imagine a group of people walking without anywhere to go. The impressiveness of getting people to move is negated by the lack of destination. Get into the dorms, classrooms, cafeterias, and everywhere else to speak to students on an individual basis.

I have been proud of these movements so far, and I hope they continue to inspire and motivate students. However, if we want them to result in actual change, it's time to get serious, strategic, and specific. Otherwise we will continue to let MSNBC and CNN frame the debate for us.

### Howard H.U.G.S.

Today in The Punchout from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., Howard University Police Department along with the Howard University Student Association and Student Safety Office are hosting a Public Service Announcement to launch student registration for Bisonconnect.

Bisonconnect is an initiative started by the HUPD to improve the safety of Howard University students both on and off campus. "Alert-HU", which acts as an emergency notification system that can reach students, faculty, and in some cases students' parents via e-mail, voice mail and text-messaging, is used in case of inclement weather, school closings, area emergencies and more.

The newly introduced component of Bisonconnect is the Howard University Guardian Service, or H.U.G.S., is a "personal safety program that enables the Howard University community to be monitored and directly connected to the HUPD.

H.U.G.S. can be activated one of two ways, by timer, or by panic phone call, through registering your cell phone number with the HUPD.

The timer acts as a simple precautionary alert notification, that can be activated when you are in route to a location. Once you arrive to your location safely, you can deactivate the timer. But if the timer surpasses a certain period, or a student issues a panic call, HUPD is immediately

notified to take further action to investigate the call.

Lieutenant Brian K. Jones is the project manager of the Howard University Guardian Service. Lt. Jones has carefully evaluated and tested the system and is very confident that the Howard University community will feel a sense of safety.

The panic alert is implemented when an individual needs the HUPD in case of an immediate emergency.

H.U.G.S. is creating a positive buzz amongst students that spend a significant amount of time on campus at night. The system was first brought to his attention by Police Chief James from seeing the same system at American University and it proving to be effective.

"The initial system at American University is paid for by the students. We felt it was a wonderful system, but wanted to find a way to fund it so it would be free of charge to our students," James said.

Jones wants to enforce that this new system is not just for students but for the Howard University community in general, including staff and employees from Howard University Hospital (HUH):

Since the new system requires Howard University e-mail accounts, there will be an Information Systems and Services representative at the event to assist with any problems regarding HU e-mail accounts.



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
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

> Today however, we're presented with a strikingly different caliber of African-American sitcoms.

> Gone are the shows like "Moesha," "One on One" and "All of Us," fallen victim to abrupt cancellations, complete with unresolved cliffhangers. We are instead presented with a pretty different quality of black family related sitcoms, featuring dirty-mouthed, animated children ("The Boondocks") or shucking and jiving jesters (Tyler Perry's noted

sitcoms "House of Payne" and "Meet the Browns").

Again, we watch these shows; we laugh; we buy the DVD sets. But what an interesting shift we've encountered in the 25 years since the "Cosby era" - at this rate, what will be the state of black family sitcoms in 25 more years?
