## Robbery Occurs in Engineering Building

At 3:33 a.m., four ski-masked assailants robbed three male students in the Lewis K. Downing Engineering Building.

The four assailants continued their crime spree around the campus until 6:30 a.m., according to Fox 5 News.

"That's crazy that they can come inside our school building and rob us," Jasmine Thomas, a Howard student, told Fox 5, "Something needs to be done."

Tena Hunter, a junior chemical engineering major, said that three students were studying in the engineering building library when the robbery happened.

Hunter said the crime canceled the three student's plans to travel to Toronto to attend the 36th annual convention of the National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE).

The 36th annual NSBE convention kicked-off on March 31, and lasts until April 4.

The convention marks the first international convention of the

organization, which aims to promote the success of Black engineering students and professionals.

According to a Howard University Police Department (HUPD) crime alert, one of the armed burglars slapped a student before leaving the engineering building through the handicap entrance facing Georgia Avenue.

Nine other robberies or attempted robberies took place between 3:30 a.m. and 6:30 a.m.

The crime alert said Black and Hispanic men walking in pairs or alone were the main targets of the assailants. Metro police believe that the culprits of the robberies are connected.

"I was not aware of the robbery," said Nyoko Efreti, a junior chemical engineering major, "but this is nothing new."

Efreti said that engineering school has been the sight of numerous break-ins and burglaries.

"It's open odd hours for CEACS students, but other non-CEACS students use it for their own activities," she said.

She added that CEACS administrators are trying to make the building less vulnerable to

delinquency.

There has been a rash crime in the Howard area in the last few weeks.

On March 21 HUPD released a crime alert.

In that alert a student that lives off campus was robbed in her home.

Six suspects entered her home at approximately 3:00 a.m.

The suspects threatened the complainant and the other residents with golf clubs, bricks and a knife.

They demanded everyone's valuables. All of the suspects were wearing masks.

## Understanding, Making Sense Out of the Census

If you haven't already been bombarded by a wave of television, radio, and online ads reminding you to fulfill just one of your legally required duties as a citizen, get ready.

"We can't move forward, until we mail it back" is the slogan for this year's simplified and more available forms, which were sent out to over 120 million Americans within the past few months.

Administered by the United States Department of Commerce under the U.S. Census Bureau, the forms are sent out to accurately survey the age, sex, race, employment and population of the nation every 10 years.

These numbers will help determine which state districts and states receive more or less congressional representation and more significantly, how much money will be received by such areas.

Around the time of the last Census in 2000, over 72 percent of American households returned their forms, yet an estimated one million people of color did not.

The numbers include 628,000 African-Americans, 248,000 Latinos and 22,000 Native Americans.

Ethnic groups who historically have the least representation and live in areas that are the most impoverished.

Such numbers are not surprising to those within the Census

Bureau, but they are still a negative stain on the U.S. Government efforts since communities of color are the most likely to be under counted.

For 2010, the Census form asks fewer questions that are also less personal.

Rather than a longer, more in depth form of the Census that was distributed in ten years ago, the current forms only ask about 10 questions.

Many citizens are apprehensive to distribute their information to strangers working with the government.

Therefore, one of the major educational pushes this year has been to raise awareness of confidentiality.

By law, Census information cannot be shared for anyone outside of the Census Bureau, such as law enforcement, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), private organizations, landlords and immigration.

Black organizations nationwide such as the NAACP, National Urban League and the National Coalition on Black Civic Participation have been working to improve the state of affairs this year.

Programs such as Count on Change 2010 have been created specifically to help out these efforts.

As of now, households who have received the 2010 Census are now required to mail back their forms.

If citizens fail to do so, Census workers will begin arriving at their homes beginning Friday, April 23.

This year marks the celebration's 14th year, and the Academy has started a nation-wide effort to get more people involved. Check out the Metro Section for events being held in the area throughout April.

