It looks as though the list of well-accomplished Howard University Alumni can add one more member to the ranks. Proclaiming herself to be more than just a pageant girl, Miss Black USA 2009 Shayna Rudd has added another achievement to her already extensive list.

Born to a father who was addicted to drugs, the Philadelphia native said that she would lie in her bed at night and think of what she would say when she finally got to speak to Oprah. Dreaming always to be famous, Rudd told The Hilltop that she has always had a heart for humanity and, in fact, cried when Tupac died because she realized that his dream and his purpose would go into the grave with him. Rudd, who graduated from Howard University with a joint degree in journalism and African-American Studies in 2007, has maintained that she is just at the beginning of her career, and there is no stopping her. A strong advocate for her faith, she revealed that she believes that she was called for greatness. saying that "Shayna Rudd is nothing without God." Starting her pageant career here at Howard, she won the title of Miss Black and Gold sponsored by the Beta Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. and then she went on to run for the title of Miss Howard University. Her platform was "Project T.E.S.T.I.M.O.N.Y." which got her recognized by a Miss America representative who was in the audience and convinced her to try her hand at another pageant: the Miss District of Columbia Pageant.

Contrary to the tradition in pageantry, Rudd won the title of Miss D.C. her first try, and became one of three Black women to compete for the title of Miss America in 2008.

At a time that should have been the best in her life, her experience was overshadowed by the fact that she was in an abusive relationship. While the relationship never became physically abusive, Rudd and in the surrounding area. It wasn't until her senior year, however, that LadyDiva Corporation was born. Now a registered nonprofit organization, LadyDiva corporation operates under the motto "Having the Audacity to Dream."

Rudd is carrying out her term as Miss Black USA through a series of public appearances, and has also released her own book. After 11 months of writing, editing, and publishing, her dream of becoming an author finally came into fruition when her first book was released on Jan. 31, 2010. The book is volume one in the ten volume series, "Lady Lessons: The LadyDiva Guide to Embracing the Truth About You" and has gotten many positive reviews from critics and readers alike. The Hilltop asked Rudd how she felt after completing her first published work and the smile in her voice was contagious. "I felt real, and human. I had finally allowed myself to be honest and it was like nothing I had ever felt before." Laughing about feeling like Carrie Bradshaw from Sex and the City, Rudd said the best advice she can give to Howard students is to "never let Satan rob you of your dreams, and never blend in."

After not winning Miss America, and ending a relationship with a man who had no respect for her, Rudd says that she began to get her life in order and "get my swag back."

While she was working as a teacher in the Washington, D.C. area, she won another title; the title of Miss Black Pennsylvania. This propelled her into a national competition where she was crowned Miss Black USA 2009.

In her sophomore year at Howard, Rudd had the idea to start an organization that would help empower young women who were dealing with issues around campus The book is best described as a guide to self-worth, through loving yourself and realizing the potential within you. EPA Administrator Visits HU

While many viewed the Mid-Atlantic blizzard as a hassle causing mounds of snow and ice, the government used the severe weather to reignite the national debate about environmentalism.

The administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) visited Howard's campus to debunk myths about environmentalism and highlight the critical role young people will play in increasing the community's understanding of "green" issues.

As a part of the seventh annual James M. Nabrit, Jr. Lecture Series, EPA administrator Lisa P. Jackson spoke on the topic before a packed audience in the School of Law. The lecture series honors Nabrit, who was a pioneering civil rights lawyer for the NAACP Legal Defense and Education Fund and former Howard professor of law.

During her speech, Jackson demonstrated the struggle of explaining environmentalism by sharing how difficult it was to inform her mother about her decision to work for EPA. She said her mother did not understand why environmentalism mattered.

New Orleans Elects First White Mayor in 30 Years


Fresh off the city's first Super Bowl win against the Indianapolis Colts, New Orleans experienced another major change as Mitch Landrieu, brother of Sen. Mary Landrieu (D-La.), won the city's mayoral race to become the first white mayor since 1979. The last white mayor in the city was Landricu's father, Moon Landrieu. The mayor-elect is Louisiana's current lieutenant governor. He attended Jesuit High School in New Orieans before moving to Washington D.C. to attend Catholic University. He then practiced law for 15 years after receiving his degree from Loyola

University of New Orleans.

Landrieu has been involved in Louisiana politics for over 20 years and ran for the position four years ago with hopes of speeding up Hurricane Katrina recovery. He lost to the incumbent mayor in a rumoff.

With 66 percent of voters behind him this time around, Landrieu will replace term-limited Mayor C. Ray Nagin, who has been losing popularity from years of failed recovery efforts following the storm, and comments that New Orleans would be "chocolate at the end of the day." According to 2008 U.S. Census Bureau statistics, nearly 62 percent of the New Orleans' residents considered themselves "black," while 34 percent identified themselves as "white." According to the statistics, in 2008, New Orleans' population of white residents was the second smallest in Louisiana.

