

Slowe Hall Flooded by Leak

Maintenance work aimed at securing heat for satisfying the demands for heat from chilly Slowe Hall residents left the dorm flooded with a new problem.

A radiator leak caused an water to rush down the stairs and gush from the pipes Tuesday afternoon.

According to Slowe employee and sophomore civil engineering major Jordan Rivers, the problem started when the radiator on the right side of the building that lies between the first and second floor burst. Brown water ran down the stairs into the lobby. The lobby flood caused the staff to temporarily close the area.

Acting Dean of Residence Life Marc Lee said the radiator problem was due to faulty piping that leaked when the system was being charged in preparation for the heating cycle.

As a consequence, Residence Life turned off the water supply valve to halt the flow of water throughout the area.

"To provide a point of clarity, what occurs when the mechanical system is made active is that it is going from an inactive or dormant state during the spring and summer months to an active state during fall into the winter months," Lee said. "I have been informed, by the PFM Engineering Department, that problems may occur in the system when being charged due to seasonal changes and that some pipes may begin to leak after not being active for a period of time."

The entire housekeeping staff stayed behind after the end of their regular shifts to clean the

Student Petitions for Extension

Before he came to college, freshman Justin Senu-Oke worked out two hours every day. Now, with his busy college schedule as a freshman class representative, that number is down to zero.

"I'm involved in several extracurricular activities, and...with all this going on I find it hard to hit the weight room between 5 and 9 p.m.," said Senu-Oke, College of Arts and Sciences (COAS) freshman class representative.

Senu-Oke is petitioning to extend the hours of the weight room, cardio area and lower area of Burr Gymnasium as a solution.

Senu-Oke's petition stated, "The weight room and lower gym of Burr Gymnasium are currently open to students on weekdays between 5:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. and on Saturdays between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. On Sundays, these areas are variably closed to students. We would like weekday operational hours to be extended until midnight; Saturday hours to be extended until 5:00 p.m., and Sun-


day operational hours to be incorporated between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m."

It continues, "The cardio area of Burr Gymnasium is open to students Monday through Saturday between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. On Sundays,

this area is variably closed to students. We would like Monday through Saturday operational hours to be extended until Midnight and Sunday operational hours to be incorporated between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00p.m."

According to Debra Johnson, a fitness professor in Burr Gymnasium, Senu-Oke's demands do not seem feasible.

"I doubt this would happen. A lot of things need to go into planning: how we would pay for this and how many students would actually use [Burr] during those

hours," Johnson said. "After certain times of the evening it doesn't make much sense to stay open when there are facilities in the dorms that aren't even being used to [their] fullest potential."

Several campus dormitories have work out facilities, such as the Howard Plaza Towers, Cook Hall, Bethune Annex and the Tubman Quadrangle.

"I stay in the West Towers, and I honestly never really see anyone in the weight room," said

Some Want to Kill The Death Penalty

A report recently released by the Death Penalty Information Center has revealed that, with budget cuts coast to coast, the United States has run into great difficulty in paying for death row programs.

According to the report, the United States spends \$6.8 billion on the death penalty each year, and budget cuts have made that number impossible to keep inmates on death row without a timely execution.

Those in favor of capital punishment agree that it is detrimental to keep inmates on death row for so long, and have proposed that legislation be put into place to limit the amount of time an inmate can be kept on death row before execution.

Those who oppose the death penalty say these alarming numbers are even more of a reason to do away with the death penalty, arguing that it is a waste of money to keep people in jail for so long only to kill them.

In an interview with

CNN, Kent Scheidegger, legal director of the Sacramento, Calif.-based Criminal Justice Legal Foundation said, "I think we need to build support for the death penalty and need to impose it more regularly where it is warranted."

Proponents also contend that part of the problem is many states have added unnecessary, time-consuming delays that hold up the legal system in terms of execution.

Junior administration of justice major Chris Paige feels the change is going to cause even more of a problem. "I think that's going to cause costs to go up more, " Paige said. "Because people will be spending more time in prisons and [prisons] will stay crowded."

The death penalty has been a large part of the United States justice system for nearly a century. Even though the numbers have drastically decreased in recent years, there are still a significant amount of inmates on death row. California has the largest number of inmates on death row, with 678 listed inmates.



mess. They were able to clean the area, but a slow leak continued.

Hours after the incident; pipes in the stairwell and the radiator still dripped with water while housekeeping waited on maintenance to return.

Before the incident, junior political science major Dorien Blythers said several ceiling tiles in the lobby were removed and maintenance was working on fixing a leak Tuesday morning. Rivers confirmed and said maintenance was repairing that leak when the radiator burst.