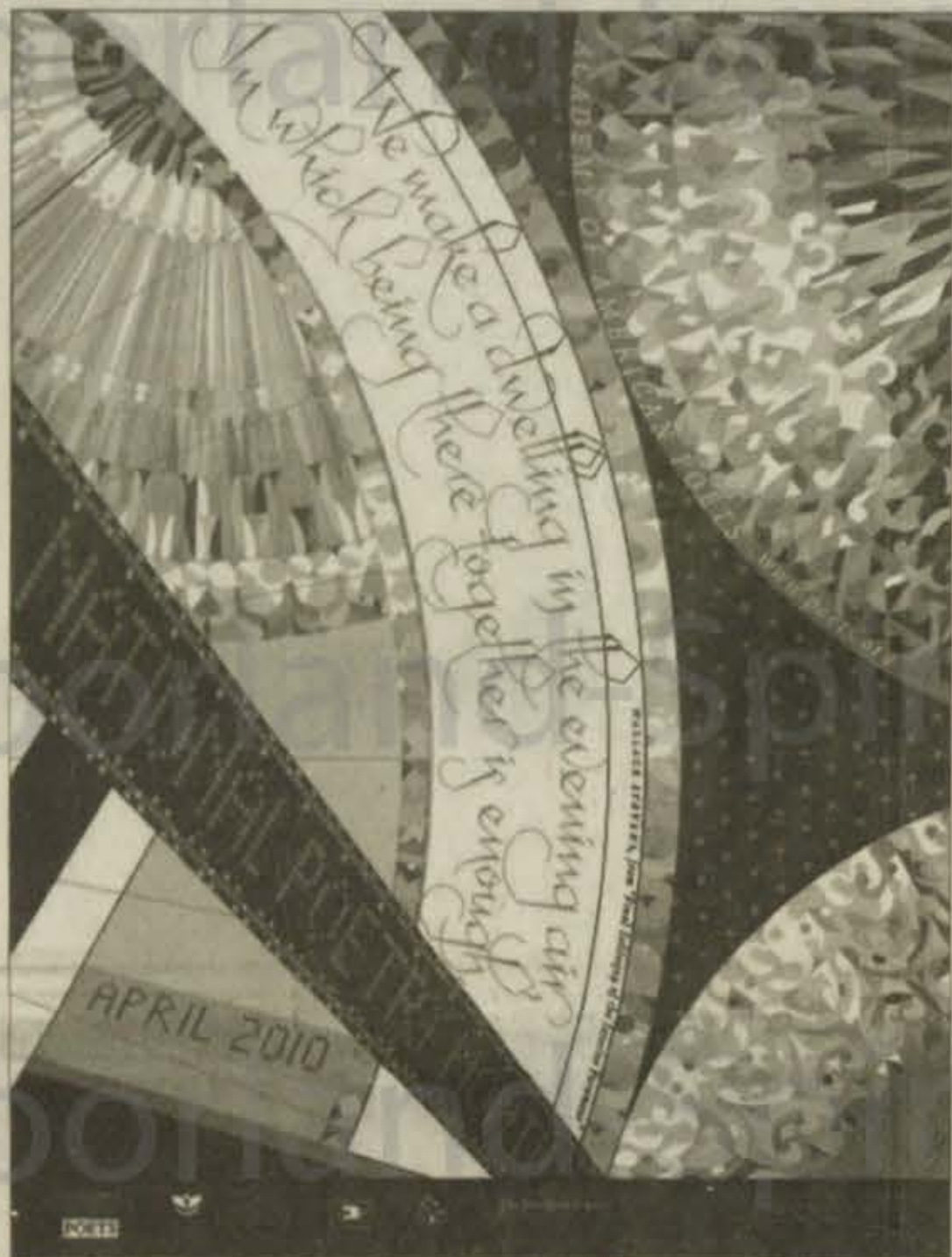