Nearly five years into New Orleans' recovery, Landrieu's campaign site boasts that he will help the storm-ravaged city become > See **POLITICS**, page 3

For \$10, Howard students can get a ticket to see talent from their peers, the Cool Kids and Nikko "Youngsta" Rogers will also be performing live in Cramton Auditorium. The Cool Kids and Youngsta are both natives of Chicago, "Its a great opportunity for me to expand my fan base and show the people of Howard University what I have to offer," said Youngsta. He added how "blessed" he felt to have the opportunity to perform for the Howard community.

World War 3 also gives up and coming rappers, like Joshua Stapleton, a member of CPU, the opportunity to highlight their talents. "I'm trying to mark myself as

the top rookie rapper, and gain respect from my fans and peers," Stapleton said. He will be performing the song "Go In" from his mixtape "Family Business." By performing at the talent show music artists, like Stapleton, have a chance to get noticed by a music label like last year's performer Jeremih, who performed his single "Birthday Sex." Jeremih was signed from his appearance at CPU's talent show,

"secure, protected by strong levees and a restored coast." Other goals on Landrieu's agenda include creating more jobs, better schools and safer streets in the city that experienced two murders within the first three days of 2010.

Tianny Sims, junior mathematics major and resident of New Orleans, said though Landrieu's choice to run for mayor seemed "shady" because he would be taking a position with less pay, his race was not something she considered.

"The color of his skin is nothing," said Sims, who intended to vote for another white candidate, John Georges. "The best candidates in this [election] were white. It's

not about their race; it's about who is going to get the job done."

Sims said she hopes Landrieu will use his political experience to make changes that are necessary for the city, unlike Nagin, whom she said "was more of a businessman than a politician."

"I hope he can improve the city and not be idle in his position," Sims said. Referring to Landricu's agenda, she added, "If you're going to bring more business, then bring more business. If you're going to fix the school system, then fix the school system. Don't just sit idly. Fix the problems that need to be fixed, and improve the city."

Changing Politics Controversy Arises Over 'We Are The World' Remake

Exactly 25 years ago, musicians from every end of the spectrum came together to sing a song about the state of the world, and how to fix it. This year, in the wake of the massive earthquake that struck Haiti's capital Port-au-Prince in January, artists have united to remake "We are the World, adding a modern twist.

While none of the original artists were featured on the new track, original songwriter Lionel Richie and producer Quincy Jones were present when the song was recorded, in order to ensure!a successful recording. Singer Janet Jackson sang alongside a recording of her late brother Michael Jackson's part in the original recording.

The culmination of new gave a new spin on an old school track. With popular artists such #3 Celine Dion, Jennifer Hudson and Kanye West, the recording has a series of new sound elements, such as Auto-Tune, that were not present in the original.

single has done better than it's predecessor in terms of it's chart rating. Jackson said, "It took a reallife incident to make her understand what environmentalism was all about."

Jackson said the hurricane's

does more than cut back on bills; it has an additional, positive impact on a person's surroundings by decreasing carbon emissions.

Jackson said the poor are often burdened with low air and nuclear reactors in Georgia. The nuclear reactors would be the first construction of nuclear furnaces in nearly 30 years.

While recycling was praised, Jackson said common practices such as covering cracks in doors and windows during wintertime

After winning her sixth Mid-Easter Athletic Conference (MEAC) Rookie of the Week award this season, it is safe to say that redshirt freshman forward, Saadia Doyle, is well on her way to quickly becoming a star of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference.

Doyle splashed onto the scene recording 16 points and 12 rebounds in her first regular season game as a Bison. Twentythree games later, the Bison are 12-12 overall and Doyle is averaging 17 points and 11 rebounds per contest, with a total of 14 doubledoubles.

"Saadia has been successful because of her consistency," freshman forward, Kara Smith said. "She knows her role and without a doubt she brings it in practice and in the games."

Doyle, a 5'10" McDonald's All-American nominee from Atlanta, was a major addition of the Bison 2008 recruiting class.

However, while playing in a summer league game for the Bison, Doyle tore her Anterior Crucial Ligament, sidelining her for the upcoming 2008-09 season.

Nicknamed "Sadiez" by her teammates, Doyle worked frivo-





NATION & WORLD **Obama To End "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" Policy**

Plans are being made to cease a 17 year policy requiring homosexual soldiers to conceal sexual preferences



The "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" Policy has been in place for more than a decade and has prevented homosexuals in the U.S. military from revealing their sexual preferences. President Obama is seeking to put an end to this policy.

"Don't Ask, Don't Tell" will be abolished if President Barack Obama can help it. Braving what he called "Snowmaggedon" last week, the president promised to a standing ovation at the Democratic National Committee that he would about their sexuality from the military.

The policy, which has been in place since 1993, is part of President Obama's first-term agenda and now he is working with the Department of Defense to repeal the law.