It caught them by surprise, Rivers said. But the problems come as no surprise to the students, who have been dealing with rolling blackouts, lack of wireless connectivity capabilities and lack of heat in addition to facility issues as The Hilltop reported Tuesday.

more psychology major said, "My reaction was what else could break in this place. We already don't have heat and Internet. As far as the Internet goes I think they should have someone in the dorm who knows how to fix it."

Burchette took pictures of the lobby area when the leak happened but was unable to send them due to the lack of internet.

According to Lee, Residence Life have been actively working on all of the Internet problems.

"Part of the wireless problem will be addressed by replacing the radio tower. There have been several contractors to complete repairs within the residence halls, although some of the problems have returned and when that occurs students should re-submit a request in those instances," Lee said.

Lee said the heat traditionally turns on in all residence halls by Oct. 15, but does not consider this to be late.

lems with the heating system in other residence halls such as the Towers, however. In terms of the Towers, Residence Life does intend to adjust the heat levels to match the comfort of the students today.

"The process of maintenance repairs may have many steps depending on what the problem is; although we maintain communication with each department we work with, on the residents' behalf, through each of those steps to provide quality service to our students," Lee said. "Oftentimes, the maintenance questions that are taken forward outside of any particular residence hall or the Department of Residence Life before being asked within only complicate the problem. If only [students] allowed someone to assist them in resolving the matter within the hall or the department we could serve them better. We want to serve their needs and if given a chance to, we will serve their needs."

Alicia Husbands, a junior biology major. "I doubt people would leave their room to go to Burr when they barely want to go downstairs to work out."

Outside of problems with potential usage of Burr after hours, safety of the students is another issue facing Senu-Oke's extension plans.

"It's not a very safe idea," said Tracy Wyatt, a desk assistant in Burr Gymnasium. "When it gets past about 9:00, everything gets way more dangerous. We wouldn't want to put students at risk."

Despite the obstacles facing his proposal, Senu-Oke does not plan on giving up that easily. He said getting signatures is only step one. He plans to work with the

Howard University Student Association (HUSA) and faculty to determine the factors preventing the extension of hours.

"From there [we want] to determine how best to proceed in order to get the hours extended to what the students, who are paying tuition to have the gym opened in the first place, want them to be," he said.

The COAS freshman class representative already has student body support as demonstrated by the hundreds of signatures on his extension petition.

"The idea actually seems great to me," said Fatima Rashid, a senior marketing major. "I really would love to get a late night work

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

Interracial dating and the number of interracial relationships in professional and collegiate sports is an increasingly hot topic among the urban community.

Reggie Bush, Kobe Bryant and Tiger Woods, to name a few, are some athletes who have been in an interracial relationship.

Many black athletes find themselves in interracial relationships for various reasons. Coach Merritt of Howard University's Track and Field Team had a theory of his own.

"Once civil rights laws were passed, it opened doors to allow reequitment of black athletes," Merntt said. "Black males got curious and wanted to see what it was like to date outside their culture."

Graduate sports management major Michael Glasby agreed with coach Merritt to some extent.

A random survey was distributed to non-white athletes, both males and females, at several colleges and universities around the country on why they might date outside their race. Women, on the other hand, had one simple response. They see no color when it comes to relationships. Ricky Harris, senior basketball player at the University of Massachusetts said he dates white women because they are easier to deal with.

"They don't complain as much as black women; they are also way less demanding." Harris



But when does race become important to determine a relationship? And are we misinformed on interracial dating within

Several professional athletes have black wives. According to the articles on Biglead.com, a sports news and rumors blog and Answers, Yahoo, com. percent of NBA players have black wives. These Web sites go on to say that the reason America has a false impression that black athletes interracially date is because the media highlights an athlete's wife who is not African American five times more than showing one of their same race.

Biglead.com went on to give an example on how, during the 2000 NBA playoffs, Shaquille O'Neal of the Los Angeles Lakers announced his engagement to a black woman and the media did not cover the en-

gagement. However, when fellow teammate Kobe Bryant announced his engagement to a non-African American woman, the media did

"The media has to sell tickets," coach Merritt said. "They have to have stories outside the

norm and a black athlete dating a Caucasian woman is big news and if the athlete does anything to harm the women it makes for even bigger

Tennis star Serena Williams dated a white man in the past. The media chastises black female athletes for interracially dating instead of praising them.

"Black women athletes are looked at in a more negative light when it comes to interracial dating; it's this double standard Americans seem to have," Glasby said.

There were rumors that said Williams stopped dating black guys because they were the wrong choice for a successful black woman. Killian Lewis, senior broadcast journalism major, wants black women to venture out and begin dating outside their races.

"I like how Serena had a white boyfriend," she said. "If male athletes can do it then why not women. I know I don't discriminate; neither should they."

Many young athletes are beginning to experiment dating outside of their race. According Urbansportstalk.wordpress. com, a vast majority of black athletes are removed from black areas when they are given scholarships to attend white colleges.