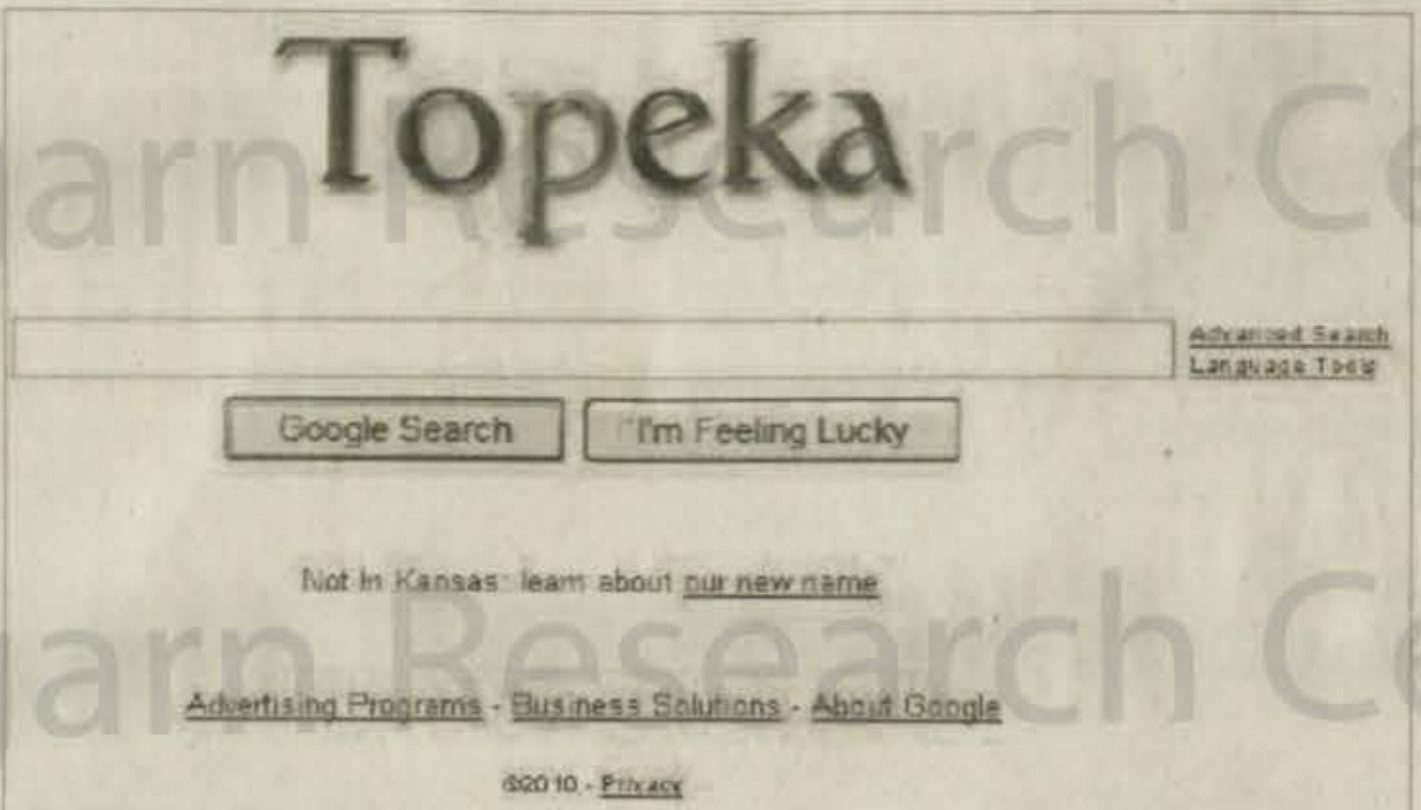