They also announced a new policy that the Department of the Defense has put into place that will III, a member of Howard Unihelp to protect the rights of homosexuals whose sexual orientation is not revealed willingly. The policy, which will not need to be in place if "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" is repealed, will not take action to discharge members whose sexual orientation is revealed by third parties or jilted partners. A full repeal of the law requires an act of Congress.

Arguments have been raised that the president has begun to take on too many issues at one time; dealing with healthcare and the two wars in the Middle East. Despite the administration's immense agenda, sophomore architecture major David Glover is happy that the administration is addressing the issue now, as opposed to later.

"If gay people can't have all the same rights as other citizens, in terms of marriage and their families, then at least they'll be able to be themselves when fighting to protect this nation abroad."

Polls show that most Americans do support allowing openly gay citizens to enlist in the United States Armed Forces. A vast majority of Americans did not agree when "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" was introduced and enacted 17 years ago;

Meanwhile, a 2006 Zogby International Poll suggests threefourths of all Iraq and Afghanistan veterans are comfortable around

gay soldiers. Yet, the process to repeal the law is not expected to be quick not easy.

Sophomore Clifford Dalson versity's Reserve Officer's Training Corps (ROTC) is in favor of efforts to repeal the law. He believes repealing the law would allow more people to join the military, especially those who want to do so posthigh school or need more financial support to attend college. In Dalson's opinion, it does not make logical sense for the government to limit service opportunities based on sexual preference.

"I don't think it makes a difference when it comes to the military's productivity and efficiency because whether your comrade is gay or straight, it doesn't make a difference if they're able to follow orders or their accuracy in shooting or anything like that," Dalson said.

Arguments for repealing the policy include those saying that the rule directly contradicts the United States Constitution's statement that "we hold these truths to be selfevident that all men are created equal ... "

Arguments against repealing the policy include those saying that the policy will create an uncomfortable environment in the military.

Both arguments have been heard time and time again. The road to repeal started with the Obama administration, and if all goes according to plan, it will be repealed before he leaves.

U.S. Engineer Crashes Plane Into Federal Building

A disgruntled software engineer who had conflicts with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) intentionally crashed a small plane into a federal office building containing multiple tax offices in Austin, Texas. Authorities identified the pilot as Joseph Andrew Stack, a 53-year-old Texas resident who also burned his house down and left a suicide note explaining his actions.

"If you're reading this, you no doubt have to ask yourself, 'Why did this have to happen?"" Stack said in the note. "The simple truth is that it is complicated and has been coming for a long time."

The suicide note was posted to a social media Web site, but was quickly taken down at the request of the FBI. In the note, he discussed his thoughts, "in light of the storm raging in my head."

Stack launched into a tirade against the federal government claiming it brainwashed children into a false belief that the government stands for justice for all or for freedom. He also spoke out against taxation without representation but said that people who truly stand up for such a principle are labeled a "crackpot, traitor or worse,"

In addition, the kamikaze pilot railed against the bailed out executives of General Motors who are "a handful of thugs and plunderers," as well as drug and insurance companies who are "murdering tens of thousands of people a year and stealing from the corpses of the victims they cripple."

Stack was also angry with politicians of all party affiliations and the IRS, which he believed unfairly provided tax loopholes to big corporations and the Catholic Church, but not to average Americans.

Stack admitted that he tried to exploit the same loopholes, but it backfired. He wrote that the "little lesson in patriotism cost me \$40,000-plus, ten years of my life, and set my retirement plans back to 0."

The note was initially posted Tuesday, but was modified yesterday at 6:42 a.m. According to local News Corporation affiliate MyFox-Austin, Stack set his home on fire, which was located six miles from the crash area. It was reported that his 12-year-old stepdaughter and another unidentified woman were

rescued by a neighbor from the burning residence.

Following this, Stack departed in a single-engine, Piper Cherokee airplane from Georgetown Municipal Airport, north of Austin around 9:40 a.m., but did not file a flight plan. He intentionally crashed the small single engine plane into the second floor of the seven-story Echelon office building around 10 a.m. local time (11 a.m. Eastern Standard Time).

The crash shook and shattered many of the buildings windows and knocked employees to the floor. Nearby buildings also shook as black and gray smoke billowed into the sky.

A witness named Cynthia told CNN the building "shook almost like an earthquake." She told the news outlet that she followed her co-workers as soon as they ran out of the building.

"People were on the second floor. They couldn't get out. They were hanging out the windows screaming for help," she said.

The federal building employed 199 IRS workers, two of which were rushed to an area hospital; one person was unaccounted

for. Firefighters were able to control the flames and within 75 minutes the flames were dying out.

President Barack Obama was notified of the attack shortly after noon. In addition, North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) scrambled two F-16 fighter jets from an air-

field in Houston to conduct air patrols in response. However, the Department of Homeland Security stated that there was no reason to suspect terrorist activity. The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) is sending staff from Dallas and Washington, D.C. to the scene.




Maybe the production team was attempting to give the old classic a more contemporary flair by including