It's during this time when socialization with diverse groups will ultimately influence an athlete's perception.

"I know when I was getting recruited to play basketball, I was introduced to a lot of women as a perk for coming to their school. Most of the women were white," Harris said.

Although times have changed since the civil rights era, interracial dating in the world of sports is a phenomenon that is growing and will continue to be a hot topic.

A Bison You Should Know: David Marshall

Golf teacher assistant (T.A.) and Howard student David Marshall did not begin to take golf seriously until he challenged his uncle to a golf match after attempting to play in his grandmother's backyard. After the challenge date was set he began taking beginner lessons at his local golf course.

immediately was hooked," Marshall said. "I pracgced hitting everyday, but I never played."

Marshall went on to win the match against his uncle and started to practice the game everyday. The more he practiced, the more he got noticed.

"I started getting money to play, but I had to dumb down the game so I could hit the ball straight and put it in the hole," he said.

In 2002, Marshall took a friend's advice and began the necessary steps to become a professional golfer. Marshall approached a professional at a golf course about becoming his assistant while working as a golf cart cleaner at a course.

"He told me that if I could pass the PAT (Players Ability Test), that he would hire me in a heartbeat, so I went online and signed up," Marshall said.

The day of the test there were 69 players and there were only two African Americans, one Asian and the rest were White.

"I've never [felt] so out of place on a golf course before," he

Marshall excelled on his PAT and won honors for the lowest score, which is a positive indicator in golf, but instead of the professional giving him a job as an assistant, he told him to try another golf

It was at this point that Marshall said he realized that his journey to a career as a professional golfer wasn't going to be easy. For the next several months, Marshall went around to different golf courses trying to get a job as an assistant to a professional. He ended up settling on picking up golf balls, or "picking cotton," until he obtained his PGA card.

To manifest his dreams further, Marshall moved to North Carolina to start his career. The Tar Heel Tour was Marshall's first official professional golf tournament.

"I was really excited because it was my first tour, but when I got there I was greeted with a less than friendly welcome," he said. "It was then that I realized that the south was still alive and kicking."

Marshall continued to do

tournaments in North Carolina but initially, did not have much luck; he wasn't winning anything. He had gotten so discouraged that he contemplated leaving the area until he met James Black. Black was the first black golfer to shoot a 67 in a PGA event. Marshall studied under Black and eventually won his first tournament. He won four tournaments in all.

"James taught me three important ingredients of success: knowledge of self, trust in the spirit that guides you and an unshakable commitment to your intended purpose," he said.

In 2008, Marshall returned to Washington D.C. to finish his degree at Howard and be the golf T.A. He felt that if he could commit and be successful at golf, then he could put the same efforts into finishing his degree.



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
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

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Morehouse Student Receives More Than \$1 Million in Scholarships

There is one college student walking the campus of Morehouse College that will not be eating Ramen noodles for dinner. Freshman Derrius Quarles was awarded over \$1 million in scholarships on his way to college, and has proven that

when the effort is put forth, it is possible to get funding for college.

A native of Chicago, Quarles has managed to remain safe from the path of stray bullets, and away from involvement in drugs, making his way to Morehouse without having to pay for anything.

Not having either of his parents around, Quarles has lived

independently, as a ward of the state, since he was 17 years old.

He is hesitant when it comes to talking about his rough. childhood, and contends that calling it "rough" would be an understatement. At the age of 4, his father was stabbed to death, and his mother struggled with drugs, a habit that continues to plague her

Then, at age 5, he was taken away from his mother and placed into the care of various other family members. Quarles, however, does not allow his lack of parental involvement control his present, or his future.

"You can't go around thinking you are inferior just because you didn't have parents," Quarles said.

Rather than allow his circumstances deter him from achievement, he has used them as

"I began applying for scholarships my sophomore year of high school. I applied to over forty," and it paid off. Quarles was offered more than \$1 million in scholarships from various colleges and scholarship organizations including The Gates Millennium Scholarship, which was founded by Microsoft Corporation Chairman Bill Gates and his wife, Melinda. Quarles was awarded exactly \$1,150,000 and accepted only \$355,000.

At Morehouse, Quarles has quickly come to realize how easy it is to get caught up in the social aspect of college life. He currently balances attending classes, studying and participating in many extracurricular activities. He says however, that he stays focused and avoids getting "caught up."

"It's no one really watching you," Quarles said. "It's really up to you. I'm used to it though, because of what I've had to go through."

Although, he is hundreds of

miles away from his beloved hometown of Chicago, he says he will never forget his upbringing.