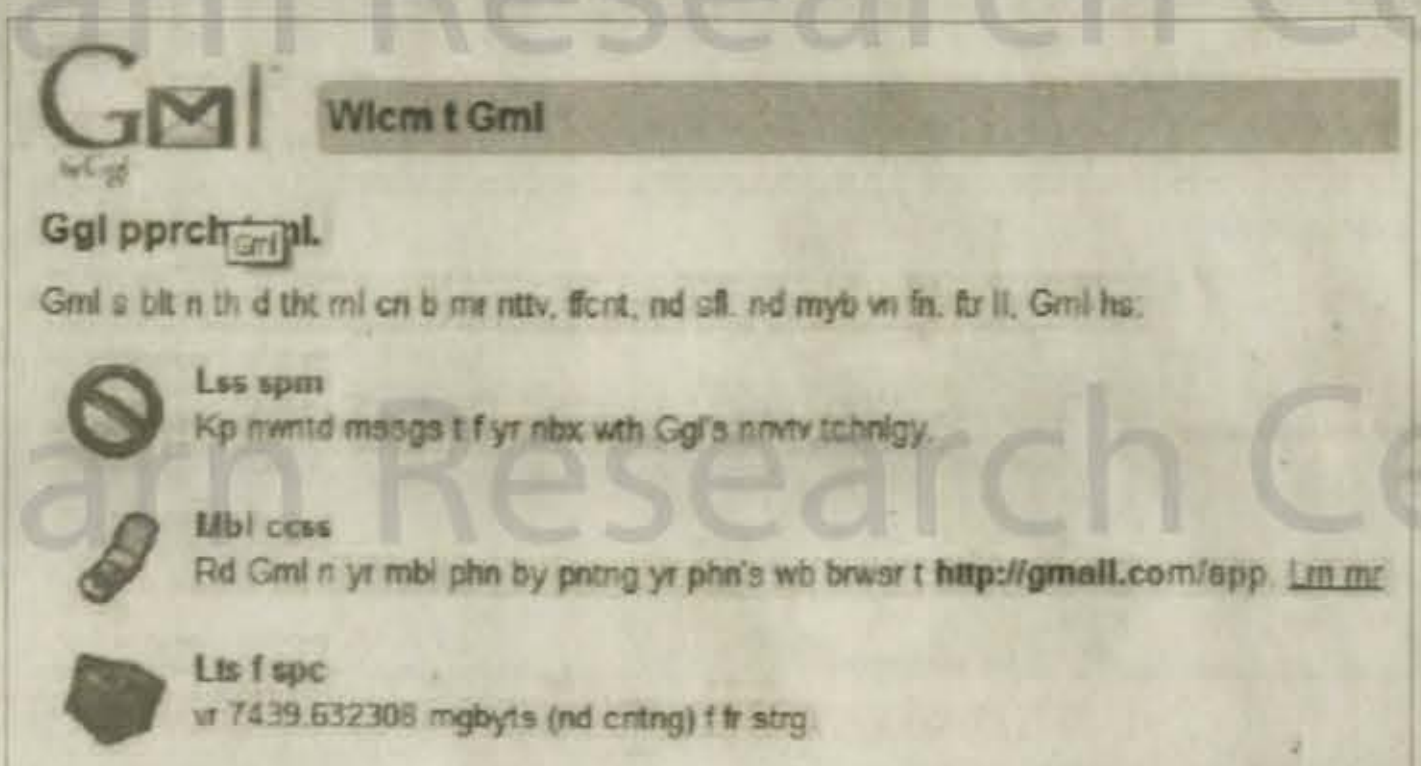