"For me, it's about knowing where you are from and accepting it, but more important, knowing where you are going." Quarles

Quarles recently appeared on CNN's Newsroom where he was interviewed by Don Lemon about how he managed to achieve and beat-the-odds. As an interviewee, Quaries was granted the opportunity to share his story with the masses, and that is something for which Quarles has said that he is grateful for

Many call him lucky, but

Quarles contends that "It's not called luck. It's called hard work. I took control of my destiny and I hope my story will inspire others to do the same."

Quaries is currently pursuing a bachelor of arts degree in psychology, with the hopes of one day receiving a doctorate degree in public health.

Kwame Speaks: The Meaning, Value, and Standard of Education

"If a [sick] man dies shall he live again? We do not know. But this we do know, that our children's children live forever and grow and develop toward perfection as they are trained. All human problems, then, center in the Immortal Child and his (her) education is the problem of problems..."

In carefully examining this quote, among many others from Dr. W.E.B. DuBois, it becomes evident that he believed education leads to salvation for African people at home and abroad. Furthermore, Dr. DuBois sought education as a means to combat greed, egotism, and debauchery among other so-

cial ills. That being said, why don't we take our education more seriously? We, as college students, must begin to reassess the fundamental purpose of education, our purposes for getting an education, and "their" intent of our education.

George G. M. James, author of "Stolen Legacy" proposes that the purpose of education is to become more God-like. Similarly, in the Bible, Hosea 4:6, reads, "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge; because you have rejected knowledge, I reject you from being a priest to me. And since you have forgotten the law of your God, I also will forget your children."

To use a more secular definition, the purpose of education is to acquire knowledge such that it can be used for the dissemination of service amongst people. Dr. DuBois said that "the object of education is manhood and womanhood, clear reason, individual talent and genius and the spirit of service and sacrifice, and not simply frantic effort to avoid change in present institutions; that industry is for man and not man for industry and that while we must have workers to work, the prime object of our training is not the work but the worker - not the maintenance of present industrial caste but the development of human intelligence by which drudgery may be lessened and beauty widened."

The question may be asked:

if we accept any of the aforementioned as true, do our intents and purposes of education coincide?

For example, some question why major in Africana Studies? What job can you get with a degree in Africana studies? These questions presuppose that the purpose of education is to get a job. If that is the case, we have failed to live up to our potential.

Dr. DuBois and Booker T. Washington debated on the purpose of education, and while Booker T. Washington asserted that it was best (especially during the times) for Africans in America to receive a vocational education to build their economic power, Dr. DuBois believed that a liberal education should be the priority and vocational training secondary. Most students agree more with Dr. DuBois, ideologically, than they do with Booker T. Washington.

However, in recent times, students and former students seem to have mixed and matched both Dr. DuBois' and Booker T. Washington's ideologies where they saw fit. As a result we have students receiving a "liberal" education, not to be men and women, but contrary to this, to get a job. For example, some of our public intellectuals including but not limited to Dr. Henry "Skip" Gates, Dr. Cornel West, Dr. Michael Eric Dyson, and Dr. Eddie Glaude all received their education to get jobs. This appears to be one of the objectives of

the "system." "They," the inventors of the western academy and the modern world system, intend for our education to uphold and not rebel against the system. Dr. DuBois says that the academy "aims not at the full development of the child, but that the world regards and always has regarded education first as a means of buttressing the established order of things rather than improving them."

Because of this we must use the academy as one of the many vehicles of obtaining education. It is apparent that the academy has taken the position of making us believe

that "if our stomachs are full it matters little about our brains." In the depths of our hearts we know this is false so let us reassess our education Since 2001, America used approxiand look for alternative means to a truly well-rounded education.

In summary, the purpose of education is to become men and women. Currently, the academy is not set-up to produce men and women so we must solicit for other means of education such that we can achieve our fullest potential. Dr. DuBois said, "As in the Great War, we discover soldiers too ignorant to use our machines of murder and destruction, we train them - to use the machines of murder and destruction. If mounting wealth calls for intelligent workmen, we mush tumultuously to train workers - in order to increase our wealth. But of great, broad plans to train all men for all things - to make a universe

intelligent, busy, good, creative and beautiful - where in this wide world is such an educational program?" mately \$1 trillion on wars in Iraq and Afghanistan accumulatively.

True education is clearly not a priority. Dr. DuBois asserts that "[we] sin because in our befuddled brains we have linked money and education inextricably." "We assume that only the wealthy have a real right to education when, in fact, being born is being given a right to college training. Our wealth today is, we all know, distributed mainly by chance inheritance and personal favor and yet we attempt to base the right to education on this foundation. The result is grotesque! We bury genius; we send it to jail: we ridicule and mock it, while we send mediocrity and idiocy to college, gilded and crowned ... " Let us not make a mockery of education. "One day we'll read more than Souls of Black Folk."


All-White Party and ResFest Step Show were memorable too.

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
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Students Struggle in the **Howard Plaza Towers**