Along with the experience gained after four years at Howard, and two months of intensive training at the Parisi Speed School in New Jersey, Corniffe performed well enough at Howard Pro Day to be considered by professional scouts.

Croner, an administrative justice major of Wilmington, Del., was also successful at Howard's Pro Day.

He realized his love for the game while playing flag football

at ten years old, prompting him to proceed to playing on his high school team and eventually advancing to the business-like atmosphere of college ball.

A variety of experiences after high school, including two years playing for a junior college, a stint at Western Carolina University, and some time working at a juvenile center with troubled youth set the stage for Croner's future success, giving him an appreciation for education and hard work.

"I actually don't really need football," Croner said. "It's all about putting yourself in the

position to have the opportunity. As long as I get that degree, and actually take something from it, I've succeeded and accomplished what I've wanted to do."

Family support has played a substantial role in both players' situations, with family members traveling to D.C. to support as Croner and Corniffe competed in Pro Day.

"My family is definitely my biggest support system," Corniffe said. "Of course they want me to play, but their biggest thing is being supportive and there for me, no matter what happens."

Likewise, Croner's father is a big supporter of his football aspirations, but is more concerned about his putting forth the best effort academically and being the first in his family to earn a degree.

Although Croner also appreciates the value of his degree, he has an idea what team he would like to play for if given the chance.

"I'd like to play for the Oakland Raiders. Growing up, you take on the team your parents like, and my dad's a huge Raiders fan," he explained.

"He has a huge influence on my life, and I want to make him

proud," Croner continued.

Both players recognize that reaching the level of potentially being considered for a spot on a professional team is an outstanding accomplishment and are wisely taking the situation in stride.

If he's not picked up by a team, Corniffe plans to pursue a career as an athletic director at a major university.

Likewise, Croner is prepared to enter the police academy and pursue a career in law enforcement.

The soft-spoken 18-year-old freshman sports medicine major was first introduced to tennis at the age of seven, and the same year, took losing her first match all in stride.

"I didn't really care about my loss. I was just happy to look cute in my tennis uniform," Morgan said.

Growing up, Brittney did it all - ballet, track, basketball, swimming, and even boxing, but she was best at tennis. Morgan credits her dad with her success.

"He got me into it, he's really proud," Morgan said with enthusiasm. Morgan's backbone consists of her parents and younger sister whom she says gives good advice and wisdom. "They been here, done that already," said Morgan, referring to her parents.

Morgan's life now would have been very different if she had followed her dream that she had since she was 11.

"I wanted to go straight to pro, not college. But going professional requires making sacrifices like

traveling all the time, being away from family and friends and home school," she said. "I didn't want to give up everything I already had."

Morgan's skills have been seen as phenomenal and compared to that of a young Serena Williams, the tennis superstar she admires the most.

"[Serena] has a lot of force and momentum. When she hits the ball, it's just evil," said Morgan's doubles partner, junior Alyssa Works. "I really enjoy playing doubles with [Brittney]. She's a quite player, it's just effortless for her; she's a beast. When you see her hit that evil volley, the opponents just throw up their hands; it's over."

Morgan admits life as a student-athlete doesn't come easy. "It's crazy," she said. "We practice at least five days a week and have matches three to four times a week. Sometimes we have to miss classes and make-up tests or homework."

Although her schedule is hectic, the winning moment is her most satisfying feeling.

"Her record pretty much describes her," said Morgan's tennis coach, Larry Strickland.

Coach Strickland has been at Howard 25 years and explains that Morgan has been a dream to coach and has all the skills to become one of the top players in the region.

"She's a very strong player, and very coachable. She may be a pretty quiet person off the court, but she speaks loudly on the court," Strickland said.

High school and college ten-

nis have been quite different for Morgan.

"Winning is a big factor now [more] than in high school because scholarships are on the line and the coach's job; it counts more," said Morgan, who has won six out of the eight matches this season.

But it's not just about winning; it's about having fun and enjoying the team chemistry.

"My team is fun, we have lots of jokes and laughs and we hang out when we're not playing," said Morgan. "The tennis team cares about the community; we gave Halloween candy out to the kids at Banneker and played a tennis match with pink balls for Breast Cancer Awareness."

While Morgan originally had her eyes set on another school before attending Howard, she is glad to be a part of the Bison community and claims that she has met a lot of great people and learned a lot of things thus far.

Morgan hopes to eventually return to California to attend medical school at UCLA and become an orthopedic surgeon.

She plans to continue to play tennis, but not on a professional level. "Just for fun and to stay in shape," Morgan said, smiling.

The women's team plays their rival, Hampton University, Saturday at Banneker Community Center at 1 p.m.

"If you ever see her play, she's outstanding," an assuring Coach Strickland said.
